COMMANDER RUE: Colors in place, hand salute. Two.
. . . SAlute to colors by ASSembly . . . Uncover.

We'll have the invocation by Department Chaplain Ron Distel.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Good morning, everyone.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Let us pray.
We ask for Your protection, Lord, for all of our military men and women in service. Give them, Lord, the unflinching courage to defend our country with dignity, honor and dedication. Help them, Lord, at our churches, our homes, and our places of work.

Protect our land, Lord, from all enemies, in and out of our borders.

Give us peace, Lord. Instill in the hearts of everyone everywhere to live in peace and goodwill for all.

And it is to You that we pray. Amen. FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

COMMANDER RUE: We'll now join 1st Vice

Commander AJ Whatley in the Pledge of Allegiance.

POW/MIA recognition by Department 1st Vice Commander AJ Whatley.

1VC WHATLEY: Resolution 288, adopted at the 67th National Convention, called for designating an empty chair placed at all official meetings of The American Legion as a physical symbol of the thousands of American POW/MIAs still unaccounted for from all wars and conflicts involving the United States of America. This is a remainder for all of us to spare no effort to secure the release of any American prisoner from captivity, repatriation of the remains of those who died bravely in the defense of liberty, and a full accounting of those missing. Let us rededicate ourselves to this vital endeavor.

COMMANDER RUE: Cover.
We'll now join the 2 nd Vice Commander for the Department, Stan Oren, in the preamble.

COMMANDER RUE: We'll now have roll call.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Good morning, everybody.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
. . . ROLl CALl Conducted . . .

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander, you have a quorum.

COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
We'll now have Department Sergeant-at-Arms Dean Boyers give the introduction of guests. SGT-AT-ARMS BOYERS: Good morning.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
SGT-AT-ARMS BOYERS: The guests we have present this morning, we have Dayna Beyer, Auxiliary Department Historian; Holly Lewis, Chair of the Finance Committee; Gary Cox, Jr., Past 6th District Commander and candidate for Department 2nd Vice; Al Beyer, Department Historian; Robert Klostermeier, Past NEC and Past Department Commander; Ralph Van Kirk, he's the 10th District 2nd Vice Commander; Tom White, Department Service Officer; Mel Cantrell, from Post 79; Will Little, Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms; Rylee Little, she's a guest, Junior Auxiliary President of 764; Robert Schmitt, Past Department Commander; and Darell Bishop, Past Department Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Dean.
Now we'll have the reading of the previous minutes by Department Adjutant John Robinson.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The outgoing and incoming

DEC, we do not have the minutes for yet.
We do have an emergency Department Executive Committee meeting. All of you should have it in front of you.

The meeting was held virtually, on Wednesday, July 19, 2023. Jason Rue called the meeting to order. He stated that we needed to pass a resolution to revoke Post 472's charter. He asked Adjutant Robinson to read the resolution. The resolution is attached.

Commander Rue then asked Joyce Hannum, Past 9th District Commander, to speak on the state of the Post and what has been going on.

Joyce stated that the Post had issues with members not presenting their DD-214s when the District asked for them to prove eligibility.

And then PDC Stennis had also looked into their books and found large amounts of income missing from the Post.

At that point, Commander Rue called for a vote. The vote was unanimous.

The meeting ended in regular order.
COMMANDER RUE: I'll entertain a motion to accept the minutes.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th

District Commander, so moves.
6TH DISTRICT 1VC MILLER: Chris Miller, 6th District 1st Vice Commander, seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: I have a motion and a proper second to approve the meeting minutes.

Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander, as soon as we get the other minutes, we'll get them out to everybody and we will do an on-line vote to approve.

COMMANDER RUE: Hearing no discussion, all those in favor say aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: Those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
As he said, when we get the meeting minutes from the last two, we will get them out to everybody. We'll give you probably a week and a half or so to go through them, sort through them, and then we'll have another emergency DEC, I guess, to approve those minutes, or actually we can do an e-mail vote for those minutes.

I'd like to thank all of you for coming out
this morning.
I know, like me, many of you had a long drive to get here. So we'll just move on to AJ Whatley, 1st Vice Commander, for membership.

1VC WHATLEY: Thank you, Commander. $\mathrm{O}-\mathrm{H}$.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: I-O.
1VC WHATLEY: Everybody is awake. I can see that.

Saying that together we can achieve anything, I'm going to give you my membership report. But first I'm going to give you the standing of the Posts from one through five, as it stands today: Post (sic) 12, Post (sic) 2 -- let me back up, District 12, District 2, District 3, District 6, and District 11.

My membership report, those were Department quota.

Yes, sir?
FROM THE FLOOR: The Districts have something? What do those Districts have?

1VC WHATLEY: One through five, the standings for membership.

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: The standings, all right. I missed that part.

1VC WHATLEY: Turn on your hearing aid.
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Yeah. I don't have one of them.

Don Capps, District 8 Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Please stand when you have a question.

1VC WHATLEY: Thank you.
Goals for the Department quota, I'm pushing the level high, 90 to 95 percent across the board.

As you know, for the last 12 to 13 years, our Department has been on a skid down the hill. And I'm pushing to stop that curve and push us back up the hill.

I'm focusing, and our main focus should be, on retention. The Districts plan to and must use teamwork to stay in touch with the Posts and give them help whenever they need it, to assist them.

The first membership report will be released on the 2nd, and will continue to update every Wednesday.

Membership cards. When you're conducting your Post inspection, be sure that you look at the CPR and make sure they're turning in all of the necessary paperwork so they can receive their cards.

National is aware that Paid-Up-for-Life members have not been counted. But that's been ratified and that should be out on your next report. You can also go on-line and receive that data.

Training. As far as training, if your Post or District needs training, you can contact Hunter Wood. He's the activity person and the membership, and he will set up a meeting or a schedule for training for your District or Post. Commander, I believe --

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander, could I speak on membership for just a second?

COMMANDER RUE: Are you finished?
1VC WHATLEY: Yes, that concludes my report, sir.

COMMANDER RUE: Go ahead.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I believe every District 1st Vice Commander should have papers from National. Several of you have asked me about them. They're just a little card that shows 888 transfers to Posts. Reach out to those Posts because those members want to go there.

National sends those to us. We will be forwarding them to the District officers to get
them to the Posts and work with the Posts, showing how to get those members into their Post.

We're not going to do that. So that's on you guys to make sure that happens. That's easy membership.

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Commander, I have a question on membership.

Mason, 5th District 2nd (sic) Vice Commander.
Last night I spoke to my Adjutant of my Post, 344, Carey. We have sent in 50-something memberships already and the report shows us at zero.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: When did you send them in?

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: I don't know when he sent them in, but he has checked it several times. And usually, I know the first batch goes right after you get the cards, which would have been right after --

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Can I speak on this, Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: (Nodding affirmatively).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: If you are mailing your cards to Department for us to process, you're looking at at least three weeks before will show
up on the report. This time of year, with everybody sending them in, you're looking closer to six weeks. Because it takes National that long to process them through.

So we do the best we can, but the turnaround time is a minimum of three weeks. And that's if everything goes exactly according to plan. By the time we get them and we process them, we send our transmittal to National, it takes National another 11 days, normally, for them to process a transmittal. This time of year it's closer to 14 to 17 days.

Thank you, Commander.
5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Thank you.
Commander, Mason, District 12. I submitted on MyLegion. Do we know how long? Because it's been a week since I've submitted some renewals.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Three weeks.
5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Three weeks. Thank you.

COMMANDER RUE: That process will speed up later. It's just the over swamped they have right now. That usually is about a week turnaround.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It's usually about 11 days.

COMMANDER RUE: Yeah.
Well, speaking of membership, real quick, I got an e-mail from National this week. We are not near the top on having all of our paperwork turned in for people to get their cards. If you look at our cleared list, we should still have cards.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah, we have some.
COMMANDER RUE: Yeah.
So we have Posts that don't have their cards yet.

Look at your cleared list. If they're in your District, reach out to them. Help them. It may be as simple as they don't know because the previous Commander didn't tell them to do it. But reach out to them. See if they need some help to get this stuff done. Because they're already behind the eight ball at this point on getting membership out.

So please look at those cleared lists. And if they're in your District, please help them get what they need done.

And the cleared list is posted Monday, Wednesday, Friday.

We'll now have Department 2nd Vice Commander Stan Oren on Post activities.

2VC OREN: Okay. We just got done with the golf outing over in Kettering. We didn't have a huge turnout, but we sure had beautiful weather over there on July 29th and 30th. Kettering Post 598 had a nice meal on Friday (sic) night, or Saturday night, excuse me.

So we're looking for hosts for next year.
On the bowling, we have a contract with the hotel that has been signed. And Hunter will be working with Peg Gross and Jon --

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Vulgamore.
2VC OREN: -- Vulgamore --
My pronunciations are terrible on names.
-- and pass out information on how to reserve a room.

That will be at the Holiday Inn and Suites Cincinnati Eastgate. Post 72 will be the host Post. The alley that is holding the tournament is Cherry Grove Lanes, at 4005 Hopper Hill Road, Cincinnati. The date of the tournaments are February 10th and 11th, 17th and 18th, 24 th and 25th.

We're circulating some new ideas, possibly looking at a fishing tournament, a ruck march, a paintball tournament, cornhole.

If anybody has suggestions, please get them to me and Hunter. We will work on it, trying to get activities up again, get people involved, and trying to get our younger veterans to come to these things.

So, okay, we are looking for Posts willing to host activities within the Districts. If you are interested, see Hunter about a package, a bid package. They've got them completed now, so we can get them out to you.

Any ideas on how we can get more people out and more activities, please get them to me.

Thank you, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: I'll say it right this time, Jose Rivera, Department Treasurer.

TREASURER RIVERA: Thanks, buddy. You're never going to live that down.

Okay, my report is short and sweet.
I was informed that this past week we actually hit $\$ 7$ million in our funds. I think we lost seven. Investments, we lost seven. So we're just under. So we're doing good.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We're still over seven. TREASURER RIVERA: Oh, look at that, we're still over seven.

I misheard you, just like when you say my name.

So our investments are doing good.
Anything else as far as finance, you will be hearing that from Holly.

And I, too, am running for 2 nd Vice, in case you didn't know that.

Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Jose.
NEC MASOWICK: I've got a question.
COMMANDER RUE: Yes, Steve.
NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick, NEC.
I talked to Jose a little bit earlier. I got an e-mail with his name on it, saying they were putting an account together for me. And I didn't know how they were going to do this, so I asked Jose. It's a scam.

Do you want to bring that to light?
TREASURER RIVERA: Yeah.
I, last week, received an e-mail that supposedly came from our Commander, saying that I needed to set up an ACH so he could do web hosting. It's wrong.

And then the other one that he's talking about, I never sent out an e-mail. And if I want
to talk about funds, I'm going to contact the Finance Committee first for something like that to happen.

So all them e-mails you're getting, they're scams. If you're not sure, please call JD and he will let you know that they're not real.

Thank you.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Adjutant Robinson.
Real quick, on the scam portion, we've looked into with our IT people and we've not come up with a good solution to stop them. But if you look and you see it's Jason Rue, or Commander Stennis, or whoever it comes from, click on that, on the name, and it will show you where it came from. If it's not an OhioLegion.com e-mail address, don't answer it. It's a fake. All of our officers will use the OhioLegion.com e-mail they have to contact you.

Any questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Thank you, sir.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
We'll now have the Chaplain report from Department Chaplain Ron Distel.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Mr Commander.

Morning, again.
FROM THE FLOOR: Morning.
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: I'm going to start with a bit of sad news. We lost Lou Dimmerman and Ed Anderson since we've met last. I've not heard any arrangements on either one, but I just wanted to make you aware of that.

I also heard this morning that Past Commander Jean Wilson is in the hospital. She was taken there because of a lot of stomach area pain. Her husband took her in. They admitted her. They don't expect her out for a while.

Maybe Holly Lewis has a little more to add. She spoke with her directly.

FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: Yes. They think she has gallstones. And she doesn't have a gallbladder anymore, so it's kind of a serious situation. So they moved her to U.C. last night, but I haven't heard anything else.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Thank you, Holly.
Next month, or the month after, it's going to be real soon, we'll be having a Religious Emphasis meeting.

Now, every District has a Chaplain. Every Religious Emphasis meeting I've been to, we've had
about four people show up. There is no reason that every District cannot ask their Chaplain to be at this meeting.

We need ideas. We need people to come up with different things. We need people to support.

So there's all the Districts, and I don't expect any less than a Chaplain from every one.

FROM THE FLOOR: Date?
When is that?
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: That hasn't been set yet, but it will be. I'll be getting with Christie probably before the day is out.

Thank you, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Ron.
4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Commander, Buxton, 4th District Commander.

Lou Dimmerman was interred yesterday at Dayton National Cemetery. I was there and everything went really good.

And I don't know anything about Ed Anderson and what's going on with that.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: This information has to come out faster. Because I got a phone call Tuesday about Ed Anderson and I heard he passed on Sunday. So, you know, there's no way for us to
get places or to show our respects to the family unless we know.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: There has not been any arrangements forwarded to us for Ed yet.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Okay.
Thank you, sir.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
Harold.
1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: Harold Landis, 1st District.

If we get our Chaplains to show up for that meeting, are they going to be paid mileage?

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: Okay, just so I can tell my Chaplain.

COMMANDER RUE: Yep.
NEC MASOWICK: Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Steve.
NEC MASOWICK: Speaking of deaths, -- Steve Masowick, NEC -- Barb Clausing passed.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes, I did see that.
Al Beyer, Department Historian.
HISTORIAN BEYER: Commander, how are you today?

COMMANDER RUE: Good, Al.

HISTORIAN BEYER: Gentlemen, DEC members, I'll be real quick here today, but I've got to follow my notes.

Commander, I'm really pleased to represent the Department of Ohio and this American Legion for you this year again. Thank you for the appointment.

I will be submitting my 2022-2023 Department History to the National Historian, that will reflect the efforts of our members fulfilling the mission of The American Legion.

And I will be also attending the National Historian Conference meeting at the National Convention in Charlotte.

I'm asking all of you to submit your Post and District history so that I can include it into my reports to National, as well as document it in our Department history records. So if you're wondering why you're not in it, just look to see if you were submitted, first of all.

I would appreciate any photos and stories submitted to me by e-mail, as well as I would appreciate an invitation to attend all your Post and District events, to help promote the history that you'll be making and the difference here in
our Department and impact throughout the nation. If $I$ can be of further assistance, please don't hesitate to contact me.

I'd like to thank my Historian, Bob White, for his participation in making this history events recordable, and also my beautiful wife, Dayna, who helps me more than anybody can probably know.

I've also got one piece of news here.
The Miami Valley Military History Museum is having a reenactment here pretty soon. Free parking, free admission, bottled water, and individually-wrapped snacks. It's, let's see, it's on August 9th, at 6:00 PM, at East Main Street, on East Main Street, in Fairborn. If you want the details and phone numbers and what have you, please see me after the meeting here.

That concludes my report, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Al.
Next up we'll have Steve Masowick, NEC.
NEC MASOWICK: Commander.
It's good to see Al on his feet again, huh?
For a while there $I$ thought he had a drinking problem.

Did you see the score yesterday? Cleveland
finally won yesterday, 4 to 2. That's a milestone.

One award was given my recognition. Congratulations to a person on the third runner-up position in the nation for recruiting new members. Your hard work has not gone unnoticed. Please accept the enclosed check for $\$ 150$ as our way of saying thank you. That was to Jean Wilson.

We had a voting NEC meeting on-line. The voting members agreed to allow Centene Corporation, C-E-N-T-E-N-E, a Fortune 25 company, who has offered to enter into a five-year agreement, to advertise Medicare plans through to The American Legion Members through our national marketing channels, such as the website, newsletters, American Legion Magazine, and our National Convention. The lucrative contract will mean millions of dollars in net revenue to The American Legion.

Unfortunately, probably the downside of this, you're going to get another bunch of recycle in the recycle bin.

The agreement is a pretty good chunk of money. And it wasn't seen. It just came out of nowhere. So we were lucky to get that money.

We have a new member in Julia Mathis. She's going to be the legislative division. And she'll be working out of National Headquarters, Washington, D.C.

Julia currently serves as the Legislative Director for The American Legion National Headquarters. Her responsibilities will include serving as the organization head lobbyist by overseeing the operations of the Legislative Division of The American Legion before the U.S. Congress on all legislative matters which the organization is interested, and in coordinating testimony in congress hearings, reviewing written testimony statements for the record, and organizing grassroots activities for training sessions, and on and on.

We'll just welcome Julia Mathis.
If we ever get to Washington, whoever goes to Washington this year, we'll be able to see her.

In closing, if $I$ don't see you all sooner, I'll see you in Charlotte. I'm sure we'll hear more about that later; right? Christie is going to mention some things on there.

And then JD, you've got some things to mention on that.

So Christie, lots of love there, taking me off the hook there. Thank you.

If there's no other questions, I'm going to depart.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
NEC MASOWICK: Commander, thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Steve.
Alternate NEC Ron Chapman, do you have anything to add?

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Ditto what you just heard. You just heard my report from my boss. COMMANDER RUE: Department Judge Advocate Josh Brown.

JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Well, thank you, Commander.

And thanks to everybody for the confidence that you've put in me.

I've been the Judge Advocate for less than a month. I've already had about four cases put on my desk: Post 15, Post 472, a Toledo problem, and a lawsuit. So I was kind of thrown in the water and I'm learning to swim.

I have read the bylaws very meticulously, outlined them, and still showed up this morning and the Commander had to correct me on something
that I got wrong. So I'm learning as I go.
But I feel like in the lawsuit that we have, I feel like we're in a great position to knock that one out with minimal cost. And of course we're working to prevent any other lawsuits from coming.

And of course I'm always available. So I want to make sure everybody has my number to call me.

Nobody from the Post should call me directly. If it's someone from the Post, they should call JD.

But if it's state level, or Districts, you can call me directly. And my number is (614)284-4394.

FROM THE FLOOR: Say that again. I'm sorry. JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: It's (614)284-4394. And no conversation with me will be confidential. I will report to JD and Jason everything that we talked about. So don't expect it.

I'm not representing you, but I will look out for the interests of the Department. And I'll try to make sure that we keep the Department out of trouble, and make sure that we keep our hands
clean in everything. And so I'm glad to take those calls on behalf of the Department.

And the main thing that we've run into is, just when you deal with a problem with your Posts, don't say things that accuse people of things. Make sure you stay in your lane. And that's what's gotten us into some trouble in the past, is making some accusations and coming in a little too hot in the situation.

And that's what $I$ want to make myself available for, is to coach you through some of the difficult situations and make sure that the Department is apprised of what's going on. Should I take questions? COMMANDER RUE: Yeah. JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Okay, any questions? FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response). JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: All right, thank you. (Applause).

NEC MASOWICK: Thank you for taking on the responsibility for us.

JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: No Gary Minadeo.
Department Adjutant, do you want to talk?
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Morning, everybody.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: First, I want to apologize for the air conditioning. We tried to get them out. They are coming Monday. We've been fighting this for about two years now, as I hear from my coordinators.

The second thing, the Cleveland Regatta is September 17th. A lot our Districts cover right around the Cleveland Regatta. It's right after the Commander's Homecoming the 16th. So we're going to make the trip from his homecoming and drive over and have a really good time. If you've never seen it, it's pretty cool.

The Legion National sponsored a skull a couple years ago, and then we present a trophy. I'm not sure if we do a check anymore. I know we did the check the first year, but I believe we just present the trophy for the winners of the military race.

I talked about Jason's homecoming. We do have flyers out.

I will say we also have Dave Dilts' flyers, if you want to go to the SAL Commander's Homecoming.

The downside of my job is the closing and
merging of Posts. Please, if you're looking at closing a Post, get with me before you start, so we can make sure all the proper paperwork is filed.

You have to file with the state AG's office if you're closing. It's a $\$ 50$ charge for most of them. We have to start there. Because otherwise, as Josh can allude to, they keep creeping back and biting us in the butt. So let's make sure we do things correctly.

JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: And I would appreciate being copied on those communications.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay, we can do that.
Anybody have any questions for me?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Oh, Charlotte and the
Ohio Party. We have the Ohio Party set. It is at the NASCAR Hall of Fame. It will be from 7:00 to 10:00. It's within walking distance. I'm pretty sure everybody has their tickets already.

Okay, good.
If you need tickets, let me know and I'll see what $I$ can do. It was a limited amount of space we had. We are sharing it with Michigan and Iowa. FROM THE FLOOR: Michigan?

What if we've paid for them and haven't gotten them yet?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: You won't receive them until you're there.

FROM THE FLOOR: Well you just said you should have your tickets.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Well, you should have purchased, or let me know about wanting the tickets.

FROM THE FLOOR: Oh, I got you.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We are doing a really nice ticket that looks like you're getting into a NASCAR race. And we have a few other fun ideas for you while you're there.

I do have the list of delegates I would like to go over. I've tried to contact the District officers. I did find out Chet Nowak is going.

Does anybody know if Carol Jordan is going?
4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: She's going.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay. We need the housing form today.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: I told her and she said she was sending it in.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Paul Kramer. Not going?
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: I don't know. He
never called me back.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay.
Jerry Collins?
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Actually, I sent you a text back on the number that you called me. He's not going.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay.
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Don Capps, District 8.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: And Al Buxton, District 4.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Sorry.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Larry, did you ever hear anything on Mickey Nest?

Okay, I will reach out to those and make sure they're not going.

Thank you, Commander.
No questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay.
COMMANDER RUE: No questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: All right, at this time we'll move on to the commission reports.

Christie White, Americanism Commission

Coordinator and Department Baseball Coordinator. COORDINATOR WHITE: Good morning. FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning. COORDINATOR WHITE: All of you should have been e-mailed the minutes ahead of time. I'm just going to over the motions so we can get these minutes approved.

The Americanism Commission met on July 15th. It was moved and seconded to approve the minutes of the last meeting. It was also motioned and seconded to approve the commission rules.

Testing dates. The Americanism Commission agreed to have the A\&G Test October 30th through November 3rd. The make-up testing dates, in case there's a snow day or whatever, November 6th through the 10 th are the make-up dates.

The trip dates. We are hoping to have it March 3rd through the 8th, 2024. If that week does not work, it will be March l0th through the 15 th .

We do it based off of Arlington National Cemetery. That's the first thing that we schedule and we schedule everything else around it. If they don't have any dates that first week, we will move to the second week.

The Americanism Commission also selected the essay question for the A\&G Test. The essay question will be: "Should the United States Flag Code have enforcement penalties added if the U.S. Flag is being misused? Please support your answer." So that will be the essay question. The 6th District gave us a resolution to create an Outstanding Department JROTC Cadet of the Year, to be awarded at Mid-Winter. The American Commission supported the resolution and agreed to take ownership of it. They will be reformatting the resolution to present to the DEC for approval.

The Father John Duffy and Chaplain of The Year Convention Award was discussed, and the Americanism Commission believes these convention awards will be better voted on at the Religious Emphasis Committee. So they are giving those to Religious Emphasis.

The Americanism Commission would also like for the Convention Committee awards to be sent with CPRs to each Post, as well as requesting Posts to send a narrative for each award, as well as a hard copy of their CPR. So that should make judging the convention awards a little bit easier.

The Americanism Commission also asked for the Red, White, and Blue Award to be redone. So that award has been redone and it is on the website.

That completes my Americanism report, Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: Baseball.

6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: Shane Eaton, 6th District Commander, makes the motion.

11TH DISTRICT CMDR STAN: Tom Stan, 11th District Commander, seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: So we have a proper first and a second to accept the Americanism Commission Report.

Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
Baseball.
COORDINATOR WHITE: Baseball. This report is for information only.

2023 marked the 98th year for American Legion Baseball.

This year's senior tournament kicked off on July 24 th, at Beavers Field in Lancaster, and the Department Commander threw out the first pitch. He did a decent job.

COMMANDER RUE: They said it was a strike. COORDINATOR WHITE: They always say it's a strike.

No, he did good.
The Department Senior Tournament was an eight-team, double-elimination tournament.

The eight teams, in case nobody knows who won each region, were: Region 1, Napoleon Post 300; Region 2 was Sidney Post 217; Region 3 was Wayne County Post 68; Region 4, Utica Post 92; Region 5, Harrison Post 199; Region 6, Pickerington Post 283; Region 7, New Philadelphia Post 139; and Region 8 was Beverly Lowell Post 389/750. Those were the eight teams that were in the tournament.

The final game of the tournament started on

Thursday, July 27th. Beverly Lowell Post 389/750 and Harrison Post 199 faced off for the final game, both teams only having one loss prior to the championship game. Harrison Post 199 defeated Beverly Lowell 7 to 5, in the tenth inning.

Now at Legion Baseball we only play seven. So it went all the way to ten, on the hottest day that week.

Harrison moved on to the Mid-Atlantic Regional Tournament. They played Wednesday against Fort Cumberland, Maryland. They won 12 to 6.

Thursday they played Quakertown, Pennsylvania. They lost, 6 to 4.

And yesterday they played Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and lost 8 to 4.

So Harrison is out of the Mid-Atlantic Regional, but they did Ohio proud.

Commander, if $I$ may, since Chris Emmons is the new Baseball Chairman, do you have any additional things and stuff?

BASEBALL CHAIRMAN EMMONS: Commander, I'll be real quick. I just have a baseball signed by the state champions, Post 199, all the players, that I'd like to give to you.

That's the ball he threw out. And it was not a strike.

NEC MASOWICK: Did he bounce it up?
BASEBALL CHAIRMAN EMMONS: It didn't bounce. NEC MASOWICK: Well, good.

COMMANDER RUE: I was actually on the mound. I wasn't short either.

COORDINATOR WHITE: I mean the front of the mound, but --

COMMANDER RUE: Do you have anything else on Baseball?

COORDINATOR WHITE: That's all I have on Baseball.

COMMANDER RUE: Children And Youth.
COORDINATOR WHITE: Children And Youth, same thing as Americanism, you guys have received the minutes already. So I will just go over the motions so we can get them approved.

It was motioned and seconded to approve the minutes of the meeting and the commission rules.

The 2023-2024 donations that Children and Youth will collect for and raise money for, they decided to go along with the Commander's Project, and they chose "Stockhands Horses for Healing." So any money that the Post collects under Children
and Youth will go to Stockhands.
I want to add this also. If you guys send in money that says "Child Welfare," or the memo says "Child Welfare," Child Welfare goes to National. So any check that you send in that says "Child Welfare" goes to National.

Any check that you send in that says "Children And Youth" stays here. So then we can use it for the Commander's Project.

I just want to make sure that everyone is aware.

Special Olympics donation. They agreed to donate $\$ 25,000$, like they have the last couple years, to Special Olympics.

They also, Special Olympics, made Ohio Legion, specifically, flyers for their schedule of events around the state. That is up on the website.

The Children and Youth Commission, via resolution last year, agreed to have a new program called "Our Country's Flag Program." It's for fourth graders. The commission went over certain dates and deadines. They want to keep it at the District level for right now, for the first year, to see how it goes, to try and get Districts
participating.
Once the Districts start participating, then we'll move it up to state level, like the A\&G Test.

In the minutes you'll have the breakdown of the order forms will be mailed to Posts in August. Order forms will be returned to the Department by September 15 th. Tests need to be returned from the schools to the Posts by November 11th. Post winners need to be decided and mailed to Districts by December 9th. And then District winners will be selected by January 3rd, and awarded at the District Spring Conference. It's in your minutes, but we will also put it on the website and we will mail you something out so you don't have to feverishly write the dates real quick.

The Children and Youth Commission would also like the Convention Committee Awards to be sent with the CPRs to each Post, as well as requesting Posts to send a narrative for each award so they can properly grade them.

Commander, that completes my Children and Youth Report.

COMMANDER RUE: Do you have something, Harold?

1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: I have a question. Harold Landis, Commander, 1st District. On the donation of 23,000 or whatever dollars, I had been informed that that was supposed to go to the Finance Committee and we didn't do that.

COORDINATOR WHITE: The donation has not been made yet.

1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: But in the minutes it's not saying it's going to the Finance Committee.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That was passed years ago, that the committee gets to make the motion to pay that out of the investment. That has been established over the years. So it does not need to actually go through the Finance Committee every year, because it was already established in meeting minutes past that they would make the donation of 25,000 every year until the fund was dissolved.

1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: I was also told it should have went to Charities, Inc. But it belongs in an account to cover it.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We still have that investment account. And there's, I'd have to
look, there was 20 -- I forget how much was in it. COORDINATOR WHITE: I think it was \$23,795. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah.

COORDINATOR WHITE: There's also Special Olympics donations that were made to Department that weren't sent to Special Olympics yet. So we're adding that in there to make it the 25.

COMMANDER RUE: Any other questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: If not, I'll entertain a motion to accept the report.

6TH DISTRICT 1VC MILLER: 6th District 1st Vice Commander Chris Miller motions to approve the report as read.

1ST DISTRICT CMDR LANDIS: 1st District Commander Harold Landis seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: Sorry, Sharon. I was already looking over here (indicating).

14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: That's the problem.

COMMANDER RUE: I was already looking over this way (indicating), Sharon. My bad.

Having a proper motion and a second, is there any discussion?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
Thank you.
Next we'll have Finance Chairman Holly Lewis.
FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: You have the minutes, so I'll keep it short. I'll hit the highlights.

We had our first Finance Commission meeting at 6:00, on July 19th. We welcomed our new member, Dean Boyers. Welcome, welcome.

We had some guests present. We read the previous minutes.

We walked through the year-end report for the $P \& L$ and the balance sheet and I definitely had some questions. So the report that we got was showing a negative balance for the end of the year, which I knew was not correct. So we went back and forth. We found a couple of errors and were able to correct that. So now it looks like we are ending the year, we haven't finalized it yet, we're closing the books, but it looks like
we're go to end the year about 50K to the good, which is, you know, which is great.

We also have some final adjustments from Department Convention. There are a couple of accounts that were definitely over budget, significantly. So I had Kathy pull the actual line items from each of those accounts so that we can go through it to could figure out why were we so over budget on Mid-Winter, Department Convention, and on office expenditures. So we'll be looking at that as well.

Jose and I are thoroughly committed to being open and transparent on all of this. So if you have any questions, whatsoever, please let either one of us know and we'd be happy to answer them.

Under "New Business," we talked about Jason's car. We're just waiting for the car to get approved so that we can pay the $\$ 25,000$ for it.

We did talk about wage increases for the Department staff. We are going to do performance revue evaluations first, before we do that. We do have a budget for that. So we'll be walking through that.

There were a couple of repairs that are needed, repairs and maintenance on the building,
for which we have no budget right now. So we talked about the parking lot needs repaved, as well as the building needs powerwashed and painted. So we'll be getting quotes on those.

We did get a really nice donation from Department Charities of 40 grand, which is nice because it wasn't budgeted. So we could potentially use that.

I think, JD, you had said that the parking lot takes priority over the painting. So we'll probably be looking at the parking lot before that.

Becky gave us an update on National
Convention and the District Activities Funds.
I did ask, just so you guys know, for us to look into documenting the best practices on how and what that money is for, and what has to happen in order for you to get that money. So we will be looking at the past practices of that. I think we've gotten a little lax on that, personally.

And then we adjourned the meeting at 6:46.
Does anybody have any questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Are you going to make a motion?

FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: I can't? Can I? I make a motion to approve the -COMMANDER RUE: No.

FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: I can't; right?
I'm not part of the DEC.
COMMANDER RUE: Never mind.
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Don Capps, District 8 Commander, makes a motion to accept the Finance Committee report.

COMMANDER RUE: Sharon.
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: Sharon McClain, Post 281, Commander of the 14 th District, I second the motion.

Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: There has been a motion and a proper second to accept the Finance Report.

Is there any questions, any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

FROM THE FLOOR: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: The motion carries.
Mr. William Genochio for the Legislative

Commission.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: All right, I'll start with the Legislative report again, and follow suit with everybody else and just hit the highlights here. Everybody got the minutes already, so they've been able to review them.

We had several guests in attendance.
As far as the District reports, there was only one District that actually reported anything, and that was the 14 th District, which informed that their committee had visited eight out of their 18 Posts, and they had four people visit with local legislators to talk about business.

During our "Old Business," we talked about the House Bill 69, which would oppose term limits on the commissioners, and this is forcing them to have four post-9/11 veterans serve on the commission. That was actually struck down.

It was reported by David Root, he reported that he was involved in that meeting version, and it's one post-9/11 veteran that will stand on it. And that commission will not come from the commissioner within the Districts or the Posts. It has to still come from a judge. So that was amended to change that.

We had Department Adjutant John Robinson advise on House Bill 2693, which would allow Coast Guard personnel to be paid during a federal shutdown by DOD and by Homeland Security.

Joyce Hannum spoke about a military spending bill that would be regarding pay and travel for abortions.

Ron Chapman of the 4 th District advised that the bill would keep the Commander from being appointed as well.

There was a discussion to draft a resolution, which was to remove the abortion portion of the military spending bill.

We discussed, the "Legislator of the Year" was discussed. It was recommended they are selected by secret ballot.

And then Joyce Hannum also suggested that we put a form in place to educate the Posts, the local Posts, on the requirements needed to nominate the "Legislators of the Year."

Ron Chapman of the 4 th District suggested the Department Adjutant, John Robinson, to draft a form that includes the requirements for the state and national legislators.

Again, Ron Chapman of the 4 th District asked
about the open legislative coordinator position. Adjutant Robinson informed the committee he had posted that position.

I don't know if you want to go over that, but it's up to 30 hours per week, a part-time position.

If anybody has got a question I can definitely let JD, you know, further explain on that.

Joyce Hannum of the 9th District suggested we change the time for awards in October for in-person voting. It was also recommended to make that a Zoom call in 2024. The Department Adjutant said he would address the DEC.

There were no resolutions before this committee.

And that concludes my report.
Any questions?
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Don Capps, District 8 Commander.

House Bill 69, that's still in committee; is it not?

COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: It's been amended, but it hasn't been passed. So as far as $I$ know, yes, it's still in committee.

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Has it passed out of Committee or is it in Committee?

COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: That I couldn't tell you, exactly where it sits. I filled in for the legislative position, so I'm not 100 percent.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I'd have to look at that.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: He has access to the system. I don't. But I can find out for you, though.

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: All right, thank you.

COMMANDER RUE: Are there any other questions?

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: One comment. I don't know if you mentioned it or not.

Chapman, Alternate NEC.
We still oppose that bill as amended, I believe. Did we not?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.
ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: We originally opposed the bill as a whole. And even though it's been admitted, we still oppose that bill.

COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Correct. Correct. I apologize.

Yeah, that was House Bill 69, which was
basically forcing four post-9/11 veterans to sit on the commission within your counties, and them being appointed by the commissioners.

Like I said, they revised it to a judge appointing and only making one post-9/11, but we still do oppose, yes.

COMMANDER RUE: Any other questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion to accept the report.

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, Alternate NEC.

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MOORE: Marty Moore, 5th District, makes a motion.

COMMANDER RUE: A second?
5TH DISTRICT IVC MOORE: Or a second, yeah.
COMMANDER RUE: Having a proper motion and a second, is there any discussion?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in favor say aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: Those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.

VA\&R Commission.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: All right, so VA\&R.
Again, I'll read the highlights of it.
Everybody should have gotten these in the deals.
So we read the previous minutes. There was a motion to accept those minutes. Darell Bishop did make a correction to the Post minutes, item 8, line B, after the Fisher House, to add "female section." A motion was made by Darell Bishop and seconded by Rhode, to accept the amended and the motion passed for the previous minutes.

District reports. Not all Districts had anything to report. The Districts that did were:

District 1 was having issues with the volunteers and VA staff members. There are limits on what our volunteers can and cannot do.

District 2 reported donations collected. And they and the Auxiliary usually go to Dayton. This past year's donations were given to the veterans canteen at Dayton VMC, to use as needed.

District 4 reported that volunteers can now get in. There must be a rapid COVID test first.

District 5 reported that Sandusky is opening to them and can do some visitations now.

District 6 reported that can get in COVID
testing now, only if they are going to a few areas within the hospital.

Myself, as the coordinator, announced that Gabe Kilgore, who was our VSO or DSO over there, did resign and took a job at the VA Medical Center working with the VA. So that position is open and vacant.

District 8 reported that Chillicothe is open and having activities set for August 16th.

District 9 reported that Cleveland is opening back up.

District 10 reported that they raised 2,000 for the Warriors.

And District 13 reported that they're now back open per COVID guidelines.

Old Business. There was a review of the guidelines of Veterans Treatment Court. As of the time, there was no plan in place or written. Darell Bishop of the 5th District will work with myself to draft some kind of instructional letter or policy of how the money, how they would request it and how that money would be requested and paid to the courts. A motion was made by Al Buxton of the 4th District, seconded by Don Capps of District 8, to approve this motion. The motion
passed.
Under New Business, there was a review of the commission rules. A motion was made by Carson of District 14, to have the last line in the first paragraph changed from, "may be reappointed to a three-year rotating term." This would give continuation for the commission, as it would only have possible turnover of only a third of the commission at a time. Chairman Cook stated it is like the prior changing the name from the committee to commission. Genochio, myself, will check on that to see if we can make that happen. I'll get with the Adjutant to talk about that. This was the change they said happened before and then was revised. A motion was made Rhode of the 10th District, and seconded by Carson of the 14 th, to accept the rules with this possible change. The motion passed and we moved on.

Again, being in our report, $I$ won't read it again. But again, the House Bill 69 was discussed. We've already talked about the Legislative. So unless somebody wants me to re-read basically what I've already said, we'll just pass over that portion.

Darell Bishop of the 5th District gave the

Gifts for Yanks Report to the subcommittee. There is $\$ 126,000$ in the budget. They have funds left over from the VA from last year due to the buildings being shut down and not used. The Veterans Home did not hand out the 25 gift cards as provided, and they did not want them just laying around. They asked for one check to be given to the hospitals versus the individual cards, and they would distribute into the individual accounts. So they're going to be looking at that.

The $\$ 25$ gift cards they're looking to increase to $\$ 35$ this year. They spent 144,000 and still have a reserve. Special project requests that you have need to go to them by April.

Due to the turnover of Department staff, letters have not been sent out to the various locations of the VA Hospitals.

Also, the District Chairmen and Commanders will give reports on funds collected and spent now, and this will show who has made the donations.

Again, the VA\&R Committee had no resolutions at the time.

For the good of The Legion, I did address the
fact that the National Legacy Ride has changed years. It is no longer going to be collecting money this year. The 2023 ride coming up is the last year they are collecting funds, and it will go to the Legacy Scholarship Fund. Next year, I believe, I've got Larry here, their moving to veteran and children programs, is what 2024 collections will go for, at the National level. At that point, the meeting was adjourned. And that's all I have, unless there's any questions or clarifications.

COMMANDER RUE: Any questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: And I still have the DSO report after that.

COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, I'll entertain a motion to accept the VA\&R report.

6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: Shane Eaton, 6th District Commander, makes the motion.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District Commander, seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: Having a proper motion and second, is there any discussion?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in
favor say aye.
FROM THE FLOOR: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
PDC SCHMITT: Commander, I have an issue with the --

COMMANDER RUE: Hold up.
The motion passed.
Now you can go. I was in the middle of a vote. Discussion was over.

PDC SCHMITT: Nobody talked to me. I've been in contact with Chief Justice Sharon Kennedy's office about how we go about dealing with the courts and the distribution of money. They've already checked on the ethics of how this is to be done.

COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: I don't sit at the chair of that committee, but $I$ would be more than happy, if you want to help draft a letter, to go through it.

But, I mean, as far as the funds that are in the Department's hands, I mean we're in the process of drafting it. So we can get together with Darell Bishop, you and I, and, you know, if you've got the plan and the guidelines down, that
would make it a lot easier on us.
PDC SCHMITT: I've been in contact with Chief Justice Kennedy's staff, I can't remember her name now, but anyway, that's who I've e-mailed with back and forth. We've checked with the ethics committee as to how it should be done. And right now, nobody can give to the courts without sending a letter first.

A court communicated to me that they tried to give laptops or Apple computers to a court and the court rejected it.

But anyways, we can talk more about this.
COMMANDER RUE: Yeah.
Because no money is going out as of right now because we're in the process of drafting some kind of regulations. But that's good to know, that we can tap into your resource and make sure we're not violating any codes or ethics.

PDC SCHMITT: And for the record, it's Bob Schmitt, Past District Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: And Department.
PDC SCHMITT: Yeah, and Department.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: And Commander, this last report is just for informational purposes only. It's just our DSO report.

COMMANDER MASOWICK: I can't hear you.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Yeah, so this next report is just for informational purposes only. It's our DSO report.

I just want to advise everybody on the PACT Act. We've been getting a lot of scrambles in the offices, people freaking out about the deadline. So just to make everybody aware, there is no deadline to file for the PACT Act. When it came into law on August 10th of 2022, you had one year to file to protect your effective date. So if you filed before August 9th and you get granted, you are grandfathered back to the date the law became effective, which is August 10th of '22. Twenty years from now you can file a PACT Act claim and get granted, but your effective date is the day you successfully opened your claim. So veterans can file. The PACT Act is not going away. It's a law. That whole scramble is if you get it in by the 9th, you're retroactive back to the 10 th of 2022.

The Cleveland Regional Office is open to the public. We've had a huge increase of walk-ins. Walk-ins are always welcome, but we prefer and encourage appointments. That way, we're not
blindsided and can actually give you full attention right then and right there, instead of having you kind of sit while we finish a project.

As I've mentioned earlier, the Columbus VA is currently vacant. I'm in talks with the Adjutant of when, how, and whatnot, of when we're opening that position back up. It is vacant.

The Cincinnati VA Medical Center is still appointment only. They are currently working. They've hired a front desk gatekeeper, if you will. It's going to start vetting veterans to bring them in for same-day appointments or walk-ins. They're in the process, like I said. They've got the staff member there. They're vetting them. And then they have to do a construction on a window to do a cut-out so they can do walk-ups.

If anybody has been to Dayton, it's how they operate. They have a doorkeeper who checks in and then finds a service officer. Cincinnati is going that way, but is currently still appointment only.

Dayton is open to the public.
Wade Park, we finally filled that position. So we did hire one of our own. We have Darell Bishop, who is now the DSO representing us at the

Wade Park.
They will be open Monday through Thursday, from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM. And we would like to get out to our veterans that at our Cleveland office our last appointment is $3: 30$. That way we have time to finish that veteran, you know, the paperwork. Because we shut our doors at 4:00.

A little bit of success numbers: In 2022, we ended at an 84 percent success rate, $\$ 2.1$ million dollars in BVA retros, another 1.4 million in remands.

In '21, we did a 92 percent success rate, with, you know, a little over two million in retro, another 1.2 million in remands.

And our total one for veterans and our percentage since 2017 is 84 percent of the hearings the team has represented we've won, totaling \$18,920,706.40.

So they're kicking butt and taking names in Cleveland. I appreciate them. And even our service officers throughout, they're building claims.

A reminder: Post Service Officer School is September 16th, 08:00 to 16:30, right here. I think right now we have 37 registered for that
class. So let everybody know we'll be teaching it here.

Other than that, Commander --
FROM THE FLOOR: Can you say the date again?
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: September 16th.
I don't know if you wanted me to hit on ALR, the Riders. It's not on the agenda, but I don't know if you want me --

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Okay.
And my resource here is we do have the American Legion Riders Director here.

We just successfully completed the Legacy and the ROMP. Horrible weather projections, but we got lucky and outran it. I think one day we got rained out.

But like I said, we collected, on the ride, I believe it was around 40,000.

Now, Larry, I know I e-mailed you the other day. I don't want to put you on the spot, but have you still not heard a final count?

I know checks are coming in on Facebook. We're seeing that Posts are still donating.

You can still donate to the Legacy Fund. Those checks will be taken to National and
presented. So if you have Posts that want to donate, please get that money out there.

We do have The American Legion Riders of Ohio Facebook page out there, that posts tons of, you know, memorial rides, support events. So, you know, go on there, look at those pages, request to be a friend, and get out and support your Riders. They do a lot to give back to The Legion family.

Larry, is there anything I missed that you would like to add?

ALR DIRECTOR SULLIVAN: No.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Commander, that concludes my report.

COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Bill.
Media, Marketing and Communications. Chris Emmons, can you give that report, since John is on vacation? I hate to put you on the spot.

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: I don't have anything prepared, Commander.

We're meeting Thursday. So I would just move that we wait until after our meeting.

COMMANDER RUE: Sounds good.
That might have been the shortest report of the day.

Stan Oren, since Hunter Woods is on military
duty for a little bit here, do you want to give an update on Post activities?

2VC OREN: I already did it, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: He might be shorter than you. John Robinson, do you want to give the SAL report?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Skip Craun e-mailed me his report.

The Detachment Executive Committee met at 10:00 AM, on Saturday, July 22nd, 2023, at Department Headquarters.

The following motions were approved: The appointments of Shane Eaton to fill the position of Detachment Assistant Adjutant, created by the resignation of Chuck Castle, approved; approval of the 2023 National Convention Delegates and Alternates; approval of the 2023 Detachment budget; approval of the National Convention Committee appointments.

The committee also heard and approved the reports of the various Detachment committees.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Do you want to do the National Security report?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah. I got that one right here.

Good morning. Long time since I talked to you.

National Security met on July 15th, at 4:00 PM. Chairman Buxton opened the meeting. The colors were saluted. Jose gave the invocation.

Under "Old Business," there was no submissions for the Ralph Doll Award for the committee to decide.

Doug Russell of the 10 th and Jose asked to terminate it. Discussion was had. The motion to terminate was not passed.

Jose and Robert Weiler of the 3rd are going to work on creating a new packet for the judging of the award. That motion passed.

COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Mr. Commander,

Buxton, Commander of the 4th District, I have an update Jean.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: She just posted on Facebook. She says, "Well, unexpectedly, I'm at UC Hospital. The last several days I've been extremely nauseous and in pain. I originally thought it was from the side effects of my shoulder surgery. Yesterday, my pain was just too intense, so JW took me to the VA. After much testing, it was determined that a gallstone was in one of my ducts. It's kind of weird since four years ago I had my gallbladder removed, but the doctor says they can still form.
"The VA decided that since they could not do what I needed until Monday, that they were going to transfer me to UC. My potassium was very low, so I had to have three bags of potassium before they would transfer me. Finally, at 4:00 AM, I had the transfer to UC. The doctor came in and the procedure will happen sometime today to remove it, or whatever. After the procedure, I'll be here two or three more days.
"I am so hungry and thirsty, as I have had nothing to eat and drink since about 3 PM on

Friday. What I'd give for an ice cold 7-Up.
"The staff at VA and UC have been great, as well as JW. Prayers and good thoughts will be appreciated."

That's the update on Jean and her status at the hospital.

COMMANDER RUE: All right.
So at this time, lunch is here and ready. We will go into recess till noon. That will give you about 35 minutes to eat.
(THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS). . . . CAll to order . . .

We're going to reconvene now in our meeting.
I believe Larry has Legion Riders.
ALR DIRECTOR SULLIVAN: Commander, this is Post 584. They just chartered their Legion Riders three months ago, and they're already here with a $\$ 1,000$ donation to the Legacy Fund.
(Applause).
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you, Post 584 ALR, awesome job.

Now, I know it's been put out, my Commander's Project this year is "Stockhands Horses for Healing." They're right down here (indicating), just down the road in Delaware a little bit.

I believe you all know Tamar. And then Tim is going to do a presentation for the project.

MR. FUNK: Good afternoon.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.
MR. FUNK: I'd like to take a few minutes and thank everyone for inviting us out today.
"Stockhands Horses for Healing," we're a nonprofit $501(c)(3)$ that we've been operating since 2014, right here in Delaware, Ohio.

We offer assisted equine therapeutic services to those people in the community in need, to include our veterans, first responders, and children and adults with physical or emotional developmental disabilities.

Our veterans program is very robust. We probably have the largest veterans program in central Ohio. I'm even going to go out on a limb, in Ohio in general.

Every other Friday, we have anywhere between 20 and 30 veterans at our facility. We do not charge for those services. So that's one of the reasons we're here speaking with you folks.

We're also actively engaged in Delaware County Veterans Court. We're working with these veterans that kind of lost their way. They're
struggling to fit back in to civilian life, so to speak, after their post-service. These brave individuals often bear the unseen burdens of their service, grappling with physical and emotional wounds that linger long after their duty. It is our responsibility as a grateful society to offer them a solace path of healing.

Within our organization, therapeutic riding and driving programs, our participants range from individuals with autism, developmental and physical disabilities, and those struggling in mental health and recovery, including our veterans and first responders.

These individuals have a journey that may have been very difficult for them. But it is our duty to insure that they are not defined by their challenges. Instead, they should be celebrated for their spirit, their strength, and their unyielding determination.

When our doors opened, we hoped to be a place of belonging for children and adults with developmental and physical disabilities, as well as well as veterans and first responders. That hope has developed into a huge reality. But the reality, however, has come with quite a few
challenges.
We're holding a three-month wait list on our participants for our therapeutic riding program. We have limited ability to expand our services and assist others in our community due to the lack of space and time. We've begun a capital campaign to raise money to build a second arena and expand our services.

With that, I'd like to play a short little video, talking about our facility, and then I'll be happy to answer any questions afterwards.

There will be a test afterwards, so please pay attention.
(THEREUPON, THE VIDEO PRESENTATION WAS PLAYED).

Yes, sir.
HISTORIAN BEYER: Al Beyer, Department Historian.

Can we get a list of the prerequisites to be a part of this?

MR. FUNK: You sure can.
Basically, there is no prerequisites. If you go to our website, you can learn a little bit about our veterans program.

Our veterans program is a lot different than
most of the other equine-assisted riding programs around.

For one, I'm not having some young lady who is fresh out of college and wants to teach horse riding lessons and stuff like that. You're not going to be sitting there riding around in a circle telling you, "Hey, sit up straight, put your heels down, hold your hands like this."

Our veterans program and our equine program is more of an open house. My wife hates it. She won't come around the barn because she says it looks like organized chaos without the organization. So, our veterans program is ran strictly by veterans.

Like I said, we started in 2014. We've had a lot of veterans that have come in our doors and now are becoming a part of our leadership within that program. It's more of an open house.

If you want to learn to ride, we can teach you to ride. We also have the ability to do horse cart and carriages for some of the folks that have low mobility or not be able to actually properly sit a horse. So we do offer those services as well. We do everything from hillbilly polo to we play soccer on horseback.

In the colder months, when we're like, yeah, I don't feel like bundling up and getting on the back of a horse, we have "Forge Night." So we break out the anvils and forges, and a bunch of railroad spikes, and everybody and their brother wants to make this really cool knife, and it ends up looking like a weird butter knife or a letter opener or something like that.

The only prerequisite for our program is to come in and make fun of the branch that you didn't serve in. That's the only prerequisite.

We'd like to have a copy of your DD-214 on file. That just helps us when we apply for grants and fundings and things like that.

Any other questions?
Yes, ma'am.
FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: Tim, could you talk a little bit -- this is the existing unit right now (indicating)?

MR. FUNK: Yep.
FINANCE CHAIRPERSON LEWIS: But this is the whole other concept that I think we --

MR. FUNK: So, currently, this building here (indicating) does not exist, and neither does this one (indicating).

This is our main building here (indicating). Our arena is 120 by 70.

This building here (indicating) will be our new arena. It will be an 80 by 200 arena, and along with this front section (indicating), is a little bit more elevated. It's a two-story office space, receptions, meeting rooms, and stuff like that.

This building here (indicating) is what we're calling our "Community Service Building." When we do work with the docket quite a bit, then we also have some other veterans who would like to just come in and work with their hands, who are struggling. So, with this Community Service Building, we have a ton of woodworking tools, metal working tools, someone has even offered to donate us a car lift. So within that building, they can have several different bays to help that out. Kind of like when you go on base, "Hey, I need to rent a garage space for an afternoon to do the wife's brakes because she rides them all the time," that sort of thing.

But also with this building, Delaware County, the Delaware County Veterans Service Office, has spent over $\$ 25,000$ last year to put up veterans,
displaced veterans, in housing, whether it be hotels or things like that. The problem with that, it's great that our county does that, the Salvation Army is also helping out with that with their veterans housing program, but when we put these guys up in these hotels, they're not in the best of areas. Some of these guys are struggling with addictions, whether it be alcohol or drugs, and we're kind of isolating them and keeping them in an area that they're not going to be able to grow.

So, with this building, there will be veterans housing. Not inside the building, but we have plans of putting in at least three or four small, tiny homes that will be put on skids, that will have electric, basic utilities, that sort of thing, for them to deal with and get their feet back underneath them.

This is not long-term housing for them. This is 60 to 90 days. They can help out within our barn and we can start getting them to see the VA, meet with the vets center for mental health and stuff, work with the VSOs to start getting their claims set up, and helping them find jobs that they can sustain themselves and get their feet
back underneath them.
So, all of this project is going to run us roughly $\$ 4.7$ million. But that's where we need help. We need advocates for our veterans program. We need advocates for our other programs as well.

So, we are very thankful that you allowed us to come in and present to you today. And we deeply appreciate your support.

Any other questions?
Yes, ma'am.
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: I don't have a question but $I$ do have a donation.

MR. FUNK: Outstanding.
She's showing the rest of you guys up, just so you know.

Can you come up here and give it to me?
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: This actually goes to the Department and they will send the money to you.

FROM THE FLOOR: Who are you?
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: I'm going to give her that, just give me a minute. Everybody knows who $I$ am; right?

FROM THE FLOOR: Right.
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: I am Sharon

McClain, Commander of the 14 th District. Okay?
On behalf of the 14th District, I'd like to present $\$ 100$ that the Commander will send to you guys for his special project. Okay?

MR. FUNK: Thank you.
14TH DISTRICT CMDR MCCLAIN: All right.
You're welcome.
(Applause).
MR. FUNK: Any other questions?
COMMANDER RUE: I don't know if you guys noticed or not, he's not wearing it now, but he is a Marine Corps veteran.

FROM THE FLOOR: What's his favorite color?
MR. FUNK: What's that?
FROM THE FLOOR: What's your favorite color, of Crayon?

MR. FUNK: It's hard to pick just one color. COMMANDER RUE: Reds are spicy. I will tell you that.

FROM THE FLOOR: Are you a member of The American Legion?

MR. FUNK: I am not.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Whoa.
MR. FUNK: But that will change.
NEC MASOWICK: It can change this minute.

MR. FUNK: It probably will.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Hey Tim, we've had this conversation.

MR. FUNK: We have.
Any other questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
MR. FUNK: That being said, I have one question for you: How many branches are in the United States military?

FROM THE FLOOR: One.
Six.
One.
MR. FUNK: One?
FROM THE FLOOR: Five.
MR. FUNK: There's actually only two. The Army and the Navy are the only two branches in the military. The Air Force is a corporation. Where's my Air Force guys? And the Marine Corps is a cult.

COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Tim.
At ease.
Now we'll move on to Post Charter revocations and suspensions.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander, I'd call on Shane Eaton to give an update on Post 401.

6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: Good afternoon, everybody.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.
6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: The update on 401 is I've let my 1st Vice take over the finance side and I'm taking over operations. We are currently looking for a canteen manager and Post officers.

When we shut down the Post, we went into the canteen manager's office. We found $\$ 6,000$ stuck in every nook and cranny. And we're still finding money.

So we're going to rectify that. We're working on instituting SOPs with the Post when we get it back up and running, updating their constitution and bylaws, so this does not happen again.

And when I reinstitute the Post, I don't want to hear, "I didn't know." I gave you the opportunity and I gave you the word. Read it.

That's the update, is that we are currently working on the operations side, I am, and finding a canteen manager, which we hope to have by the end of this month.

That's my report.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Shane.

NEC MASOWICK: Thank you for what you're doing for us.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: When we were digging through the Post, we did find an envelope with, it said "\$20" on it, but when we actually looked in the envelope it had $\$ 30$ in it. And it was marked for Gifts for Yanks from 2010-2011. So I did bring that in and put it in as a donation. So, just passing it along.

Post 472, we discussed it earlier, from the emergency DEC. I'm going to refer to Josh on the next steps we need to take, as far as going forward with the revocation of charter.

We are looking at the 14th of August for the trial date. We do have three Past Department Commanders serving on the board. If you read in there, the resolution explains everything.

Gary Minadeo will be the assisting JAG officer on it and Josh will be the prosecutor.

Any questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Okay, no questions, Commander, I turn it back over to you.

10TH DISTRICT 1VC MAROTTO: Howard Marotto, 10th District 1st Vice.

Am I under the impression that they're still in operation?

COMMANDER RUE: Yes and no.
We went in there and closed, Charles and them went in and they actually closed the Post. And they broke back into the Post and started doing stuff again. That's where that stands at.

So they're not supposed to be, but, yes, they've broken the new locks that were put on there, had them changed, and basically took everything back over again.

Bob.
PDC SCHMITT: Schmitt, PDC.
Is anything going to be done to try to salvage the Post, in other words, with new leadership?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We can't.
PDC SCHMITT: Is there any reason why?
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We tried it already.
PDC STENNIS: Yeah, we tried that already. Actually twice.

PDC SCHMITT: And yet we hear rumors that the membership does not want to do away with the Post.

COMMANDER RUE: Is that the social members or what type of membership?

PDC SCHMITT: I don't know.
COMMANDER RUE: I mean they had social members voting in on their meetings.

FROM THE FLOOR: What?
COMMANDER RUE: Oh, yeah. It's a big mess.
And they didn't want to straighten it out the first time. And actually, the ones that they're trying to say are their new officers are some of the biggest drivers of it.

PDC SCHMITT: Okay. But obviously we've communicated with the real membership by letter?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.
PDC SCHMITT: And we got no responses back?
COMMANDER RUE: Actually, their guy still on record as Commander, he didn't do the paperwork right. But they were going to surrender their charter. And now this guy who's highjacked the leadership role as Commander is fighting it.

PDC SCHMITT: I just, you know, I hate to see a Post go away if the membership really wants it.

COMMANDER RUE: Go ahead, Charles, you have better knowledge than me.

PDC STENNIS: Past District Commander Joyce Hannum and I have been working on this --

Joyce, for what? Over --

ASST SGT-AT-ARMS HANNUM: A year. PDC STENNIS: -- almost a year.

Actually, new leadership was put in place. He could not find other membership that was there, anyone who would help him. So we advised him, okay, it's time to shut it down.

Prior to putting new leadership in there, the folks that have, I'll call it what it is, absconded with the Post as a whole, were robbing the place blind. They were robbing the place blind, bouncing checks, the payroll was coming directly out of the till every night, all kinds of violations.

We stopped it and put new leadership in. Those folks left. They tried to join other Posts within the area. They were rejected. So at that time it was decided, okay, it's time to shut it down.

They actually broke in, went back in, changed the locks and did all that. So this is where we are now. So I would say their goal was to take that Post back over.

PDC SCHMITT: Okay. I mean I had that Post disciplined when I was Commander. But I didn't have any idea of the things they were doing now.

PDC STENNIS: That Post was actually donated to them. It was donated to them. They didn't build it. It was donated to them.

PDC SCHMITT: Well they owned additional property right next door and the woman there donated her house to them. She gave her house to them.

PDC STENNIS: There's also funds that were missing. We believe that the Past Commander of that Post was stealing also. We couldn't prove it, but we believe that he was stealing also. But he kind of got away with it before we got there. They didn't have enough records for me to prove that he did.

I actually audited their books for the last two years. I found all kinds of discrepancies.

The Sons' Commander had stolen $\$ 10,000$ over a two-year period. We caught him. There was supposed to be charges being brought up against him then we found out he wasn't even a member. He wasn't a member.

So these are the types of things that were going on at 472.

So, it's my mind and thinking, and I know Joyce and I have had many conversations, to shut
that Post down.
NEC MASOWICK: What time is that meeting on the 14th?

COMMANDER RUE: 10:00 AM. I think it says on the resolution, doesn't it?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.
COMMANDER RUE: All right.
JD.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: One further thing, Bob, that may clear something up along the lines that you're thinking of, talking with Joyce, there is another Post that is interested in taking that building over once the Post is completely closed and they can check all the membership that's coming into them. They would be happy to reopen that building.

So, once we get things settled, my thinking would be, since it was donated to them, we would donate it to the new Post and let them flourish under it.

ASST SGT-AT-ARMS HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, Past 9th District Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: That would be the Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms right now.

9TH DISTRICT CMDR HANNUM: I think it should
be the Past 9th District Commander.
That building is owned by American Legion
Post 472. The building itself and the funding to build that was done by a group of five guys. So it is owned by The American Legion, not by anybody else. In fact, the secondary lot was also titled to them.

COMMANDER RUE: Anything else on 472?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: You can let Bob Klostermeier back in, please.

Thanks, Bob.
Resolutions, constitutional amendments.

New Business.
JD, do you want to talk about the Department 50/50 raffle?

So the Adjutant from Florida reached out right before Department Convention. They've had their Department Convention and started an on-line 50/50 raffle.
