We'll now have the POW/MIA Recognition, led by 1st Vice Commander AJ Whatley.

1VC WHATLEY: Resolution 288, adopted at the 67th National Convention, calls for designating an empty chair placed at all official meetings of The American Legion as a physical symbol of the thousands of American POW/MIAs still unaccounted for from all wars and conflicts involving the United States of America.

This is a reminder for all of us to spare no effort to secure the release of any American prisoners from captivity, the repatriation of the remains of those who died bravely in defense of liberty, and a full accounting for those missing.

Let us rededicate ourselves to this vital endeavor.

Oh, I'm sorry, Bob Schmitt, Past Department Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Dean. At this time we'll have the reading of the previous minutes by Department Adjutant JD Robinson. 4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District Commander, moves that they be accepted as sent out. COMMANDER RUE: We have a motion. Do we have a second?

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd District 1st Vice Commander, seconds. COMMANDER RUE: We have a proper motion and a second to dispense with the reading of the minutes, as they were mailed out previous to this meeting.

Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in
favor signify by saying aye.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: The motion carries. I'd like to thank everyone for coming out today. It's good to have a good turnout again, especially with the PDCs showing up. It isn't often we get those.

And I know somewhere along the line we used to have Department Auxiliary Presidents speak at these, and the Detachment Commanders speak at these, and we got away from that at some point. But as a family, I brought them back in so we can work together as a family. So they'll be giving greetings and discussing their stuff a little bit later.

Now I'll turn it over to AJ Whatley for membership.

1VC WHATLEY: Thank you, Commander.
Good morning, everyone.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
1VC WHATLEY: First, let me start off by taking care of the most important thing.

I should be seeing two lanterns in our conference today, the red lantern and the green lantern.

FROM THE FLOOR: (Indicating). 1VC WHATLEY: So I'm only seeing one.

Oh, I see.
The green lantern goes to District 2, and the red lantern stays at District 7.

Right now, as a District (sic), we're at 71.63\% in membership, a little bit higher than where we was last year.

If you've been doing your buddy checking and some Post revitalization, this will put you in place to call your comrades that don't have a chance to come to the meetings and have not paid their dues, which are delinquent or expired.

If you haven't done that, you're going to have a hard time getting where you need to go. You're going to have a hard time.

Right now, as far as membership, we have 54,562. That's about 22,000 members short from our quota, which is 76,275. The last $30 \%$, and this is about 30\%, is going to be hard for us to get percent.

If you've been doing your buddy checks, your Post revitalization, it will put you in a great position to get those members to pay their dues. If you have not, good luck.

Right now, the next cutoff is January 17th (sic). I'm sorry, December 13th.

Right now, we have 12 of our 14 Districts at $70 \%$ or above. We have three Districts -- and I think most of you have this report, correct?

FROM THE FLOOR: Yes.
1VC WHATLEY: -- that's already at the next level, pretty much.

So that's where we are. Let's get there. We can do this.

Nationwide, right now we're bouncing between position 24 and 26. We're going up and down. One month we're up, one month we're down. So that's a big improvement from last year.

As I said before, I never, ever want to be 43 again. Never, ever.

I need your help. I need your help. So let's get out and do our jobs. And hopefully, at the next report, you will see a big improvement.

Thank you, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, AJ.
So as the 1st Vice was saying, our next cutoff is December 13th. That's 75\% as a Department.

We are just over 71\% now.
I would urge each of you to try to get to $75 \%$ as a District. If we do that, we will definitely make it.

Because we've already got a couple of Districts already over 75\%, which AJ didn't mention. But I'd like to congratulate the 2nd District and the 4th District for winning the Brown Jug.

Give them a hand.
(Applause).
If you get out there and work it, you can get it done.

Now I'd like to call 2nd Vice Commander Stan Oren for activities.

2VC OREN: Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
2VC OREN: I'm glad to see you're awake at least.

Okay, we have the bowling tournament. That's going to be at Cherry Grove Lanes, in Cincinnati, Ohio. The Holiday Inn and Suites Cincinnati Eastgate is our hotel. Post 72 is the host of this. And that will be February 9th through the 10th, 16th through the 17th, and the 23 rd through the 24 th.

I still need some, I'm accepting reservations for golf. I'm looking for somebody to host. Anybody?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
2VC OREN: Okay, the euchre tournament, pool
tournament.
Plus, I've heard through the grapevine that maybe a District would like to do a cornhole. If they do, let me know. I'd like to get with you yet today.

The 6th has mentioned paintball. So I'd like to get with you on that one.

If you guys want to do this, let's get'er going. The more of those things we can do, the better off we are.

And I'd like to get young people in. And I know that cornhole and paintball are two things young people like to do. I'll attempt it.

Thank you.
Thank you, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Now we'll have Jose Rivera, Department Treasurer.

TREASURER RIVERA: I will try to give a shorter speech.

Of course you know that the stock market goes up and down. So at present we're sitting at $\$ 6.472$ million in our investments. And we trust the company we have investing for us to make sure we have the proper investments.

Thank you.
(Applause).
Now we'll have the Department Chaplain's Report by Department Chaplain Ron Distel.

CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Thank you, Commander.
I've been kept pretty busy lately. It seems like every three days I'm getting notice of one of our members passing away.

I've been sending out cards, and it's been going rather well.

I did have one gentlemen in a funeral home down in Marietta that I didn't have any information on. I went to that funeral site but you couldn't access their site for some reason. I even had my grandkids trying it for me.

I also, this past fall, attended Past Department Commander Ed Anderson's funeral.

But everything doesn't go smoothly when I get this information. So the more information you give me, the easier I can get the sympathy cards out or contact the funeral home for electronic sympathys on their site, et cetera. So the more information I get, the easier it's going to be for me to do that. And I definitely will continue working as hard as I can.

On October 21st, we had a Religious Emphasis
meeting here at Department. And I want to thank all that attended. There wasn't an empty seat in the room. And that's the first time I can remember that in a Religious Emphasis meeting. There was a lot of ideas thrown around. And I want to thank Christie for organizing this and keeping it moving, and she did.

Next month, we'll be having a Four Chaplains
Service at Mid-Winter. I'm looking for four volunteers. I need four additional volunteers. I'm going to be here all day, so come on up. It's something really easy. It's nothing hard. So don't hesitate.

And with that, Mr. Commander, that's about all I have.

And once again, I need four volunteers.
FROM THE FLOOR: I'll volunteer.
(Indicating).
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: There's two of them.
FROM THE FLOOR: I'll volunteer.
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Awesome.
FROM THE FLOOR: I'm four.
COMMANDER RUE: That was quick.
Thanks, Ron.
(Volunteers were: Gary Minadeo, Jose Rivera, Al

Buxton and Bob Mason).
CHAPLAIN DISTEL: Come and see me afterwards. COMMANDER RUE: Now we'll have the Department Historian's Report by Al Beyer.

HISTORIAN BEYER: Commander.
I'm sure everybody can hear me.
Commander, Department officers, the DEC, in the whole country, there were only 34 entries for the different, the entries of the Posts' Historian Books. And there was 12 Legionnaires that were judging them.

However, the "Best Narrative" went to first place Indiana. Second place went to North Carolina.

And the "Best Department Yearbook," I'd like to say Ohio, but first place went to Nebraska, second place went to Missouri, and third place went to New York.

And the "Best Post Narrative" went to Post 395, in Missouri, second place went to Post 8, in Florida, and third place went to Post 374, in Iowa.

By the way, if you feel like your Post, District or county would like to enter a book, please have the book to me no later than June 1st. And if you need the rules for the contest, it's in the officer's handbook -- and we still don't have an
officer's handbook -- or you can email me for the rules and I'll get them to you.

I'm sure there's a lot of people in here who don't know who Travis Mills is, or his foundation. I never heard of him either, until I got notified when I did back in October .

Anyway, he's a retired Army Staff Sergeant of the 82 nd Airborne, and is a recalibrated warrior, motivational speaker, actor, author, and advocate for veterans and amputees.

By the way, I didn't mention it, but he's a quadriplegic, by the way. And he's a pretty awesome guy to talk to. Despite losing portions of both his arms and legs from an IED while on active duty in Afghanistan, he lives by the motto, "Never give up and never quit."

Well, on November 9th, we got to be an important part of history for the Department of Ohio, thanks to our Assistant Historian, Bob White. Bob White had called and informed me of this show called, "New Day Cleveland," which I had never heard of before.

Anyway, through Bob, we made arrangements to meet with Fox 8 News at the Parma Post 572. And the Department of Ohio, a few of us got to visit with

Post 572 and be on this show called, "New Day Cleveland." The few that were there were our Department Commander; NEC Steve Masowick; Department 2nd Vice Stan Oren; Department Treasurer Jose Rivera, who, by the way, showed us the way; your Department Historian, myself; Assistant Historian Bob White; and of course Department of Ohio Auxiliary Historian, and my gorgeous wife, Dayna; Post 572 Commander Erich Pfleaidermahnn, along with a few of his officers and members.

Anyway, Travis had a few more guests on the show, which I will go into more detail in the next quarterly Legion News.

And by the way, for all of you football fans, one of the Cleveland Browns greatest was there, Bernie Kosar. He was there as well.

And having listened to Travis Mills and one of his guest speakers, Chris Miller, at the end of the show, everyone in the room left that day with a whole new respect for the combat veteran of our military. It was a really moving experience, I'm telling you. There wasn't a dry eye in the room. It encouraged me a lot more to say and do something more on "Be the One."

Well, with his help and the guests on the show
that day, I walked away with a whole new vitality to help our veterans in any way I can, such as doing buddy checks and, this is a big one, just listen to their experience, or what the stories are of any other vet that they might have. Just listen to them.

By them being able to talk and get it out of their system it helps a hell of a lot, I'll tell you.

And I don't know if you know it already, but there's, I think it's 22,000 a day commit suicide.

NEC MASOWICK: It's 22.
HISTORIAN BEYER: Twenty-two?
NEC MASOWICK: Yeah.
HISTORIAN BEYER: Okay, a day. That's veterans.

Anyway, if you'd like to see that show and see a real good part of history, go on YouTube, punch in the "New Day Cleveland" show for November 9th of this year, and be inspired.

Be the one. You always should have your buttons on.

Commander, that's all I got. Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Al.
Next we'll have NEC Steve Masowick.

NEC MASOWICK: Good morning, Legionnaires. How are the best Legionnaires this side of the Mississippi this morning?

FROM THE FLOOR: Great.
NEC MASOWICK: First off, Brenda, first day on the job. Thank you for coming.

Don't chase her off. Maybe one day she'll be the Commander of this great State of Ohio.

I'd like to thank Stan Oren for coming to our 14th District the day after your party, which was a tough call.

I think I'm allergic to the beverages you've got over there.

National Commander Seehafer will be coming here in June. We have not talked anything about it with JD yet, so we don't have anything on his transportation or nothing. But we'll be showing him around the State of Ohio when he comes in.

Dan Wiley from Kansas, he's not going to be able to make it. If we can cross paths somewhere along the line, that would be great.

And Jim, I think he's coming.
COMMANDER RUE: Summer convention.
NEC MASOWICK: Summer convention, very good.
COMMANDER RUE: That's the leading candidate,
by the way, to be National Commander next year. NEC MASOWICK: A couple reports on some Departments across the country.

PNC Tom Bock is in charge of the reestablishment of the Department of Washington. He's getting it better. The programs are all running. And hopefully by July they'll have officers in place and they'll be back in the fold.

PNC David Rehbein is at the Department of Colorado, getting it better. All the bills are being paid. They were way behind. Posts in the Department are doing well. They need to be, they should be, will be close to reaching lap prizes for membership. And they're on the straight and narrow.

Jake Comer has stepped down as the go-to guy for National. Dan Dellinger will be taking his place. And David Rehbein, Past National Commander, will be second in charge.

Jake is 94 years old. And when I call him on the telephone, he's good. He's still got it. And if he don't, he'll ask his wife. I can hear his wife tell him, then he tells me.

We're in good hands as far as what we're doing with National, National Commanders. That's a good group of people who are really dedicated to what
we've got to be.
Well I hate to say this, but I think I'm done. (Applause).

One thing, in closing, we got a chance to meet Travis. And I wanted to shake his hand and I didn't realize how bad off he was. But I go to shake his hand, his hand turns all the way around. Freaked me out. It's got some kind of control in there where he can do that. It scared the shit out of me.

COMMANDER RUE: He did the same thing when he was waiting to be on the show. He sat there and his hand just spun around. And it cracked everybody up. The guy is a real joker by the way. I believe that's how he got through with everything that he got through. He has a great sense of humor. Next we'll have Ron Chapman, the Alternate NEC. ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Okay, so he left me with the exciting part.

Okay, a lot of misunderstandings are going on around the country right now over some of the things that we support and don't support as The American Legion. And I think if I read a letter to you that Steve and I got from Commander Seehafer that it will pretty much explain our stance. So why don't I just do that.

And it says, "Dear American Legion Family and Friends,
"Let me say this in the clearest terms possible: Veterans should feel safe and confident when filing for claims, knowing that no matter who they choose for representation, the Department of Veterans Affairs has reviewed, approved and accredited that party.
"That is why The American Legion opposes the PLUS Act."

That's the "Preserving Lawful Utilization of Services for Veterans Act."
"If enacted, the PLUS Act would transition our system of securing benefits for disabled veterans to an unregulated, profit-driven industry.
"Currently, there are unaccredited third parties that present themselves to veterans as legitimate claims service companies to assist veterans in obtaining their earned benefits. The 'PLUS Act' aims to legalize these companies by allowing automatic accreditation after 90 days, regardless of whether the VA has completed its verification process. The VA accreditation program exists to ensure that veterans and their family members receive appropriate representation on their

VA benefits claims. The American Legion wants to hold bad actors accountable, not give them a pass to prey on veterans.
"Our team is working hard to protect all veterans from the 'PLUS Act'. In September 2023, The American Legion sent a letter of opposition to the congressional representatives sponsoring the 'Plus Act,' and I personally voiced our opinion during my congressional visits just last month.
"However, there is legislation that would help veterans elude the clutches of bad actors. In an effort to protect our veterans, The American Legion supports the 'Governing Unaccredited Representatives Defrauding Act,' the 'GUARD Act' as we know it, and this legislation would reinstate criminal penalties for unaccredited claim representatives who charge unauthorized fees while assisting veterans with filing claims for VA disability compensation benefits.
"The American Legion continues to muster support to protect all veterans and their families from claims sharks. Join us in telling Congress to support the 'GUARD Act'."

And that's signed, "Daniel J. Seehafer, National Commander of The American Legion."

One of the things that these rumors have created was the resolution, we had a resolution that was written, probably last year sometime, but they had to rewrite a resolution. And that's created a lot of concern.

Some of those concerns were that The American Legion does not support the "GUARD Act" because they don't support the "PLUS Act." That's false. We do support the "PLUS Act." So that's false.

These are things that are being said on social media because we rewrote the resolution in support of the "GUARD Act" and not in support of the "PLUS Act."

I'm not going to read that resolution to you. I'm not even going to read the resolved clause. It's available in the archives from the National Convention, on the National website. If you need to see that, it will be on the National archives after our NEC votes, probably to support this new resolution, next Tuesday, when they have a virtual meeting with the Commander and the National Executive Committee. So that's just to make you aware.

And also, with all that being said, I encourage every one of you, if you're not already a member
receiving information and you haven't joined the grassroots effort, please do that. Join the grassroots effort and get those legislative updates on a weekly basis that come out of Washington, D.C., concerning our veterans support, our veterans supporting the congressional laws that are being worked on in Washington, D.C.

Thank you, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks.
Now we'll have Josh Brown, the Department Judge Advocate.

JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Good morning.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
JUDGE ADVOCATE BROWN: Basically two things going on legally with The American Legion.

We have a lawsuit down in Fayette County, a couple guys named Andy Lachat and Chris Lachat, and they both work for a company called Riten Industries. They sued The American Legion, two of our officers, and Post 25, saying that we committed defamation against them.

I've been pretty clear that I think it's a frivolous lawsuit. We lost on the motion to dismiss. So the lawsuit is moving forward right now.

We sent discovery to them this week, the Lachats. And so the hope is we'll take another shot at getting the case dismissed after discovery.

What discovery is is we send them questions that they have to answer in writing. So when we get that back, we're hoping to have that case, take another shot at having that case dismissed.

They also argue that the Post kept some property of theirs and some other things that are more related to the Post. But for the Department of Ohio, it's just the defamation claim.

The other thing that we have going on is the closing of Post 472. And I think we're going to be dealing with that, so I'll just let the Commander do that and let that take the natural process here today.

But we've got some challenges we've got to deal with, just getting the Post itself taken care of. But we've been on top of that and I know we're going to be restarting the process to get that Post taken care of.

So, like I said, those are the two big things that I've been taking care of.

Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Josh.

Now we'll have the Department Parliamentarian Gary Minadeo, for his report.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Greetings, warriors. How we doing?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: What's going on with the beard? Well, about mid-October, Cassie sent me like 35 constitution and bylaws to review. I figured it was starting to get out of control, so I have to act more like Moses. Some of them are extremely exciting.

But there's three things I want you to notice when you go look at these.

One, a lot of folks, they think they need to do this big constitution and bylaws change just to scratch out "great wars" and put "all wars." It's just a pen change. So they can just change that. So a lot of times I'll just send back an e-mail through Cassie and say, "Just change that 'great wars' and then the next time you do an update you vote on it." Okay?

Changes to constitutions and bylaws that are in favor of the membership and not restricting the membership's ability to get information or question or vote on information can just be you scratch it
out and put the new information in.
For instance, the disciplinary procedures, we range from Posts that are going to do whatever the Department tells them to do in one sentence to nine or ten paragraphs on how they're going to, you know, throw someone out, to the Executive Committee could suspend, expel, hang, quarter, I mean it's all kind of stuff, at the meeting where it's brought up, as long as the Executive Committee votes with the majority on it. So some of those I have to write a little differently for them.

And a lot of them reference the disciplinary procedures of the Department of Ohio under the old constitution, prior to July '22. All right?

The July '22 constitution and bylaws changed the section. The disciplinary section in the bylaws for the Department went from Article IV to Article V.

So all they really need to do is talk about, in discipline, that the Executive Committee will follow the procedures of the Department of Ohio, as outlined in Article V of the bylaws of July 2022. So I send them that information and they just cross that out, because the Department mandated that. Your Post cannot follow the discipline procedures
under the uniform code of conduct for the Department of Ohio. Okay? So that's one.

And then another one is amendments. Okay?
In the officer's manual, the boilerplate just says, you know, you need to notify, and then it has so many dates, but it doesn't recommend any dates.

Our amendments for the Department are 35 days prior notification.

So a lot of them will have a constitutional amendment and they'll change it at the next meeting after that meeting where it's brought up. So I'm telling you to scratch that out and say that you will notify at least 30 days prior to when the vote is being taken. So that gives people time to read it, understand it, and ask questions about it. That's just a pen and ink change.

Now some of your old-timers will say, "You can't change that. You have to vote on it." No, no, no. It's a change in favor of the members having more ability to question and ask and educate.

So we'd like to see at least 30 days on that. Now the other question that comes up: "Do we have to do this every year?"

I normally send them an e-mail and say I
recommend, after the new officers are elected, at
the next meeting, have the officers at least read the constitution and bylaws, see if there's any changes that need to be made, and then publish it once a year, however you're doing it. Through e-mail is easy.

I've got it posted in our canteen. So at various levels of alcohol, they read it. Apparently they understand it better with more alcohol.

So that's about it.
So the constitution and bylaws that I have, I found out, and I'm just reading them as they give them to me, so I found out from Chappy today I sent comment on one that was probably ten years old. I don't have the most current one. So that's okay.

Tell your Posts to take it easy on Gary. He's already growing old from this process. Don't say, you know, the various levels of names other than Gary that they call me in an e-mail when I send them a comment about, hey, you need to change this. Just tell me, you may be working off an old one and here's the current one. And then I'll read it and say, okay, you do have it right. Okay? Don't get upset.

Normally what I say is "Approved with comment." And unless it's really broke, I'm not going to
disapprove it. And to be broke, it really has to be out of order.

I really need to see it. And Doug does this too, Doug Russell. We need to see that the Post has a rule in the constitution and bylaws that limits discussion, that limits the blue caps from finding out the information and actually managing the Post, rather than the executive council or some committee going wild with it.

So rarely am I saying "disapproved." Okay?
But any questions you can ask me about it. I'll give you my card if you have any issues. But for the most part, we're knocking them out. We're knocking them out.

Now, in the officer's manual -- a lot of people ask how we do this. Well, in our 2022 Officer's Guide, it has, on page 85, a suggested Post Constitution.

So the big question is: How do I know when it was revised?

So go back to the boilerplate and just see if you have everything there. And then have your committee add some little things, the traditions you may have, stuff like that. So that's one.

Take a look at that boilerplate. It's really
nice. I think they actually have it on-line as a PDF also. Yeah, they do.

We used to have it on our website but it's not there anymore.

And then parliamentary procedure, the thing that I love, right here (indicating). Okay? It's '99. This is everything you need to know to manage a meeting. You don't need to know all the other stuff that I deal with. Just follow this (indicating).

So it's right in your officer's guide. If you want to help new Commanders, young Commanders, old Commanders, whoever, on how we run a meeting, that's how you do it.

All right, God bless all of you.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you, Gary.
JD Robinson, for the Department Adjutant's Report.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Good morning, everybody.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: First off, I'd like to thank our staff. They have done a tremendous job.

We are continually fighting to keep staff. We keep replacing staff. We're moving position to position daily. It is a struggle to maintain who is
doing what, when, where. And we have meetings to make sure we know what we are doing, who is doing what, and how often they are doing it.

So I want did say thank you to the staff.
(Applause).
Just a heads-up, the Membership Coordinator, Hunter Woods, his last day was yesterday. He is going to the State Highway Patrol. We wish him the best of luck.

Sherry Yockey will be filling that position as a, not quite a coordinator but a step up. We did not feel that it was prudent enough to hire another coordinator for a year, six months, and then they go down the road, when she's more than capable of doing the daily tasks. And I can help and fill in in all the other areas that need filled in.

The other position we just lost was our Cincinnati VA DSO, Jeff Delaney. He was hired by the VA. So we lost another one.

But to tell you how good Jeff was as an employee, we had a lady call in on Thursday and she's writing a sizable check to the VA Committee, or the VA Commission, for us, because her 82-year-old husband was awarded a very large sum. I don't know how much. She didn't say. But Jeff was
such a pleasure to work with and helped her so much, she felt the need that that would be the best reward to help us out that way.

So when you're thinking about the staff, we do do our best.

Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Thank you, sir.
COMMANDER RUE: As I said before, we're bringing the Auxiliary and the SAL back to our meetings, to give us updates and any information they want to pass along.

So at this time we'll have our Department Auxiliary President Jane Ridenour.
(Applause).
PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Thank you so much.
Commander, Department officers, Legionnaires and guests, good morning.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: And this next phrase cannot be said often enough, but for all of you, thank you for your service.

And for the Vietnam veterans, welcome home.
I'll give an update on our Auxiliary activities, as they're participating in all of their
community programs for Veterans Day. Many of our units are working hard with the "Wreaths Across America," in preparation for the laying of the wreaths.

Just Thursday, I had the opportunity of touring the Dayton VA facility, and was totally, totally impressed with what they do there, and the Auxiliary's participation from the members of the thundering 3rd District. I'm planning on reaching out to them to try to get a little more in the other areas, that we can have that type of participation in all of the other VAs.

And I know our other Districts are all actively organizing various activities to help our veterans enjoy a merry Christmas season.

I have to -- what's the word I want to use? I can't even think of it right now. I just went blank.

What Jason said about family, that's been such an important part of this year, working together with Jason, and with Dave and the SAL. I think it's a nice refocus, if you will, that we're doing. Not only are we focused on, obviously, the veterans, doing what we can for them, but our communities, our children and youth.

We've been focused on what we can do to help our veterans. Jason's special project, Dave's special project, and mine, have all coincided. And for those of you who do not know, my special project this year is "H.O.O.V.E.S., Healing Of Our Veterans Equine Services," in Swanton, Ohio. And if none of you are familiar with that, please look that up on-line. They are doing amazing work there. It's a private, donor-supported charity, dedicated to providing fully-funded, four-day, non-clinical healing intensives for veterans across the nation.

She not only houses them, she, Amanda Held is the facilitator, she will fly them in. She pays for the transportation. She pays for the housing, for food, everything.

She takes in rescue horses, trains them and uses them uses them as part of the therapy for the veterans.

An amazing, amazing program.
So I am doing a raffle on that. So if anyone is interested, see me afterwards.

Right now, though, I think our main focus, like yours, is on membership.

Although we do a competition, if you will,
between The Legion and Auxiliary, whatever, really, membership is not a competition, it's a necessity. And I know this is a focus across The Legion family.

Right now, Ohio Auxiliary membership is only at 58.7\%, as of November 22nd. Nationwide, it's only $54.73 \%$.

I'm happy to say, though, overall, right now, our numbers are better. We are, nationwide, 5,824 more members than we were last year at this time.

However, if we want our organizations to continue and exceed what we've accomplished over the last 104 years, we've got to get those numbers up. So let's do what we can. If you're getting members in The Legion, maybe they have a spouse that would like to join the Auxiliary. Let's pass that information along and share that and see what we can do to help one another out.

And if there's anything else that the Auxiliary can do to further assist your organization, please do not hesitate to reach out and ask.

Thank you so much for having me here and have a good day.

10TH DISTRICT CMDR CROTHERS: Wes Crothers, 10th District Commander.

When I've been doing my Post inspections the
last month, I came across a Post that didn't have their Auxiliary. And they told me they ain't got enough girls there.

PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Okay.
10TH DISTRICT CMDR CROTHERS: And they've always participated before.

PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Okay. Make sure you see me and we'll see what we can do to reach out to someone in the area and get that taken care of for you.

COMMANDER RUE: Wes, Buckeye Boys State has two honor codes that gives the access to both Boys State and Girls State information on it. So talk to your Buckeye Boys State or Girls State staffers that are here in Department and they can help you out with that, to get you information for all that.

10TH DISTRICT CMDR CROTHERS: Okay.
COMMANDER RUE: Now Jane, before you walk away, I know we make our wagers. And at Districts, we did it back as District Commander and District President.

PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Uh-huh.
COMMANDER RUE: I will challenge you for membership for a $\$ 100$ donation to your charity for this year as of May 31st.

PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Okay you're on. COMMANDER RUE: Now it's up to you guys to help me with that.

FROM THE FLOOR: Is it members or -COMMANDER RUE: Percentage, percentage of membership. We're a larger body than them. That's not fair to just go by numbers. PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Just remember, I make great cheesecakes. You can help me on membership. COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Jane. PRESIDENT RIDENOUR: Thank you.
(Applause).
COMMANDER RUE: Now we'll bring up our
Detachment Commander Dave Dilts.
(Applause).
DETACHMENT CMDR DILTS: Good morning.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
DETACHMENT CMDR DILTS: And you too, JD, good morning.

We can't forget our good guy here. He helps me out a lot.

And Jason right there, he helped me out just the other day with a situation we had.

Thank you guys for helping us out. And I
appreciate that.

Just take a moment and just look around. Look at our fellow people here. We are proud to be here. We are one heck of a family. We are all making a difference. If we can all get together as The Legion, the Auxiliary and the Sons, we will make a difference and make a heck of a good family.

We've got to go into our Posts and figure out what the problem is with a lot of things. We've got to stop this bickering and stuff that's going on in our Posts.

I was very upset with my Post, Post 29, in Zanesville. We are not a true family. We go in and do things but we do not, we don't appreciate the people, you know. We need recognition. Our Legion does not recognize, our Auxiliary don't recognize, and the Sons don't recognize, to work together. We're all bickering and everything. That's my biggest challenge, to try to get us together and make a difference.

But other than that, our membership, we're not as good. You know, our membership is a little over $46 \%$, but it's better than what it has been at this time, this year. I don't know if we'll be able to make a challenge like that, but we're going to make an effort to try to get things better.

I'm working with Tim Conway, our 1st Vice Commander. And all our table officers are doing a great job doing everything.

And as I travel through the State of Ohio and visit your Legion Posts, I appreciate all the hospitality the people have given me.

Thank you.
(Applause).
COMMANDER RUE: At this time we have a presentation being given by Rafflebox.

So Jim Gilliom, please come forward.
MR. GILLIOM: Good morning.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
MR. GILLIOM: Thank you for having me.
I drove over from Ft. Wayne, Indiana, this morning. So I'm a Hoosier, but I like Ohio too.

Now, I also do not like talking in microphones.
But anyway, I'm from a company called "Rafflebox." We are privileged to work with a lot of nonprofit 501s across the country and a lot in Canada as well, but mainly in the United States, and primarily south of here because we work with the Department of Florida American Legion and all 281 of their Posts.

And what we've done since June is actually do a
statewide program that has been a very big success, and a growing success. They're growing month over month. They're raising a lot of money.

But also, it's not just about the money. It's about the information and the camaraderie that's being captured from the Posts and younger people outside the Posts.

So, I don't know, JD and I talked a few times. And I believe there have been some conversations about this in the past. But my goal today is just basically to almost have an open conversation. If anyone has questions about this, raise your hand. I've got answers.

Do you have a question?
NEC MASOWICK: Yeah. I don't even know what a Rafflebox is.

MR. GILLIOM: It's a raffle.
So basically it's, Rafflebox is the company name. But we're just an electronic raffle supplier. So we're GLI certified. That's the same certifications that, you know, the top machines have in Vegas, at casinos and things like that. So we have all the accreditations, yeah.

COMMANDER RUE: And it's actually, it would be a statewide 50-50 drawing, is what it would amount
to.
Florida does one every two weeks, roughly. MR. GILLIOM: Yeah.

COMMANDER RUE: And their last one was of 18,000.

NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick, NEC.
This is done electronically?
COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
MR. GILLIOM: Yeah, electronically.
So Florida does it every two weeks. Their last one, which was actually their lowest one, that he spoke about, was 16,000. The highest one on a two-week basis was 30,000. But yesterday theirs just ended at \$53,000.

Last December, doing it the traditional way, and I'm not saying "old-fashioned way," but the grandfathered way, last year, in December, they sold $\$ 11,000$, total. And that's with 29 days left in the month.

So our program makes it easy on the Department to run, and very easy for your members and family and everyone outside of the membership to participate as well.

If anyone wants, if you get out your phone right now, $I$ don't know if it's against the rules,
but you can go to their website, it's Florida5050.org, and check it out. You can go through the whole process.

You can't buy a ticket, because you're not in the State of Florida, but you can kind of see the whole workings and things like that. You can see the last four purchases.

It's probably, in the last, since I've been up here, they've probably sold a hundred to \$200 worth of tickets. It's constantly flowing in.

And every single purchase, you capture the person's first name, last name, e-mail address, phone number, zip code, full address. And that really helps you increase and grow your membership outside of, you know, people who are already members.

And there is a way where, and this would be up to the Department and everyone here on how to structure this, but the best way to do it is actually bring in the Posts. So it's not only benefiting the Department, the entire state, but each individual Post. So if I go in --

What Post are you from?
NEC MASOWICK: 685. It's up by Cleveland.
MR. GILLIOM: So 685.

So when you go to purchase a ticket, you actually select your Post at the point of purchase and a percentage of the money that you spend goes directly back to the Post. So at the end of the quarter or biannually or a year, the Department will actually be, and I'm sorry if I'm speaking out of turn, contributing basically a commission back to the Posts.

So there's incentive. Every member has skin in the game. Not only a chance to win a lot of money, but if they don't win, they can justify it by it's going to support my Post.

And the more people that support it, our cut as a company, it's -- sorry, I didn't know if this is allowed to be spoken.

COMMANDER RUE: Oh, yeah. This is the body that's going to make the decision. So they're the ones that are going to have to --

MR. GILLIOM: Okay.
Rafflebox will be charging an $8 \%$ fee on gross sales. That's what we charge.

The other costs to this are just the costs of doing business on-line, which is a $2.9 \%$ processing fee that's not paid to us. It's paid to Stripe, which is the processer.

NEC MASOWICK: I have a lot of questions, but -- Steve Masowick.

How is the transaction, electronically, cash, check?

MR. GILLIOM: Electronically. So similar to if you --

NEC MASOWICK: So our members don't touch any money, it just goes into a digital bank and they take it out of your account?

MR. GILLIOM: It's all processed on our back end. And our back end is very, one, secure; and two, very clean in the transaction.

So it's all processed. There's no cash exchanging hands. So, you know, there can't be any money laundering or lost funds or anything like that. It's very transparent.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: Brad Beatty, 12th District.

Your name and website, please.
MR. GILLIOM: My name is Jim Gilliom, G-I-L-L-I-O-M. And the company and the website is Rafflebox.us. The dot-com is currently being negotiated with someone.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: So it's ".us"?
MR. GILLIOM: It's ".us," yes.

And then there will also be a ".org", once that goes live, actually in January.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: So it's new?
MR. GILLIOM: It's not, the company is not new. We've been around since 2017. It's just the domain. And then this is just a technicality. There's squatter on our domain, the dot-com. And he wants $\$ 100,000$ to buy it.

COMMANDER RUE: Gary.
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Minadeo, Post 7.
Are you cleared through the charitable gaming laws of the State of Ohio?

MR. GILLIOM: Yeah. Yeah, we are registered in the State of Ohio. We are registered in every state that this is legal in. With that, we also keep all of our other accreditations. We're $100 \%$ on the right side of things.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Once you take your $10 \%$, your eight and the another two, then we have to split the 90 50-50 with the charity?

MR. GILLIOM: The Department would be --
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Unless Charities is holding it.

MR. GILLIOM: It comes to the Department.
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: So we're splitting

90, essentially $90 \%$ ? If we get $\$ 100$, you keep 10 and we get 90 , and have to send 45 of that to the charity. So 45 would go to the person that won. And then out of our 45, we would keep half of that? FROM THE FLOOR: No. PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: No, no, no. You can check the law. It's a raffle. We are allowed to hold a raffle. We have to give $50 \%$ of our net to a 501 (c) (3).

COMMANDER RUE: That would go to Charities, Inc.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Well, they would have to, Charities, Inc., would have to be in charge of it, to distribute it, and they would get all of it and send us our 90\%, after they take their ten and -- I mean, I'm just saying it's not as easy as it seems. Florida is a little easier with their gambling laws than the State of Ohio.

MR. GILLIOM: You are correct.
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: That's all.
COMMANDER RUE: Do we have any other questions? 9TH DISTRICT 1VC WHETSTONE: I do.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
9TH DISTRICT 1VC WHETSTONE: I'm Jacqueline Whetstone, 9th District 1st Vice Commander.

What about your players' privacy? You're getting a lot of information from everybody. How can I be sure that my name and address and phone number isn't going somewhere else where I start getting a bunch of crap in the mail?

MR. GILLIOM: That's a good question.
The Department, the organization who would run this, who we would be under contract with, owns 100\% of the data. We don't touch it. We don't sell it. It is not our information and purchase you're not going to get another e-mail.

And then once you purchase a ticket, you can opt out. As long as you don't purchase another ticket, you're not going to get another e-mail. But most people who do purchase once purchase every single time there is a draw.

Again, in Florida, they've done this since the beginning of July. So that's five total months and they've done just under 300,000 in sales, which is over 50,000 a month.

And then they've captured 4,000 of their, 4,000 donor profiles. Again, none of those are sold externally. They're all captured by the Department of Florida. And from who I speak to, about 20\% of those are from outside their current list.

9TH DISTRICT 1VC WHETSTONE: So in other words, when you buy a ticket, you get an e-mail confirmation of that ticket?

MR. GILLIOM: Yeah, the ticket is electronically --

And what's nice is that, you know, e-mails do get lost and stuff, so when that winner is pulled, the Department, the system knows exactly who purchased it. So even if you've purchased and lose the e-mail, which isn't very common. But in that uncommon circumstance, the Department could call the person and say, "Congrats, you won."

9TH DISTRICT 1VC WHETSTONE: So you're getting a confirmation number that you have to hold on to in order to get your payout?

MR. GILLIOM: Essentially. That's getting into kind of the weeds of things, but the claim process is very clean-handed.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Well I've got one more question for Post 7.

Is there an automatic reporting accompanied to the IRS on who won the money?

MR. GILLIOM: There's automatic -- no. The quick answer is no. There's no automatic reporting to the IRS.

Now we have all the automatic reports that you need. However, we just have to have that separation, as the technology provider and the organization running the event.

1VC WHATLEY: Any other questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
1VC WHATLEY: Hearing none, thank you, sir.
MR. GILLIOM: Thank you.
And we also run, I don't know if we have any Buckeye fans in here, but do run all their programs in the State of Ohio.

NEC MASOWICK: Who did you say?
MR. GILLIOM: Ohio State.
FROM THE FLOOR: O-H.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: I-O.
MR. GILLIOM: Okay, I guess you are fans.
And that's osu5050.com, if you want to write that down. You can go buy a ticket right now and do the whole process because that's in the state.

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Alternate NEC Chapman.
So do you do like Major League Baseball stadiums and things?

MR. GILLIOM: Yeah. We do everything from, you know, little kids little league all the way up to Ohio State University, and everywhere in between.

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Because I know the Reds do one.

MR. GILLIOM: Yeah. We don't run the Reds.
NEC MASOWICK: The Guardians do it too.
MR. GILLIOM: Yeah.
And I used to run the Indianapolis Colts Raffle Program. Fortunately, I've worked in raffles for about a third of my life. So I've seen about every one you could have.

But here is my contact information
(indicating). You know, it will be a privilege to work with the State of Ohio.

So thank you.
NEC MASOWICK: Thank you for your time.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
(Applause).
All right, now we'll go into our commission reports.

Holly Lewis, for the Finance report.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd District.

I move that we suspend the reading of the minutes that were previously e-mailed to everybody
multiple times, hearing any questions or concerns to these reports.

COMMANDER RUE: This report here was just e-mailed, because we just had a meeting this past week. So there's some stuff that needs to go into this.

CHAIRMAN LEWIS: I'll keep it short, I promise.
Good morning.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.
CHRMN LEWIS: All right, you guys got three sets of minutes from the Finance Commission. We meet quite often, usually once a month.

I want to just hit the highlights for you, just so everyone is aware of what is going on.

So, in the September minutes, we raised the price of the Americanism Test to a quarter from 10 cents.

We also are looking at baseball and how are we going to fund the baseball program.

We also made a motion to increase 888 membership dues to $\$ 50.00$ per year.

Okay?
So that's out of that set of minutes that I wanted to bring to your attention. The next set of minutes are October.

What I wanted to bring to your attention there is that we made a motion to increase the dues, and seconded by Jose. I see you have a separate item that's on about resolutions, so I'm going to leave it there.

The other thing that we decided is -- we're trying to save money, if you can't tell. Okay?

All of you have an ACH folder in front of you. One of the things that we want you to do is get your expenses via ACH, so that we can save money on postage, checks, paper, all the things.

So, please, fill out an ACH form. And when you fill out your expenses, make sure you put on there "ACH." All right?

And the other thing is, we released the District Activity Funds, if you didn't notice that. We went back to the old policy, where we subtracted the hats from what you were getting and then sent you the remainder.

We also had three quotes for the parking lot. And we decided to use Sheedy Paving. And we'll be doing a parking lot repave in the spring.

And we also moved to put the Legislative position back to a full-time position, when we can find someone to fill it.

All right, November minutes. I'm going to skip one thing here and just talk about the other things.

We updated the resolution. We took out one part of it where we had said we wanted to raise the dues in coordination with National. We took that part out. And we also realized that we didn't have an effective date in the resolution, so we added one and got that approved.

The other thing that's going on is Maloney and Novotny, our current auditors, I'm just going to say it, they suck. Okay? They've gotten very far behind. And so we've asked JD to pull the contract and talk to Josh about what are our options here, can we stop paying them, what? Right?

And then we're also, JD is meeting with the VFW, AMVETS, and a couple of other organizations, to talk to them about who they use for auditors, so that we can get a better auditing team. Okay?

All right, at this point I would like to ask the Commander if we could go into executive session.

COMMANDER RUE: I'd entertain a motion to go into executive session at this time.

TREASURER RIVERA: Jose Rivera makes the motion.

6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: Eaton, 6th District

Commander, seconds.
COMMANDER RUE: All right, so we have a motion and a second to go into executive session.

All those in favor, signify by saying aye.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: The motion carries.
(THEREUPON, THE COMMITTEE WENT INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION) .
. . . CALL TO ORDER . . .
COMMANDER RUE: We're back in session.
CHRMN LEWIS: Okay. So the committee discussed ways to cut costs and raise revenue. That's the way business works, revenue, expenses. Right?

So we're looking for ways to bring in more revenue so that we're not as dependent on membership.

Chris.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd District Vice Commander.

I have a question about the raffles. Does it really increase the revenue or are we going to give the money to Charities, Inc.?

CHRMN LEWIS: Yeah, I think we need to look
into that. So I think Gary brought up a great point. Like how does that work? Right? How does that part of it work?

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: One thing we don't have transparency on is Charities, Inc.

CHRMN LEWIS: I agree.
So, the last thing on the November minutes, you
will see that staff increases were reviewed and discussed, with amounts agreed upon.

And that concludes my report.
COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
12TH DISTRICT 1VC HIGGINS: Mike Higgins,
District 12 1st Vice.
On revenue, there are a number of accounts that belong to the Department of Ohio on the Department of Commerce's unclaimed website.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We started on that Thursday.

CHRMN LEWIS: Yes.
12TH DISTRICT 1VC HIGGINS: Great.
Two is the ones that, the other Legion
accounts, if those organizations are no longer, you've got that covered?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes, sir.
12TH DISTRICT 1VC HIGGINS: Thank you.

NEC MASOWICK: Good for you. CHRMN LEWIS: Any other questions? FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response). CHRMN LEWIS: That concludes my report, Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes, sir. 6TH DISTRICT CMDR EATON: Shane Eaton, Commander of the 6th District, I make a motion to approve.

11TH DISTRICT CMDR STAN: Thom Stan, Commander, 11th District, I second that motion to approve. COMMANDER RUE: All right, we have a motion and a second to approve the minutes from the Finance Committee.

Is there any discussion?
FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Is there any discussion?
FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in
favor signify by saying aye.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.
COMMANDER RUE: The motion carries.
Thanks, Holly.

CHRMN LEWIS: You're welcome.
COMMANDER RUE: All right, Christie White, Americanism Commission.

COORDINATOR WHITE: All right, I will be quick, because you're going to hear a lot from me.

Can everyone hear me? Is everyone awake?
Americanism met on October 7th, at noon. The minutes were motioned and approved.

Educator of the Year was discussed.
Within discussing the Educator of the Year, the commission talked about changing the rules of the packet, making some of the wording a little more clear. It depends who reads it, how you interpret it. So we want to clean that up a little bit.

Stuart Grunder, from the 10th District, was elected, nominated as the 2023-2024 Educator of the Year.

The A\&G test judging. The judges were selected. It will be District 6, District 14, District 12, District 8, along with SAL and Auxiliary Americanism Chairs. The alternates will be District 2, District 10, and District 4.

The commission also discussed the Red, White and Blue Award. The one that we had looked like it was made on a typewriter. It's probably 30, 40
years old. We revamped it, cleaned it up, made it nice, and it is on the website.

So please encourage your Posts to go out in their communities, and if there are businesses that are just gung-ho on Americanism, please award them. That is my Americanism report. COMMANDER RUE: Yes, Bob. PDC SCHMITT: Commander, through the Chair, PDC Schmitt.

Just to let you know, the Educator of the Year of, I believe about 2015, his name was Joe Boyle. He taught at Woodward High School in Toledo. He did of cancer. He had cancer back then, when we gave him the award. And we also had him at Buckeye Boys State that year. And it finally got to him, but he had cancer way back a long time ago and has been fighting it and still --

COMMANDER RUE: Bob, where is this going at with Americanism?

PDC SCHMITT: Well, it's Americanism because he was Educator of the Year.

COMMANDER RUE: Yeah, but where are you going with this? What does this have to do with the current report?

PDC SCHMITT: An Educator of the Year for the

Department of Ohio passed away due to cancer and he was an exceptional teacher.

COMMANDER RUE: Okay. Thank you.
Go ahead.
COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay, Buckeye Boys State. They met on October 14th. The previous minutes were approved. They gave personnel reports and approved some guests to be new commissioners and some guests to be consultants. They appointed the Samsung Scholarship Committee, the Hall of Fame Committee, and the Boys Nation Selection Committee.

The dates for Boys State for 2024 are June 9th through the 16th, 2024. Again, it will be at Miami. It will be there for the next eight years, because we've got a ten-year contract with them.

Section Head reports were given. And it was decided that the spring meeting for Boys State is April 12th and 13th. So if anyone wants to come check it out, see what Buckeye Boys State is about, you're more than welcome to attend the meeting. That is my Boys State report. Any questions? 5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Yes. What was the dates you said for Boys State, June -COORDINATOR WHITE: June 9th through the 16th.

Okay, Baseball.
And Baseball is a little bit longer because there are some changes going on.

Baseball, they met on October 22nd. The previous minutes were approved. The committee rules were approved.

The Baseball Commission decided to create a subcommittee to clean up the Ohio Rulebook. The subcommittee will be Jeff Vrabel, Mike Higgins, Bill Lonsbury, Bryce Agner, Mel Cantrell, our Chairman Chris Emmons, and myself.

The spring Baseball meeting will be Sunday, February 24th. The meeting starts at 10:30 for the commissioners and the chairmen, and 1:00 o'clock for coaches and managers.

So if you have baseball teams in your District, tell them of the spring date and encourage them to attend. They have to attend.

FROM THE FLOOR: There will be a virtual option.

COMMANDER RUE: There will be a virtual option as well.

Junior and senior tournament dates were discussed. The junior tournament will be July 18th through the 20th.

You can find all this information on-line also. So you don't have to frantically start writing things down.

The winners, the region winners for the junior tournament, needs to be at Department by Sunday, July 14th.

The senior tournament will be Friday, July 26th, through July 29th. July 30th will be the "what-if" game.

Instead of doing a banquet this year, we're doing things a little different. The teams will check in at the field earlier in the day. And then all day, at the field, we will have a "Family Fun Day," to kind of encourage families to come out, and the community to come out, and really get involved with Legion Baseball.

We're trying to get food trucks donated, a bounce house donated. The only way that we are going to do this is if things are donated. So we're not throwing money out there.

So there will be a "Family Fun Day" all throughout the day. And then at 7:30, we'll have a game under the lights for two of the teams.

At 10:00 AM, the coaches will meet at the field. Each team will be given 30 minutes to run
drills.
The region tournament winners will need to be turned in to Department by July 21st. So you have to have your region tournaments done by July 21st.

We are also creating a new bracket this year. Every year there's a rain delay or teams winning that are supposed to lose and we have issues. So we're fixing that this year.

The junior team fees are \$500. The senior team fees are \$600.

The regional tournament dates for National are August 7th through 11th. The National World Series is August 15th through the 20th.

National had some updates this year. They will get rid of the dual roster rules. There is no limit. The National Americanism Commission approved it during fall meetings. The rule is "6.E.1, Dual Roster."

Again, all this will be on the website.
There is also a new resolution from National that will require 18-year-olds to have background checks and sexual abuse and molestation training. That includes players.

FROM THE FLOOR: That's on hold-ish.
COORDINATOR WHITE: That's on hold-ish.
"USA Baseball" and "Protect Youth Sports" will be the two approved companies that will handle the background checks and S.A.M. training.

I would also like to mention that 2025 is the centennial year for American Legion Baseball.

The commission also appointed the Past Chairman, Marv Shamhart, as an Assistant Chairman to Chris this year. Marv did great things for Baseball. They didn't want to just shove him aside. Chris is new. He's learning from Marv. So they decided to appoint him as the Assistant Chair.

That is my Baseball report.
Questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR WHITE: Moving on, Oratorical met on October 21st. The previous minutes were approved. The committee rules were approved.

The 2023 contest was reviewed.
Each District that was present notified us of their contest dates. And we'll make sure and get those up on the website as well.

The Department Oratorical Contest will be March 17th.

The winners need to be sent to Department by March 11th.

And then our Department winner needs to be to National by April 1st.

The National Oratorical Contest is May 17th through the 19th, in Hillsdale, Michigan. They switched it so they're doing it at a college now.

If anyone wants to volunteer, they can fill out a volunteer form at legion.org. They're looking for volunteers. So if you've ever wanted to see an Oratorical Contest, please feel free to volunteer at the Department's, and then you can also volunteer at the National's.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: If you have questions on volunteering, ask John Looker. He goes out every year.

COORDINATOR WHITE: A lot of times, National is looking for escorts. It's not what you think. Being an escort in this situation is a good thing.

Prize money was discussed. We were notified of different prize amounts. So then, during the meeting, the Oratorical Commission created a resolution. However, there were no minutes to back up the different prize amounts. So the prize amounts stayed the same. The resolution in the minutes are null and void, according to the Parliamentarian. He says that they are overcome by
events and do not need to move forward. So the resolution in the minutes, just ignore it.

And Oratorical also created a brochure, kind of like Boys State has, Americanism has. So if anyone is looking for Oratorical brochures, you want to go out to your schools when they're talking about other programs and you want to take Oratorical with you, let me know. I do not have any on hand here, but we can get some printed out and sent to you.

Any questions on Oratorical?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR WHITE: Moving on, Religious Emphasis.

Religious Emphasis met on October 21st as well. Chaplain Distel talked a little bit about it.

The main thing on the Religious Emphasis Committee was the Father John Duffy Award and the Post Chaplain's Award were discussed.

Previously, the Father John Duffy Award was an award that was decided by a convention committee. It is now going to be voted on by the Religious Emphasis Committee. It just kind of made more sense that way. Each District will send in their Father John Duffy Award and Chaplain Award to the Department immediately following their District

Summer Conventions.
So please fill out the Father John Duffy and Chaplain Awards at your District Summer Conventions. The body will vote on it there. And then we will have 14 District winners from the Department after your summer conventions.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: Question.
Beatty, Commander, 12th District.
So that packet, is it mailed out to our Americanism Chairpersons in our Districts when, the packet that has all those, all that documentation?

COORDINATOR WHITE: So, that's a good question, because this was just decided on.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: Last year, it never did reach the chairs.

COORDINATOR WHITE: The of-the-year packet?
12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: It reached someone, but it didn't move forward. So I want to know what the date is so I can hold accountability.

COORDINATOR WHITE: So the of-the-year award winners are two separate things. Those are all due here by September 15th.

12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: Okay.
COORDINATOR WHITE: The John Duffy is after your summer convention, which is --

FROM THE FLOOR: May. COORDINATOR WHITE: -- May. 12TH DISTRICT CMDR BEATTY: But there's a packet that's sent, right? Isn't there a packet with --

COORDINATOR WHITE: Those are of-the-year awards. Those are completely separate. The John Duffy is separate from that. So that will be mailed differently from the of-the-year awards, just because of-the-year all have the same due date. Father John Duffy has a different one.

And this is kind of brand new, so we're working out the kinks as we go. Most likely, your District Chaplain will get the information and then can send it out to your Posts. But, we are open for suggestions.

So, the Father John Duffy, the District will send the award to Department immediately following their District Summer Conventions. The 14 District winners will be voted on by the Religious Emphasis Committee and selected as the Department Father John Duffy and Chaplain of the Year, to be awarded at Department Convention.

As the Chaplain had mentioned, the Sunday service for Mid-Winter is a Four Chaplains.

Department Convention will be a Catholic and a Protestant service. So Four Chaplains at Mid-Winter, Catholic and Protestant at convention. Any questions? FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response). COMMANDER RUE: All right, I'll entertain a motion to accept the Americanism reports as a whole. 3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Chris Emmons, 3rd District, so moves. 4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District Commander, seconds. COMMANDER RUE: We have a motion properly made and seconded.

Is there any questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Hearing none, all those in
favor signify by saying aye.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
COORDINATOR WHITE: Children and Youth, they met on October 7th. The previous minutes were approved.

Unfinished Business that they had, I don't know
if anybody has seen it in your Post, but there's cans or boxes or something that should be sitting around, that look like this (indicating). It's a sticker. The idea is this will stay on whatever can, or whatever it is, whoever the organization is that Children and Youth decide to raise money for, and will be replaced at the bottom every year.

If your Post does not have one of these, let me know. I have extra stickers.

Any money that is put in these cans will go to Stockhands, because that is what Children and Youth selected this year.

If you put money in those pigs that say "Child Welfare," that will go to National's Child Welfare.

So if you want to donate to Stockhands and stick it in a Child Welfare pig, it's not going to go to Stockhands.

Anything that's purple will stay here. Anything that is not purple will go elsewhere.

I also have some Stockhands brochures that they came and brought us, if anyone wants any to put in your Posts by your cans. That way people know what they're donating for. I will get those to you as well.

The Children and Youth Commission created a new
program. It is the Fourth Grade Flag Program. It's a little comic book that the fourth graders get to learn about the flag. They take a test.

As of right now, they're keeping it at District level. So your Post winners will go to District. Your District will award them, one boy, one girl.

Once we kind of get the kinks worked out, because it is a new program, then we'll talk about running it to Department level and awarding them at Department.

Your District Children and Youth Chairs have certificates for the winners.

Again, this is brand new. There are some Posts that are doing it currently. A lot of the information did not get out because the commission still needed to vote on it. So next year we will be pushing it really hard. Just know that next year and keep your eyes out for that.

The Child Welfare Worker of the Year, the deadline was September 15th. However, there were no submissions. They voted to move the deadline to November 15th. They did.

There was a submission. It was voted on via e-mail. And Tanga Mitchell was selected as the Child Welfare Worker of the Year.

Children and Youth also, last year, created
"Teen Suicide Awareness" pamphlets. If anyone needs more of those, please let me know and we'll get you some.

Any questions?
PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: That fourth grade program was the one we approved in convention?

COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes. Yeah, there was already a resolution that was passed at convention for that. We just started working on it.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: On that fourth grade thing, do you have the brochures here?

I have maybe like a dozen back at the Post, so I can show my officers what it's about and take that to schools.

FROM THE FLOOR: Who are you?
2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd Vice Commander of the 2nd District.

COMMANDER RUE: Please stand to be recognized when you're speaking. State your name, your title.

2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: Sorry.
COMMANDER RUE: Thank you.
2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: Okay, Mike Homan, 2nd District 2nd Vice.

On the pamphlets for the fourth graders, do you have some here or do we have to order those through emblem sales?

COORDINATOR WHITE: We have them here. The books, the comic books, are a dollar apiece. But I can give you a memo that was created that explains what the test is to take with you to schools.

2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: Okay. Can I get one of those today?

COORDINATOR WHITE: Sure. You've got to give me a little bit to print them out but I'll get them to you.

2ND DISTRICT 2VC HOMAN: Okay.
ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, Alternate NEC, through you to the Parliamentarian.

A 2nd Vice Commander has no voice with this DEC. He should go through his chair out here with a question like that. Not to be nitpicky, but that's the way it should be.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: The Commander recognized him, so he could speak.

COMMANDER RUE: Since the of-the-year awards in that report were pulled out and approved already, that's just for informational purposes only.

So now we'll go ahead with National Security.

COORDINATOR WHITE: National Security met on November 4th. The previous minutes were approved. Each District gave reports on what their District is working on National Security-wise.

The commission wanted to emphasize that we take our Civilian Lifesaver Resolution and give it to National Headquarters, as well as other Departments, to encourage National to create a Civilian Lifesaver Award.

The Ralph Doll Award was talked about. There is a couple members of the commission that will create criteria for that. The Ralph Doll Award, as of now, is one of those convention awards as well. There's really no criteria for it, so they're going to create some criteria.

Their new business, because it was an odd year, odd Districts voted on the of-the-year awards. So it was 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11 and 13.

The Civilian Lifesaver was named, Robert Hursong, District 4.

Law enforcement was Kyle Brookover, of District 11.

And the firefighter was Tiffany Bailes, of District 12.

The Chairman had mentioned a website, "Defense

POW/MIA Accounting Agency." It's a website where you can go in order to get a list of all your POW/MIAs in your District. The commission was encouraged to take the information back to their Districts and give it to their POW/MIA Chairmen. The National Security Commission also has decided, for their commission, that the standing commission meetings immediately following Department Convention will be virtual. The fall meeting will be the only one in person, and then the spring meeting will be virtual. So they have decided that their commission will only have one in-person meeting.

And that is my report for National Security. COMMANDER RUE: Once again, since the of-the-year awards were sent out and voted on already, this is just informational purposes.

So now we'll move on to the Legislative report. COORDINATOR WHITE: The Legislative Commission had two meetings since October, one was in person, one was virtual.

The first one was October 22nd. Their previous minutes were approved.

In their unfinished business, there was a Legislator of the Year that was decided on by the

DEC, approved last year. Then there was a change of people, and then more change of people, and then no people. So that was kind of put on the back burner.

We picked it up again. The National Legislator of the Year was David Joyce. The state is Tracy Richardson.

The commission discussed creating a proclamation for them, so we can give them a proclamation as well as an award. So that was discussed.

They also discussed creating criteria for the Legislator of the Year. Right now it's kind of somebody brings somebody to the table, they talk about it, and they either agree or disagree. There's really no set this, this, this and this for the Legislator of the Year. So that was discussed.

The takeaways from the meeting: They were creating criteria for the Legislator of the Year, based off of the four pillars and preamble, they were creating a draft mission statement, and then creating a proclamation.

They voted to have a virtual meeting then on Tuesday, November 19th, to review their takeaways.

So the virtual meeting on November 19th, I believe you guys should have those minutes as well.

COMMANDER RUE: They've all been sent. COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay. The minutes from the last meeting were approved.

The Legislator of the Year criteria, those are all typed out in your minutes. There was a couple edits, but everything in here is the edited version. There was also a proclamation created for Dave Joyce and Tracy Richardson. Both of those are in here as well.

The proclamations were sent to their offices for them to review to make sure everything is correct and if there's anything they wanted to add or take away.

Tracy Richardson's office responded the end of last week. So her proclamation is done.

We are waiting for Dave Joyce's proclamation to come back, for them to either approve it or make changes.

They are either going to be awarded -- it's going to depend on each legislator's office. They want to do it at the Washington Conference. If for some reason they can't be there, they're talking about the Districts doing it within their Districts. The problem with having it at convention or

Mid-Winter is a lot of these legislators, once they cross different boundaries, different rules apply. So it's easier to either do it at Washington Conference or within the District. And it's going to be based off of each legislators' offices, their decision.

So that is what was discussed in the Legislative Commission.

COMMANDER RUE: All right, now I'll entertain a motion to accept that report, since we created some certificates for them and stuff.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District Commander, so moves.

ALTERNATE NEC CHAPMAN: Chapman, Alternate NEC, seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: We have a proper motion and a second.

Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Is there any discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: All those in favor, signify by saying aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
All right. Thanks, Christie.
Now we'll have Mr. William Genochio for VA\&R. COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Good morning, or afternoon.

The VA\&R, Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation Committee met on October 7, '23. A reading of the previous minutes was approved. There was no District reports given.

And also, I should note that there was not a quorum. We only had six attend that virtual meeting. So we did not have a quorum. So no District reports.

There was unfinished business.
A review of the commission awards was held. A motion was made by Mr. Capps of District 8 to approve. That motion passed. We also reviewed guidelines for the Veterans Treatment Court that were drafted by Darell Bishop, of the 5th District, and myself. Those were read by Commissioner David Cook, of District 6. A review of the guidelines was e-mailed out, since we did not have a quorum. And that was done for an e-mail vote. And then the responses will need to be in by
the 13th of October. And that motion passed.
There was also a review of the commission rules regarding the change to the first paragraph. I mentioned there's no answer from Department. So we're still waiting on that change.

An update was given on House Bill 69.
Under new business, the DSO report was given. The Gifts for Yanks report was given by Darell Bishop of District 5, which said some of the locations have issues with the previous gifts they were getting. That's why we went with the gift cards.

Under the good of The Legion, I stated that there was 46 service officers that attended the last Post Service Officers' school. And we're looking to do both an in-person and a virtual class in the future. I'll have to work with Jon Vulgamore on doing that.

And the meeting adjourned at 2:35 PM.
That concludes my VA\&R report, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: Okay, so that's just
informational only.
Thank you.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Commander, I do have the DSO report and The American Legion Riders report if you want it.

COMMANDER RUE: Yes, please.
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: So the DSO report, as I actually mentioned earlier, I did notice on November 16th of 2023, the VA released their Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report. They reported the suicides through '21. The report showed that 6,392 veterans lost their lives to suicide. This is an increase of 114 since 2020. Since January 17th of '23, veterans in acute suicidal crisis have been able seek a VA or non-VA healthcare facility for emergency healthcare at no cost. This includes inpatient or crisis residential care for 30 days, and outpatient care for 90 days.

And also, I'm sure you guys have seen it, but the VA has also shortened their crisis line. You dial 988, and press 1 for immediate assistance.

The Cleveland office remains open to the public. We have seen an increase in our BVA hearings. They are getting scheduled heavier and heavier. We're having anywhere from 20 to 30 a month. We're also seeing an increase in our walk-in traffic at the Cleveland office.

The Columbus VA Ambulatory Clinic is still currently vacant.

As they mentioned earlier, Cincinnati is now vacant. Jeff Delaney took a job with the VA. He starts Monday. Yesterday was his last day.

Dayton is open to the public. Gary Felver is now conducting BVA hearings at that location for veterans in that area.

Production for 2023 on BVA success is 82\%, with 586,000 in awards.

I've reported all the years, annually. Since we started tracking in 2017, the DSO team has brought in $\$ 21,469,131.50$. And that's just board hearings we've conducted.

That's my DSO report.
(Applause) .
These DSOs are phenomenal in the research they do and their representations. I'm very lucky to be able to work with them on a day-to-day basis. They're fantastic.

Any questions on the DSO report?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR GENOCHIO: Okay, I'll move on to The American Legion Riders.

As many of you know, we have a new state director. Mike Lincoln stepped up. He was our deputy director. He is now the state director. And
he appointed Deputy Director Thom Fowler as the Deputy Director for The Legion Riders.

The 2024 "Ride on Military Pride," referred to as the "ROMP," will be held August 1st through the 4th of 2024. Zanesville Post 29 will be hosting that ROMP.

There was five new chapters that opened this year. That's Marion Post 584, Athens Post 21, London Post 105, Austintown 301, and Wellington Post 8.

For any of your Riders looking for the unity patch, the deadline is December 15th, for those Riders to receive that at Mid-Winter Conference.

And then discussions will be held at Mid-Winter to discuss possible charities or programs to support as the Legacy Ride from National is no longer the Legacy Ride.

So, Commander, that completes my three reports.
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Bill.
Next we'll have Jon Vulgamore with the Media, Marketing and Communications Commission.

COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: Thank you, Commander.
Good afternoon, ladies and gentlemen.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.
COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: MMC Chair Chris Emmons
called the virtual Microsoft Teams meeting of the Department Media, Marketing and Communications Commission to order on Thursday, October 5th, 2023, at 5:31 P.M. Ten members, one subcommission member, and one guest were present. Bob White, District 13, gave the invocation. The Pledge of Allegiance was also led by Chair Emmons and recited by all present. The meeting secretary appointment was substituted by all present agreeing to be digitally recorded through Microsoft Teams to produce the minutes from.

Due to the previous meeting minutes from August 10th, 2023, being e-mailed to the members of the commission for review, Chris Emmons, District 3 Chair, moved to entertain a motion to approve and suspend the reading of the previous minutes. Holly Lewis, District 10, so motioned. And Bob White, District 13, seconded the motion. No discussion was offered, and the commission oral vote unanimously passed approving the minutes as presented. The motion carried.

Next, MMC Commission Staff Liaison Jon
Vulgamore presented his Ohio Legion News report on current costs of the mailed summer OLN edition, also the digital-only program, the extended on-line
newsletter e-mail campaign, OLN advertising and cost savings report with the recent mailing distribution changes.

Next, Bob White, District 13, lead the discussion of the Department creating or outsourcing our own press credentials. After lengthy commission discussion, it was decided to table the Department press badge sanctioned program due to the undefined cost and difficulty implementing the infrastructure, budget and administration involved with it.

Vulgamore continued with the Department website and social media report.

Dayna Beyer, District 5, offered to create a new Legion Family and Post Facebook page and Instagram page, and also to moderate it to solve the issue of the current one no longer being active.

Now this is different from our main Department page.

Chair Emmons then moved to entertain a motion to create these social media pages. Holly Lewis, District 10, so motioned. And Al Beyer, District 5, seconded the motion. No discussion was offered and the commission oral vote passed with seven ayes for and 2 ayes against. The motion carried.

After some announcements and good of commission
discussion, Chair Emmons closed the meeting with a salute to colors. The meeting was adjourned at 6:32 PM.

NEC MASOWICK: No, I mean is it rising? Are more people doing it?

COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: At the previous meeting, we passed a motion to put on all the 888 members, since, you know, they probably have little invested interest in receiving the bale of paper anyway. And then also implemented this fall was the war eras for the Gulf and Global War on Terror members to be auto-enrolled in that program. So the short answer is yes, it's gone up significantly, to almost 16,000 now.

NEC MASOWICK: Great.
COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: The cost savings should be around eight grand.

COMMANDER RUE: Anything else?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Jon.
Now we'll have the Department Adjutant, JD, give the Sons of the American Legion report.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Sons of The American Legion Report to the Department Executive Committee, December 2, 2023.

The Detachment Executive Committee met at Paschall Post 164, in Grove City, on Saturday, October 21st, 2023.

Presentations were given by Cindy Boehnlein of The American Legion Auxiliary on legislation and the President of the OVH Volunteer Advisory Committee on the Sandusky home. They both gave great presentations.

Reports were heard from the committee chairmen.
The following donations from future projects were approved: The Central Region Extravaganza was \$1500; the Task Force 20, Commander Dilts' project, was 1,000; Child Welfare Foundation was 651.29; for a grand total of 3,151.29.

The next Detachment Exec Committee meeting will be Friday, January 19th, at the Marriott Columbus, at Mid-Winter Convention.

Commander, that is the report.

COMMANDER RUE: All right, thanks, JD.
All right, it is now, 12:12. We will meet back here at 12:45. We're going to break for lunch. (THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS). . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

COMMANDER RUE: We are reconvening.
At this time we'll move on to Post Charters, revocations and suspensions, Department Adjutant John Robinson.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We have several new charters for Squadrons: Squadron 2, in Cleveland, was created; Squadron 90, in Bethesda; Squadron 171, in Westerville; Squadron 608, in Fremont; and Squadron 764, in Newark.

The only closing, we are still working on 472. And I'll let the Commander speak on that.

COMMANDER RUE: So, after talking to the National Judge Advocate and a few others, we went back and had to redo a few things starting this. So we are moving forward with that. We have the subcommittee picked and we're waiting for a trial date to be set at this point. And that's about as far as I can go into it right now.

Resolutions.
So, two of the resolutions, the JROTC Award one
and The American Legion Department of Ohio Video Gaming Committee, are being pulled from here. They are not going to be heard by the DEC today. They have to go to Finance first before they can come before the DEC. So we're not going to waste the time of the DEC with those.

Now, we have the Department dues increase. Everybody should have got a resolution packet on your desk with that. And it also has the supporting information on the second sheet.

I'm not going to read the whole resolution.
We'll start at, "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of Ohio --

No, that's not the right one.
Okay, so, "Resolved, by the Department of Ohio, that the Department Commander shall direct the Department Finance Commission to look for additional revenue streams, cut costs, and self-fund Baseball, A\&G Trip, and Oratorical programs, in collaboration with the Commission Chairs and Department Adjutant."

That's not the full thing either.
"Resolved, by the Department of Ohio, to increase dues from $\$ 9$ to $\$ 14$, to provide an additional approximate revenue of $\$ 375,000$, effective January 1, 2025; and be it further
"Resolved, by the Department, that the Department Commander shall direct the Department Finance Commission to look for additional revenue streams, cut costs, and self-fund Baseball, the A\&G Trip, and the Oratorical programs, in collaboration with Commission Chairs and the Department Adjutant."

Is there any discussion at this time?
Yes, Bill.
9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Bill Dittebrand, 9th District Commander. I have a few issues with this.

This was brought up at the outgoing DEC in June. And they was talking about getting committees together to see about cutting costs and all that. What costs did they actually cut to do this dues increase? And do we have a committee that's supposed to be made up of --

COMMANDER RUE: It's on the back page of that handout that you got.

9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Okay, Commander.
COMMANDER RUE: The commissions have been put on a budget. So there's no travel for every meeting. Some of them are going to do their meetings, some of them are going to be virtual. Us three (indicating) have been put on a budget for the
first time in many years, as Department officers. We've reduced the employees that are here by two.

FROM THE FLOOR: It's on the back.
COMMANDER RUE: Yeah, it's all right here on the back (indicating). "Cost Reduction Projects Underway, Appendix A."

And actually, if all the DEC would do the ACH and encourage all your Posts to be on an ACH, it would save a lot of money, because we're not paying for checks to be mailed out, we're not paying for stamps, we're not paying for envelopes for them. That gets expensive when you're talking about mailing and you're talking about 590-some Posts in the state. So if we could get everybody on board with doing the ACH , it would save Department a ton of money.

9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Okay. And also, this $\$ 600,000$ that we took out of the investments, are we going to pay that back?

COMMANDER RUE: No.
9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Well that was one of the reasons they took it out was with the intention of paying it back.

COMMANDER RUE: There's a problem. When you don't have the funds to pay it back, you just keep
taking it out, Bill. And eventually --
I mean, it's wrote down in here as to how much of that money we can actually touch in the investments, which isn't the whole six million.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: No, it's only 2.7.
COMMANDER RUE: Exactly.
So if you keep taking six to $\$ 800,000$ out of there every year, how long until we're going to be broke?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: One of the other key ways that we can start saving money is we have issued every District a Commander, a 1st Vice, a 2nd Vice and an Adjutant's e-mail. So that way we can start e-mailing all of you, versus sending with postage. That way we know you are getting it.

FROM THE FLOOR: They have been issued. Mine don't work. I've never heard of it.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I sent it out and all the Commanders got them, to be able to pass out to the people below them. I will reissue them again and we'll go through it again. But that is something we are wanting to get started. So once we can get it working to the best of its ability, then we will stop using snail mail, for lack of a better term.

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Don Capps, District 8

Commander.
This seems to be missing a little information on the top of this resolution, such as a number.

COMMANDER RUE: What type of number?
8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: A resolution number, like all the others have. COMMANDER RUE: There's two pages in there. One has the actual resolution with the resolution number on it. The other has kind of the generic version of it.

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: Then I missing the resolution.

COMMANDER RUE: And this (indicating) is on the back. The front page looks just like this (indicating). There's no back page to it.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The copy they have does not --

8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: That's my point, we don't have that.

COMMANDER RUE: It's 24-01, is the actual resolution number.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I didn't have the formatted version this morning when I printed it out. 8TH DISTRICT CMDR CAPPS: All right. Thanks. 5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Mason, District 5 1st

Vice Commander.
Maybe I'm out of line here, but I've got to say this.

We are elected by our members in our Districts to represent them, are we not?

COMMANDER RUE: Yes.
5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: I, personally, in our District, since September, I have visited, we have ten counties, 52 Posts in our District, I have been to seven out of our ten county meetings, and talking about membership, and I've been bringing it up about the dues, National raising them, we went through this the last time, Commander, I have not had one person, not one single person, say, "Hey, Bob, great, we do need to raise our dues."

What I'm getting at is what I am getting from them is, "If you raise my dues, I'm going to quit." I'm getting that. We got that at National. We got that before.

On the one hand we're saying we need membership, we need all the membership we can get. On the other hand, we know that if we raise the membership, we're going to lose, like they estimated the last time National raised them, 600,000 members.

Now they're going to smack together somewhere.

We've got to make up our mind. Do we want members or do we want to raise dues?

Now, I know we have to do it. I understand that. I don't feel that now is the time. And I believe that it's not our duty to do what we want, it's our duty to do what our members elected us to do.

COMMANDER RUE: Well you also have to do what's best for the Department of Ohio in --

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: I understand. COMMANDER RUE: No, wait.

You also have to do what's best for the Department of Ohio. Because now you are representing the Department of Ohio on the board. So, therefore, when is the best time to do it, in three years, when we run out of money in the coffers and we don't have investments to go back on? We're operating a zero budget then. It's hard to do.

I mean, eventually, if we can't get some of these programs that help with the money, programs will eventually be cut. And it ain't five years down the road. We're talking two, three years down the road if we don't get a dues increase.

I mean, these are things that we have to look
at, is, you know, all of the Americanism programs we fund. They're not self-sustaining at all. So you're talking about the Department Baseball Tournament, the Oratorical Contest we put on, all that stuff, you know, the Washington trip for the A\&G Test. Those tests don't pay for that trip. The Department pays for that trip. That comes out of our budget.

So those things will have to start getting cut if we don't have the money to come in and help support them. And that's going to happen quicker than you think.

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: I understand that. One of those things you mentioned was baseball. Are we not charging the teams? Didn't I just hear we're going to start charging them $\$ 600$ now?

COMMANDER RUE: That covers the fees.
FROM THE FLOOR: Yeah, that just covers the fees.

5TH DISTRICT 1VC MASON: Right. And I get that.

I'm just saying, you know, I'm hearing this from the membership. I thought I needed to bring it up.

COMMANDER RUE: Do we have any other
discussion?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: At this time, the committee made and seconded the motion, the Finance Committee. So we'll take a vote on accepting the dues increase resolution to go before the body at Department Convention.

All those in favor of the dues increase signify by saying aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: All those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.
COMMANDER RUE: What we're going to do, because that was pretty chose, all those in favor, please stand at this time.

Sergeant-at-Arms, will you please count those standing.

All right, thank you.
All those opposed and voting nay, please stand. SGT-AT-ARMS BOYERS: Fifteen for, 11 against. COMMANDER RUE: The vote passes. It will move to the Department Convention floor.

There's no unfinished business to report at this time.

How about the good of The Legion, do we have
anything for the good of The Legion?
HISTORIAN BEYER: I'm sure you can hear me anyway.

As mentioned earlier today, 22 veterans commit suicide every day, for a number of reasons.

And it was also mentioned how it increased to 6,392 in '21, from 6,278 the previous year.

And that data comes from the Department of Veterans Affairs, released this past November 16th.

This is a topic that hits close for me, you know, and the details of which I won't go into at this time.

But I am glad of how receptive people are to find out what "Be the One" is about, and why I attached a flyer to each of the buttons, which I wish you would all take a bunch of them home with you and pass them out at your Posts or wherever. They're laying back there (indicating) on the back table.

And I just want to say thank you to Jon Vulgamore for putting up with me and printing all these flyers for me as I needed them.

Anyway, in 2021, The American Legion launched its "Be the One" mission to reduce the rate of veteran suicide by creating more awareness,
lessening the stigma of mental health treatment, and encouraging everyone to act when the life of $a$ veteran might be at risk.

I have placed a number of buttons, "Be The One," with the mission statements, on the shelf in the back room there. Please take them back to your District, pass them out within your command, and educate.

I have made it a point to always have some buttons with me when I visit a Post now.

And should you like more of those buttons, give me a call.

Our goal is to de-stigmatize asking for mental health support, provide peer-to-peer support and resources, and educate on how you can "Be The One."

You have no idea what someone is frustrated about. But just by giving him or her an ear, there's a good chance you'd be saving their life.

Keep in contact with other Posts. Because, as we all know, some Posts are more active than others. Find out what is making it happen at their Post. See what they're doing. Perhaps even join them in an event in their community, making all, even civilians, aware.

As we've done in the military, in looking out
for our brothers and sisters, we, as Legionnaires today, are committed to doing the same thing because of one reason: We care. We are our brother's keepers.
"Be the One."
Thank you. That's all I've got, Commander. COMMANDER RUE: Thanks, Al.
(Applause).
Christie is up next.
COORDINATOR WHITE: Hey there, I'm back.
Okay, really quick, Mid-Winter Conference.
Please make your reservations. Your
reservations need to be made by December 22nd.
If anyone has any ideas for vendors that we can potentially have at Mid-Winter, please let us know. We are open to getting new vendors in there. We have a whole lot of space to work with. So please, please, please, please, please, if you have any suggestions, let me know.

The of-the-year awards banquet. Everybody should have the flyer in front of you. The meal choices are on the back. Please, please, please, please, please, fill that out. If possible, turn it in today. If not, get it in the mail, so we can start getting the banquet set up.

We're also having a blood drive. This is new. It was not on the tentative agenda. It is not on the website yet. It was just solidified this past week.

There will be a blood drive on Friday. So please consider giving blood for Mid-Winter Conference.

Sergeant-at-Arms, I'm going to get with you and your assistants on some assistance that will be needed at Mid-Winter.

And thank you, Sergeant-at-Arms and Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, for everything you guys do. You guys saved our butts multiple times at Mid-Winter Convention and here.
(Applause).
Does anyone have any Mid-Winter questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR WHITE: Mid-Winter, Saturday, will be BALC classes. There will be programs that are being taught.

No Mid-Winter questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay, Department Convention, quickly.

It will be in Independence. We've been at that
hotel multiple times.
The deadline for registration is June 10th. So please make sure, if you're making your hotel reservations for Mid-Winter, you might as well get Department Convention out of the way. Doing it earlier is better than somebody calling me the week of and saying, "Oh shoot, I forgot to make reservations. Do you have a room?" No, I don't.

Any convention questions?
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COORDINATOR WHITE: Commander, that's all I've got.

COMMANDER RUE: All right.
JD will do the National Convention.
Thanks, Christie.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander Rue and I went to New Orleans last month. We toured our hotel. We're staying at the Renaissance. It is a very, very nice hotel. It does have a lounge and a restaurant and an art gallery in it.

We are close by several eating establishments, a comedy club, and we even found a nice cafe that has $\$ 1.25$ beers during the day. Just saying.

So, the important part, room rates are 155 a night, with parking $\$ 38$. And it is valet parking.

There is no parking structure nearby. They will valet park for you.

We'll have the form to register at Mid-Winter. Make sure you fill the form out. Even if you don't go, fill the form out. I need to know how many rooms we're going to need. So if we go over our allotment, I can start finding other places for people to stay. Because this could be a very big year for us for a travel destination. So the sooner you let me know, the sooner I can get with the hotel and make sure we have all the reservations we need.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th
District.
Is the $\$ 38$ a night?
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes.
COMMANDER RUE: Yes. And it is a brokered, discount rate from what it normally is too.

3RD DISTRICT CMDR LaVOY: LaVoy, 3rd District.
Is this the French Quarter?
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: The arts district.
COMMANDER RUE: The arts district.
3RD DISTRICT CMDR LaVOY: Thank you.
COMMANDER RUE: You're about a half an hour walk from Bourbon Street and all that.

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We're about ten minutes from the convention center. But it's a nice, easy walk.

COMMANDER RUE: It's level. It's not uphill and downhill like last year.

FROM THE FLOOR: Be careful where you walk.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Actually, the area we were in was quite nice.

FROM THE FLOOR: How close to that cemetery?
COMMANDER RUE: I don't know.
ADJUTANT ROBINSON: There weren't any cemeteries by where we were at.

COMMANDER RUE: All right, moving on.
Did everybody got one of these handouts (indicating), just a little bit ago? They were sent out to all of the Posts this week.

This is the National Commander's Plan of Action. These are things he wants us to engage on this coming year.
"Be the One." No. 1, changing lives, saving lives. That is what "Be the One" is.

Servant leadership.
Competence, character and commitment.
As they talked about earlier, the grassroots
legislation campaign. They get those alerts right
there on the top. Legion.org/action, that puts you on the action alert, which allows you to directly contact your senators and representatives with just the push of a button on a computer.

And you can do that every day. Until they act on that, it will be there for you to keep acting on every day. You can push on that every 24 hours.

That one is also on the website.
His goal is 100\% CPR reports, of course it is.
And let me tell you, there is no reason why, after the first of the year, you can't start doing your CPRs, because it's all based on stuff from this past year. There's no reason we are not 100\% by the time we hit Department Convention, let alone National Convention.

So we need to start getting that out at your District Conferences too, that we need to start getting that stuff done. Because now we're moving into January, when those are going to start happening.

And Jon, do you know when the updated form comes out and when we can have it on the website?

COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: They send to us around mid-March. And I get it out as soon as we get our boxes in so everybody has it.

COMMANDER RUE: By the end of March?
COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: By the end of March. COMMANDER RUE: The National Veterans and Children's Foundation.

And then payments benefiting Department. Basically, we're going to go out and get some people to help support us, which will also help with offsetting costs on everything.

So at this time, with nothing further to come before the meeting, I would ask --

Go ahead, Bill.
9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Dittebrand, 9th District Commander.

It was brought to our attention that the 9th District was not in support of Jose Rivera for 2 nd Vice Commander. That is not true. That is a false statement. Whoever said that, it was the wrong thing to say.

A copy of this resolution was given to the Department Adjutant today, and the Department Commander.

The 9th District does support Jose Rivera, and supported him for running for 2nd Vice Commander. We'll give him the proper endorsement and we will be giving him donations for his campaign next Saturday
at our District Conference.
And the second thing is, it probably should have come under old business, or maybe new business, but there was an appointment made on the Charities, Inc. Okay? Jerry Wilson was reappointed on to Charities, Inc.

And I believe, at the DEC, we asked to get a copy of the constitution and bylaws for the Charities, Inc.

Every member here on the DEC, they are also on the 1099 that is submitted to the Internal Revenue Service every year. We are responsible for that.

And we were told that we were going to get a copy of their constitution and bylaws, but we have not got a copy of that yet.

And why was Jerry Wilson reappointed?
Shouldn't there have been an appointment made to the DEC, or a nomination and appointment made by the DEC?

COMMANDER RUE: Yes, I just found out about that today.

9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Okay.
COMMANDER RUE: We didn't throw it on the agenda last minute.

But yes, the DEC is the one who appoints people
to that body.
PDC JEAN WILSON: No.
COMMANDER RUE: Yes, Jean, it is. The DEC is the one that appoints people to that body. PDC JEAN WILSON: They approve. COMMANDER RUE: What's that? PDC JEAN WILSON: They approve. COMMANDER RUE: Yes. PDC JEAN WILSON: Thank you. COMMANDER RUE: We get nominations that come forth -- actually, we vote for it. The DEC here votes for people to go on that board.

So we will have a special meeting later on, where we will vote for that, and take nominations for that. But it's not going to happen today because, like I said, I just found out about it this morning. It was brought to my attention this morning. I did not know that.

So what I will say is, all those wishing to put nominations forward, get them in to Department. We will push out when we're going to have our meeting for that. Probably in January we will do a virtual meeting for it on Teams.

And when we send out the memos for that, it will also be the last call for all those who want to
put nominations forward for it. And then we will have our vote for it then.

PARLIAMENTARIAN MINADEO: Commander, just to keep it legal, since they are a 501 (c) (3), I would recommend that there be a motion from the floor that Jerry Wilson fill the slot as an interim until the final decision is made at the next DEC meeting to fill that vacancy. That way, they're not in trouble that they went outside of any procedures, which we don't know, and the DEC covered that with an interim appointment.

COMMANDER RUE: Did everybody hear that?
I would, at this time, entertain a motion for Jerry Wilson to hold the position on Charities, Inc., until we have an actual election, a nomination process and election coming up.

4TH DISTRICT CMDR BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District Commander, so moves.

6TH DISTRICT 1VC MILLER: Christopher Miller, 6th District 1st Vice, seconds.

COMMANDER RUE: All right, we have a motion and second for Jerry Wilson to temporarily fill in until we have an election, a nomination and election process to fill that through the DEC.

Is there any discussion?

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).
COMMANDER RUE: Is there any discussion?
Wes.
10TH DISTRICT CMDR CROTHERS: How come we can't do this at the Mid-Winter?

COMMANDER RUE: We don't have a DEC meeting at that.

We're wanting to save costs. We'd have to pay everybody to come in and go home if we're going to do that.

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Commander, Chris Emmons, 3rd District Vice Commander.

COMMANDER RUE: Please stand up, Chris.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Do we have visibility as to who is on that committee and how long their terms are?

COMMANDER RUE: We elect one every year.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: What's that?
COMMANDER RUE: We elect one every year.
Art Lustig resigned off the committee.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: In January, we're going to be voting on a full slate?

COMMANDER RUE: No.
We elect one every year. But now, in January, we'll be electing someone to finish out Art Lustig's
term.
3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: Where's the listing of everybody's names and terms and their years?

ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I e-mail out a list of names. I do not have term limits. I can try to get them from Charities, Inc.

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: So they need to all be revoted on and start their term next year?

COMMANDER RUE: No.
There's four members that were voted in. And they rotate every year as to which one gets voted in. And then you have a fifth member, who this year is Charles, it's the Immediate Past Commander. They have five members on there. Every year, one of the other four come up for reelection.

And they just voted off Jerry and put Roger Friend on.

Art Lustig, I'm not sure if he's the next one up or the one after that. I know he's coming.

But the election in January will be to fulfill the rest of Art Lustig's term.

3RD DISTRICT 1VC EMMONS: I would just request that in January, when we're asked to vote, that we have the names and their years.

COMMANDER RUE: We can put that forward.

Is there any further discussion?
13TH DISTRICT 1VC WRIGHT: Commander, Post 2
has donations to give to the Department.
COMMANDER RUE: We're in the middle of a motion right now.

13TH DISTRICT 1VC WRIGHT: Okay. Sorry.
COMMANDER RUE: Wait till we get done with that.

All right, hearing no further discussion, all those in favor signify by saying aye.

FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.
COMMANDER RUE: Those opposed, nay.
FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.
COMMANDER RUE: Motion carries.
All right.
13TH DISTRICT 1VC WRIGHT: Commander, Cleveland Post 2 has donations to donate to our four pillars in the amount of $\$ 3,000$.

COMMANDER RUE: Awesome.
It's 1,000 for Boys State, 1,000 for VA\&R Gifts for Yanks, 500 for National Security, and \$1,000 for Children and Youth.

Thank you.
(Applause).
All right, at this time we're going to have Jim

Fast, our Assistant Department Chaplain, give the benediction for today.

Please rise.
Uncover.
