1 Saturday, August 7, 2021.

2 . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

3 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll now have an
4 invocation by Al Buxton, Department Chaplain.

5 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Almighty God, creator of
6 all that has been, that is, and still to come, be
7 with us, we pray, as we meet as comrades and
8 friends of The American Legion. Be with us as we
9 meet our commitments as members of this great
10 organization. Guide our hearts and our minds as
11 we work together for You, our God, and our
12 country.

13 Amen.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: 1st Vice Brad, lead us in
16 the Pledge, please.

17 . . . PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

18 Charles Stennis will now, excuse me, 2nd Vice
19 Charles Stennis now will lead us in the preamble.

20 . . . PREAMBLE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

21 Resolution 288, adopted at the 67th National
22 Convention of The American Legion, calls for
23 designating a POW/MIA empty chair at all official
24 meetings of The American Legion as a physical
25 symbol of the thousands of American POWs still

1 unaccounted for from all wars and conflicts
2 involving the United States.

3 This is a symbol for all of us to spare no
4 effort to secure the release of any American
5 prisoners from captivity, the repatriation of the
6 remains of those who died bravely in defense of
7 liberty, and a full accounting for those missing
8 in action.

9 The chair is empty. Those we honor are not
10 here in body, but are here with us in spirit. Let
11 us remember, and never forget, their sacrifice.

12 We'll have roll call by Adjutant Suzette.

13 ADJUTANT HELLER: Good morning.

14 I can hear the rumblings about not saluting
15 the colors. So I didn't have that as first on the
16 agenda. So we will salute the colors at the end.

17 . . . ROLL CALL CONDUCTED . . .

18 Commander, that completes my roll call and we
19 do have a quorum.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Adjutant
21 Suzette.

22 And that's my bad on not saluting the colors.
23 I know better. I just --

24 FROM THE FLOOR: Don't worry.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: My mind wandered there for

1 a minute. But I take full responsibility. It
2 doesn't need to be written down.

3 We'll now have introduction of guests by
4 Sergeant-at-Arms Whitham.

5 SGT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: Commander, we have
6 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Richard Donovan;
7 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Jason Rue; Past
8 National Vice Commander Glenn Hickman; Jack Nix of
9 The American Legion Riders; Jerry Wilson, Past
10 Department Commander; Al Buxton, Chaplain and
11 National Security Chairman; Robert Schmitt, Past
12 Department Commander; Frank Adley, Assistant
13 Sergeant-at-Arms; Marv Shamhart, Baseball
14 Chairman; Chuck Craynon, VA&R; Harold Savage,
15 Finance Committee; Ron Chapman, Past Department
16 Commander, President of Buckeye Boys State; Holly
17 Lewis, MMC Chair; Larry Stottsberry, -- I probably
18 got some of these wrong -- 2nd Vice Commander of
19 the 10th District; Thom Stan, 11th District 2nd
20 Vice; Steve Foster, a Department Assistant
21 Sergeant-at-Arms; and Darell Bishop, Past
22 Department Commander.

23 Did I miss anyone?

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Did we miss anyone?

25 SGT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: Joe Law, I missed Joe,

1 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Thank you,
3 Craig.

4 Well, first of all, I'd like to say good
5 morning to everyone. And I'm happy that you were
6 able to be here at the meeting this morning.

7 We have a lot of business to get done today.
8 So hopefully the meeting runs smoothly and we get
9 a lot accomplished.

10 Some District Commanders were telling me they
11 didn't have speaker request forms. They're over
12 there (indicating). Marie put some out. They're
13 over there on that middle table (indicating),
14 along with expense vouchers, if anybody needs an
15 expense voucher.

16 We would appreciate, if you're going to
17 request a speaker, that you get your year lined up
18 and get the forms in for that so we can come to
19 your District and not have a conflict. It just
20 makes it easier if we have the year organized for
21 all the Department officers, or whomever you want
22 to be one of your speakers. So if you could think
23 about that today and get them in to Marie as soon
24 as possible, that would be great.

25 All right, we're going to move on to reports.

1 And first of all, we're going to have our 1st
2 Vice, Brad.

3 1VC TEIS: Commander.

4 Good morning everyone.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

6 1VC TEIS: All right, here we go.

7 We were just on the phone call a week ago
8 with incoming National Commander Mr. Dillard. Our
9 quota is set at 80,518. And technically, if you
10 look at the numbers, they're almost exactly the
11 same numbers we had last year, except they took
12 the DMS out. So we do not have the DMS in there.

13 They also were talking about National. They
14 had to go to the Finance Committee, to the
15 National, to get awards that are coming out.

16 Any Department that gets 90 percent retention
17 will get a monetary amount. And if the Department
18 goes to 103 percent, which would be 82,934, there
19 will also be a stipend with a monetary amount for
20 that.

21 Two weeks ago, we met on membership. And we
22 sat down, Jean and I and Suzette and Charles, and
23 what we did was, we are combining membership and
24 activities. We're trying to promote the team
25 concept. So the best way to do that is to show

1 the leaders from the front, from out there, up
2 here, what we're doing. So Charles and I are
3 working together with membership, and also with
4 activities. We had the meeting two weeks ago. I
5 put out the team concept.

6 And for those of you that don't know, I'm
7 going to ask every one of you District Commanders
8 right now, after that meeting, how many of your
9 1st Vices came back and called you about the
10 meeting?

11 FROM THE FLOOR: (Indicating). Because I was
12 there.

13 1VC TEIS: You were there.

14 FROM THE FLOOR: And I was there.

15 1VC TEIS: He was there too.

16 That's not good.

17 The reason I say this is, the team concept
18 that we did in the 10th District, passed on to the
19 4th District, which we worked on for three years,
20 is you get every one of your table officers in the
21 District together. Get your Division Commanders,
22 your County Commanders, together. Okay?

23 Don't you take the responsibility of trying
24 to go out and get 72 Posts or 65 Posts or 40 Posts
25 all as one person. It's not going to happen. It

1 can't happen.

2 It's not a one-man army. An army consists of
3 many, many people. But you need to put a team
4 together.

5 And just to let you know, after that meeting,
6 we had no Districts that were cleared. And I gave
7 them two weeks, until today, to get it done.

8 And I want to congratulate the 4th District,
9 the 10th District, the 12th District, and the 13th
10 District, for getting your Districts cleared. So
11 congratulations to you four.

12 (Applause).

13 Now, just as the numbers go, if anybody
14 hasn't seen it, 1st District, you still have nine
15 Posts that aren't cleared.

16 2nd District, you have five.

17 3rd District, you have four.

18 5th District, you have four.

19 6th District, you have two.

20 7th District, you have eight.

21 The 8th District has four.

22 The 11th District has six.

23 14th District has two.

24 Ladies and gentlemen, if they don't have
25 their cards, they can't get their membership.

1 They have to get this done.

2 You know, when you have a car payment and it
3 says it's due on the 15th of the month, that's
4 when it's due. And after that you get penalized.

5 All this stuff should have been turned in by
6 the end of May. Some of it was due back at the
7 end of March.

8 But we can't keep letting this slide. Even
9 though we had the COVID, we still could have sat
10 at home and made sure this was done.

11 It's not hard to do. You should have all the
12 Post phone numbers in your District. Split it up
13 to your team members and please get this done.

14 We have to get them done. Because we know
15 that the memberships went out from National and
16 now the Posts are probably getting checks in that
17 don't have membership cards.

18 And the easiest way to do this is, the 4th
19 District does it, and I know the 10th District, in
20 my Post we started a long time ago, and Post 199,
21 don't wait for National to send out National dues
22 notices. You're just sitting there waiting and
23 waiting. And they were late this year to begin
24 with. Send them out.

25 FROM THE FLOOR: And they were wrong.

1 1VC TEIS: What's that?

2 FROM THE FLOOR: And they were wrong.

3 1VC TEIS: And then the first time they went
4 out, as we know, they were wrong. Some people
5 only had to pay seven bucks. But within a matter
6 of five hours they rescinded that.

7 But please tell your Posts to do a mailing
8 early. Do it before the end of June. If not, do
9 it now. Now it's past June. Get them out now so
10 we can get the stuff and get them done.

11 Don't wait for National to send the dues out.
12 Because they only send them out four times a year.
13 You're just going to sit there and wait and wait
14 and wait. You need to get it done.

15 And also, while you're doing that, go back to
16 our retention. Our retention has to come up. We
17 have to retain the members. We're losing seven to
18 8,000 a year. And that's just, it's uncalled for.
19 We just can't do that. Those are family members
20 that we're losing.

21 On the other side of that, John -- and we've
22 been talking. We apologize. National still does
23 not have a membership report yet. But supposedly
24 next week, we don't know yet, but supposedly we
25 can get it.

1 But you can go on --

2 ADJUTANT HELLER: Maybe.

3 1VC TEIS: Yeah, maybe.

4 But you can go on MyLegion and look your own
5 District up and see where you're at. Mr. Poulton
6 already does it and it's easy to do. And I know
7 Steve does it too. But you can find out where
8 your District is.

9 But please, please, don't -- we know what's
10 wrong with MyLegion. It's all coming to us. It's
11 just a matter of time.

12 Yeah, John will be talking, here in a little
13 while probably, about the membership workshop
14 that's coming up, along with the standing
15 committee meetings.

16 FROM THE FLOOR: Commander Teis.

17 1VC TEIS: Yes.

18 FROM THE FLOOR: If I may, I started doing
19 this the first week of our membership year in
20 July. It takes ten seconds per Post to get the
21 current numbers that's listed in MyLegion. Ten
22 seconds per Post. For me, with 20 Posts, it takes
23 two minutes. Okay?

24 1VC TEIS: Yes.

25 FROM THE FLOOR: It's not tough to do.

1 1VC TEIS: Exactly.

2 14th District, I'm just pulling you out of
3 the hat, you have what, 20 Posts?

4 FROM THE FLOOR: Nineteen.

5 1VC TEIS: Nineteen Posts.

6 If you take the Commander, 1st Vice, 2nd
7 Vice, Adjutant, and County Commanders, you can
8 split that up to three Posts each.

9 And if you do that, that person is in charge
10 of just those three Posts. So they can call there
11 every week to see if they need help, see where
12 they're at in their membership.

13 That's how you're going to get quota. The
14 10th District proved it. The 4th District proved
15 it last year. But that's how it can be done. You
16 can either go on the ride with us or you can sit
17 back and just not be successful.

18 But I think we can all be successful if we
19 just try a little harder than what we have.

20 Other than that, Commander, that is my
21 report. And thank you very much.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Brad.

23 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Brad, do you want
24 membership?

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, we've got membership

1 cards.

2 1VC TEIS: Yes.

3 Oh, John forgot the bucket.

4 PDC WILSON: I know there's a fine for not
5 having the green lantern. What's the fine for not
6 having the bucket?

7 ADJUTANT HELLER: Buying lunch.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Buying lunch.

9 1VC TEIS: Post 243, 36 members; Post 717,
10 24.

11 FROM THE FLOOR: There's the bucket.

12 (Applause).

13 1VC TEIS: And Darell Bishop, 58.

14 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: 118.

15 1VC TEIS: 118, Post 118, 58.

16 Thank you very much.

17 Anybody else?

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thank you, Brad.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll now have a report on
21 membership and Post activities by Charles Stennis.

22 2VC STENNIS: Our lovely folks with Dragon
23 Reporting asked that would everyone, when they're
24 speaking, identify themselves and their Post, so
25 they can make sure that, when the indictments come

1 down, that you're in the record. Okay?

2 ADJUTANT HELLER: We know exactly who you
3 are.

4 2VC STENNIS: I've got some cards, 37
5 Legionnaires and 30 SAL from my Post, that will be
6 going into the bucket.

7 First and foremost, I want to talk about
8 activities first. And then we'll touch a little
9 bit about the membership.

10 First, I want to thank Joe and Betsy Law for
11 doing an outstanding job with the golf tournament.
12 It was a great turnout. I had a -- as a matter of
13 fact, the dinner that night was fantastic. I had
14 to wobble my way back to the hotel. They had
15 outstanding hospitality and it was just a great
16 event.

17 That being said, any Post that would like to
18 host the golf tournament next year, please let us
19 know. It is a time-consuming effort. And if you
20 were to do it, I'd suggest that you go back to
21 your District or Post to prepare themselves,
22 because it is a monumental effort and it does
23 require quite a few folks.

24 But great job, Joe and Betsy.

25 I'd like to give them a round of applause.

1 (Applause).

2 Joe, I appreciate that. You'll be getting
3 the 20 bucks right after the end of the meeting.

4 The next thing is that the trap shoot will be
5 going on September 12th, at the Cardinal Center,
6 right up the road. It's right off of 61 and 71.
7 For registration, their phone number is, and you
8 can jot this down, (419)253-0800. That's
9 (419)253-0800. And that's the number to register
10 for the trap shoot. And that's on September 12th.

11 All the other Post activities, we will be
12 updating you as they come together. And you'll be
13 seeing e-mails and it will be posted on the
14 website. And you'll be getting some, you'll
15 probably be getting some information from me also.

16 1VC TEIS: Bowling will be in Sandusky next
17 year.

18 2VC STENNIS: Bowling will be in Sandusky
19 next year. You'll be getting times and updates as
20 we get closer to putting that together.

21 As we talked about at our commission meeting,
22 Project 1500, this is for every single District in
23 the Department of Ohio, to make sure that they
24 distribute at least 100 thank you cards, or give
25 100 thank yous. So far I've only got two. So,

1 I'm asking you, this is all part of --

2 This is primarily aimed at the 2nd Vices.
3 Because what we're trying to do is develop
4 relationships outside of the four walls of our
5 Posts. And how we're trying to do that is
6 reaching out to other people, seeing what they're
7 doing, and then just really thanking them for it,
8 whether it's either via e-mail or sending a card,
9 anything. That's part of the project.

10 And what I will do is, after convention, I
11 will have a dashboard of who did what and when and
12 where.

13 The goal is not to embarrass a District. The
14 goal is, as a group, as a group, and I like to use
15 the "G" word, "group", is that we do this
16 together, as we enhance our communities by
17 reaching out to other folks who may not even know
18 who we are, and letting them know that we
19 appreciate each and every single thing that they
20 do.

21 Again, I will have a dashboard after
22 convention.

23 The last thing before I get out of here, and
24 I'm tired of hearing the sound of my own voice, is
25 888s.

1 Last year, my Post came up with a standard
2 888 letter because my guys don't like to make
3 phone calls. So what we did is, twice during the
4 year, we sent out 888 letters to the -- our zip
5 code is 44077. I believe we got about ten or 13
6 of those guys to come in to our Post. And that
7 was important for us because we had lost 21
8 members due to COVID. Yeah.

9 So, if anyone, and I like to work smart, not
10 hard, if anyone wants a copy of this letter, I can
11 send it to you. Just let me know and I'll send it
12 to you.

13 FROM THE FLOOR: I haven't gotten it yet.

14 2VC STENNIS: Okay.

15 FROM THE FLOOR: I asked.

16 2VC STENNIS: A 55 cent stamp is cheap.

17 So --

18 ADJUTANT HELLER: Charles, why don't you just
19 e-mail it to everyone?

20 2VC STENNIS: Yeah, I could do that.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Charles is going to e-mail
22 it to the Districts.

23 2VC STENNIS: The only thing you'll have to
24 do is change the name of the person you're sending
25 it to and the Post and the Post address. That's

1 it. That's it.

2 And that is the end of my very terse report.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Well thank you, sir. I
4 appreciate it.

5 (Applause).

6 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

8 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton,
9 Commander of the 12th District. I've got a
10 question for you. Maybe you can help me with it
11 at this point.

12 This stupid mask. I'm quarantining myself in
13 preparation to go to Ontario in 30 days, if the
14 border opens.

15 I got a report this week that one of our
16 Posts, our largest Post, had the incorrect
17 information listed on the renewal letters that
18 came out of National. And they got 80 renewals
19 sent to the wrong person in their Post, which
20 didn't recognize it right away. And they've
21 finally gotten the information to the correct
22 Adjutants. And I just wanted to --

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Unfortunately, National
24 uploaded the wrong file.

25 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: My point is --

1 COMMANDER WILSON: It's been a cluster all
2 year that, first of all, the e-mails they sent out
3 was the wrong amount. Second of all, they
4 uploaded the wrong file. And if you have your
5 cards being sent to someone's house, then it was
6 getting sent to the wrong address.

7 Tom, I'm glad you brought that up. But I was
8 going to talk about that.

9 So you need to talk to your Posts and say,
10 you know, if you're not having it mailed to the
11 Post, if it's going to someone's home address and
12 that's changed, then it may go to the wrong
13 person. Hopefully that person is still alive and
14 they'll take it to the Post.

15 But, you know, I guess when things go wrong
16 they just kind of sometimes snowball and keep
17 going. And this year National has made enough
18 blunders in membership to last a long time. I
19 mean there's no other way to say it.

20 Yes, Darell. Darell Bishop, from the 5th.

21 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: 5th District.

22 118 had that problem. It has been corrected.
23 The second notice has already been sent out,
24 because I received one in the mail. And I'm a
25 PUFL member but I got a dues renewal notice. But

1 the second notices in our District have been sent
2 out.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, I appreciate that
4 information.

5 We'll just have to work through it. Another
6 problem that we didn't create, but we have to work
7 through it. But that's what we do.

8 Yes. Betsy Law.

9 3RD DISTRICT CMDR LAW: Betsy Law, 3rd
10 District.

11 How do we get that corrected? Do we have to
12 call National? Because they're sending --

13 COMMANDER WILSON: J.D.'s got his hand up, so
14 he's going to answer that.

15 COORDINATOR ROBINSON: Every Post that I've
16 checked that has had the wrong address National
17 has already corrected. So I believe they've
18 already went through and corrected all of them. I
19 have not checked all of them out yet, but well
20 over 25 out of the 37 that were messed up.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: If you have a question on
22 a Post, you can check with J.D. and J.D. will make
23 sure that the correct information is in there.

24 Good enough.

25 Thank you, J.D.

1 Thank you, Betsy.

2 All right, as you heard, Robert Wilson isn't
3 here today. He text me last night that, first of
4 all, he's not feeling well. And second of all,
5 Charlotte is not doing well and he can't leave her
6 by herself. And whoever was supposed to come over
7 and sit with her wasn't able to do so at the last
8 minute.

9 So the Chairman of the Finance Committee is
10 going to say just a few words.

11 Harold.

12 CMTE CHRMN SAVAGE: I'm Harold Savage,
13 Chairman of the Finance Committee.

14 The only thing we have going on right at this
15 time is we're waiting for Rea and Associates, our
16 accountants, to get the year ending P&L to us. At
17 that time we can review it and go over it. But at
18 this moment, that's all we have going.

19 That's all I have, Commander.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Harold.

21 And as more information comes available with
22 the Finance Committee we'll be getting it out to
23 all of you.

24 I'm sure most of you realize, but you
25 District Commanders and 1st Vices, we need you to

1 go back there today and, if you've got plaques for
2 your District, we need you to please take them
3 with you. They're all back there (indicating),
4 lined up.

5 All right, we'll now have a report by our
6 Department Chaplain, Al Buxton.

7 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Good morning.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

9 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: We'd like to -- what I'd
10 like to do is send cards out to anyone that's
11 under the weather or you've lost someone in your
12 family.

13 Please let me know. That's the only way I
14 can do it is if you let me know. My e-mail and
15 phone number is in the roster. So if you've got
16 that, please let me know.

17 We do have our Assistant Historian's wife who
18 had hip surgery yesterday. So let's keep her in
19 our thoughts and prayers. And I will get a
20 special card out for her from the Department.

21 That's all.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

23 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: I have a comment on
24 that. Steve Masowick, Alternate NEC.

25 Barb Clausing was admitted to assisted living

1 yesterday. So she probably will not be coming
2 out.

3 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Okay. We'll remember Barb
4 and get a card out.

5 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Send it to Dennis.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, we'll send it to
7 Dennis.

8 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Yeah, Barb doesn't
9 know who Barb is anymore.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Well we'd still like to
11 remember her.

12 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Sure.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: So just short on Al's, if,
14 like he says, if you know someone in your District
15 that needs a card to be sent out for illness or
16 death, please e-mail Al and he'll get it out.
17 We've had some special cards made up. And we just
18 want to keep everybody in our thoughts and
19 prayers.

20 All right, Al Beyer, Department Historian.

21 HISTORIAN BEYER: Good morning, Commander.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Good morning.

23 HISTORIAN BEYER: Ladies and gentlemen, not
24 really much to report here today, other than how
25 Ralph Jackson and myself, along with my better

1 half, of course, -- every time I get reminded
2 about it if I don't mention her, you know -- and
3 we really enjoyed being Historians.

4 And I pray that we can keep up with your
5 expectations here, Commander.

6 But if I may, I'd like to say something else.

7 It's often been said that without their
8 veterans, Americans would be speaking another
9 language. Regardless which view or turn of
10 history you would like to take, we do know that
11 without our veterans, America would not be
12 America.

13 There's a lot of joy that comes from being
14 able to help others keep a record of what's going
15 on within all the ranks of The American Legion.

16 I find that people, returning veterans,
17 really want to help other veterans, but they don't
18 know if they have the skill set for the job
19 position you're trying to push him or her into.

20 And if I may suggest, then it's, therefore,
21 very important for us to impress upon each Post to
22 create and keep a yearly Post history binder so
23 that the newer veterans can see what is going on
24 and they can choose on how they can help.

25 If you're not portraying a past, how do you

1 know how to build a future?

2 And the results are more retention.

3 Thank you, Commander.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Al.

5 All right, now we have a report from our
6 NECman, Bob Klostermeier.

7 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander.

8 I do have a couple things that's come out of
9 National. One of these is pretty important.

10 And it's a phone scam that's going around out
11 there. I'm just going to read this. It's short.

12 We have received a couple of phone calls from
13 members who have been in contact with a gentleman
14 by the name of Billy Newman. This guy is fishing
15 for information and tells them he is a member of
16 The American Legion. Some have talked to him
17 about purchasing a life membership and he's trying
18 to get them to provide their bank information. On
19 one of them, he has a phone number, and the caller
20 ID comes up unavailable. The phone number that
21 was given to me about this is (317)967-6675.

22 And this is coming from Matt Herndon in
23 internal affairs.

24 I called the number and the voice message
25 says he is Billy Newman with The American Legion.

1 And we need to get the word out to the
2 Departments, leadership, everybody, not to take
3 any phone calls from this clown. Because all he's
4 doing is trying to get some money. And there's
5 enough scams going on out there already.

6 One other thing is National Convention. We
7 just got an updated schedule of events.

8 The recommended dress code, and everybody, I
9 think, here is going to like it, unless you're on
10 the stage, the recommended dress code for Phoenix
11 is as follows: Participation on the convention
12 stage will be business dress, that is coat and tie
13 for men and appropriate business dress for women.
14 Participation in convention audience and in
15 commission and committee meetings: Business
16 casual, that is trousers and collared golf shirt,
17 preferably Legion polo, for men, and dress
18 appropriate top, skirt and trousers or capris for
19 women. The American Legion and the Auxiliary
20 Banquets: Business dress, except head table,
21 which is formal.

22 Appropriate footwear for all, no flip-flops.

23 I just wanted to put that information out
24 there. No flip-flops.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: If you are going to wear

1 flip-flops, at least get a pedicure first. Okay?

2 I know the ladies would.

3 Just on that scam thing, somehow, our
4 Commander's e-mail has been compromised over the
5 last couple years. And I know it happened with
6 Roger last year. It's already happened with me.

7 If you get an e-mail from me wanting me to
8 buy you gift cards, send me money, whatever, I
9 would never do that. That's what the first dude
10 is for. He buys me the gift cards.

11 I would never do that. I'm not going to be
12 in jail. I don't need bail money, hopefully. As
13 long as I stay away from Jerry Perry I might be
14 all right.

15 PDC WILSON: Does that mean when you ask me
16 for money anymore I can say no?

17 COMMANDER WILSON: No. Like I said, you're
18 the one I go to.

19 All right, now we'll have a report from our
20 Alternate NEC, Steve Masowick.

21 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: I have no
22 correspondence and no meetings.

23 But a happy belated birthday to our Adjutant.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

25 (Applause).

1 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thank you, Steve.

2 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: You're welcome.

3 FROM THE FLOOR: Thirty what?

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: Five.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll have a report from
6 our Immediate Past Commander, Roger Friend.

7 PDC FRIEND: Commander, can I do it from
8 here?

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Absolutely.

10 PDC FRIEND: First of all, I want to thank
11 all of you that actually spent the last two years
12 with me for sticking it out and doing what needed
13 to be done to make this Department what it is.

14 I also hope to see all of you in Phoenix in
15 the next few weeks.

16 So be safe and let's have some fun. Okay?
17 Commander.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Roger.

19 We'll now have a report by our Judge
20 Advocate, Bob Ray.

21 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you, Commander.

22 If I could do it from here too.

23 Good morning.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

25 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I'd like to commend the

1 staff. They've got the revised constitution and
2 bylaws from July, from just our past Department
3 Convention, out.

4 And now you District Commanders can go to
5 work on revising your constitutions, and then
6 passing the information on down to your Posts and
7 County organizations. They're all going to have
8 to be updated.

9 One of the main concerns, or things you
10 should count on, is the new discipline procedure.
11 There's a very good outline of the procedure that
12 was written by Past Judge Advocate Doug Whitney.
13 It's very good. It's very well explained and it
14 gives you a step-by-step. Everybody should have
15 this either in their constitution, or as an
16 addendum to their constitution if they don't want
17 to put it in their main body. But it should be
18 incorporated by everybody. And it's going to be
19 mandatory that this information be passed along.

20 No. 2, there's a National mandate on
21 insurance. All Post, Counties, Districts,
22 Departments, are going to have to prove that they
23 have liability insurance by sending copies of
24 their insurance policies to Department and to
25 National, or to Department and they will send them

1 through. But to be safe, it would probably be
2 good to send them to both. But this is going to
3 be expected from every Post, County organization,
4 District organization, and the Departments, to, I
5 guess, keep National from having liability for
6 things that might come up.

7 But this is also something I'll be sending
8 out to you here in the near future. But I just
9 wanted to give you a heads-up.

10 And be looking for the new constitution that
11 you can go by.

12 The National Constitution, there were some
13 changes made in '19. And it's available on the
14 website.

15 So anything that you feel like you need --
16 and I'll give you some prompts on what I feel
17 should be in your constitution. That will be
18 forthcoming within the next couple weeks.

19 So, Commander, that's my report.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Robert.

21 Ron Hartman, our Department Parliamentarian,
22 do you have a report, sir?

23 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: A couple things
24 here. Bob stole most of my thunder there.

25 But it's important that you review your

1 constitution and bylaws. You're supposed to do
2 it, actually, every five years. I know our Post
3 has been delinquent on it for a long time, but we
4 got it together now.

5 One of the other things I think everybody saw
6 at the convention in Cleveland, the e-bingo bus
7 that was there. We had it at our Post. They'll
8 come down to your Post with the bingo with that
9 bus. All you've got to do is give them a call.

10 You won't be able to get those machines or
11 anything, if you're interested in them, until
12 probably April. The governor did sign off on
13 them, but they told us last night that the
14 attorney general's office has to make the rules
15 for the bingo.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: That is correct.

17 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: And I understand
18 Glenn Hickman, I was talking with him earlier,
19 he's going to elaborate a little bit on some of
20 the things. So he's firsthand knowledge on that
21 stuff.

22 So if you've got the other machines in there,
23 according to last night, what people were telling
24 us, they're going to be mandated that they have to
25 get them out.

1 But if you need to contact them, my number is
2 in there. I can give you their information up
3 there. They have offices in southern Ohio,
4 northern Ohio. Their office is in Cleveland, the
5 manufacturing business.

6 Do if you've got any questions in reference
7 to that, push them to Glenn. He's knowledgeable
8 about that.

9 Thank you.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Ron.

11 Someone did mention to me, if you'll check
12 your information on the Department roster and if
13 there's any correction that need to be made, if
14 you would let us know before you leave today.
15 Someone told me there was a couple errors on
16 there. So just look it over. If it's not right,
17 if you want us to change something or add
18 something, let us know before you leave today.

19 We will now have a report by our Department
20 Adjutant, Suzette.

21 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thank you, Jean.

22 Good morning.

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

24 ADJUTANT HELLER: It's me again.

25 So, I started to chat with you about the

1 binders in front of you, but I didn't realize that
2 some of you were not hear in the room yet. So
3 just take a look through that information.

4 You have the most recent updated constitution
5 and bylaws from Department and National. You have
6 the updated rules of the DEC that were done in
7 May -- I'm sorry, March, earlier this year.

8 There's all kinds of tidbits of information there
9 that will help you be successful as an executive
10 board member.

11 Another piece is the board of governance. So
12 the attorney general's office offers a webinar for
13 board of governance.

14 So there are 36 members of this board who are
15 voting members. You are held to a legal standard
16 by the state attorney general. So you have a duty
17 of loyalty, duty of care. There's all different
18 duties that you have as a voting member of this
19 board. So it's really important that you are
20 familiar with what they are, and that you abide by
21 them, so as to do yourself, your Post, and the
22 organization, due diligence as a voting member of
23 this board.

24 The webinars are online. They cost you
25 nothing. So there's a plethora of information on

1 the attorney general's website about non-profits,
2 about charities. So I highly encourage you to do
3 that, please. That will just help you be a better
4 informed board member.

5 Post Inspection Reports. We're working on
6 getting those together and updated. I know Jason
7 Rue had went through it like in '17 or '18. And
8 the JA, Doug Whitney, the former JA, had went
9 through it as well. But I would ask that that be
10 reviewed again, that Post Inspection Report.

11 But those things are really critical, and
12 I'll tell you why.

13 We have a spreadsheet here at Department, and
14 it's called "Post Compliance." And so there is a
15 lot of information that we ask for, that you are
16 going to ask for when you go visit that Post.

17 And we need that information. Because our
18 data is only as good as the information that we
19 have. MyLegion is not going to get it for us.
20 Okay?

21 The IT Post Data Forms that are sent from
22 National to the Posts, those aren't going to get
23 it for us either.

24 So we need to know these things. You need to
25 know these things. So that way, when your

1 District Commanders behind you come on board, you
2 know, your District has a good idea of what's
3 going on.

4 And also, the Post has accountability to the
5 District. Right? So they have accountability to
6 their community, to the state, to the Department,
7 to National, to make sure that they are doing
8 everything that they are supposed to be doing, as
9 far as just basic compliancy. And it keeps
10 everybody legal.

11 It doesn't put a burden onto new leadership
12 that comes in that had no idea that they were
13 supposed to do that. Right? So it's really
14 important for that.

15 Post Inspection Reports for 2020-2021, I know
16 it was pandemic time, but we only received 317.
17 And we have 528 Posts. So that means that there
18 are, you know, almost 200 Posts that did not get a
19 visit, that didn't have to show, you know, their
20 legality, or that their records were up to date.

21 So we got nothing from the 7th District, the
22 8th District, the 9th District, or the 11th
23 District. Nothing.

24 We got half from the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 5th.

25 And so the monies that we, the portion of the

1 membership monies that we give out for District
2 activities, District travel, that's supposed to
3 cover, help cover some of those costs. I know
4 it's not a whole lot, because membership, it's
5 based on membership, and that's not nearly what it
6 used to be. So just keep that in mind and start
7 thinking about that.

8 We have Post inspections, the blank forms.
9 They're probably on the website. If not, we'll
10 send you one. It doesn't need to be a perfect
11 copy right now.

12 But if you're going to a Post, just do a Post
13 inspection while you're there.

14 District Constitution and Bylaws, I know Bob
15 had talked about that, but I had Marie go through
16 all the District files that we have at Department
17 and kind of give me a rundown of what's going on
18 with that. And this is the update of record with
19 Department as of February 22nd of 2021.

20 In 2020 and 2021, the District Constitution
21 and Bylaws, and I'm going to pass this information
22 on to Bob as well, we received updates from the 4,
23 7, 13 and 14.

24 Now, the last time the 12th District updated
25 theirs was 2017. I'm not saying that's what

1 actually happened, I'm saying that's what we have
2 on file at Department. So it's critical that we
3 have updated copies of these.

4 '15, 2015, was the last copy we have for the
5 1st. 2010 is the 2nd. 2009 is the 11th District.
6 2005 is the 8th District. 2000 is the 9th
7 District. 1995 is the last copy we have for the
8 5th District. And 1988 is the last copy we have
9 for the 10th District.

10 So if they've been updated since then, that's
11 great. Make sure we get copies, so we make sure
12 we have the most current copy for the District on
13 file. It's really important.

14 If you don't know, we have a whole locked
15 room where we keep all of the District records,
16 all the historical information. We have Post
17 files.

18 I know you've seen the rolling cart in my
19 office. Every time I get a phone call about a
20 Post, we pull the Post file and we put that
21 information out to the officers. And I'm going to
22 tell you, I have close to about a hundred files in
23 my office that have some kind of issue, matter, or
24 something that, you know, that we've all talked
25 about or that information has been sent out.

1 So, that's all I'm going to say about that.
2 Vacancies at Department.

3 I know you all know that I've submitted my
4 resignation. And I want you to know that that was
5 a really tough -- that was a hard decision for me.
6 I've been with The American Legion now for ten
7 years. And that was a difficult decision. The
8 Headquarters is 12 minutes from my home. This is
9 my second home. And we have an amazing staff.

10 But I know you're in good hands.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll get through it.

12 ADJUTANT HELLER: Just give me a moment.

13 FROM THE FLOOR: Sure.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Assembly sings Happy
15 Birthday).

16 (Applause).

17 ADJUTANT HELLER: I made it to 50. So today
18 is the first day of my 52nd year. So, yeah.

19 So anyway, so my position is available. If
20 you know of anybody who would like to do this
21 job -- and I mean that with a sincere heart.

22 I have agreed to consult for the next, you
23 know, however long it takes to get a new Adjutant
24 up and running. I know it takes at least a year
25 to run through the cycle.

1 But there's a lot of things that I do that
2 maybe an incoming Adjutant maybe wouldn't
3 necessarily do, or have to do, or is necessary to
4 do. I know that I go above and beyond. It's just
5 my nature. It's my work ethic.

6 But we have a lot of positions available. So
7 there's mine. There's the executive secretary,
8 because Marie is leaving as well. She's going to
9 go to St. Michael's, which is a Catholic school
10 down in Columbus.

11 We also have a position for VA Voluntary
12 Services, VHA, Gifts for Yanks, and a fundraising
13 coordinator.

14 Elisha, at the front desk, she is National
15 Guard. And so she was activated.

16 She's been activated a couple times. But I
17 think they're really, the National Guard is really
18 looking to find a permanent position for her with
19 the outfit, with the U.S. Army National Guard. So
20 her orders keep getting extended, 30 days, 60
21 days, which is a great career.

22 She's a young gal. She'll be 21 this month.
23 So, I mean, she's just -- this is her life. She
24 moved here from Texas. We took her in. And she's
25 just done a fabulous job with her unit locally.

1 So she is probably not going to come back.

2 So we still, we have a front desk
3 receptionist person.

4 And then the Columbus VA, we have that DSO
5 position that is also still available. So they're
6 just now letting their service officers back in
7 that.

8 So, I've got a lot of work to do between now
9 and the end of September. I will see you at
10 National Convention.

11 And I do want -- I'm going to tell you where
12 I'm going. So I'm going to Arrow International.
13 And I'm sure some of you probably maybe aren't
14 surprised by that and some of you are.

15 But I'm going to Arrow International. They
16 did approach me after Department Convention.

17 And, you know, myself and Glenn and some of
18 our other counterparts with the other VSOs, we've
19 worked on this legislation.

20 I've been here for eight years. I've been
21 with The Legion for ten.

22 But this legislation we've worked on, I know
23 our team, OVFC, we've worked on this for ten
24 years. And this has consumed a large part of my
25 time.

1 And so I like the idea that I get to go back
2 to grassroots and go to the Posts and get engaged.

3 Our biggest concern is we don't want to see
4 this turn into the wild west. So now that the
5 legislation is being passed, there's other
6 companies who are coming in from out of state and,
7 you know, they're trying to -- it's all about
8 money for these companies. So my concern is I
9 don't want the Posts or Legionnaires to be taken
10 advantage of. So I felt it right and appropriate
11 to get out there and help the Posts, the
12 leadership in the Posts, understand exactly what's
13 going on. So I know there are some other folks
14 here who are going to be engaged in that as well.

15 So I will still see you. I'm still going to
16 be involved with the veterans and fraternalists. And
17 so I just want to leave you with that.

18 So my heart is always with the Legionnaire.
19 My heart is always with the Post. And that's
20 where I stand. And I felt like that was the best
21 decision for myself and my family.

22 Lastly is I did receive a couple of notes of
23 correspondence recently.

24 The Humane Society of Delaware County next
25 door, they want to expand. And so they're looking

1 to acquire our property.

2 This is the second offer we've had on that
3 piece of property, that parcel of land right there
4 (indicating), in the last year. The first one was
5 the Delaware Water and Sewer Department.

6 So they're looking to acquire that to expand
7 the humane society.

8 I'm not -- now upon talking to real estate
9 folks and Luther Liggett, you know, the idea was
10 that, well, if you're going to sell it, you might
11 as well just sell it all, because you have less to
12 offer when it comes to the time when you really
13 want to sell the property.

14 So I don't know if we just, what we want to
15 do with this. I would say keep it in mind. I'll
16 send the letter out to everybody and you all can
17 think about it and make a decision at the next
18 DEC. And so there's that.

19 The other one is, I received this from
20 National, Katrina Demerle, from Hamilton, Ohio,
21 she placed second in the 2021 American Legion
22 Junior Shooting Sports.

23 This came from Richard Anderson, from the
24 National Americanism Commission. So I'm sure the
25 Americanism Commission will report on that as

1 well.

2 But this is just correspondence that I've
3 received that I felt you should be aware of.

4 So --

5 COMMANDER WILSON: And she gets a
6 scholarship. I don't know how much she gets, but
7 she gets a scholarship.

8 ADJUTANT HELLER: She gets through 1,000.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: \$1,000?

10 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yes, yeah.

11 Through the generosity of a grant awarded by
12 The American Legion Auxiliary, your accomplishment
13 entitles you to receive a \$1,000 college
14 scholarship in accordance with the regulations set
15 forth by The American Legion.

16 So, yep.

17 Commander, that's all I have.

18 PDC FRIEND: Suzette.

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yes.

20 (Applause).

21 COMMANDER WILSON: It's definitely not how I
22 wanted to begin this year, with that news, but we
23 have to wish Suzette the best. You know, you have
24 to do what you think is best for yourself and your
25 family.

1 But we will find a replacement. And if you
2 know of anyone, or if you would like to apply
3 yourself, please send your resume to myself and we
4 will get it out to the screening committee.

5 Yes.

6 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: I don't know what
7 happened, but --

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Mike Homan.

9 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd
10 District Commander.

11 I don't know what happened, but I sent in all
12 the Post Inspection Forms from the 2nd District
13 except for one Post. So they should have gotten
14 every one from the 2nd District except that one
15 Post.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Well we need
17 to get with Marie and see where we're at.

18 Thank you.

19 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Yeah.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we're going to
21 add a report to the agenda. We're going to hear
22 from Glenn Hickman, the Chairman of Charities.

23 PDC HICKMAN: As you know, I'm trying to be
24 safe.

25 I'd like to call to order the Annual Meeting

1 of the Charities, Inc., at this time.

2 I'd like to give the committee a report about
3 the machines that we have in our Posts there.

4 We've been working on this legislation there
5 for ten years. We finally got close to the home
6 run there. We're on the ground level there.

7 We've got a couple more steps to make.

8 But the attorney general is setting the rules
9 and stuff. But he's talking about making this
10 instant bingo machines, or e-bingo, to be with
11 Charities, or our Posts there, at a level IV,
12 maybe.

13 But we have until December 31st, as of right
14 now, to have our machines out. We can't put them
15 back in until after we apply, the veterans apply
16 for the license on January 1st.

17 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: I didn't catch the
18 dates, Glenn. I'm sorry.

19 PDC HICKMAN: We have to have our machines
20 out by December 31st, maybe sooner there. It
21 depends on the legislation and what's going on
22 right now.

23 We have, from the supreme court, the
24 mediation of the matter.

25 The court refers the case to mediation under

1 CR 19.01, and stays all filing deadlines for this
2 case until further orders of this court. The
3 court will not issue any decision on the merits of
4 the case until mediation has concluded.

5 2019-0016, Ohio Veterans and Fraternal
6 Charitable Coalition versus Yost, Franklin
7 Application 18AP, 2018-4679, on appellants' update
8 to the court and motion to refer the case to
9 mediation, the motion was granted.

10 So right now we're at limbo there, on that
11 motion there. So our TRO that we have with the
12 courts are in effect until they come back with the
13 recommendation.

14 Like I said, we've been working on this for
15 ten years there. And finally there, we're getting
16 to the point there where the e-bingo will be bingo
17 license No. 4, possibly.

18 But they have to go to the attorney general
19 there, who has to issue all the guidelines and
20 what the outside vendors are going to do, how much
21 they're going to charge the outside vendors for
22 the license.

23 And then it comes to the Post there, the
24 individual Post. The Posts will make their own
25 decisions. They could be going with one, two,

1 three, whatever, vendors there.

2 So we will send more information out to the
3 Posts there, once we get the final stuff there
4 from the attorney general's office.

5 The other issue, we have a board member going
6 up for reelection there, Art Lustig.

7 I'll entertain a motion to nominate Art
8 Lustig for another four years there.

9 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 4th
10 District, I nominate Art Lustig for another four
11 years.

12 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 2nd (sic)
13 District -- or 13th District, seconds that motion.

14 PDC HICKMAN: Do we have any other
15 nominations for Art's position?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 PDC HICKMAN: Art's been on the board there
18 since 2003, when we started Charities, Inc. He's
19 been a great help. He's gave us many hours as a
20 volunteer. He represented the Department there,
21 many times there, for lawsuits that we were in.
22 So I think he'd be a good help for Charities.

23 Do we have any other nominations for Art's
24 position?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 PDC HICKMAN: That's the third time. So now
2 I need a motion to close the nominations.

3 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
4 District, motions that we cast one unanimous vote
5 for Art Lustig.

6 PDC HICKMAN: Do I have a second?

7 13TH DISTRICT 1VC LOCKYER: Second.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Who seconded it?

9 13TH DISTRICT 1VC LOCKYER: (Indicating).

10 PDC HICKMAN: All in favor say aye.

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

12 PDC HICKMAN: Opposed, same sign.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14 PDC HICKMAN: Thank you.

15 Commander, that's my report for right now.
16 Thank you.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Glenn.

18 PDC HICKMAN: Oh, one more thing. I do have
19 tickets there for the Clippers' game tonight if
20 anybody wants any. I'll be around for awhile.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, did you hear that?
22 Glenn has tickets to the game tonight for the
23 Clipper's. Anybody who wants them must see Glenn
24 before he leaves.

25 PDC HICKMAN: And Commander, I want to tell

1 them that you're throwing out the first pitch at
2 6:30. So you'll want to come down and watch her
3 throw a strike.

4 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: There you go.

5 FROM THE FLOOR: Don't sit in the first row.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, don't sit in the
7 first row. Be sure you'll be able to duck.

8 Please don't forget, if you're going to make
9 a motion for the record, we need your name and
10 your District for the recorders over here. It
11 just makes it easier.

12 Okay, going right on with the reports, Dick
13 Houp is on vacation. So the Americanism, we're
14 going to have Thom Stan give the Americanism
15 report.

16 CMTE MEMBER STAN: We had our Americanism
17 meeting July 24th. It was called to order at 9:00
18 AM. Chairman Houp opened the meeting of the
19 Department Americanism Committee.

20 Salute to the colors.

21 Invocation by Melissa Fowle, 3rd District
22 Chairwoman, Americanism.

23 We had the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman
24 Houp led those present.

25 Roll Call by Christie White, Americanism and

1 Children and Youth Coordinator.

2 Stan Oren, 1st District, was present; Kent
3 Long, 2nd District, was present; Melissa Fowle,
4 3rd District Chairwoman, was present; Henry
5 Knight, 4th District, present; Cheryl MacDonald,
6 5th District, present; Roy Terry, 6th District,
7 present; Bill Frost, 7th District, not present;
8 Robert Schmoll, 8th District, not present; William
9 Dittebrand, 9th District, present; Richard Houp,
10 10th District present; Thom Stan, 11th District,
11 present.

12 Thomas Rowe, present. I'm not sure what
13 District he's in.

14 FROM THE FLOOR: 12th.

15 CMTE MEMBER STAN: 12th District. I'm sorry.

16 Kevin Conlan, 13th District, not present
17 (sic); John Life, 14th District, present.

18 We had guests, just Christie White.

19 Reading of the Previous Minutes. Ms. Fowle,
20 3rd District Chairwoman, moved, seconded by John
21 Life, 14th District Chairman, to approve the
22 minutes of the last meeting.

23 Stan Oren, 1st District Chairman, moved,
24 seconded by Kent Long, 2nd District Chairman, to
25 approve the committee rules. Motion passed.

1 Testing dates are set for November 1st to the
2 5th, 2021. And November 8th to 12th, 2021, will
3 be the make-up dates. That's the Americanism
4 test.

5 Trip dates are February 28th to March 5. The
6 alternate will be March 7th to 11th. And those
7 kind of center around the buildings and getting in
8 to the Arlington National Cemetery.

9 Tom Rowe, 12th District Chairman, moved,
10 seconded by Melissa Fowle, 3rd District
11 Chairwoman, to approve the testing dates and the
12 trip dates depending on the schedule of the Tomb
13 of the Unknown. That motion passed.

14 Selecting the Essay Question.

15 Melissa Fowle, 3rd District Chairwoman,
16 suggests referring to current events, like the
17 condo collapse, in regard to response teams.

18 Henry Knight, 4th District Chairman,
19 discussed social media and being politically
20 correct, and the backlash of cancel culture.

21 Tom Rowe, 12th District Chairman, suggests to
22 ask: "What are your thoughts on social media and
23 the influence on society?"

24 Melissa Fowle suggests changing "society" to
25 "culture".

1 The committee discussed that culture effects
2 society.

3 John Life, 14th District Chairman, motions
4 that the question will be: "What are your
5 thoughts on social media and the influence on
6 society?" Roy Terry, 6th District Chairman,
7 seconds the motion. The motion passed.

8 Unfinished business.

9 Americanism Pins.

10 The idea behind it is to give a pin to the
11 Scouts or youth that help the different Legion
12 Posts and the community, so that they're rewarded.
13 The committee will send suggestions/quotes to
14 Christie White in the next 30 days. Tom Rowe will
15 contact Rick Isabell, who is a graphics artist, to
16 see if he can create something. Suggestions for
17 the pin will be an outline of the State of Ohio,
18 and with the American Flag in the middle, Legion
19 emblem and Americanism on the bottom of the pin.

20 A resolution to bring back civics in schools.
21 Subcommittee wrote a resolution and it was edited
22 and stalled. The subcommittee will bring it to
23 the fall meeting of the Americanism Committee and
24 give their suggestions, and the chairman can give
25 it to the DEC for review.

1 Convention Judging Committee. The chairman
2 suggests that the National Americanism Awards
3 would be chosen at the District Summer Convention,
4 and that the District Americanism Chair will
5 select a person/Post for the National Awards, and
6 the Americanism Judging Committee at the
7 Convention will select the winner from the 14
8 suggestions.

9 Melissa Fowle, 3rd District Chairwoman,
10 motions to change the way the National Awards,
11 Certificate of Meritorious Service and Certificate
12 of Distinguished Service, and CPR Awards, Mickael
13 Golato, are chosen, by having the District agree
14 on a name at their District Summer Convention and
15 send in the name to Department for each award.
16 The Americanism Judging Committee will be
17 selecting the winner out of the 14 suggestions at
18 Department Convention. Stan Oren, 1st District
19 Chairman, seconds the motion. Motion passed.

20 New business.

21 Online grading. Resolution was rejected on
22 the convention floor. We will contact National to
23 see if there is any state that is still doing the
24 A&G, and if any of them do it online. If there is
25 a state that does it online, we'll see how they do

1 it. The committee thinks that doing it online
2 will make it easier to cheat.

3 Henry Knight, Jr., 4th District Chairman,
4 motions, seconded by Thom Stan, 11th District
5 Chairman, that the Americanism and Government Test
6 not be taken or graded online. That motion
7 passed.

8 Educator of the Year dates. The Educator of
9 the Year will be awarded at the Mid-Winter, so the
10 committee will vote on them at fall meetings. The
11 April 1st deadline should not apply, since the
12 committee is not going to vote on the them until
13 October. And we did move that deadline.

14 Roy Terry, 6th District Chairman, motions
15 that the due date for the Educator of the Year is
16 June 30th. John Life, 14th District, seconds the
17 motion. That motion passed.

18 Good of The American Legion.

19 Chairman Houp asks that a member of the
20 committee give the report to the DEC on the
21 Americanism Committee on August 7th. Thom Stan
22 has agreed to give the Americanism Report.

23 Roster changes, Sheryl MacDonald, and all
24 these different phone numbers here. Everybody
25 present can ask me later if you want them.

1 Henry Knight, Jr., shares that Honor Flight
2 will be giving another trip soon. Age 65 and over
3 are able to attend if anyone is interested.

4 We had a benediction and adjourned at 10:19
5 AM.

6 Any questions?

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

8 CMTE MEMBER STAN: Thank you, Commander.

9 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,
10 Wright, 13th District. I have just a
11 clarification. Was the 13th District, Mr. Conlan,
12 not present? I thought I heard that.

13 CMTE MEMBER STAN: Not present.

14 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: He was here, sir.

15 1VC TEIS: Christie is shaking her head yes.

16 COORDINATOR WHITE: He was present.

17 CMTE MEMBER STAN: Oh, okay. Well, we have,
18 sorry, an error there.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: There's a correction.

20 Joyce.

21 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
22 District, Post 459.

23 When you were reading your report, you kept
24 referring to District conferences, and that's
25 where all the awards would be chosen by the 15

1 (sic) Districts. Did you not mean Department
2 Conferences or Department Conventions? Was it
3 just a misspeak?

4 CMTE MEMBER STAN: I'm not sure, because I
5 was just told to read this.

6 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: All the Districts
7 don't attend a District Conference. They attend
8 Department Conferences.

9 CMTE MEMBER STAN: So it does say "District
10 Conference" here.

11 Christie, is it Department Conference?

12 COORDINATOR WHITE: Correct.

13 So the committee asked that anybody that they
14 nominate be at their summer District Conference.
15 Each District will pick a person to nominate at
16 their District Conference then send it in to
17 Department, and then the convention judging
18 committee will pick out of those 14.

19 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: It sounded like the
20 Districts had a separate District Conference for
21 the awards.

22 COORDINATOR WHITE: The District will choose
23 the --

24 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Right. But since
25 he said "District", I thought he should have said

1 "Department".

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: No, it's District. So
3 that each District --

4 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Never mind. Never
5 mind.

6 CMTE MEMBER STAN: Suzette, that was the
7 first I heard about that. So I have nothing to
8 add on the scholarship.

9 Thank you, Commander.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

11 Yes, Darell.

12 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Commander, do we
13 need a motion to adopt that report?

14 FROM THE FLOOR: Yes.

15 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Okay, I make that
16 motion, Darell Bishop, 5th District.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion by
18 Darell.

19 11TH DISTRICT 1VC WAINWRIGHT: Commander,
20 Wainwright, 11th District 1st Vice, seconds.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion and
22 second to adopt the report.

23 Is there any discussion?

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in

1 favor signify by saying aye.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

6 All right, now we're going to go on to the
7 Baseball report by Marv Shamhart.

8 And all of you have gotten on your desk today
9 this lovely Baseball program (indicating).

10 I just want to congratulate the Department of
11 Ohio staff. They did this here, on our machine.
12 And I think they did a great job. If you look
13 through it, it is all quality. It was very, very
14 nice. It was a lot of work, but they got it done.
15 And I thought it was beautiful. So, thank you.

16 (Applause).

17 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Good morning.

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

19 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Commander Wilson,
20 Department officers, 1st Vice and 2nd Vice, and
21 all the guests.

22 Okay, my year starts after January 1st. Team
23 administrators start registering their teams on
24 the National website.

25 Managers, coaches and any adults who will be

1 in the dugout are required to have a background
2 check and an adult awareness check test.

3 And I also approved 244 background checks and
4 awareness checks. This will continue until the
5 cutoff date, which is set be the National Baseball
6 Committee, which is usually May 15th, but they
7 haven't set it yet.

8 I approved 57 teams, 22 new teams, 37 senior
9 teams.

10 And I asked a committee of commissioners to
11 work on a plan to come up with an Ohio Regional
12 Junior Tournament, those sites, and then send a
13 winner to Lancaster for a state tournament
14 structured after the senior tournament. The
15 junior coaches in the state have been asking for
16 that for a long time. And to be honest with you,
17 I just didn't have the time. And these guys that
18 took it on did a really good job and come up with
19 a great plan, which we instituted this year and it
20 went very well, it was received and the teams
21 enjoyed it. And so we'll probably continue that.

22 I'll ask all of them to give me a rundown of
23 how they put it together, all the ins and outs, so
24 I can give you a better play by play after the
25 October meeting that we have with all the

1 commissioners and the Baseball chairmen.

2 We had a very good senior tournament, good
3 competition, good sportsmanship. Things were
4 moving right along until a little shower turned
5 into a thunderstorm. Those who were there can
6 testify to that. We had completed two innings and
7 the umpire stopped play. That was the last game
8 on Thursday.

9 And I talked to Al Beavers, who oversees this
10 complex, and he was confident. He said, "Give me
11 45 minutes and we'll play."

12 Well, I don't think it was 20 or 30 minutes
13 and it unloaded a gully washer. That was it for
14 Thursday.

15 So we came back about 10:00 o'clock the next
16 morning, on Friday, and finished that game and
17 played the last two games.

18 Harrison Post 199 won. They went on to the
19 regional in Morgantown, West Virginia. And they
20 lost their first game 3 to 2. They won their
21 second game 3 to 2. And then they lost their
22 third game 5 to 1.

23 And I didn't get to go due to some medical
24 issues, but kept up with it on the Internet.

25 And it looked like the pitchers were having

1 their day down there, starting out. If you can
2 get a game 3 to 2, that's a pretty good pitched
3 ballgame. They kept the hitters under control.

4 So, I hope to attend the National meeting,
5 September 24th, 25th, 26th, in Indianapolis, where
6 it's baseball rules, and Boys State. I really
7 don't know what all they do out there, but I know
8 that that's where we vote on rules as Baseball
9 chairmen.

10 And that's my report.

11 Do you have any questions? I'd be glad to
12 entertain them.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Any questions of Marv?

15 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

16 COMMANDER WILSON: I just wanted to say,
17 Marv, that you and all the commissioners that were
18 at the tournament all week, you're so dedicated
19 and you care so much about the young men on that
20 field.

21 And they're there all week, from early
22 morning until the last game is over. And believe
23 you me, I can tell you, it was a hot week.

24 CMTE CHR MN SHAMHART: Yes, it was.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, it was.

1 So, with that being said, Mr. Marv, I'd like
2 to present you with a certificate of appreciation,
3 which every commissioner is getting one mailed to
4 them.

5 This is a certificate of appreciation
6 gratefully presented to Marv Shamhart, in
7 recognition and sincere appreciation of
8 outstanding service and assistance which
9 contributed to the advancement of The American
10 Legion program activities, dedicated to God and
11 country, presented by The American Legion
12 Department of Ohio, the 9th day of August, 2021,
13 Suzette Heller, Adjutant; Jean Wilson, Commander.

14 And it's not enough, but it's a thank you.

15 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Thank you, ma'am.

16 (Applause).

17 Commander.

18 Thank you, everybody. We'll try to do a good
19 job next year.

20 1VC TEIS: Marv.

21 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Yes, sir.

22 1VC TEIS: Just quick.

23 Brad Teis, 1st Vice.

24 If anybody doesn't know, the world series
25 will be the 12th through the 17th. And ESPN2 will

1 be picking it up and it will be aired every day.
2 So please watch it. It's amazing to watch these
3 young gentlemen play ball.

4 Thank you.

5 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: I guess I forgot to
6 mention it.

7 It's in Shelby, North Carolina. It is a
8 great place to watch a ballgame. They really put
9 some time and money in it. And I enjoyed it. I'm
10 going to try to go this year, if health will let.

11 1VC TEIS: I'll be there.

12 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Okay. Thank you, sir.

13 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thank you, Marv.

14 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Yep.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Our Children and Youth
16 Chairman, Andy Atkins, isn't able to be here
17 today, due to at the last minute something came
18 up. So Christie White is going to give the
19 report.

20 I would like to ask, I know myself, being
21 seated out there before, it's kind of easy to want
22 to chitchat with the person next to you. But if I
23 can hear you up here, then you're disturbing
24 someone else. So if you need to chitchat,
25 chitchat real low. Okay?

1 Thank you.

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: Good morning.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

4 COORDINATOR WHITE: The Children and Youth
5 Commission met on Saturday, July 24th, at 11:00
6 o'clock. Eleven out of the 14 members were
7 present.

8 The Children and Youth Commission chose
9 Sojourners Care Network as the organization that
10 they will raise money for for 2021-2022.

11 Sojourners Care Network is a nonprofit youth
12 development organization. They have temporary
13 shelters that serve youth at risk, at risk of or
14 experiencing homelessness. The organization
15 provides a variety of programs, including foster
16 care, runaway and homeless youth services,
17 employment training, diploma and GED support,
18 mentoring, leadership training, and service
19 learning opportunities.

20 So, any of the Children and Youth donations
21 that are, that your Post collects this year, will
22 go towards the Sojourners Care Network.

23 Unfinished Business of the committee. I'm
24 just kind of touching on a few things here.

25 The Commission wanted to produce t-shirts as

1 a way of collecting donations for this year. The
2 commission decided to table that again, until fall
3 meetings. Every commission member is going to go
4 back to their own hometown and get quotes for
5 different shirts.

6 The idea is to have the Legion Family on the
7 pocket, the Children and Youth logo on the back.
8 And of course the shirts are going to be purple,
9 because purple is the color of Children and Youth.

10 Child Welfare Worker of the Year, the dates
11 of the applications have been changed until June
12 30th. That's when they need to be in to
13 Department by. The of-the-year awards will be
14 given at fall meetings. So there's no point to
15 turn in the applications on April 1st if we're not
16 going to give out those awards until October.

17 As you know, Special Olympics became a
18 program of the Children and Youth Commission last
19 year. The committee voted to donate \$25,000 to
20 Special Olympics this year. That will cover a
21 presenting sponsorship for Special Olympics.

22 In a presenting sponsorship, we get on their
23 website. We get our logo on every program that
24 they have. There's a bunch of things that go with
25 it. I will make sure that it gets posted on the

1 website under the Children and Youth tab, if
2 everyone wants to take a look and see what the
3 presenting sponsorship covers.

4 The commission also discussed needing, the
5 need to start focusing on and talking about drug
6 awareness and suicide prevention. With the
7 pandemic and everything else going on, kids are
8 turning to drugs and suicide. The commission is
9 aware of this and needs to start talking to the
10 community about it.

11 The Children and Youth Commission voted on
12 committing to taking drug and suicide awareness
13 very seriously this year, and making it a
14 forefront topic within the committee and each
15 individual District.

16 So if anyone needs more information on
17 Sojourners Care Network, suicide prevention, drug
18 prevention, please reach out to your District
19 Commissioners or myself and we'll be happy to
20 give.

21 Commander, that concludes my Children and
22 Youth report.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

24 And now you're going to give your other
25 report while you're there?

1 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Convention Commission.

3 COORDINATOR WHITE: All right, everyone will
4 want to get out a pen and a piece of paper,
5 because I'm going to give you some dates and some
6 prices for some stuff.

7 Fall meetings this year will be at Cherry
8 Valley Lodge. It's in Newark, 2299 Cherry Valley
9 Road Southeast.

10 ADJUTANT HELLER: I think they got the
11 report.

12 COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay.

13 It will be October 8th through the 10th. The
14 rooms are \$100 per night. The cutoff date for
15 reservations is September 7th. Make sure that you
16 call them and tell them. Make your reservations
17 before September 7th.

18 The purpose of the fall meetings is for
19 standing commission meetings and membership
20 training. We also spoke with Mike and they will
21 be doing some BALC classes as well.

22 There will be a banquet on Saturday night for
23 the of-the-year award winners. We will get that
24 information out to you, of course, as soon as we
25 have it available.

1 Any questions on fall meetings?

2 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

3 COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay, Mid-Winter
4 Conference. It will be at the Crowne Plaza once
5 again. It will be January 21st through 23rd,
6 2022. The rooms are \$103 a night. The cutoff
7 date for reservations for Mid-Winter is January
8 6th.

9 Mid-Winter will consist of committee
10 meetings --

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Christie, do they make
12 their own room reservation?

13 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes.

14 All of these things you make your own room
15 reservations for.

16 Mid-Winter Conference will consist of
17 committee meetings, trainings, and the a
18 Membership Awards Banquet.

19 Any questions on Mid-Winter?

20 Yes, sir.

21 FROM THE FLOOR: How much was the room again?
22 My brain doesn't compute as fast as yours can.
23 Can you go over that, the dates of that conference
24 and the cutoff?

25 COORDINATOR WHITE: So Mid-Winter is

1 January 21st through the 23rd. Room prices are
2 \$103 a night, 1-0-3.

3 Suzette also says all this information is in
4 your binder as well, the documents that were
5 sitting on top.

6 Department Convention will be at Hilton
7 Netherlands, in Cincinnati.

8 FROM THE FLOOR: What was the name of it?

9 COORDINATOR WHITE: Hilton Netherlands.

10 We're moving on up to the Hilton.

11 The dates of the convention will be June 30th
12 through July 3rd, 2022. The rooms are \$135 a
13 night. That was actually the cheapest of all of
14 the bids for 2022.

15 FROM THE FLOOR: How much?

16 COORDINATOR WHITE: 135 a night.

17 The cutoff date for reservations for
18 Department Convention is June 12th, 2022.

19 Any questions on fall meetings, Mid-Winter
20 Conference or Department Convention?

21 FROM THE FLOOR: What was the date again on
22 the fall meeting?

23 COORDINATOR WHITE: October 8th through
24 October 10th, of this year.

25 8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: Bob Schmoll, Post

1 128, in Middleport.

2 This year, on the Mid-Winter Convention,
3 could there be some way that we could find out,
4 before we get up there, about our lunch, or
5 evening meal tickets? Because that, for us, was a
6 big hassle. You pay your money, no, surprise, no
7 tickets.

8 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes. That was also a
9 hassle for us. We covered that in our AAR
10 actually, pretty extensively. So we have a plan,
11 moving forward, on how we're going to handle that.

12 8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: Thank you.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: They didn't like it
14 either. So --

15 FROM THE FLOOR: Is the Auxiliary going to be
16 at the Netherland also?

17 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes, everybody will be at
18 the Hilton Netherland for convention.

19 FROM THE FLOOR: Okay, thank you.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Any other questions of
21 Christie?

22 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

23 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, thank you very
24 much.

25 Ken LaVoy has had hip replacement surgery.

1 So he will not be here today.

2 Al, that's another card we need to get out.

3 But we're going to have Scott come up. He's
4 the Coordinator of Legislation and National
5 Security.

6 If you haven't met Scott before, introduce
7 yourself to him today.

8 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Yeah, I'm the short
9 guy, everybody.

10 My name is Scott. My office is always open.
11 If you need anything, give me a call.

12 But the Legislative Commission met at 9:00
13 AM, on July 24th, in this room.

14 Holly Lewis was actually the chair, as Ken
15 LaVoy wasn't available during the time.

16 Only six of the 14 members were present, so
17 we continued as a discussion, since we did not
18 have a quorum.

19 We did review last year's minutes, just to
20 see what had been accomplished, see what we could
21 do better.

22 There were no District reports or any old
23 business to discuss.

24 Under new business, under the legislative
25 update of all the legislation that happened in

1 Ohio since I came on board, and the impact, we had
2 the Veterans Information Act. That's Senate Bill
3 160. It is currently in the House Veterans
4 Affairs, yeah, House Armed Service and Veterans
5 Affairs Committee right now. It is a bill that
6 looks to Ohio healthcare providers to let veterans
7 know all the benefits they are actually entitled
8 to, so no one misses out on anything they're
9 actually entitled to get compensation for.

10 Then there was Senate Bill 59. It's known as
11 the "War Relic Bill."

12 This bill was previously discussed last year,
13 but it was the House Bill version.

14 The Senate Bill version is the one that's
15 been moving along.

16 This is going to protect war relics in the
17 State of Ohio, and actually make it illegal for
18 private collectors to come in and buy war relics
19 and hide them away from everyone in Ohio, this
20 history.

21 That's currently in the, it's in the House.

22 And then there's House Bill 13 (sic). This
23 is a bit of a contentious one. It is the "Honor
24 and Remember Flag."

25 It has been passed by the House, and it's on

1 to the Senate Veterans Public Safety Committee,
2 Veterans and Public Safety Committee.

3 It's a contentious bill. Since no one has
4 seen the Honor and Remember Flag, it may have some
5 imagery that is a little disappointing to see.
6 It's also a \$400 flag. So --

7 Then the big one that we discussed,
8 Parliamentarian Ron Hartman took my glory away,
9 was the bingo. Yeah, that was a big one, bingo in
10 the fiscal year budget. It's also still in the
11 Senate Bill that is going to be discussed once
12 summer recess is over.

13 And the last piece of new legislation at the
14 state level that we talked about, Governor DeWine,
15 Governor DeWine signed House Bill 244, which is a
16 bill that makes it easier for military children
17 moving in and out of Ohio to virtual learn, to
18 make their transition easier and for their mental
19 health.

20 And then we talked about other legislation.

21 The Honoring Our PACT Act has moved out of
22 the House Committee on Veteran Affairs. And this
23 was a big one for National, since it actually
24 addresses burn pit exposure. I know that was a
25 big thing for National Legislation.

1 Referring to legislation for National, there
2 was also, at the time, Congress was discussing an
3 emergency supplemental for the National Guard, who
4 are financially struggling after the January 6th
5 Capitol insurrection and their orders to sit on
6 the Capitol. They're still working on that plan
7 to give, I believe it's in the range of \$521
8 million, to the National Guard, the State and
9 National Guards that were actually called to the
10 Capitol.

11 And a big one was House Resolution 2441. It
12 was signed by President Biden. And it establishes
13 three new centers of the Rural Access Network for
14 growth enhancement programs. This also gives
15 additional mental health support to rural
16 veterans.

17 My thought on this is maybe Ohio and The
18 American Legion Department of Ohio could receive
19 one of these programs and facilities in southeast
20 Ohio, since I know that is a very rural area that
21 is underserved.

22 And then, moving on from that, I gave an
23 update on some potential new legislation that I'm
24 working on here at Department, just a few things
25 here to help grow veteran populations here in Ohio

1 and attract veterans to work here in Ohio after
2 their service is done.

3 There's the Veterans Workforce Development
4 and Transition Service Act. This is to streamline
5 veterans' transitions into the workforce. It
6 would foster communities' communications with
7 employees seeking employment, and it lets
8 employment education programs for veterans be
9 funded by the state.

10 There's the Veterans Home Grant Program. And
11 this is one that I've actually contacted
12 Representative Casey Weinstein, from the Hudson
13 area, who we talked to a lot after the Post
14 situation there. This would implement a cash down
15 payment assistance grant program.

16 As we know, grants you don't have to pay
17 back. It's not a loan. It's a grant.

18 Then there's the Veterans Data Dashboard.
19 This is to impact public policies and allow
20 policymakers to actually craft impactful
21 legislation here in the State of Ohio, instead of
22 just possible legislation they think is going to
23 do something but actually doesn't.

24 Then there's the Ohio Veterans Act. This is
25 a nationwide marketing engagement campaign that

1 looks to attract and retain veterans' employment
2 here in Ohio.

3 Last was the Veterans Federal Business Tax
4 Credit Act. This looks to give a higher tax
5 credit to employers who employ veterans over just
6 civilian workers. It's to give them a bonus and
7 get more veterans employed, since veterans'
8 employment in Ohio, I believe the current rate, as
9 of July, was close to 4.8 percent. It's under the
10 regular unemployment numbers, but those have risen
11 in recent days as well, I'm sure, about when the
12 COVID variant happened.

13 That is all I discussed that day.

14 Oh, one last piece, we did discuss an
15 American Legion license plate similar to the Sons
16 of The American Legion license plate that was
17 previously done. I am tasked with working on the
18 legislation for that. So I'm actually looking
19 forward to doing that.

20 And then one last thing was we discussed
21 establishing a legislative mobilization database
22 for the State of Ohio. That way, if we need to
23 lobby something, I can contact the District
24 commission members and they can reach out to
25 people, they can reach out to more people. It's

1 like a spider web. We can really get to talk to
2 our representatives and make sure they hear our
3 voice as a veteran service organization.

4 That is all I have.

5 Are there any questions?

6 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

7 COMMANDER WILSON: No questions? Okay.

8 ADJUTANT HELLER: Good job, Scott.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Scott.

10 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Thank you.

11 (Applause).

12 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander, NEC
13 Klostermeier.

14 I'd like to revert back to the Children and
15 Youth Committee. We've got to put a motion on the
16 floor to accept that report. There were motions
17 passed.

18 The Legislative Committee, they were not
19 allowed to do any motions because they were so
20 shorthanded. So all we can do is accept that
21 report as just a written report.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Will you make those
23 motions, please?

24 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: I just did, Commander.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, we need a second.

1 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,
2 Wright, 13th Districts, seconds.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion and a
4 second to accept the reports.

5 Is there any discussion?

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
8 favor signify by saying aye.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 (Motion passed).

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Thanks, Bob. Keep me on
14 my toes. Keep me right.

15 All right, the next report will be by Holly
16 Lewis, Media, Marketing, Communications.

17 CHRWMN LEWIS: They're not flip-flops if they
18 have heels. Just saying. They're called
19 "sandals".

20 So we had our inaugural meeting as a Media,
21 Marketing and Communications Commission on
22 Saturday, July 24th, at 3:00 o'clock, in the
23 library.

24 The one thing -- I won't run through the roll
25 call and all the things, but there are some

1 Districts that do not have an appointment for this
2 commission. And I would ask that you please
3 consider who you're going to put on it. And I
4 would ask that it be someone who actually has some
5 experience in either social media, websites, or
6 marketing, please. And someone who's going to be
7 able to show up to our meetings.

8 All right, we did have a guest present, Dayna
9 Beyer, who is our Social Media and Member
10 Engagement Subcommittee; Al Beyer, the Department
11 Historian; and Jon Vulgamore.

12 We read the previous minutes from our
13 committee meeting and moved and approved those
14 minutes.

15 We didn't have any unfinished business, but
16 we did have some new business. And I want to
17 discuss that with you.

18 So we did a review of the spring edition of
19 the Ohio Legion News. We spent \$29,169.21 on the
20 paper version of Ohio Legion News. We printed
21 81,432 papers, at 35.8 cents per individual paper.

22 We had a lot of discussion around providing
23 those to Veterans Service Officers and, basically,
24 how can we get the costs of this thing down,
25 because postage is just going to keep going up.

1 All right?

2 So that is the second item, which is a review
3 a review of the digital-only campaign.

4 We have been sending out e-mails to all of
5 the e-mails that we have in our Constant Contact
6 database to ask people to register for an
7 online-only version of the OLN, so that we can
8 take them off the list of getting a printed copy
9 so we can get the number down.

10 We are going to do another campaign in
11 September.

12 And Joyce Hannum, from the 9th District, had
13 a really great idea, in that maybe what we'll do
14 is have the stuff that we have to chop out of the
15 printed version in the online version, so that
16 there's an actual win-win for people signing up.
17 You'll actually get more content if you sign up
18 for the digital-only.

19 So we're still working on the details on that
20 with Jon, on how that's all going to work, you
21 know, extra work for him or whatever, or are we
22 just going to have to tack it on to the end of it.
23 So we'll get you guys some updates on that.

24 We also had an update on the OLN ad
25 activities.

1 So I think you guys probably remember, we
2 approved ads for the Ohio Legion News, with a
3 price sheet. If you know anyone who wants to
4 advertise -- we've gotten a couple of companies
5 that have been interested, but they have not
6 proceeded. If you know anyone who wants to reach,
7 you know, 81,000 veterans in the State of Ohio,
8 plus their family members, or any kind of company
9 that has a cross-state reach, please contact Jon
10 Vulgamore.

11 We're also going to put more information
12 about how to put it in, in the OLN, on our
13 Facebook site, and send it out again in the OLN.

14 All right. We also had a website and social
15 media update by Jon Vulgamore.

16 We have some, probably some upcoming website
17 upgrades that are coming up, because some of our
18 plug-ins that we use for WordPress are out of
19 date.

20 And he also reported on the Department
21 Convention livestreaming. That went really well.

22 The one thing that we will do differently
23 next time is we'll actually tell people that we're
24 going to do that. Just saying.

25 So -- but there was actually a couple hundred

1 people on the livestream. So they found it
2 anyway. But we are going to like post a schedule.

3 He also reviewed the social media posting
4 procedure. So if there's anything that you want
5 to be put on the Department Facebook, just get it
6 to Jon. Right?

7 It's helpful if you put all the details in
8 there so he doesn't have to do the research, he
9 just needs to format it. But if you want it on
10 the Department Facebook site, just get it to Jon.

11 We also had discussion for the commission.

12 We want to put together some subcommittees.
13 And we're going to have some subcommittees: One
14 for Ohio Legion News, and how to get the costs
15 down; one for the website; one for social Media;
16 and one for member engagement.

17 Frank Morrow did offer to head up the website
18 subcommittee, and Marty Moore agreed to be on it.

19 Ersel Howe volunteered to be on the
20 membership engagement subcommittee. He didn't
21 want to run it.

22 And Dayna Beyer is going to lead the social
23 media subcommittee, because she's really good at
24 that.

25 So, if you know anyone, they don't have to be

1 on the commission, if you know anyone who would be
2 interested in being on a subcommittee for the
3 website, Ohio Legion News, you know, anybody that
4 has backgrounds in like newspapers or any of that
5 kind of stuff, please get me their name and their
6 contact number so that we can put them on a
7 subcommittee.

8 Because that's how I feel we're going to get
9 work done, is in the smaller subcommittees, rather
10 than the whole commission trying to do everything.

11 We did have a discussion on the topic of some
12 membership engagement type videos. So we want to
13 do an interview of the staff members and get those
14 out onto our Facebook page. So it's like "get to
15 know you."

16 And then the other thing that we'd like to do
17 is, for any members in the State of Ohio who are
18 50, 60-year members, we'd like to do an interview
19 of those members and get that out on our
20 Department Facebook as well, and on our YouTube
21 channel.

22 We closed the meeting at 4:39 PM.

23 And that is my report.

24 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Very good.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: You've heard Holly's

1 report. Do we have a motion to accept her report?

2 13TH DISTRICT 1VC LOCKYER: Lockyer, 13th
3 District, entertains a motion to accept Holly's
4 report.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: And do we have a second?

6 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
7 District, seconds that motion.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

9 We have a motion and a second to accept the
10 Media, Marketing report, the Media, Marketing and
11 Communications report. All those in favor,
12 signify by saying aye.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

15 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

17 Thank you Miss Holly.

18 Up next is Al Buxton, for National Security.

19 CMTE CHRMN BUXTON: Good morning.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

21 CMTE CHRMN BUXTON: The National Security
22 Commission met 24 July, here at Department
23 Headquarters. We started at 1:01 P.M.

24 Opened the meeting, salute the colors, and
25 invocation by was by Tom Leach, from the 11th

1 District. Pledge of Allegiance was said.

2 There was eleven members present, two absent,
3 and one excused because they was in the Post
4 Activities meeting. And Bill Dittebrand was from
5 the 9th District for Jose Rivera.

6 Reading of the previous minutes. Bob Weiler
7 motioned, Bob Weiler from the 3rd District
8 motioned to approve the minutes of the last
9 meeting. Seconded by Richard Wright. Motion
10 carried.

11 Discussions.

12 The chairman's opening remarks discussed the
13 POW/MIA pins, revenue and checks received, and how
14 to fill out the checks. May still have the dog
15 tag pins to sell, as well as the 2011 pins we're
16 going to sell.

17 I mentioned the 2011 pins. It looks like a
18 scroll. We got a bunch of those that Becky gave
19 us. They're going for a dollar apiece. And each
20 District took some of them to sell. Please get
21 the money back in as soon as possible to Becky.
22 We'd appreciate that.

23 We had the Districts report what they was
24 doing in their Districts. I'm not going to go
25 through all of these. They're basically about the

1 same.

2 Old Business.

3 Distributing POW/MIA pins from 2011 to
4 District members to sell for one dollar, since we
5 have been sitting on these for ten years.

6 Discussion on the Department website;
7 February 29th, 2020 meeting; and April 4th, 2020
8 meeting, addressing updating the website and
9 moving the environmental subcommittee into the
10 National Security Committee.

11 Discussion on the environmental subcommittee
12 has been tabled in order to see what Bob Schmitt
13 and the others will do with the environmental
14 subcommittee. Scott to get ahold of Bob Schmitt
15 and find out if there will be a meeting and fill
16 out the rest of the subcommittee District
17 vacancies. It has been discussed with Schmitt on
18 how he wished to revamp the subcommittee,
19 improving participation. Set aside until further
20 information is available by fall meetings.

21 July the 11th, 2020, National Security
22 minutes. Reviewed a motion drafting resolution
23 for National Security Commission to oversee and
24 review claims of Post Legion money stealing and
25 laundering.

1 In discussion on this, policing falls under
2 the Department Task Force.

3 Doug Russell, 10th District, motioned to
4 withdrawal the proposed resolution on the
5 subcommittee with the Department Task Force of the
6 July 11th, 2020 committee meeting's motion to have
7 the National Security Committee handle
8 investigating Post wrongdoing involving money
9 theft. Mike Kennedy, 1st District, seconded. The
10 motion carried.

11 New Business.

12 Program Discussion: We discussed the blood
13 donor program, looking in to see if the Red Cross
14 is charging for blood, which I've heard they have.
15 The commission agrees that this money could be
16 given to our vets.

17 District 4 gets anywhere from 45 to 50
18 people, sometimes 100, for blood donation.
19 Chairman Buxton informed the commission The Legion
20 can get plenty of new members from these blood
21 drives. Information will be sent back to
22 Districts regarding having blood drives for
23 recruitment purposes as well as helping blood
24 donations.

25 Scott will investigate the Armed Forces Blood

1 Bank mobile, that's the WPAFB, if they go anywhere
2 in the state, so The Legion can use this military
3 blood bank.

4 Amateur Radio Club was discussed. Commission
5 members were open to this idea, along with
6 exploring the radio instructors at the Ham Radio
7 Convention in Dayton.

8 Disaster Preparedness: Discussed the ways we
9 can help local communities with disaster and how
10 we must set the example for Ohio. A great way to
11 increase membership and recruitment.

12 The SAM Center of Akron gives out plenty of
13 food for veterans and their families. The Legion
14 could utilize this group to help with community
15 food drives.

16 POW/MIA: Licking County is one of, if not
17 the only, POW-recognized town in Ohio.

18 How does a town or county become a POW/MIA
19 town?

20 The city proclamations and events put on by
21 towns to recognize POW/MIAs. Public projects for
22 communities, like military pavers and walkways.

23 POW/MIA Museum at Jefferson barracks
24 previously helped with the process of becoming a
25 POW/MIA recognized county.

1 This could be beneficial to getting The
2 Legion Posts to have their towns or counties
3 recognized as POW/MIA counties.

4 Beverly mayor proclaimed POW/MIA town
5 recognition.

6 Discussed the recognition day, POW/MIA
7 Recognition Day, and if Districts are doing
8 anything. POW/MIA tables at Posts for meals is
9 the normal recognition process.

10 National Guard: Discussion on Federal
11 Government reimbursing states for Capitol Building
12 security following January 6th. Motion to support
13 the House Bill No. 4498 by Doug Russell from the
14 10th, seconded by Bob Weiler from the 3rd. Motion
15 carried.

16 Immigration: Discussed the Ohio National
17 Guard and State Highway Patrol being sent to
18 Texas' southern border. The discussion shifted
19 back to the funding issues and how much it would
20 cost the Ohio Guard.

21 The commissioners did not like the National
22 Guard being used for public relations by the
23 DeWine administration as the Ohio gubernatorial
24 primaries heat up.

25 There was no resolutions to go over. Nothing

1 for the good of The Legion.

2 The colors were saluted and prayer was given
3 by Tom Leach, 11th District.

4 The meeting was adjourned at 2:25 PM.

5 Respectfully submitted, Al Buxton, National

7 Madam Commander, I make a motion that these
8 be adopted.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion. Do we
10 have a second?

11 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Second.

12 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Homan, 2nd
13 District --

14 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
15 District, seconds.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Looks like I've got lots
17 of seconds.

18 FROM THE FLOOR: I've got a correction.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Wait, wait, wait. We'll
20 talk about that once we get the motion made and
21 seconded. That will be under discussion.

22 So we have a second; correct?

23 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Yes.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Stand up and state your
25 name, please.

1 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Steve Ervin, 4th
2 District.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

4 So we have a motion and a second. Now we
5 have discussion.

6 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
7 District Commander.

8 The SAM Center is on the program discussions,
9 the disaster preparedness. The SAM Center is not
10 located in Akron. It's controlled by the
11 Massillon Post. Okay? 10th District.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: That correction will be
13 duly noted.

14 Anything else?

15 Jerry Wilson.

16 PDC WILSON: Is Al a voting member of the --

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, he is.

18 PDC WILSON: Okay.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Department Chaplain is a
20 voting member.

21 PDC WILSON: We introduced him as a guest.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, I don't know why.
23 But it doesn't matter.

24 1VC TEIS: Yes, it's in Massillon.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

1 Any other discussion or questions, concerns?

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, we will vote.

4 All those in favor signify by saying aye.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

9 We're down to our friend Chuck, Chuck

10 Craynon, Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation.

11 CMTE CHRMN CRAYNON: Everybody keeps saying

12 "Hurry up. It's lunchtime." So --

13 COMMANDER WILSON: You're correct.

14 CMTE CHRMN CRAYNON: Did you save the last

15 for best, or best for last?

16 COMMANDER WILSON: People have been added to

17 the agenda after you, Chuck.

18 CMTE CHRMN CRAYNON: The VA&R commission.

19 Chairman Charles Craynon opened the meeting

20 of the Department VA&R Commission at 11:00 AM,

21 with a salute to the colors and an invocation by

22 Past Department Commander Darell Bishop from the

23 5th District.

24 Roll Call: District 1, present; District 2,

25 present; District 3, present; District 4, absent;

1 District 5, present; District 6, present; District
2 7, absent; District 8, absent; District 9,
3 present; District 10, absent; District 11, vacant;
4 District 12, present; District 13, present;
5 District 14 was present, but he was excused for
6 personal reasons.

7 Guest present: Bill Dittebrand, Commander of
8 the 9th District.

9 Chairman comments: Chairman Craynon reviewed
10 the meeting procedures for the commission members
11 present.

12 Commission members were informed that the
13 minutes would be e-mailed to them unless they
14 preferred another form of delivery.

15 Commission members were informed that if they
16 want a particular item placed on the agenda for
17 future meetings they must contact the chairman by
18 e-mail, text or phone.

19 VA&R Coordinator Scott Palider was asked to
20 correct the commission information on the
21 Department website, as it is currently outdated
22 with wrong information.

23 The meeting minutes from the March 12th, 2021
24 were reviewed.

25 Department Commander Wilson visited with the

1 1st Vice, Brad Teis, and Department Adjutant
2 Suzette Heller.

3 The Commander thanked the present commission
4 members for serving as members of this year's
5 commission. She talked about her Commander
6 program for this year, "Save the Warrior," and
7 what her expectations are for this program.

8 District Reports: District 1, nothing;
9 District 2, nothing; District 3, nothing.

10 District 5: The VA opened a new clinic on
11 the first of the month in Lorain. Volunteer
12 service resumes on September the 1st. A new Gifts
13 for Yanks name is going to be voted on at the fall
14 meeting. There was a discussion on the name
15 change.

16 District 6: Not sure what's happening at the
17 clinic.

18 District 9, nothing.

19 District 12: They don't have a Christmas
20 Gift for Yanks, but they're doing Christmas in
21 July on July 25th. There are COVID protocols in
22 place. Twenty-five volunteers are expected. They
23 must take gifts to lobby and they cannot see the
24 veterans for COVID reasons. Possibly the end of
25 September we'll be able to allow programs. All

1 the veterans will get picnic lunches if they're
2 allowed to visit. They're already looking at next
3 year and planning their programs. They'd like to
4 make it an annual Christmas in July, instead of
5 December, when everyone gives. They're looking
6 forward to opening and having events like
7 pre-Covid. They asked if they need a resolution
8 to change the time of the gifts from December to
9 July for the Gifts for Yanks. Scott Palider will
10 research that.

11 District 13: No volunteer activities yet.
12 Authorized \$5 coupon books for a September 28th
13 program.

14 Under New business:

15 Department Service Office Update was given by
16 Bill Genochio by telephone.

17 Gifts for Yanks update was given by Darell
18 Bishop, 5th District. He discussed the Gifts for
19 Yanks budget and the changes to the budget. The
20 Socks for Sandusky program is no more. This freed
21 up \$2500.

22 The Gifts for Yanks name change was
23 discussed. Leroy Brinkhoff of the 13th made a
24 motion that the VA&R Commission not support the
25 name change, but to support the logo change.

1 Seconded by Dave Cook of the 6th. The motion
2 carried.

3 Department VA&R Coordinator Scott Palider
4 updated the commission on the Commander's VA
5 visits, which will resume in September.

6 Scott updated the commission on the Ohio
7 Veterans Home new superintendent and his goals of
8 controlling COVID and allowing the operations to
9 resume as close to normal as possible.

10 Department VA&R Coordinator Scott also
11 updated the commission on the Ohio unemployment
12 rate and federal updates on the GI Bill.

13 He updated the commission on all legislation
14 happening regarding veterans' affairs and
15 education.

16 Dave Cook from the 6th made a motion to
17 continue the VA&R award program. Darell Bishop
18 from the 5th seconded the motion. The motion
19 carried.

20 The Department Coordinator updated the
21 commission on his hopes to see more recognition
22 from the Districts regarding veteran-owned
23 businesses. He stated that this could lead to
24 more community recognition and increase
25 membership.

1 Commander Wilson spoke on her program,
2 suicide awareness, Save a Warrior, and she asked
3 the commission to truly focus on helping prevent
4 veteran suicide.

5 Scott Palider told the commission he would
6 like to see the Posts and Districts hold suicide
7 prevention workshops, since suicide impacts the
8 community. He presented the idea of having a VA
9 mental health professional come in and give a
10 presentation on how to address the signs of
11 depression and mental health issues. He informed
12 the commission this could help drive community
13 engagement and help membership increase.

14 There being no further business, the meeting
15 was adjourned at 12:13 PM, with a prayer by Past
16 Department Commander Darell Bishop and a salute to
17 the flag.

18 That is my report.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we've heard
20 Chuck's report. Do we have a motion to accept?

21 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 5th
22 District, so moves.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Darell Bishop so moves.
24 Second?

25 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd

1 District, seconds that motion.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Mike Homan from the 2nd
3 District seconds it.

4 Do we have any discussion?

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
7 favor signify by saying aye.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

12 Thank you, Chuck.

13 I wanted to ask if Buckeye Boys State
14 President Ron Chapman has anything he'd like to
15 say here today.

16 BBS PRESIDENT CHAPMAN: There's nothing here
17 today, Commander. We will be having the
18 directors' conference the weekend of
19 September 28th through the 30th.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: I'd just like to
21 congratulate you on your election, sir.

22 BBS PRESIDENT CHAPMAN: Thank you.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: You're welcome.

24 Also, I think we're getting about ready to
25 break for lunch, but we're going to have J.D. give

1 the SAL report.

2 COORDINATOR ROBINSON: Good morning.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

4 COORDINATOR ROBINSON: The Detachment
5 Executive Committee met at Department Headquarters
6 on Saturday, July 17th.

7 The following appointments were made: Brad
8 Swires, District 10, Detachment Assistant
9 Sergeant-at-Arms and Randy Matthews, Detachment
10 Americanism Chairman.

11 Department Liaison J.D. Robinson spoke about
12 the SAL member from Belle Valley Post 641 who was
13 going to Special Olympics as a power lifter. The
14 hat was passed and \$268 was raised to assist him.

15 Delegates and alternates to the National
16 Convention were certified.

17 The 2021-'22 Detachment Budget was approved
18 with the following amendments: National
19 Convention increased to \$20,000 and Washington
20 Conference increased to \$8,000, using unspent
21 funds from last year.

22 A motion was passed to pursue a fundraising
23 opportunity at Ohio State football games.

24 The following were appointed to the National
25 Convention Committees:

1 Americanism is Tim Conway.
2 Constitutional Amendments is Bill Towns.
3 Internal Affairs, Bill Sutterlin
4 Finance, Steve Honigfort
5 VA&R is Gerry Palmer, Sr.
6 Children and Youth is Dennis Albright.
7 Credentials is Scott Thornton.
8 Membership is Jeff Vrabel, Sr.
9 Legislative and Rules is Bernie Kessler.
10 Community Service/History Book is Dave Dilts.
11 The next Detachment Executive Committee
12 meeting will be held at 10:00 AM on Saturday,
13 October 16th, at Department Headquarters.
14 This report was for Skip Craun, Chairman,
15 Department SAL Advisory Committee.
16 Commander, that is the report.
17 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Thank you.
18 Thank you, J.D.
19 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thanks, J.D.
20 COMMANDER WILSON: Before we break for lunch,
21 I have a couple announcements I'd like to make.
22 Any of you who have not had your picture
23 taken by the photographer, like your head shot,
24 please do so when we break for lunch. She's
25 leaving after lunch. So she'll be in the library.

1 Please go see her. We went through a great deal
2 of trouble to get her here today. So let's not --
3 if you haven't had your picture taken, please do
4 so.

5 Also, up here you see the 1st District in
6 their beautiful red shirts. That is the new
7 membership shirt for this year. And if you
8 haven't ordered one, you can order them through
9 Emblem sales. So I think they're a very nice
10 looking shirt.

11 Thank you guys for wearing them.

12 Also, I want to congratulate Kevin Motter.
13 He will be representing us at the National Legion
14 College in November.

15 So thank you, Kevin, for doing that.

16 And also, he's not here today, but I'd like
17 to mention, from the 3rd District, Chris Emmons
18 will be going in December.

19 So they're having two, since they didn't have
20 it last year.

21 So we have good representation that's going
22 to go to the National Legion College and bring
23 back a lot of information for us. And I'm sure
24 they'll be future instructors at the Ohio Legion
25 College.

1 Right Holly?

2 The Buckeye American Legion College.

3 All right, so I think that we've covered
4 everything we need to cover before lunch. So
5 we're going to break.

6 I would like Al -- let's all stand.

7 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Commander, is this
8 going to be a working lunch?

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Let's do a prayer before
10 lunch. And then let's be back here in our seats
11 by 1:00 o'clock, so we can get you guys back on
12 the road, guys and gals.

13 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: We thank Thee, oh Lord, for
14 this food, which reminds us about care, and pray
15 that it will strengthen us for doing Thy good and
16 pleasure, and give us the power to render service
17 to Thee.

18 Amen.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: And we'll be back here at
21 1:00 o'clock.

22 (THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS).

23 COMMANDER WILSON: We're going to start
24 off -- hey, calm down, people. If we're quiet, we
25 can get out of school early.

1 All right, we're going to start off with the
2 next report from Jack Nix, our American Legion
3 Riders Director.

4 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Good afternoon.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.

6 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: I have a ton of stuff here
7 from the meeting that was done when we was here,
8 but you can find that on Facebook, talk to your
9 District liaison, and all kind of places you can
10 find that.

11 And speaking of District Liaison, that's a
12 very important position in your District. Make
13 sure your District has one. That person can
14 relate between you and the Posts out there.

15 And that's something that's one of the things
16 I want to emphasize here. We emphasize it every
17 time we get together with the Riders. And we
18 remind them, you are a Post organization.

19 There's some confusion out there. And we
20 keep educating them and educating them. We are
21 not like the SAL or Auxiliary. They are separate
22 organizations.

23 The Legion Riders, we only exist because The
24 American Legion exists, or SAL or Auxiliary,
25 depending on which one we're members of.

1 Now I'm an American Legion member first. As
2 a matter of fact, I can't even get my Legion Rider
3 card from the Post unless I show them my new
4 membership card for the new year.

5 So please remember that.

6 And tell your Post Commanders to get involved
7 with The American Legion Riders. We encourage The
8 American Legion Riders, you report to that Post
9 Commander, you fall under him.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Or her.

11 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Or her.

12 Thank you, Commander.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Just a point.

14 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: So, you know, point that
15 out and have them get involved with them. Tell
16 them, you know, if they're not riders, that's
17 fine.

18 Matter of fact, the National has, Resolution
19 No. 5 has now made it available, we now have
20 supports. We've never had that before. A person
21 can now be an American Legion Rider supporter.
22 They don't have to own a motorcycle. They don't
23 have to ride. They're just standing up and
24 saying, hey, we support them.

25 There's still questions about a patch, or,

1 you know, what they're going to do to identify
2 that. But we'll work that out, or National will
3 work that out, what they're putting down to us.
4 But now it can be officially designated that they
5 are a supporter of The American Legion Riders.

6 The other thing that the Resolution No. 5 did
7 is open up the membership for The American Legion
8 Riders. You still, No. 1, you have to be an
9 American Legion member, an SAL member, or an
10 Auxiliary member. But the thing that changed is
11 now your significant other, someone you've been in
12 a long-term relationship with, commonwealth (sic)
13 marriage, or whatever the term may be, they can
14 now become a member of The American Legion Riders.
15 Before it had to be a spouse. And that was in the
16 guidelines. So that has opened up.

17 They still also have to be a member of The
18 Legion, the SAL or Auxiliary. So that's still
19 very important.

20 We've had a great year. It's great to
21 hopefully be coming out of this COVID pandemic.
22 And I hope that we're not going back into it.

23 A lot of things are happening. Posts are
24 getting active, raising funds for veterans
25 organizations across the state.

1 We had the Regional ROMP in Vermilion.
2 Raised \$9,000 there. And that's going out to
3 various veteran organizations within The Legion or
4 outside The Legion.

5 And we've set dates for next year and the
6 year after that. We're just believing things are
7 going to turn around and we're all going to be
8 able to ride.

9 But again, I want to come back to where I
10 started and emphasize the importance of Commanders
11 and their Legion Riders staying in constant
12 communication.

13 We tell the Riders when we meet with them in
14 our meetings that you need to report to the
15 Commander. You are your Commander's Legion Riders
16 group. You're not a separate organization. Don't
17 go out and think you can do your own thing. You
18 report to that Commander. Let them know what's
19 going on.

20 And on the flip side of that, we want to
21 encourage Commanders to get involved with The
22 American Legion Riders and see what they're doing.
23 Maybe you don't want to ride.

24 I will tell you this, if you don't own a
25 motorcycle and you would like to ride, there's an

1 awful lot of us, including myself, that, because
2 of age or the body not being what it used to be,
3 we have three wheels. So they don't tip over so
4 easy. And we can ride someone behind us.

5 So if you want to go and support a ride
6 that's going on somewhere, get ahold of somebody
7 and we'll find somebody that's got three wheels
8 and will let you ride along and be part of it.

9 It's a great organization. They've been
10 doing great things.

11 One thing I wrote down, the Legacy Run, it's
12 back on this year. It starts out in Rogers,
13 Arkansas, about five days before the National
14 Convention, and heads toward Phoenix.

15 And I picked up a number where they said
16 since 2004, they've given \$3.6 million to aid 401
17 families of fallen soldiers or disabled soldiers.

18 So it's a great organization doing great
19 things for The American Legion. So support them,
20 because we're here to support you.

21 And thank you.

22 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Sir.

23 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Yes.

24 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton, 12th
25 District Commander.

1 I had an unfortunate circumstance hit me this
2 past week. One of my Post Commanders contacted
3 me. He said "I need some help." He was a Rider,
4 but he didn't know who to call. And I didn't know
5 who to call because I'm not a Rider. I just need
6 to find out more about it, obviously.

7 But he had an escort opportunity for a young
8 soldier out of central Ohio to Dayton this past
9 week. And he wanted to get riders to help escort
10 the young soldier to Dayton.

11 And I never -- I didn't find out whether it
12 happened or not. And I didn't know who to tell
13 him to call.

14 Is there somebody that we can call at
15 Department level, or somebody --

16 I have a Riders organization at Post 239, in
17 my District, but I couldn't get ahold of the Rider
18 representative to help facilitate this.

19 Is there some information out there that I
20 can use to help my Commanders with this task?

21 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Do you have a District
22 Liaison?

23 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Yes, sir.

24 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Did you contact him?

25 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: He was not

1 available. He was out of town.

2 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: He was unavailable?

3 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: He was not
4 available. I couldn't make contact with him.

5 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Then the next thing to do
6 is bump it on up to, you know, I guess that would
7 be Department level.

8 But Mindy Hinkle would do a great job helping
9 out there.

10 The other thing to do, and most people don't
11 realize it, the Patriot Guard, I'm sure you've all
12 heard of the Patriot Guard, they were actually
13 started by The American Legion Riders. And most
14 of them are also American Legion Riders.

15 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Patriot Guard?

16 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Patriot Guard.

17 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Thank you, sir.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Any other questions of
19 Jack?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, Jack, thank you
22 very much.

23 But just for your information, the Sons is
24 not a standalone organization. They're a program
25 of The American Legion. So if The American Legion

1 Post closes, that SAL Charter is gone. Okay?

2 The Auxiliary is different. They're
3 stand-alone. They can stay in existence if The
4 Legion Post goes away, but not the Sons.

5 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Thank you, ma'am. I was
6 misinformed on that.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: You're welcome.

8 Yes, Darell.

9 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 5th
10 District.

11 Were those resolutions turned in to the
12 Executive Committee and approved, the resolutions
13 that they passed?

14 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Resolution No. 5 was
15 approved in May, at the convention.

16 ADJUTANT HELLER: That was a National
17 resolution.

18 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: National.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Not the Department of
20 Ohio.

21 ADJUTANT HELLER: That was passed at the
22 spring NEC.

23 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: We're a Post organization.

24 Now there is a National Advisory Committee
25 for the ALR. And they're the ones who put this

1 together and sent it up to the National Executive
2 Committee to approve that and put it in.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Anything else
4 for anyone?

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

6 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, thank you, Jack.

7 ALR DIRECTOR NIX: Yes, ma'am.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Thanks for being here
9 today. We appreciate it.

10 Just a couple other announcements before we
11 move on to the rest of the agenda.

12 Anyone, any District officer who doesn't have
13 their District cap, you may want to check with
14 Becky and make sure that she has your order.
15 Okay?

16 I just want to make sure that everybody who
17 needs one gets one. So check with Becky.

18 Because some people think that they were
19 ordered and she's telling me they weren't. So
20 send her an e-mail if you don't see her today, and
21 give her your cap size and what District you're
22 from and your position and she'll make sure that
23 it gets ordered.

24 Also, I'd like to say that we've changed the
25 Department Task Force. It's no longer north and

1 south. I thought that was too much territory for
2 two people to try to control, with all the issues
3 that seem to come through to Department. So we
4 have a northwest. We've got a northeast.

5 Now the northwest is Districts, 1, 2, 5 and
6 6, and Dick Zulch is the chairman, along with
7 Roger Friend and Ken Estep.

8 The northeast is the 9th, 10th, 13th and
9 14th. And that will be led by Brad and Charles.

10 The southeast will be 3, District 3, 4 and 7.
11 And that will be led by Jerry Wilson, Mike
12 Blackwell and Rick LaValley.

13 The southwest, the 8th, 9th and 12th, will be
14 led by Jerry White, Tom Rowe and Rick Donovan.

15 So we're developing a form that's going to --
16 that they're going to have to report back on about
17 the problem, to see what the problem was, if it
18 was able to be resolved or not, and what follow-up
19 we may need with that Post.

20 There's a lot of serious things going around
21 in the Department. And we need to make sure that
22 we keep those intact.

23 Also, we have developed our Internal Affairs
24 Commission. And it's going to be: District 1,
25 Jason Rue; District 2, Kent Long; District 3, A.J.

1 Whatley; District 4, Jerry Perry; District 5,
2 Charles, "Special K" -- I can never say his last
3 name.

4 FROM THE FLOOR: Kvochick.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: There you go.

6 I call him "Special K" at Boys State. So he
7 knows it.

8 -- District 6 is Bart Arndt; District 7 is
9 Roger Ward; District 8 is Fred James; District 9,
10 our chairman is Charles Stennis; District 10, Doug
11 Russell; District 11, Andy Metheny; District 12,
12 George Mussi; District 13, Mel Baher; and District
13 14, Steve Masowick.

14 All those names are listed on page 18 of your
15 Department officers book. So if you have a
16 problem, you're going to want to contact the
17 chairman of that committee and let him or her know
18 what the issue is. They'll set up, through you,
19 when to come visit the Post and try to get the
20 issue resolved.

21 Yes, Joyce.

22 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
23 District.

24 Should most of these issues not go through
25 the District first, and then be elevated to the

1 task force, depending on what happens?

2 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm saying if you need
3 that task force. It should come to you first.

4 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: We got a visit from
5 your task force. We weren't invited. We didn't
6 even know about it. We found out about it by
7 accident. That's really insulting to a District
8 Commander.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: I do apologize for that.
10 You should have been included on that first. It
11 was a problem that we did not actually, Charles
12 knows --

13 2VC STENNIS: Yeah.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: The letter that we got was
15 sent to Department. And really, Joyce, I
16 apologize. We should have contacted the Commander
17 or you and go over it first.

18 Which, if it comes through Department again,
19 that's what will happen. You will be notified.

20 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Because, you know,
21 there was nothing wrong with the task force member
22 there or anything that they said. It could have
23 been handled strictly at a District level. So it
24 was kind of a waste of time for somebody to drive
25 all that way when it could have been handled by a

1 District.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Uh-huh, yeah.

3 It was actually started the year before this
4 was all set up.

5 But that will be the practice that we follow
6 in the future, going on.

7 Thank you. Thank you for pointing that out.

8 But no, we've already talked about that,
9 actually.

10 So, at any rate, if the task force has to
11 come in, that's how it will be.

12 All right. So now we're going to go on to
13 Post Charters, cancellations, revocations,
14 suspensions, consolidations and applications.

15 Adjutant Heller.

16 ADJUTANT HELLER: Thank you, ma'am.

17 Good afternoon.

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: Everybody's got a full
20 belly and it's warm in here.

21 Okay, what's on the agenda is one, two,
22 three, four, five Post concerns.

23 And I want to clarify that the Post closures
24 that we voted on, both in December and, I think,
25 in March, that were sent to the NEC for the spring

1 meeting, which is Post 133, Stover-Harrod and
2 Cairo, I think that's in the 1st District; 197,
3 South Amherst; and Post 808, at the University of
4 Akron. Those did go to the May NEC meeting and
5 they were approved.

6 However, if they're still on the roster,
7 they're still in MyLegion. Because, for whatever
8 reason, National has yet to figure out how to add
9 a Post and remove a Post in that process, as you
10 are clearly aware of.

11 So, I normally get a formal letter from
12 National, signed by the National Adjutant, that
13 says that these Posts have been formally closed.
14 But the only thing I got was an e-mail after I
15 inquired, about four months later.

16 So, Squadron 46 was also one of the
17 approvals, at the Bellevue Post. That Squadron is
18 also canceled.

19 So just know that those are done. If you
20 still see them on your roster, it may affect your
21 membership for this year. I have no answer for
22 that, and National doesn't either. So, at least
23 there's consistency.

24 The next issue -- so those were done.

25 So I have, we have to talk about three

1 potential charter cancellations, a temporary
2 suspension, and then the Bedford Post.

3 And I'll address the Bedford Post.

4 Now, Post 350, so if you were at the DEC
5 meeting on Thursday at convention, Past District
6 Commander Joe Ruland mentioned that Bedford Post
7 350. We did send that to National. It was in
8 March, right before they changed MyLegion. So
9 Personify kicked in 1 April. And so that charter
10 has been sitting there because they could not add
11 that Post.

12 It was added last week. And they're in the
13 process of creating a temporary charter.

14 So Post 350, in Bedford, 13th District, we're
15 just waiting for the temporary charter. So they
16 were finally able to get it in. They should be
17 able to start processing membership.

18 So please reach out to the leadership,
19 Richard, if you could help, and Jim, if you could
20 help facilitate that with John Robinson and the
21 Post leadership, to get with John and have them
22 get logged in, they can start adding future
23 members to that Post.

24 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: What's the address
25 on that Post?

1 ADJUTANT HELLER: 350? It's Bedford. It's
2 13th District.

3 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Yeah, but --

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: I don't know the physical
5 address of that Post.

6 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay.

7 ADJUTANT HELLER: I don't have that with me
8 right now, but I can find out for you. Okay?

9 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Yeah. It's close to
10 my house.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, gotcha. I'll make
12 sure I get that for you.

13 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: They don't have a
14 Post home. They're meeting at the community
15 center.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. So they don't have
17 a brick and mortar?

18 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Through the Chair,
19 when they have their meeting, I'd like to be at
20 it. I'd like to see it.

21 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Right.

22 ADJUTANT HELLER: Steve, we'll get you
23 connected with the Post leadership there too.

24 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Thank you.

25 ADJUTANT HELLER: You're welcome.

1 Okay, the next matter is Post 464, in Hudson.
2 And that is to lift the temporary suspension of
3 that.

4 And since I know Jean has been involved in
5 this, Commander Jean, and also Brad Teis, and
6 Alternate NECman Steve Masowick, also NECman Bob
7 Klostermeier, so I'll turn --

8 COMMANDER WILSON: And PDC Schmitt.

9 ADJUTANT HELLER: And PDC Schmitt.

10 So I'll turn that over for discussion.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: I'll entertain a motion to
12 reinstate their charter.

13 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick,
14 Alternate NEC, makes that motion.

15 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton, 12th
16 District Commander, seconds.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: And I forgot, we also had
18 14th District Commander Bob Carson with us at
19 those meetings.

20 Okay, so, all right, so we're going to -- we
21 have a motion and it's been seconded to lift the
22 charter of Post 464, Hudson.

23 Okay, now, do we have any discussion? Does
24 anybody want to know anything about it?

25 We've had several meetings with them. They

1 elected new officers. They are, I believe they're
2 on the right path of correcting things. They're
3 very well respected in their community. The mayor
4 on down, you know, wants to see the Post stay and
5 all that.

6 So if anybody has anything they'd like to
7 add --

8 Do you have anything you'd like to add, Brad?

9 1VC TEIS: The first -- the next to last
10 meeting we had, the Commander stayed in place
11 because we didn't feel it was proper for him to be
12 thrown under the bus. Because, prior to this
13 event, he was just elected Commander. He had only
14 been in there two months. He got elected in and
15 then he went to Florida for two months. Because
16 he wasn't even -- he didn't know anything about
17 this.

18 But, so we have a new Adjutant, a new Finance
19 Officer, a new 1st Vice and 2nd Vice, that have
20 all stepped up. At the last meeting we got them
21 all sworn in. And they're meeting at one of the
22 city hall buildings, or in the city hall. So
23 their first meeting will be coming up next month.

24 And they're starting on the right track. And
25 they're trying to get in contact with the mayor to

1 see if there's anything that they can do. They
2 don't do a lot of functions. But like with
3 Veterans Day coming up, maybe there's something
4 they can do in the community to show that the
5 Hudson Post is not a bad Post, but to show them a
6 positive move and that they are going on in the
7 right direction.

8 But they've got the new leadership in.

9 The gentleman that resigned, we cannot kick
10 him out of the Post. You guys all know that, and
11 ladies. If the Post wants to kick him out, that's
12 up to them. They control their own membership.

13 But he has stepped back. But if anybody
14 needs his help in something, because he did a lot
15 of stuff, we have no problem with helping him.
16 But we have told him he's not allowed to hold an
17 officer's position.

18 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Brad, they meet at
19 the Barlow Center.

20 1VC TEIS: Yeah, Barlow. Okay, that's where
21 it's at.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Joyce.

23 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
24 District.

25 I read or seen some person on the news speak

1 about a revitalization of the Post. Has that been
2 scheduled? Has it been done? What's the status
3 on that?

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: Well, right now they have a
5 temporary suspension. So there really isn't much
6 we can do for them until they get their officers
7 in place.

8 1VC TEIS: What happened was is that word,
9 "revitalization", was put in there. That word
10 shouldn't even have been put in there. It was
11 just to get them back up with new officers.
12 Because they didn't even have a full consignment
13 of offers.

14 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: So it doesn't
15 exist? There will not be one, as far as you know?

16 ADJUTANT HELLER: I think the revitalization
17 was referring to the revitalization of the Post
18 officers, --

19 1VC TEIS: Correct.

20 ADJUTANT HELLER: -- getting new leadership
21 in place, not a membership revitalization that
22 you're accustomed to hearing.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Bob Carson.

24 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
25 District Commander.

1 The Post is meeting, or they're scheduled to
2 meet, by their current constitution and bylaws,
3 the second Wednesday of September at City Hall in
4 Hudson.

5 If we vote today to lift the temporary
6 suspension, I can give them their cards and we can
7 get these people started back on the right foot.
8 Okay?

9 I haven't been able to give them their cards
10 because we haven't voted. Okay?

11 That's how we can start our revitalization
12 for that Post.

13 We do have officers. We do have a Post.
14 Everything is working there. All we need is a
15 vote.

16 Thank you.

17 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Commander, to add to
18 the District Commander, they're not broke. They
19 have plenty of money to operate on. But we're
20 holding their checkbook. So they can have their
21 money back as soon as we allow them to be an
22 American Legion Post again.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Does anybody else
24 have any questions or concerns?

25 MR. WOLFF: Commander, if I may make a

1 statement.

2 Bob Klostermeier, NEC.

3 Maybe what Joyce doesn't understand or
4 doesn't know is last year that Post was sitting at
5 105% of membership, even with the problems they
6 were having. They weren't having a problem
7 getting members. They'll probably be up over and
8 above quota again, I'm sure.

9 That was something, too, that we took into
10 consideration as we looked at this Post. And we
11 got new members to take over as the officers. I
12 think it's a good idea to get them back in
13 business.

14 Thank you.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Any other
16 discussion?

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
19 favor signify by saying aye.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

24 All right, now we're going on.

25 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay, good. I can report

1 that to the Akron Beacon Journal, who calls me
2 weekly to find out what's going on with this Post.
3 So Karen.

4 So please keep in mind that this news story
5 broke international news. So there are
6 journalists and reporters out there looking at The
7 American Legion, and probably looking at all the
8 VSOs.

9 So if you look at the current climate in
10 today's time regarding everything, you know, there
11 are eyes out there watching what we do as
12 Legionnaires, and who we are and the culture of
13 our organization. So please keep that in mind and
14 think about how, you know, you go back to your
15 Posts and Districts and think about how you can
16 contribute to, you know, continuing for us to be
17 viewed in a positive light.

18 So, okay, Post 590, Ironton. I received from
19 Paul Sands, last DEC, the charter cancellation on
20 that. And I didn't bring that to the DEC because
21 there's still an issue of property involved with
22 that Post 590.

23 So we do have, I have a Post inspection on
24 that. I have a -- what happened was, they just
25 abandoned the Post. And then those members went

1 mostly to Post 433, which is downtown Ironton, on
2 the river.

3 So Post 590 was just left there. They just
4 turned the lights out and left.

5 So there's over \$6,000 in back property taxes
6 on that Post that the county is not willing to
7 waive just because the Post did not complete their
8 property tax exception paperwork. So they're not
9 willing to waive that.

10 And so there is somebody in the community who
11 considered acquiring the property to turn it into
12 a market for the community. But, right now, that
13 Post still belongs in the property of Post 590.
14 So that poses an issue.

15 So if this body votes to remove, to cancel
16 the Charter of Post 590, now we too then have just
17 abandoned that building and that property that's
18 sitting there.

19 So I don't really know what the right thing
20 to do here is.

21 I mean there's a couple different scenarios
22 of how we can go about this. I think by canceling
23 the charter, I think -- I don't know. Either way,
24 the Department doesn't hold a liability on that
25 Post. We are only responsible for the assets.

1 Imagine that.

2 So any liabilities that that Post has does
3 not become the liability of the Department. But
4 if the Post had assets, that would then become the
5 property of Department.

6 So like we did in the Post before, we have
7 sold the Post. We sold the property and then, you
8 know, canceled the charter of that Post. I think
9 it was Washington Court House Post.

10 So, the taxes are about \$6500. So, I think
11 we need more guidance on this, from the attorney
12 maybe, from Luther.

13 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Paul Sands, 7th
14 District.

15 I had talked to Post 433. They're still
16 interested in acquiring that place.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: But they're not interested
18 in paying the bill.

19 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Yeah.

20 I talked to him, to Ray Murphy, the
21 Commander. They're supposed to go down, I told
22 him to go down and talk to them about it. Because
23 they want to just pay all the back taxes for the
24 place. I haven't heard from him. I'm going to
25 call him tomorrow and see what I can find out,

1 what he has done, and I'll let you know.

2 ADJUTANT HELLER: Do you know --

3 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: But they want, 433
4 wants the Post, because they want to revitalize it
5 into a community center for underprivileged kids
6 in that area.

7 But that's the only thing I've done so far,
8 is telling them if you guys want it you got to pay
9 the taxes so we can get this thing cleared to give
10 them a heads-up on buying the place.

11 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yeah.

12 And they actually have to buy it. Because
13 right now it's titled to Post 590, Ironton Post
14 590.

15 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Yeah.

16 ADJUTANT HELLER: So that means that --

17 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: That's more of a
18 hassle.

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yes, yeah.

20 So they would actually have to change the
21 deed, all that, yeah.

22 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: I'll talk to him
23 tomorrow. And then what I find out from him, I'll
24 let you know.

25 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay. Sounds good.

1 So we'll table that?

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Joyce.

3 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
4 District.

5 Tabling is good but they have to pay taxes
6 fairly soon. Because once it goes up to sheriff
7 sale for them to not pay taxes, we lose it. It's
8 completely gone to whoever the highest bidder is
9 that buys it. So we need to get them moving on
10 that quick so we don't lose it.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Can you find out exactly
12 if that's what they're going to do and report back
13 to us as soon as possible?

14 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Yes. I will call
15 him tomorrow.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Because time is of the
17 essence.

18 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Yeah. I'll try him
19 today but I won't count on it. But tomorrow I'll
20 do it.

21 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay, moving on, the next
22 issue is Post 676, which I received a task force
23 report in June, from PDC Bob Schmitt, regarding
24 this Post.

25 And there has been further things that have

1 occurred at Post 676.

2 We have temporarily suspended their charter
3 before. But it is being recommended that we
4 cancel their charter all together, due to the
5 negligence that's occurring at this Post that's
6 harming people in the community.

7 So I don't know if, through the Commander, if
8 Bob wanted to comment on what's happening with
9 that Post right now, currently, 676.

10 PDC SCHMITT: Well, Commander, based on what
11 had transpired at the last incidence of a shooting
12 there, we discovered that the property -- it's not
13 a Post issue. The property is the issue.

14 And these people show up at the property and
15 have a party in the parking lot. The last one
16 ended up in a lot of shots being fired.

17 And the Post didn't even know what was going
18 on on the outside. A couple shots did get fired
19 on the inside.

20 I ordered the Commander to close the Post,
21 lock the door. There's only two keys. He's got a
22 key and I've got a key. Nobody else can get in to
23 that Post.

24 He was told, Bob Klostermeier and I went
25 there, and we told him that he needed to get all

1 of the equipment out. That has been done. He's
2 trying to get the lottery machine and the ATM
3 machine out, and the jukebox. And that's all
4 based on somebody being able to be there at the
5 right time. Other than that, the Post has not
6 been used.

7 He is also supposed to take the Post meetings
8 and go meet someplace else, which the talk was
9 they were going to go to the DAV building there
10 and have their meetings there. I guess several
11 organizations meet there. But they haven't had a
12 meeting of that Post since.

13 As far as, you know, we can suspend the Post,
14 but they have eight parcels of property that need
15 to be sold.

16 And I've got a meeting set up with -- now I
17 just found out that I'm not the chairman of that
18 task force anymore, so I can cancel that meeting
19 or whatever -- but I was supposed to meet with the
20 Commander this week. And I was going to tell him
21 that he needs to get the real estate people to get
22 that property up for sale, so that that can be
23 liquidated, because it's not ever going to be used
24 by The American Legion. And I'm sure you're all
25 in agreement with that.

1 But whether we keep the Post or not, that's a
2 whole other ballgame.

3 But the Post has not been totally responsible
4 for what's transpired in the past. Yes, they have
5 a history that goes way back, a lot of years.

6 The lieutenant told me that he walked into
7 the Post one day and somebody had been shot. And
8 the guy who shot him was sitting in a chair, "Yep,
9 I shot him."

10 And, you know, that's the kind of stuff that
11 goes on. But, you know, that was a whole lot of
12 years ago.

13 But anyways, you know, we can suspend it.

14 What do we do with the members? I guess they
15 have to go to Post 888. Most of them, I'm sure,
16 Post 16, on the south end of town, is where they'd
17 go.

18 So it's a matter of what to do with it. But
19 that's --

20 So I'm giving it up. The Commander, she's
21 got someone else now in charge of that area. It's
22 District 5. And it's -- who is it that's got that
23 area?

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Ken Estep.

25 PDC SCHMITT: Ken Estep and Dick Zulch?

1 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah.

2 But if you would like to continue on and
3 finish that, that would be great.

4 PDC SCHMITT: Yeah, I can do that.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: I'd appreciate it.
6 Tom Poulton.

7 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton,
8 District 12 Commander.

9 Based on what we talked about before and
10 heard again today, I'm questioning whether or not
11 cancellation of the charter is the appropriate
12 action, versus a continued temporary suspension of
13 it, until the Post decides whether they're going
14 to relocate someplace else and keep the Post
15 going. I hate to see us cancel Posts, just to
16 cancel them.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Well we don't want to
18 either.

19 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: I understand
20 that.

21 But on this docket here, on this agenda, it's
22 a charter cancellation we're talking about. And I
23 want to make sure that we're going to do the right
24 thing today.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, then so move. You

1 can make a motion to do whatever.

2 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: What's the
3 status of the current charter?

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: Their charter is intact.
5 It was suspended and then you all lifted the
6 temporary suspension. But they're still having
7 the same problems that they had before. So --

8 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Well then I
9 would make a motion that we continue the -- or
10 reinstate the temporary suspension.

11 ADJUTANT HELLER: There is no temporary
12 suspension. You already reinstated that like six
13 or eight months ago.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: You would have to put a
15 new temporary suspension in.

16 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Well then to
17 start, we have to have a temporary suspension,
18 with the caveat that this Post show due course and
19 initiative of what they're going to do to relocate
20 or keep the Post, or what will make us take the
21 position to cancel the charter.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we have a
23 motion.

24 Do we have a second?

25 1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Kevin Motter, 1st

1 District 1st Vice, seconds.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Kevin Motter, from
3 District 1, seconds it.

4 Any discussion?

5 Darell Bishop.

6 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Yes.

7 Commander, this Post is trying. They did
8 certify. They do have their cards. So, you know,
9 they did the CPR. They classified their officers.
10 They're making an attempt. I wouldn't cancel
11 their charter. I would suspend it until we find
12 out if they're going to move to the DAV.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Well that's the motion.
14 So we're not going to cancel it right now. We're
15 putting a motion out there to temporarily suspend
16 it, until Bob can figure out, with them, exactly
17 what they're going to do.

18 But, these problems have got to cease. You
19 can't have shootings. I don't care who brought
20 them there. And it's The American Legion's name
21 getting the bad reputation. So we've got to
22 figure out what they're going to do.

23 Okay, I'm sorry, Mike.

24 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd
25 District Commander.

1 Any future negotiations, I think there needs
2 to be a timeline put in, that you have a certain
3 amount of time or by that time we're canceling it.
4 If not, they can draw this on for years. And I
5 don't think we want that.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: No.

7 I think that Bob can report back to us with a
8 resolution within the next 30 days.

9 PDC SCHMITT: Hopefully, Commander.

10 Like I say, I'm going to meet with them later
11 this week.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Yep.

13 PDC SCHMITT: I would like to see this body
14 put a motion on the floor that we order the Post
15 Commander and officers to sell all properties.
16 Because that property cannot be used anymore for
17 what it's been because that's the problem. If we
18 get rid of the property and keep them from using
19 it, let them go meet someplace else where it's
20 safe for them and their membership, that's better.
21 This property should not be used anymore for an
22 American Legion Post.

23 The sign has been painted over. There's no
24 identification that's an American Legion Post any
25 longer, visibly. Okay? The signs have been taken

1 care of.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Darell. You had
3 your hand up.

4 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: That's the question
5 I was going to ask Bob, if they took down the
6 signs.

7 PDC SCHMITT: It was painted over with black
8 paint, yes. I was there.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Jermaine.

10 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander, if --

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Jermaine, state your name
12 and --

13 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine
14 Ferguson, 6th District 1st Vice.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Perfect.

16 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: If there is a --
17 if we suspend the charter, can they sell property?

18 And what's the status of their liquor
19 license?

20 Maybe we should ask them to revoke or give up
21 their liquor license first, and then sell their
22 property and relocate. Have we discussed that
23 path forward?

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Bob Ray, do you have any
25 ideas on this?

1 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I would let Bob take one
2 last shot at it and see if they are, if they would
3 be willing to sell the property themselves, or do
4 they want us to take on doing that for them, and
5 get some clarification before, really, we move on
6 anything. Let Bob give it one last shot.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

8 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Jean.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

10 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: I got this from you
11 regarding --

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Who are you?

13 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Steve Ervin, Post
14 484, 4th District Commander.

15 I got this from the Department. It's
16 regarding a Post closure and merger checklist.

17 And if you go back and look for property
18 disposal, it says, "If the Post is closed without
19 merger, the Post Corporation must either convey
20 real property to the ownership of the Department
21 of Ohio Corporation or sell it and convey the
22 proceeds to the Department, less any amounts
23 withheld to satisfy any indebtedness," their debt.

24 "If the Post is merging with another Post" --
25 but this is not.

1 "All personal property, uniforms, firearms,
2 furnishings, equipment, ... should be either sold,
3 transferred to the surviving Post or the
4 Department of Ohio. Items containing the name and
5 emblems of The American Legion normally should not
6 be sold to non-Legion members."

7 "All funds remaining on hand after all debts
8 are paid should be transferred to the surviving
9 Post or the Department of Ohio, except for those
10 funds in the charitable gaming account" ...

11 Anyhow, this is something that goes back to
12 the same situation going on right now at the Post
13 and this is something you need to look at.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

15 Well, I think what we might want to consider
16 doing here is let Bob get with them again. He's
17 been working very well with them. Let him get
18 with them again, figure out exactly what they're
19 going to do, and then report back to the DEC as
20 soon as possible, especially within the next 45
21 days. I think time is of the essence here.

22 I'm going to see if -- I forgot who made the
23 motion to suspend the charter.

24 FROM THE FLOOR: Tom.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

1 Tom, I don't think that we can ask them to do
2 any of this with their charter being temporarily
3 suspended. I don't think we should do that at
4 this time. I think that, you know, we need to let
5 them figure out what they're going to do, exactly,
6 first.

7 So if you want to withdraw your motion until
8 we get a report back from PDC Schmitt --

9 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander,
10 Poulton, 12th District Commander. I rescind my
11 motion.

12 Thank you.

13 1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Motter, 1st
14 District, seconds that.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

16 All right, one more. We've got one more.

17 But we're good on this charter for now.

18 Okay?

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: This is why it's so
20 important to do a Post inspection. This is why
21 it's important to check their State of Ohio, their
22 business certificate, to make sure of their EIN,
23 their IRS, the 990 has been filed, you know, to
24 make sure that they've paid their taxes. Because
25 if that's not being checked on regularly and the

1 Post changes leadership, it's going to end up
2 here. It's going to end up right here at
3 Department, and right here in this meeting and
4 future meetings. And this is why it's so urgent.

5 We're actually running a franchise. So
6 consider The American Legion, we're a nonprofit
7 franchise. And so we have to make sure that
8 everybody is above board.

9 So, okay, the next one on the list is Post
10 504 in Youngstown.

11 I do not have a charter cancellation form
12 turned in for this. But, because of the long-term
13 standing issues that keep coming onto my desk and
14 keep ending up in the Department Commander's and
15 the District Commanders' e-mails, you know, there
16 comes a point where we have to make a decision on
17 these Posts that are not doing anything but
18 defaming the name of The American Legion. So that
19 is why this Post is also being proposed as a
20 charter cancellation.

21 So if it's not going to be taken care of at
22 the District or Post level, it's going to come
23 here to Department. And that's why we're
24 discussing this right now.

25 So Post 504, Youngstown Post.

1 1VC TEIS: The first thing on 504 was they
2 were discussed this past week, and everything that
3 was going on there. We're getting reports.

4 And I stopped in there once, probably about a
5 year ago. They have no Legion stuff on the walls.
6 They're running it as a social club. The young
7 lady behind the bar said her dad owned it.

8 The other thing is, so I got to thinking
9 about the liquor license, because they haven't
10 filed their 990 since 2017. So I called the
11 liquor board yesterday.

12 And when I first looked it up online, because
13 you can look it up, and it said "inactive". So I
14 said huh.

15 And I called the liquor board and their
16 liquor license is suspended for back taxes.

17 But my understanding is they're still open
18 and serving. So, technically, they're in
19 violation of their liquor license and everything
20 else, and they're using The Legion name.

21 ADJUTANT HELLER: There have been four
22 members on the books for the last --

23 1VC TEIS: Yeah, there's been four members on
24 the books. And actually, for two years, the two
25 weren't even paid-up members.

1 So, there's two routes we can take.

2 One, we could call the liquor control board
3 and have them go in. Because if they're serving
4 without a license, the liquor board is going to
5 shut them down and board them up right now.

6 Or, to find out if they actually are
7 operating, we could call the Youngstown Police to
8 drive by there just to see if there's anybody
9 there.

10 But on Facebook, all their active pictures
11 and everything else, technically, I think it's
12 2018, 2019, is the actual pictures they're showing
13 on the Facebook page.

14 But on the pictures on the Facebook page,
15 they're showing the inside the building. I mean
16 there's a glow ball. There's not one thing
17 hanging on the wall that says "American Legion",
18 if you look at the pictures.

19 So it's going to be up to you, what you think
20 we need to do to get this Post closed.

21 And Charles and I have talked numerous times,
22 along with Suzette and Jean here, that this --

23 FROM THE FLOOR: Yank their charter.

24 1VC TEIS: Yeah, we can yank their charter.

25 It's not really in a good end of town. But

1 to go up there, we'd have to definitely take the
2 police with us to yank their charter. Or do we
3 get ahold of the liquor control board and tell
4 them we think they're improper?

5 Because that's -- when I talked to the young
6 lady, I said they haven't filed their 990, and
7 we're understanding that we think they are in
8 violation of The American Legion. They're running
9 a bar.

10 And she goes, "Yeah, they're suspended."

11 They're supposed to be having a hearing
12 coming up in a month or so. But who knows if
13 anything is even going to happen?

14 COMMANDER WILSON: There's a question.

15 1VC TEIS: Yes, Joyce.

16 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
17 District.

18 This is one that I've heard about before. I
19 think we should cancel their charter today. Get
20 the liquor board in and get rid of the alcohol
21 immediately. Because once you get that out of
22 there, you get all the people out of there, you
23 don't have any problem. And once the charter is
24 canceled, then that property then belongs to the
25 Department of Ohio. And that would be the best,

1 quickest, easiest way to do it.

2 1VC TEIS: Well, if you pull their charter,
3 they'd have to shut the doors. And then the
4 liquor control board would go in because they were
5 no longer, their liquor license would no longer be
6 under Post 504.

7 But the thing is, they don't have a liquor
8 license right now. It's inactive.

9 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick,
10 Alternate NEC.

11 Is this on Indianola Avenue?

12 2VC STENNIS: Yes.

13 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay.

14 2VC STENNIS: No, no, no, no, no. That's
15 472. 472 is Indianola. This is on Glenwood
16 Avenue.

17 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Oh, Glenwood.

18 2VC STENNIS: Yeah, that's on Glenwood.

19 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: All right.

20 1VC TEIS: Yes, Chappy.

21 PDC CHAPMAN: Just to share a personal
22 experience with you. About 25, 30 years ago,
23 Steve and I were at my Post and we went through
24 this. We got caught without a liquor license. We
25 were operating as a club in our canteen. Got

1 busted.

2 The procedure with the liquor license is,
3 yes, they'll lock your doors. They will order you
4 to lock your doors. They will confiscate all the
5 monies there. They'll confiscate all the illegal
6 alcohol that happens to be there. Then you'll get
7 a court date. And you better take an attorney
8 with you.

9 And we were fortunate. We were still
10 operating. They still let us function and use the
11 hall as a meeting place. Our charter stayed
12 intact, but we were ordered to get our business in
13 order, to get our license in order, and report
14 back to the court. We did that and we've been
15 operating ever since.

16 1VC TEIS: But the problem with this Post is
17 they only got four active members. So they're not
18 even operating.

19 ADJUTANT HELLER: And who's listed on the
20 Certification of Post Officers Form, they're not
21 even members.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, Darell.
23 Darell has his hand up.

24 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: I have a question.
25 Do they have a gaming license?

1 COMMANDER WILSON: Do they have a gaming
2 license? Not to my knowledge.

3 ADJUTANT HELLER: I would imagine no.

4 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: All right. Just
5 checking.

6 PDC FRIEND: PDC Friend.

7 What concerns me, if we don't suspend their
8 charter before the AFT (sic) goes in there, then
9 The American Legion is still going to be, their
10 name is still going to be tarnished. So if we
11 suspend their charter before we actually get them
12 to go in and actually close the place, I think we
13 need to do that first.

14 ADJUTANT HELLER: You mean cancel the
15 charter.

16 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Cancel it.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Suspend or cancel?

18 PDC FRIEND: Cancel it. Get rid of it.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Commander, you said
20 "suspend".

21 PDC FRIEND: I meant cancel.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, I know.

23 Here's the thing, we've gotten -- and I'm
24 going to let Charles speak to this in one
25 second -- but we've gotten so many letters and

1 complaints about this Post. They have pictures of
2 naked women on the walls in there. A female
3 Legion person stopped in there and she wrote back
4 to us and told us.

5 I think, Roger, you were still Commander at
6 that time.

7 PDC FRIEND: Yeah.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: So they're not an American
9 Legion Post, no way, shape or form. And I just
10 think we --

11 But I'm going to let Charles say something on
12 this, because he's been trying to get them closed.

13 2VC STENNIS: This has been a problem since I
14 was District Commander back in 2012. So we're in
15 2021.

16 The most members this Post has ever had was
17 19. And that was underneath me. Their membership
18 has -- they don't try to get membership. They
19 don't do membership. They do absolutely nothing.
20 The Auxiliary was pulled out of there about six or
21 seven years ago. So, again, in essence, this is
22 just really a neighborhood bar.

23 Every District Commander has gone in there
24 and asked and asked and asked, and nothing has
25 happened. So I am requesting that we cancel this

1 charter and be done with Post 504.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: So you're making a motion
3 then, Charles?

4 2VC STENNIS: I am making that motion.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Do we have --

6 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
7 District Commander, seconds.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Gary Cox, Jr.

9 All right, so we have a motion and a second
10 to cancel Post 504 Youngstown's charter.

11 Is there any other discussion?

12 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander,
13 Jermaine Ferguson, 6th District.

14 Should this body submit a statement to the
15 liquor control, stating that we are canceling the
16 charter, and kind of doing --

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, we will do that.

18 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: -- that as a
19 self-referral?

20 1VC TEIS: Once we pull the charter, then
21 yeah.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: We're going to tell them.
23 They don't have a license anyways, but we're going
24 to tell them they're operating without one.

25 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: That way we could

1 have the --

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

3 1VC TEIS: We can pull their charter.

4 They're still going to have the doors open.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: They don't care.

6 But we're going to inform the liquor board
7 that they're still, as far as we know, they're
8 still operating as a bar.

9 ADJUTANT HELLER: And what would happen after
10 this, immediately after this, I have to send the
11 charter cancellation to National. And that will
12 not go to the NEC until --

13 FROM THE FLOOR: October.

14 ADJUTANT HELLER: No, it will go to
15 convention, National Convention. Because I have
16 until the 11th to get any charter cancellation
17 requests in.

18 So this will be voted on at National
19 Convention. It will be finalized by National.

20 So I would recommend not informing them until
21 after National Convention, when it's been
22 finalized by National to cancel the charter. And
23 then we can formally send the Post notice, local
24 law enforcement, and also the liquor control
25 commission, and any other entities that have an

1 interest.

2 Because anything after that, any liabilities,
3 falls on the people that are inside that Post,
4 whose name is on the building, which we'll also
5 find out about their property as well in the
6 meantime. So --

7 But once this body --

8 2VC STENNIS: It's a Past Commander who is
9 not even a member anymore.

10 ADJUTANT HELLER: Once this body votes on it,
11 there's still a final authority, which is
12 National. So that's the final authority on that.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Is there any --

14 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

16 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Even though it has to go
17 through National, if we yank their charter, they
18 are not in business, period, for The American
19 Legion. So we could still turn them in to liquor
20 control and it shouldn't affect us, because they
21 are actually out of business when we yank that
22 charter.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Any other
24 discussion?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
2 favor signify by saying aye.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

7 All right, now we have the resolutions,
8 constitutional amendments, by Adjutant Heller.

9 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,
10 Wright, 13th District. One more thing to add to
11 the Post charters.

12 We submitted paperwork for Sons of The
13 American Legion Squadron Post 2. I'd like to
14 follow up, us to follow up on that. We sent the
15 application in on April 22nd of this year, check
16 number 1009 was submitted for \$70, and was cashed.
17 So we'd like to follow up on that.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, we will definitely
19 follow up and get you an answer on that.

20 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm sure it's sitting up
22 at National.

23 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay. Thank you.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: You know how National is.

25 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I do, ma'am.

1 COMMANDER WILSON: But we'll definitely
2 follow up on it, Richard, and get back to you.

3 Okay, Adjutant Heller.

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay, Resolutions,
5 constitutional amendments.

6 So I received two resolutions from Lucas
7 County Council. And we've titled them Resolution
8 22-01 and 22-02.

9 So you have them both. And you should have
10 this as well (indicating), which is a proposal as
11 to what this award, this medal, would look like.

12 So Resolution 22-01, the resolve clause
13 reads:

14 Resolved, that the Department Internal
15 Affairs Commission and the Department Finance
16 Commission create, establish and budget necessary
17 funds for this Distinguished Service Medal Award
18 for The American Legion Department of Ohio; and,
19 be it further

20 Resolved, that the funds include a master
21 plaque at the Department Headquarters, with brass
22 tags for each recipient's name and year awarded,
23 and for a new Legion cap with the Distinguished
24 Service Medal embroidered on the cap with
25 additional lettering if needed; and, be it further

1 Resolved, that the Ohio Distinguished Service
2 Medal be known as the Frederick W. Galbraith --
3 whose the first Department Commander of Ohio and
4 the 2nd National Commander of The American
5 Legion -- Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio;
6 and, be it further

7 Resolved, that the Frederick W. Galbraith
8 Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio must not
9 resemble the National Distinguished Service Medal
10 by having a supporting ribbon color of red, white,
11 and blue, and the state name, Ohio, on the top
12 front, as well as the shape of Ohio and The
13 American Legion logo in the center of the medal
14 medallion; and, be it further

15 Resolved, the criteria for the awarding of
16 Ohio's Distinguished Service Medal will follow the
17 criteria used for the National Distinguished
18 Service Medal, with revisions allowing for the
19 issuance in the state and Department of Ohio as
20 attached, with additional revisions as needed;
21 and, be it finally

22 Resolved, by The American Legion Department
23 of Ohio Department Executive Committee, in regular
24 meeting assembled at headquarters in Delaware,
25 Ohio, establishes the Frederick W. Galbraith

1 Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio.

2 So the proposed course of action is for this
3 to be received and recorded by Department, for
4 this to fully go through the 1st District as well,
5 and to be distributed to the Finance and Internal
6 Affairs Commissions.

7 1ST DISTRICT CMDR NAVARRE: Joe Navarre from
8 the 1st District, Commander.

9 We had a virtual E board meeting on Thursday
10 night. And we decided to send this back to
11 committee, because we need to do a few more
12 revisions on it. So we hope to have it back for
13 the next E board meeting.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. All right, we've
15 got that received and recorded. And we will wait
16 on your revisions.

17 1ST DISTRICT CMDR NAVARRE: Thank you.

18 ADJUTANT HELLER: Resolution 22-02, which is,
19 subject, "Awarding of first Frederick W. Galbraith
20 Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio to Arthur F.
21 Lustig, with the title of Judge Advocate Emeritus,
22 American Legion Department of Ohio."

23 The resolve clause reads:

24 Resolved, that Arthur F. Lustig's name be the
25 very first name on the master plaque at

1 Department, and that his name shall be in the
2 center of the plaque, with future names being
3 added to the left and right columns on the plaque;
4 and, be it further

5 Resolved, that a new American Legion cap be
6 provided to Arthur F. Lustig, with a replica of
7 the medal embroidered on the cap, with additional
8 wording of "Judge Advocate Emeritus, Department of
9 Ohio"; and, be it further

10 Resolved, by Lucas County Council of the
11 Great First District, in a regular meeting
12 assembled at Whitehouse Post 384, on August 2nd,
13 urge the DEC of The American Legion to award
14 Arthur F. Lustig the first ever Frederick W.
15 Galbraith Distinguished Medal of Ohio; and, be it
16 further

17 Resolved, that the Great 1st District of The
18 American Legion Department of Ohio -- well this
19 would be changed -- in a specially-called virtual
20 meeting held on August 5th -- which didn't have a
21 quorum, which was brought to my understanding --
22 urges and recommends Arthur F. Lustig be awarded
23 the first ever Frederick W. Galbraith
24 Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio; and, be it
25 finally

1 Resolved, that the DEC, assembled at
2 headquarters in Delaware, Ohio, on August 7, award
3 Art Lustig the Frederick W. Galbraith
4 Distinguished Service Medal of Ohio.

5 So it sounds like the same thing needs to be
6 done for this as well.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, so we read that
8 and we'll record it. And we'll wait for further
9 notice from the Great 1st District.

10 All right, so is there any unfinished
11 business?

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Any unfinished business?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, moving on, is there
16 any new business?

17 Yes.

18 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 5th
19 District.

20 We have a correction on our summer convention
21 for the 5th District. It is 6/4/2022.

22 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay, I'll let Marie know.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, duly noted.

24 Yes, Joyce.

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th

1 District.

2 This is kind of addressed to Suzette, because
3 she's our expert.

4 Can you explain the difference --

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Hey guys, we're trying to
6 hear Joyce.

7 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: -- between The
8 American Legion Department of Ohio and American
9 Legion Department of Ohio Charities, Inc.

10 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yes.

11 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: They are two
12 separate organizations; correct?

13 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay, yes.

14 The American Legion Department of Ohio, Inc.,
15 is the 501(c)(19) that is Department Headquarters.
16 The American Legion Department of Ohio Charities,
17 Inc., is a 501(c)(3) that gets its usage of the
18 American Legion's name from National. They
19 authorize that from the National Judge Advocate on
20 an annual basis for the 501(c)(3) to utilize the
21 name "The American Legion Department of Ohio
22 Charities, Inc."

23 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: That being said,
24 the Board of Directors for Charities, Inc., is
25 who?

1 ADJUTANT HELLER: The board of -- so
2 Charities, Inc., has a board of, they're trustees.
3 Right? Those who are elected and authorized by
4 the DEC.

5 So the Charities Board of Trustees is Glenn
6 Hickman, who's the chairman; Art Lustig, who was
7 just approved by this body today; Jerry Wilson,
8 who was approved last year; and based on --

9 PDC WILSON: Jim Morris.

10 ADJUTANT HELLER: And Jim Morris, who was
11 approved the year before.

12 And then this body, not you all, but this
13 body previously, in '15, I think it was, voted
14 that the Charities, Inc., Board of Trustees, the
15 Immediate Past Department Commander is an
16 automatic appointment to the Charities' Board.

17 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay. So we have
18 no responsibilities for Charities, Inc.,
19 basically? So if they decide to go set up their
20 own bar and the use Charities' money for that,
21 we're not responsible? The state is not coming
22 after us?

23 ADJUTANT HELLER: No. It's a separate
24 501(c)(3). This board has a say on who their
25 board of trustees is.

1 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well the question I
2 had this morning was, we didn't really have much
3 of a say. It was a bunch of bobble heads in here.
4 Oh, we want this much and that guy, and
5 everybody's like yeah, yeah, yeah, yeah. Okay?

6 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yeah.

7 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Who chooses who
8 wants to be on it? Who gets to be on it? I mean,
9 yeah, we have to vote on it, but if you only get
10 one option --

11 ADJUTANT HELLER: I would recommend that you
12 talk to Glenn Hickman about that, as the Chairman
13 of the Charities Board, and talk to Jim Morris
14 about that too.

15 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: We need to get
16 somebody younger in there because they're not
17 going to live forever. I mean it would be nice if
18 they did and they continue on forever, but they're
19 not going to. And we need to get somebody newer
20 in there.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: But someone else could
22 have been nominated from the floor. Because he
23 asked if there was any other nominations.

24 FROM THE FLOOR: Correct.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: He asked if there was any

1 other nominations, other than Art Lustig.

2 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: It was not
3 particularly clear to me. I don't know if
4 everybody else knows and I'm just the only one who
5 doesn't.

6 I mean I went through the handout you gave us
7 when we were leaving convention at the DEC there.
8 That was information I had not been given before.
9 I read the Charities before, did not have the same
10 information then. So I want everybody to know the
11 exact --

12 ADJUTANT HELLER: What handout are you
13 referring to?

14 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: The one you gave to
15 us when we were leaving, the outgoing DEC meeting
16 at convention.

17 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay.

18 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: In the little,
19 itty-bitty room, with little bitty air
20 conditioning. It was in the packet of papers that
21 you gave us.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: When someone comes up for
23 election, and they come up for election every four
24 years, --

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay.

1 COMMANDER WILSON: -- any District can
2 nominate anyone from the floor. Okay?

3 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Is there any notice
4 put out about that?

5 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm sorry?

6 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Is there any notice
7 put out about that or is it -- is it strictly at
8 the DEC or is it done at convention ever?

9 ADJUTANT HELLER: It usually is done at
10 convention. But there were folks who were ill
11 that could not, they just couldn't find the time
12 for everybody to meet.

13 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Yeah, okay.

14 ADJUTANT HELLER: I understand what you're
15 saying. The meeting notices aren't very public.
16 These are the same core group of people who've
17 been operating Charities for quite some time.
18 They created it. It's kind of --

19 COMMANDER WILSON: They look at requests,
20 just so everyone knows, they look at requests from
21 Posts at Department Convention and at Mid-Winter.

22 So you should be talking Charities up in your
23 Districts and telling Posts if they want to make a
24 request from Charities, the next time they can do
25 that is at Mid-Winter. So they would need to put

1 their request in and send it to Glenn Hickman
2 prior to Mid-Winter. That's when they're looked
3 at.

4 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Can we do a more, I
5 guess the best way to put it is a more formal
6 request form? I mean just writing a letter, you
7 might be an expert at writing a letter and
8 requesting money, you may not. And if one gets
9 approved --

10 COMMANDER WILSON: That would be a good
11 suggestion that you could give Charities.

12 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Just a form that we
13 could definitely, this is definitely a charitable
14 organization that we're giving it to and
15 specifically why they want the money, --

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Right.

17 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: -- what they need
18 it for.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Right.

20 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: If somebody leaves
21 their Post, you know --

22 COMMANDER WILSON: I agree. But, I mean,
23 Charities runs Charities.

24 So I'm just saying this is a suggestion that
25 we can give to Glenn Hickman and say this came

1 from the DEC, that we feel like there should be
2 like a universal outline form, something similar
3 to that, that Posts can even get off our website
4 and fill them out, and tell them what the
5 deadlines are.

6 The deadlines would be before the Department
7 Convention and before Mid-Winter.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Yeah.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: So we'll talk to him about
10 that.

11 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Would an ad hoc
12 committee in the DEC come up with the form --

13 FROM THE FLOOR: No. No.

14 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Is it up to them?

15 FROM THE FLOOR: That's up to them.

16 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Make a suggestion
17 to them.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, we can make that
19 suggestion.

20 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well I assume they
21 don't have this many people. That's a lot of work
22 to add, one more thing on top of everything they
23 can do.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, they have the
25 administrative help. So they can do it.

1 So we'll talk to Glenn and just tell him.
2 That's a very good suggestion.

3 And I agree with you, it needs to be better
4 publicized. There needs to be like a universal
5 guideline form, or whatever we want to call it.

6 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: An easier format
7 for people.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, exactly.

9 Thank you. Thank you very much.

10 Okay, let's see here. Where are we at?

11 Good of The Legion; right?

12 All right, so Adjutant Heller has some
13 announcements to make about the National
14 Convention.

15 ADJUTANT HELLER: I just want to, really
16 quick, talk about National Convention.

17 How many here are going to National
18 Convention?

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

20 ADJUTANT HELLER: All right.

21 So I found out, too, they're having District
22 Commanders on a training at National Convention.
23 I'll forward the DEC the information on that.

24 So, okay, where are we staying? Does anybody
25 know?

1 FROM THE FLOOR: The Hyatt Regency.

2 ADJUTANT HELLER: Yeah.

3 FROM THE FLOOR: Downtown, Second Street.

4 ADJUTANT HELLER: All right.

5 Does anyone know the times and dates of the
6 registration?

7 I'm just kidding.

8 Okay, it's Thursday, 1:00 to 6:00; Friday
9 9:00 to 11:00, we'll break for lunch, and then
10 again from 1:00 to 6:00; Saturday from 7:00 to
11 9:00, and 1:00 to 5:00.

12 They're going to deliver to us our bags,
13 right, on Wednesday.

14 So I know the SAL will already be ready to
15 kick off on Thursday. The Auxiliary will be ready
16 to kick off too.

17 We'll have access to our rooms. So when you
18 go to second floor of the hotel, right, there's
19 stairs.

20 Make sure you have your key card on you at
21 all times, because you can't get to any floors
22 without your key card.

23 And that's also a problem if you go to other
24 hotels hospitalities. Because your key card
25 doesn't work for their hotel. So keep that in

1 mind.

2 And please be aware of little signs on the
3 elevators and things like that, to try to get
4 places. Because they're very strict on security
5 around there.

6 But we'll be at, J.D. and myself will be
7 there. Eric Hall, he will also be there. His
8 wife is a delegate to the Auxiliary. He'll be a
9 delegate for The American Legion.

10 And right now we have a little over 60-some
11 delegates with The Legion. We were allotted 90
12 delegates, just so you know. They gave us our
13 delegate strength, which was 84,724, I think it
14 was. As of July 30th, that's how many 2021
15 memberships were paid.

16 But we have what, 63 or 65 Legion delegates.
17 The Auxiliary has about 30. The SAL has about 30.
18 So we're expecting maybe 120 American Legion
19 family members there.

20 Our Ohio Caucus is on Sunday, the 29th, and
21 it's going to be at 4:00 o'clock. It's later in
22 the day. So please keep that in mind.

23 Because once our caucus convenes, we have two
24 buses that are going to pick us up on the side of
25 the hotel. So it will come back down -- I don't

1 know what direction it will be at, but it will be
2 not in front of the hotel, it will be on the side
3 of the hotel, one of the exits or entrances on the
4 side.

5 They will start chartering people to
6 Scottsdale American Legion Post 44, which is the
7 nicest Post.

8 Roger and I were there in May. We went to a
9 dozen Posts. The ones we really wanted that were
10 close by were already booked.

11 But Scottsdale American Legion Post 44 is
12 great. It's a very nice Post. We have the whole
13 place to ourselves.

14 And we have some beer, which is going to be
15 no charge. We're going to have like a Tex-Mex
16 food. We're going to have karaoke.

17 So Al, take your notebook out.

18 So we're going to have karaoke.

19 And they are so excited that we're coming.
20 So if you want well drinks, if you want, you know,
21 premium, it's going to be about five or six bucks
22 for a drink. So please keep that in mind.

23 But we're providing the food. We're
24 providing the beer. We're providing the
25 transportation. Okay?

1 It's in Old Town Scottsdale. So if you want
2 to drive out there yourself, you can. If you want
3 to go early and shop around, there's a lot of
4 little shops and stuff.

5 The Commander's Banquet is Tuesday, at 6:30.
6 We only had 20 tickets initially. Those are
7 already filled. So if you want to go to the
8 banquet, let me know. Because they did release
9 some more tickets for us. But I don't want to
10 acquire those if we're not going to use them.
11 They're \$52 apiece.

12 But if you decide when you're there that you
13 want to go to the banquet, I always have a way of
14 getting tickets. So, you know, the National
15 office and the other Adjutants are always
16 shuffling tickets around. So if you change your
17 mind when we get there and you want to get a
18 ticket, let me know.

19 The convention session is Tuesday, Wednesday,
20 and Thursday. So Monday is a free day.

21 You'll figure out where the National
22 Headquarters hotel and the Auxiliary is.

23 The delegate checks will be distributed.
24 We've set aside 30 cents a member. And so those
25 will be distributed after the convention. We'll

1 reduce the \$25 registration fee for convention on
2 that. The checks will be anywhere between three
3 and \$400, probably mid-300s.

4 We do ask that -- some of you have also been
5 appointed to the Convention Committee. Some of
6 you are call-ins.

7 How many got a call-in already?

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

9 ADJUTANT HELLER: Okay. Well there's more
10 call-ins than that. So there are a lot of
11 call-ins.

12 So your call-ins are for Saturday. The
13 convention committees are Sunday. Those are the
14 ones that the Commander appoints. And so we've
15 done all those appointments.

16 Some of you who are call-ins are also
17 appointed to a regular committee on Sunday that's
18 relevant to your National Commission appointment.

19 We just figured those out on Thursday and
20 Friday. And I believe Becky has already notified
21 everybody, or is going to notify everybody, what
22 convention committee they're serving on on Sunday.

23 National should have contacted you about your
24 National commission appointment, or call-in as
25 well.

1 So we're asking that you attend the Ohio
2 Caucus, you attend all sessions of the convention,
3 and then you attend your assigned committee or
4 commission, and then you remain on the floor until
5 all the National officers are elected.

6 So it's a great experience.

7 If something happens and you cannot come,
8 please contact me. Because I have up until
9 Wednesday morning, the 25th, to not pay the
10 delegate fee. Okay? So anything after that, your
11 delegate fee has already been purchased. So let
12 me know. Okay?

13 Thank you.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Suzette.

15 Questions?

16 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
17 District.

18 How many of you watch Fox cable news?

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

20 ADJUTANT HELLER: I do.

21 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: How many of you saw
22 us on the news in prime time last night?

23 ADJUTANT HELLER: I didn't.

24 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: And they referred
25 to The American Legion as, "Go down to that

1 dilapidated building down there with The American
2 Legion." They had our logo on the screen. And
3 they were telling people to go down there and ask
4 them to teach you how to shoot so you can defend
5 yourself.

6 This was on prime time national news
7 yesterday. So don't be surprised if you get some
8 little old lady coming in, "Can you show me how to
9 shoot?"

10 It may happen. It was on national, prime
11 time news. I just wanted you to be aware of that.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, any other good
13 of The Legion?

14 1VC TEIS: Real quick, so we can get out of
15 here.

16 Everybody should have one of these
17 (indicating) in front of you. It's Commander
18 Jean's celebration for her homecoming.

19 Don't forget. It's Saturday, September 25th
20 Yeager-Benson Post 199. There's a block of rooms
21 held at Super 8 Wyndham in Harrison. The cutoff
22 date for that is August 25th. Now that's the only
23 one we could get a block of rooms for, but there's
24 additional hotels, a Best Western, Comfort Inn,
25 and a Holiday Inn, if you want to check there.

1 So please, please, let's get everybody there
2 and give representation from all 14 Districts.

3 Thank you.

4 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Klostermeier, NEC, making
5 one last comment.

6 No parade at National this year.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Is there any other
8 good of the legion?

9 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Any other good of The
11 Legion?

12 FROM THE FLOOR: (No response).

13 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. I just want
14 to, in closing remarks, I just want to say thank
15 you for everyone being diligent.

16 I think we got a lot of stuff done today.
17 We've had a lot of good ideas brought out. We
18 will figure everything out and we'll try to get
19 everything done in a timely manner.

20 I want everybody to be safe going home.

21 And if you need any help or assistance, you
22 know, your Department officers and Department
23 staff are here for you. So, you know, please let
24 us know.

25 All right, we're going to have Al Buxton give

1 us the benediction.

2 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Let us remember those that
3 are ill: Ken LaVoy, Barb Clausing, and Rob
4 Jackson's wife Mary.

5 Our Heavenly Father, with heads uncovered and
6 bowed in tribute to our fallen comrades, we bring
7 this meeting to a close.

8 Before we depart and go our separate ways, we
9 pause to think of our members who are experiencing
10 difficult times. For them and their families, we
11 pray for strength and courage.

12 Amen.

15 the colors. One, two.
