2 . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

3 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll salute the colors.

4 One, two.

5 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

6 We'll have the invocation by Department

7 Chaplain Al Buxton.

8 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Good morning.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

10 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Let's remember a couple of

11 our officers in the prayer. Bob Klostermeier had

12 his neck surgery done and I understand Bob (sic)

13 Houp passed away, or not --

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Dick Houp.

15 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Dick Houp fell this morning

16 and hurt himself.

17 Our Father, who art in Heaven, we ask Thee to

18 bless this meeting and guide our officers and

19 members in their deliberations and decisions. Bless

20 our members and their families everywhere. Bless

21 our soldiers and sailors, wherever they may be in

22 harm's way. And God bless this country.

23 We ask these blessings in Thy holy name. Amen.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll do the Pledge of

1 Allegiance, lead by 1st Vice Brad Teis.

2 . . . PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

3 We'll now have the preamble, lead by 2nd Vice
4 Charles Stennis.

5 . . . PREAMBLE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

6 We'll now have the POW-MIA recognition by Brad
7 Teis.

8 Since we've had that blunder, we'll just
9 recognize that the chair there has the POW/MIA flag
10 on it.

11 We'll now have roll call by Department Adjutant
12 Eric Hall.

13 ADJTANT HALL: Good morning, everybody.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

15 . . . ROLL CALL CONDUCTED . . .

16 ADJUTANT HALL: Commander, we have a quorum.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

18 We'll now have the introduction of guests by
19 Department Sergeant-at-Arms Craig Whitham.

20 SGT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: All right, Commander, in
21 no certain order, we have Wes Crothers, 2nd Vice
22 Commander of the 10th District; Richard Donovan,
23 Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms; Frank Adley, Assistant
24 Sergeant-at-Arms. We have Al Beyer, Historian. We
25 have Eric Hall, who's our Adjutant; Jerry Wilson,

1 National Vice Commander. We have Sharon McClain,
2 2nd Vice Commander of the 14th District; Skip Craun,
3 SAL Chairman; Jim Koppin, Buckeye Boys State
4 Director; Robert White, Past District Commander of
5 the 13th; Ron Distel, Assistant Department Chaplain;
6 Steve Foster, Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms; Marv
7 Shamhart, Department Baseball Chairman; Jason Rue,
8 Assistant Sergeant-At-Arms; Christopher Miller,
9 who's a member of the 6th District; Mel Cantrell,
10 Post 79 Commander; Andy Atkins, Children and Youth;
11 Tom Stan, 2nd Vice Commander of the 11th; Ron
12 Chapman, Past Department Commander, Boys State
13 President; and Shane Eaton, 2nd Vice Commander of
14 the 6th District.

15 Who did I miss?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 SGT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: That's the guests,
18 Commander.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you. Thank you,
20 Sergeant-at-Arms.

21 Are there any PDCs here that we missed?

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 COMMANDER WILSON: I think they've all got
24 jobs.

25 Okay, we will now have the reading of the

1 previous minutes by Department Adjutant Eric Hall.

2 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
3 District. I make a motion we accept the minutes as
4 printed and corrected.

5 ADJUTANT HALL: Is there a second?

6 PDC FRIEND: Roger Friend, Past Department
7 Commander, I second.

8 ADJUTANT HALL: Any discussion?

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 ADJUTANT HALL: All in favor signify by the
11 sign of aye.

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

13 ADJUTANT HALL: Motion carried.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Be sure to wait on that
15 microphone, if you don't mind.

16 PDC FRIEND: Sorry, Commander.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: But we appreciate you.

18 Okay, I want to welcome everyone here to our
19 DEC meeting. I'm glad that everyone could make it.

20 It's important that, I think, that almost
21 everyone made it. But it's important that, when we
22 serve as a District officer, that you attend these
23 DEC meetings, where you can take the information
24 back that we do here to your Districts and let them
25 know what's going on.

1 Nothing worse than Districts, when they do see
2 you, say, they may say to you, "Well we haven't seen
3 a District officer in ten years." You know? And I
4 think that's a shame, but I know that it happens.

5 And I think that this DEC is changing the face
6 of that, and that you've been busy working and
7 trying to make sure that the Department of Ohio
8 stays on track.

9 Our membership numbers speak for that. I've
10 never known for us to have so many quota Districts
11 at this time in the year. So you all have a lot to
12 be proud of, and I thank you very much.

13 Now we have many things to get through today.
14 And I know that people would probably like to get
15 through it and get back on the way home. So I'm
16 going to keep my remarks short and just say that
17 anything that you need, if you see us during lunch
18 or after the meeting, let us know.

19 Okay, we'll have 1st Vice Commander Brad.

20 1VC TEIS: Morning.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

22 1VC TEIS: We've got a lot to go over here
23 today. But first I would like to have my sister
24 come up here for a second.

25 We've been through a lot the last few years.

1 We have a lot in common between our families. And
2 she calls me her brother from another mother and
3 this is my sister from another mister.

4 But tomorrow is her birthday. So --

5 (THEREUPON, HAPPY BIRTHDAY WAS SUNG BY THE
6 ASSEMBLY) .

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

8 1VC TEIS: And quite a few more.

9 (Applause) .

10 COMMANDER WILSON: It's my 29th again; right?

11 1VC TEIS: And holding.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: And holding.

13 1VC TEIS: All right, let's get into this.

14 We've got a lot to go over.

15 If anybody knew me when I came up through the
16 10th District, and did what we did in the 10th, I'm
17 really excited.

18 Like she talked about, you would not believe
19 what we have done. Some of you in this room have no
20 clue. But I'm going to give it to you right now.

21 But I've got good news and bad news. I'm going
22 to get the bad news out of the way first.

23 Let's see, Post Inspection Reports were due
24 March 1st. They're not all in. The 1st District's
25 still got 25. 2nd District doesn't have any. 3rd

1 District, she's not here, and of course, the
2 Commander of the 3rd District, it's her Post. 4th
3 District has none. 5th District has ten. 6th
4 District needs Post 460. The 7th District needs 15.
5 8th District, we're working on that, something, a
6 snafu there, and I'll get with you afterwards. 9th
7 District, zero. 10th District, 26. 11th District,
8 Post 378 is the only one left. 12th District, zero.
9 13th District, seven. 14th District, 14.

10 Get them in. We got to have them in. We have
11 dates that they have to be in. We've got to get
12 them in.

13 Now, Jerry and I, he's been sending me this
14 here (indicating) for the last two weeks. There's a
15 yellow line at the very, very top of 55 Departments.
16 Guess who's in first, place?

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Ohio.

18 1VC TEIS: O-H.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: I-O.

20 1VC TEIS: Thank you. Thank you.

21 When's the last time we did this, Jerry?

22 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Never.

23 1VC TEIS: Never.

24 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Never.

25 1VC TEIS: Never.

1 Okay, kudos to everybody.

2 I want to give kudos to the people. I put a
3 team together: J.D., Tamar, myself, Keith Whitten.
4 And we had another guy out of the 10th District that
5 was a snowbird, Bob, out of Post 436, up in
6 Uniontown. And my wife, for letting me sit on my
7 computer for the last two weeks and not pay any
8 attention to her at night.

9 But I made a promise. I took a challenge from
10 this man right here in the red shirt (indicating),
11 to make 14 Districts quota. Right now we're sitting
12 at six.

13 And I'll go down this real quick here. Let me
14 find it here. Here it is right here.

15 We have six districts that are quota: 13th,
16 106.7; 9th District, 105.4; 3rd District, 103.9;
17 14th District, 103.6; 6th District, 103.5; 4th
18 District, 102.1.

19 Right behind them, District 2 needs 54 cards;
20 8th District needs 57.

21 I don't know if I'm going to make 14, Bob, but
22 I guarantee you I'm going to make 11 or 12. It's
23 going to happen.

24 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I knew you would.

25 1VC TEIS: All right, next, Race to the Top.

1 When I call your District, would you please stand
2 up.

3 District 3; District 4; District 6; District 9;
4 District 13; and District 14.

5 Give them a round of applause.

6 (Applause).

7 I talked to Natural. And I don't think this
8 has ever been done before either. We have six
9 Districts qualifying for Race to the Top in four
10 categories.

11 The I is Bob Carson, 14th District.

12 Category II, the 6th, 9th, and the 13th.

13 Category III, which we could have a clean sweep
14 on that, whether you believe it or not.

15 Second place gets -- the first place gets a
16 free ride to the National Convention, second place
17 gets \$500, and third place gets 250. People don't
18 know that.

19 The 4th District -- or, excuse me, the 3rd
20 District is in the IV category. And the 4th
21 District is in Category V.

22 So we almost got a clean sweep on all the
23 categories. The only thing we're missing is
24 Category I, which we just missed.

25 At this time, we had our last meeting with the

1 membership. I'm going to bring J.D. up and we're
2 going to go over the areas right here, and have him
3 go over the awards manual, which we did a few
4 changes. I'll let him go over it and a couple other
5 things he's doing.

6 We have to have a vote on that from the DEC so
7 we can get that done.

8 I will say there's a few things in there with
9 the dates that we can't put our dates in there until
10 National sends us their 2023 dates.

11 J.D., do you want to come on up?

12 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Morning everybody.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

14 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: So this (indicating)
15 has been sent out to all of you. So you're used to
16 seeing it.

17 The only major change, so far, was on page 3.
18 The May target date was moved to March 31st. And so
19 we'll split the \$5,000. There is no all-time high.
20 The DEC last year had voted to do away with the
21 all-time high.

22 Post awards, I put those all on one page so you
23 can keep track of them. The dates are still
24 pending. They will be matched up with National's.
25 I just put dates in there so I had something to work

1 with.

2 The anytime Post awards was changed. They took
3 out -- they changed it to six new members or six
4 expired members and three transfers.

5 Brown Jug. The only thing we did on it was we
6 put the District, made District sizes. So on the
7 last membership report of May, it will be turned in
8 to Districts for the following year on what size you
9 are in. So if you've gained a lot of members or
10 lost a lot of members, it could change your
11 District, what size District you are.

12 The big "1" pin is going to be just that. It's
13 no longer going to be a gold, big "1" pin because
14 the price of gold is too expensive and we can't
15 afford it, or we shouldn't afford it. It went from
16 being \$400 five years ago to over 1,000 the last
17 time I ordered it. So the committee all decided to
18 keep the big "1" pin and we will come up with
19 something to replace it that is gold in color, just
20 not gold.

21 No major changes for the individual membership
22 recruiter drawing or Race to the Top.

23 Still waiting on the dates from National.

24 And the only other major change was on page 17.
25 The Hugh K. Martin Award was redesigned from the

1 highest, or all-time high to Post showing highest
2 percentage over goal of quota for the membership
3 year.

4 Those are the major changes. I need somebody
5 to make a motion to accept.

6 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
7 District 1st Vice Commander, makes a motion to
8 accept the membership report.

9 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 1st Vice
10 Commander, 4th District, seconds that motion.

11 1VC TEIS: We have a first and second on the
12 motion.

13 Any discussion on the membership manual?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

17 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

19 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

20 Okay, now we just got another thing that Tamar
21 put together here, which is a very, very, very
22 helpful thing for everybody in the District and your
23 Posts.

24 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It's the 2022
25 Membership Guide. She's went through and pulled

1 everything off of National's website, and stuff that
2 we've created here at Department. It is a great
3 tool to keep you knowing what's going on as far as
4 the new MyLegion aspect, who's eligible to be
5 members, who's not eligible to be members.

6 I'm pretty sure I e-mailed this to everybody.
7 You should have a copy.

8 And we will be adding this (indicating) into
9 them. And it will be for the renewal.

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: It's upside-down.

11 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: If you scan that with
12 your cell phone, you can renew your membership right
13 from that site.

14 So we just need a motion to accept this so we
15 can start printing them and passing them out.

16 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
17 District 1st Vice Commander, makes a motion to
18 accept.

19 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
20 District Commander, seconds.

21 1VC TEIS: I have a first and a second.

22 Do we have anything to discuss?

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

24 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

1 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

4 Yes, go ahead.

5 We had one Legionnaire of the Year Award
6 submitted. His name is Mike Schrull. He's out of
7 Post 211. He was nominated by MaryKay Menduza. He
8 is a Rider. He works with the Patriot Guard. He's
9 the District Captain. He's done all kinds of good
10 things for the Legion. I think he would be a great
11 Legionnaire of the Year.

12 I can pass this around if you guys want to look
13 at it. But it's the only nomination we have. So
14 he's automatic, as long as you guys okay it.

15 But if you guys want to look at it, I'll leave
16 it up here. He's a great candidate. I've read this
17 a couple times. I just don't want to bore you with
18 all the details. Just need a motion to accept it.

19 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
20 District, motions to accept Mike Schrull for the
21 Legionnaire of the Year Award.

22 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
23 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds the motion.

24 1VC TEIS: All right, I have a first and a
25 second to accept Mike Schrull as Legionnaire of the

1 Year.

2 Any discussion?

3 Yes, sir.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine Ferguson,
5 6th District 1st Vice Commander.

6 Procedurally, the question is: Did the
7 membership committee vote on that and when was the
8 deadline for those applications?

9 Because I know in our District we have some
10 nominations that we are going to --

11 1VC TEIS: We're going to get into that. We'll
12 get into that.

13 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: For the Legionnaire of
14 the Year, the deadline is March 31st, because it's
15 before the DEC, because the DEC has to vote on it.

16 1VC TEIS: Then I'll get into that from there
17 on. Okay?

18 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Okay.

19 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

23 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

25 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

1 Okay, now, of-the-year awards. We had it at
2 Mid-Winter last year, but we still had some
3 submissions that came in. And we are still having
4 one at convention. Then from that point on, it will
5 be at Mid-Winter, Mid-Winter, Mid-Winter. Those
6 deadlines will be September 30th, or 31st (sic).
7 September 30th.

8 The one for this year, there's paperwork out
9 there to fill out and turn in by May 30th. Correct?

10 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: May 30th.

11 1VC TEIS: May 30th, for of-the-year awards for
12 convention for this year.

13 Does everybody understand that?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 1VC TEIS: Okay. So the applications are out
16 there. We have to have them back here by May 30th
17 for of-year-awards for convention 2022.

18 All right, any discussion?

19 Go ahead.

20 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
21 Vice, 9th District.

22 Do we not have to approve, through the DEC,
23 moving them? Because I don't think they should be
24 moved.

25 No. 1, we don't have hardly anybody at

1 Mid-Winter. Okay? People expect to see them at
2 convention. And you're going to tell people to
3 drive through winter weather in January to come get
4 an award. I can see us missing people that way,
5 especially those who come from up north.

6 I see no reason to move it to Mid-Winter. I
7 think it should stay at convention, unless there's a
8 really good reason for moving it. I've heard no
9 reason for moving them, other than Department wanted
10 to move them.

11 1VC TEIS: Christie, you got anything on that?

12 COORDINATOR WHITE: Christie White, Americanism
13 and Children and Youth Coordinator.

14 So we had a couple discussions here at
15 Department, and some of the higher-ups as well, and
16 at Mid-Winter Conference.

17 The banquet would just be an of-the-year awards
18 banquet. There will be nothing else, no membership,
19 no convention award. It would just be a specific,
20 special banquet just for of-the-year award winners.

21 And then Department Convention will be the
22 Department Convention awards.

23 And then we were discussing the fall
24 conference, doing membership awards there.

25 So, that way, each separate section has their

1 own recognition.

2 1VC TEIS: Thank you.

3 Anybody else have any discussion?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 1VC TEIS: All right, that's it. It's not in
6 our constitution and bylaws anywhere that says where
7 it's at, or when we have to hold them.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
9 Vice, 9th District.

10 But the group that leads The American Legion
11 Department of Ohio is the DEC. It's not the
12 committees. It's not staff. It's not higher-ups at
13 National. It's the DEC. In my opinion, it needs to
14 be approved by the DEC.

15 1VC TEIS: Do you want to make a motion to move
16 it to --

17 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
18 Vice, 9th District, I make a motion that we keep the
19 of-the-year awards at convention, where we have more
20 members coming to see the award recipients.

21 1VC TEIS: Do I have a second?

22 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Bill Dittebrand,
23 Commander of the 9th District, I second that motion.

24 1VC TEIS: I have a first and second.

25 Any discussion?

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

4 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.

6 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th

7 District Commander. Point of order.

8 1VC TEIS: Yes.

9 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: We're under a
10 discussion for a previous motion. Don't we have to
11 complete that motion before we go to another motion?

12 1VC TEIS: There's no motion on the floor. It
13 was just discussion before.

14 All for the motion, stand up. Voting members
15 only.

16 (Members stand accordingly).

17 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We have nine.

18 1VC TEIS: Okay, sit down.

19 Opposed, stand up.

20 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: We have 18.

21 (Members stand accordingly).

22 1VC TEIS: All right, it moves to Mid-Winter.

23 Okay, yes.

24 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: I'll make a motion
25 to move the awards, the of-the-year awards banquet

1 to Mid-Winter Conference.

2 1VC TEIS: You don't have to do it. We just
3 did it.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: We did not do that.

5 1VC TEIS: There was a motion and you voted
6 that motion down.

7 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: The motion that we
8 just voted on was to keep it --

9 1VC TEIS: Okay, go ahead.

10 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: I motion for this
11 body to approve the of-the-years banquet to be at
12 Mid-Winter Conference.

13 Jermaine Ferguson, 1st Vice Commander, 6th
14 District. Thank you.

15 1VC TEIS: I have a motion. Do I have a
16 second?

17 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
18 District Commander, seconds.

19 1VC TEIS: Okay, I have a motion to have the
20 banquet at Mid-Winter. All in favor signify by
21 saying aye.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

23 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.

25 1VC TEIS: Okay, the ayes have it.

1 All right, a couple more things I want to get
2 to here.

3 Don't stop. We still have two months to go to
4 make quota. We need 2,739 cards. And if you think
5 about that, that's not very much out of the 80,815
6 that we needed.

7 Please, please, please, RRR, retain, reinstate,
8 renew.

9 Retain, retain, retain. We've got to go back
10 and retain the ones we have. We're still sitting
11 over, close to 10,000, close to 10,000 that haven't
12 been renewed. And we only need 2,739 to make quota.
13 So that's a drop in the bucket of those.

14 Phone calls, e-mails, knock on doors.

15 The Department has this postcard (indicating),
16 if you haven't seen it. We can make it Post
17 specific on the back.

18 So it says on the front here, it has the four
19 pillars of The American Legion, renew today. It
20 states on here that the four pillars, what it is,
21 and renew today at Ohio Legion. But we need to --

22 And then on the back it has a little membership
23 renewal past due notice they can read. And then it
24 will have your Post in this corner up here
25 (indicating), to where they can return it to. Okay?

1 We did this in the 10th District, or at my
2 Post. We sent out 150. Believe it or not, we got
3 61 of them back already. We got 61 out of 150 back.
4 This works.

5 There's a couple other Posts that got them, 139
6 got them, some other ones that got them.

7 But just ask. Call Jon Vulgamore and ask him,
8 or JD, and they will get you these.

9 Please, this paper and this ink (indicating),
10 they wanted to charge you guys for it. And we said
11 no, because it's part of the membership. If we want
12 to promote membership, we're going to pay for it at
13 Department. The funds are there. But don't ask for
14 any more than you need for this membership year. If
15 you still need 39 or 40 members to renew at your
16 Post, only ask for 39 or 40 cards. Okay?

17 And next year, we'll have these ahead of time
18 and we can get them out. But please don't ask for
19 any more than you need.

20 But get ahold of them. They will do it. Jon
21 will run them. That way we can run them. We don't
22 have to have any sitting here in excess of what we
23 need. So we can get them done, get them out to you,
24 so we can get these things going. We have 60 days
25 left to get the awards, to get there.

1 Of-the-year awards, we already talked about
2 that.

3 If anybody doesn't know, you have encumbered
4 and unencumbered. Okay?

5 And our numbers that Jon sends to you in the
6 District are a little bit different than what
7 National has, for the simple reason is 888s that end
8 in AD are counted in their report but the regular
9 888s that don't have them, which is 2019 and before,
10 don't count in National's numbers. They count in
11 ours but not theirs.

12 So, it ended up with, for the Race to the Top,
13 the 3rd District was 100.84; the 13th was 100.89;
14 6th District was 101.38; the 14th was 100.65; 4th
15 District was 101.07. Okay? That's the numbers
16 National is going to use for Race to the Top.

17 I have all your forms, those six Districts.
18 Your forms are all filled out here.

19 I just need you to come up afterwards, see me,
20 we've got to make sure it's the right address, for
21 the Commander only, the Commander of your District.
22 I'll make sure it's the right address, the right
23 phone number, and the amount of Posts that are in
24 your District. And then we can get this turned over
25 to Jon.

1 Because we have to have this in before the
2 14th. And I want John to get these out of here on
3 Monday. So we'll get these turned in and find out
4 where we stand for Race to the Top and how many are
5 going to get it.

6 But again, thank you, thank you, thank you.
7 You guys don't know what this means to me. I said I
8 could do it. I said it six years ago. And I'm
9 making Jean quota no matter what.

10 (Applause).

11 Mr. Wilson, do you have something?

12 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Thank you, Mr. 1st Vice.

13 You know, as I travel around the regions with
14 the National Vice Commanders, I'm awfully proud when
15 they come up and say, "What the hell is Ohio doing
16 to get where they're at?" And I think that's a
17 compliment to our leadership and to you.

18 And I want to recognize some people today.
19 First, I'd like to recognize someone that is a
20 50-year member of The American Legion. And if she
21 would come up here, I would appreciate it. Sharon
22 McClain.

23 A 50-year member. She was a member of The
24 American Legion eight years before I joined.

25 FROM THE FLOOR: Hear, hear.

1 (Applause).

2 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I'd like to present you
3 a National Commander's pin and a National Vice
4 Commander's coin.

5 LEGIONNAIRE MCCLAIN: Thank you very much.

6 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Thanks for your service.

7 LEGIONNAIRE MCCLAIN: It's my pleasure. Thank
8 you.

9 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Now get back to work.

10 LEGIONNAIRE MCCLAIN: All right.

11 (Applause).

12 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I also want to thank
13 some people that's done an outstanding job this year
14 to get us where we're at. I don't ever remember
15 Ohio being in first place.

16 And with that said, I'd like to present to the
17 13th District Commander and 1st Vice Commander one
18 of my coins and a National Commander's pin for being
19 in first place.

20 (Applause).

21 And to the 9th District, we all remember when
22 the 9th District didn't do as well as they did this
23 year. And it's because of these two people that
24 they have gone from the bottom to the top in one
25 year. And I would appreciate if Commander Bob (sic)

1 and Joyce would please come forward.

2 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Bill.

3 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Bill, Bill.

4 (Applause).

5 And from the 4th District, the guy who's done
6 quite a bit down there and has worked his butt off,
7 especially with 888s, Mr. Jerry Perry.

8 (Applause).

9 Did you ever think we'd have 600-and-some 888s
10 transferred into Districts? Each district. Not
11 just all of them, each of them.

12 And the ring leader of this whole thing, our
13 1st Vice Commander, Brad Teis.

14 (Applause).

15 And last but not least, it is her birthday
16 tomorrow. When I got to be a National Vice
17 Commander, I told our region, I said that if you're
18 the top 25 in the country when the Commander chooses
19 which regional Commander goes to the academies, if
20 you're in top 25, you will receive \$250 from me, out
21 of my money. If you're in the top ten, you will
22 receive \$500 from Jerry Wilson. And if you are
23 No. 1 in the country, you will receive \$1,000 from
24 JWW.

25 Madam Commander, would you come over here?

1 COMMANDER WILSON: I thought it was \$5,000. I
2 believe I heard that.

3 FROM THE FLOOR: Give her an IOU for the other
4 four.

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: We don't do IOUs. And
6 I've got the other four with me. But she's only
7 getting \$1,000.

8 There's your \$1,000, ma'am. Congratulations.

9 (Applause).

10 It's your money. You can do what you want with
11 it. You can give it to those guys if you want.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: No.

13 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Anyway, thank you all.
14 Thank you all very much for making the region, our
15 region -- we were 100th of a point out of first
16 place, 100th of a point.

17 And I wanted to go to West Point so bad, but
18 I'm getting to go to the Air Force Academy in
19 Colorado Springs for three days. So it's kind of
20 nice.

21 And by the way, if you're not doing anything
22 the 23rd or the 24th, the Oratorical contest is in
23 Indianapolis. And because the National Commander
24 can't make it, he's going to be in Alaska, they've
25 asked me to go up and monitor that. So I'll be

1 giving out the awards at that contest on the 24th of
2 this month.

3 Thank you, Commander.

4 1VC TEIS: All right, I have one more thing
5 here.

6 I get emails all the time. But just to let you
7 know how far this has gone, this is from the
8 Adjutant in Greenfield, Missouri.

9 "Mr. Teis, I want to say great work on the
10 Department stats, especially the transfers and the
11 news. Your transfers surpass the news by
12 approximately 200 percent. Your Department stands
13 out from all others that I've compared yours with.

14 "We are starting --

15 And I talked to him before about how we did the
16 3, 3, 3. They're starting a 4, 4 this year. So
17 they're working the same program.

18 -- "a resolution to challenge all Posts to
19 achieve four new members, four transfers, as a
20 minimum goal, which has worked for our Post for
21 several years.

22 "I would greatly like to chat with you on your
23 transfer program.

24 "Thank you very much again. Great job. Donald
25 Dillman, Adjutant, Greenfield, Missouri."

1 That's how far it comes.

2 (Applause).

3 One more thing: Anybody have any membership
4 cards?

5 The green lantern and red lantern will be given
6 after lunch, if anybody has any cards to turn in, so
7 we can revamp the numbers to see where we're at.

8 Anybody have any cards?

9 Go take them up to JD.

10 Thank you.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you. Thank you, Brad.
12 Great job. Great job.

13 Okay, we'll now call on our Department 2nd
14 Vice, Charles Stennis, for Post Activities and
15 Internal Affairs.

16 2VC STENNIS: Good morning.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

18 2VC STENNIS: Alrighty, let's get started with
19 Post activities.

20 The pool tournament is actually next week,
21 April 8th through 10th, at Post 29, in Zanesville.

22 If there are still -- it's actually open to the
23 public. So anybody who would want to participate,
24 the phone number is (740)452-1457.

25 And then the golf tournament will be July 30th

1 and 31st. And it will be at the Elks Run Golf Club
2 in Batavia, Ohio. For more information, contact
3 Clermont County County Commander Frank Morrow. And
4 his phone number is (513)607-7948. And that will be
5 hosted by Post 72. I forget the name of that Post,
6 but they will be hosting it.

7 FROM THE FLOOR: Stuart Luginbuhl.

8 2VC STENNIS: Yes, yes. That's your Post.

9 Outstanding, outstanding, outstanding.

10 Also, Commander, at the bowling tournament, the
11 ball check money was collected and will be donated
12 to Save A Warrior. And I just wanted to present you
13 with this check.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

15 FROM THE FLOOR: How much was it?

16 2VC STENNIS: It was 200 big ones.

17 All right.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: This is a great day for Save
19 A Warrior.

20 2VC STENNIS: Very good. Very good.

21 I also wanted to make a special note to Larry
22 Stottsberry out of the 10th District. He continues
23 to do a great job with the World War II Veterans,
24 celebrating their birthdays. And I think it's
25 imperative that we honor those who have done so many

1 great things before us, especially when this
2 generation is shrinking every single day.

3 Larry, I just want to thank you for everything
4 that you do. I just want to make sure that you are
5 mentioned during my report. Thank you and keep up
6 the good work.

7 Let's give him a round of applause, please.

8 (Applause).

9 All right, let's get on to Internal Affairs.

10 Actually, we met twice. We met at Mid-Winter.

11 And I'm not going to take a deep dive into the
12 resolutions. Because some of these resolutions the
13 DEC will be voting on today.

14 But on January 22nd, we had 11 of 14 Districts
15 that were present, including Mr. Poulton. Tom
16 Poulton was a guest.

17 And we took a look at, first we took a look at
18 Resolution 21-02. And this was a resolution that
19 would make the minimum membership requirement 15.

20 As a group, the IA Committee passed that
21 resolution, that that be passed on to the DEC.

22 The next thing that we did was that we took a
23 look at Resolution 21-09. And that resolution, if
24 Resolution 21-02 passes, would go into effect,
25 stating that each Post shall be entitled to one

1 delegate and one alternate for the first 15 members;
2 two delegates and an alternate for 60 members; and
3 an additional delegate and alternate for each 100
4 members. That resolution was passed by the IA
5 Committee to be forwarded to the DEC.

6 The next resolution was 22-01A. And this was a
7 resolution creating, in essence, creating the
8 Frederick W. Galbraith Award, which is a
9 distinguished service award.

10 One thing I do want to mention about this award
11 is it does not have to be a Legionnaire. And that's
12 what needs to be made plain and clear. It does not
13 have to be a Legionnaire.

14 And the creation of this award was passed to be
15 moved on along to the DEC.

16 The next thing that we voted on was 22-02. And
17 22-02 would have made the master plaque at
18 Department for the Frederick W. Galbraith Award and
19 for the very first member to be Art Lustig.

20 The committee will be sending that resolution
21 back because it didn't follow the parameters that
22 were stated when the award was created, in which the
23 Commander would set up a committee. We didn't feel
24 that it was correct to name this award after someone
25 and then circumvent the Commanders on how it was set

1 up.

2 We don't have a time when we ended. I have a
3 time when we started. But that was all that we took
4 care of at Mid-Winter.

5 We met again on May (sic) 17th, via GoTo
6 Meeting, and we discussed five more resolutions.

7 I do want to apologize. I believe we did make
8 some procedural errors in this.

9 Going forward, we will create something and we
10 will give it to each one of the commissioners,
11 stating the procedure in which things are supposed
12 to come to the IA Committee, and if they are
13 supposed to be passed or if we will send them back.

14 I do apologize. I take full responsibility.
15 If there were -- not if, there were. There were
16 some errors. I take responsibility for that. And
17 going forward, there will be some clarity. All
18 right?

19 That being said, Resolution 22-03, which talked
20 about strengthening the quality of civic education
21 in the State of Ohio, that resolution we passed.

22 Now the buddy check, we did not pass it as a
23 committee. But again, as I stated earlier, we
24 believe that there were some procedural issues that
25 were not followed. Hence, that resolution will be

1 in front of the DEC today.

2 All right, Resolution 22-06, which is to revise
3 The American Legion 21st Century policy on
4 education, that was passed.

5 And then also, Resolution 22-07, which is
6 emphasizing the reimbursement of National Guard
7 expenses, that was also passed.

8 we started at 6:35, and we ended at 7:06.

9 And that is the Post Activities and Internal
10 Affairs.

11 Any questions?

12 Yes, sir.

13 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
14 District Commander.

15 You stated that the meeting was held on
16 May 17th. Could it have been March 17th?

17 2VC STENNIS: March 17th, I'm sorry.

18 See, here's the problem. My birthday is May
19 16th. So I'm trying to get that as close as
20 possible.

21 I just want to let everyone know that this
22 year, unlike other years, I am accepting cash.

23 FROM THE FLOOR: Good luck.

24 2VC STENNIS: Any more questions?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 2VC STENNIS: All right, Commander.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

3 I did want to say today that I got three checks
4 for Save A Warrior, \$200 from the ball checks, a
5 \$1500 check from Mike Homan, and a \$500 check from
6 Post 707's Color Guard, and that's the second
7 donation that they've given us. So it's very much
8 appreciated and we thank you very much.

9 Okay, we will now call on Department Treasurer
10 Robert Wilson.

11 TREASURER WILSON: Good morning, everyone.

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

13 TREASURER WILSON: Okay, to bring things up to
14 date with our investment portfolio as of February,
15 we're at \$7,334,867.97.

16 If you have any questions about the investment
17 portfolio, you can address those to Eric, because
18 he's handling that as well.

19 The 2020 audit, each of you have a copy of
20 that.

21 The original copy was incorrect, in that
22 Buckeye Boys State was stated as still at Bowling
23 Green. We corrected that and that's what you see in
24 front of you, that it's at Miami of Ohio. It's been
25 there since 2017.

1 That's it for the audit.

2 I would ask that the Commander make a motion to
3 approve the 2020 audit as printed.

4 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: She can entertain one.

5 1VC TEIS: She can entertain a motion.

6 TREASURER WILSON: All right, I will entertain
7 a motion.

8 1VC TEIS: That's up to you. He's entertaining
9 a motion to accept the audit report for 2020.

10 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
11 District 1st Vice Commander, makes a motion to
12 accept.

13 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 4th
14 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds that motion.

15 1VC TEIS: Okay, I have a first and a second to
16 accept the 2020 audit.

17 Any discussion?

18 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
19 Vice, 9th District.

20 Our copy says "draft" on it.

21 TREASURER WILSON: Correct.

22 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay. So this is not
23 the final print?

24 TREASURER WILSON: Correct.

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay. And we've not

1 had time to actually review it and go over it. It's
2 not like it's a one-page set of minutes.

3 ADJUTANT HALL: That's correct.

4 So the draft came out and then went to the
5 Finance Committee for them to review it. Our
6 Treasurer, Robert Wilson, was the last to review it.
7 And then it went out, then it was approved to get to
8 you guys.

9 What happens next is, once it is approved from
10 here, then we get the final draft done. So the
11 final draft will be coming. It's just that we need
12 the draft approved so that we can get our final
13 audit from this one.

14 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: So the final version
15 will be exactly what's here, missing the word
16 "draft" on it; correct?

17 ADJUTANT HALL: That is correct.

18 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay.

19 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

1 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Nay.

2 1VC TEIS: Motion carried. Thank you.

3 TREASURER WILSON: Okay, our annual budget for
4 2022-'23, was prepared. It was reviewed by the
5 Finance Committee and it was approved by them. It
6 now goes to the DEC for final approval. That's the
7 2022-'23 annual budget.

8 Next, we've always had a challenge with our
9 audits. So the 2021 audit will be ready at our
10 Department meeting. The 2023 (sic) will be ready,
11 as we were told, by the December DEC meeting.

12 Okay, that's all I have.

13 Does anyone have any questions, concerns?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 1VC TEIS: Thank you, Robert.

16 TREASURER WILSON: Thank you.

17 1VC TEIS: Okay, well, Jean stepped out.

18 The next one, Al Buxton, Department Chaplain,
19 National Security and Religious Emphasis.

20 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Good morning, again.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Morning.

22 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Under the Chaplain's report,
23 it's been a sad year. We've lost too many members
24 of our Legion family, especially in these past two
25 months. Let us keep their families and friends in

1 our prayers.

2 If you know of anybody that's ill, please give
3 me their name and I will see that they get a card
4 from the Department.

5 On to Religious Emphasis.

6 If you missed the Four Chaplain Service at
7 Mid-Winter, you missed one heck of a program. It
8 was very well attended by a number of you. And
9 hopefully this program can continue in the future.

10 I'd like to thank Commander Jean, 1st Vice
11 Brad, 2nd Vice Charles, Assistant Chaplain Ron, and
12 the 4th District Chaplain Dick, for their
13 participation in helping me get this program started
14 and off.

15 Also, don't forget to send in your District
16 and/or Post nominations for Chaplain of the Year and
17 the Father Duffy Awards.

18 Now on to National Security.

19 National Security met March 13th, at 1:00 PM,
20 at Department Headquarters. Nine members were
21 present.

22 The Districts gave their reports of what they
23 was doing.

24 Old Business.

25 The Environmental Conservation Committee. Mike

1 Kennedy, 1st District, made a motion to absorb the
2 Environmental Conservation Committee into the
3 National Security Commission. Seconded by Bob
4 Carson. This motion was made due to the lack of
5 participation by those who were appointed to the
6 committee. The motion passed.

7 There was discussion about the POW/MIA National
8 Museum in Jacksonville, Florida, a discussion on the
9 drafting of a resolution to urge Congress to pass
10 H.R. 5297, which would establish the National
11 POW/MIA Memorial. We tabled this discussion until
12 further movement is made on the bill in Congress.

13 New Business.

14 Of-the-year awards. Of-the-year award
15 nominations are to be sent to the Districts by
16 August the first of every calendar year. The
17 Districts have until September 15th of every
18 calendar year to submit their nominations to
19 Department. Motion to accept Department dates for
20 of-the-years by Mike Kennedy. Seconded by Bob
21 Carson. Motion carried.

22 POW/MIA pins. A motion to give Department
23 Coordinator Scott Palider permission to order 250 to
24 500 more POW/MIA pins, depending on the cost, was
25 made by Bob Weiler, 3rd District. Seconded by Doug

1 Russell of the 10th. Motion carried.

2 Resolutions.

3 A National resolution on the Russian invasion
4 of Ukraine, a motion to support the resolution by
5 Bob Weiler. Seconded by John Randolph. Motion
6 carried.

7 A resolution on reimbursement of National Guard
8 expenses was presented to the commission. A motion
9 to accept the resolution was made by Doug Russell.
10 Seconded by Mike Kennedy. Motion carried.

11 Mr. Commander, I make a motion that these
12 minutes from the National Security Committee be
13 accepted.

14 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
15 District, motions that the minutes of the National
16 Security Commission be accepted as read.

17 1VC TEIS: He has the motion. You've got the
18 second?

19 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I've got the
20 second.

21 1VC TEIS: Okay.

22 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I apologize.

23 1VC TEIS: All right, on the motion to accept
24 the National Security --

25 And you did hear in there about -- the pins are

1 in there; right?

2 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Yes.

3 1VC TEIS: Okay. Is there any discussion?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

7 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 1VC TEIS: Motion carried. Thank you.

10 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Out of order,
11 Commander.

12 Jermaine Ferguson, 6th, 1st Vice Commander.

13 Did this body approve the Finance Committee
14 minutes? I know we voted to approve the draft on
15 it. But the minutes, I did not hear that.

16 1VC TEIS: The minutes have not been read yet.

17 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Is that not in the
18 Treasurer's report? Is that the Finance Committee
19 report?

20 1VC TEIS: No. The Finance Committee has their
21 own report.

22 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Sorry. Thank you.

23 1VC TEIS: Yes, sir.

24 All right, next up, Al Beyer.

25 Do you want to do it from back there, Al?

1 HISTORIAN BEYER: Commander, Commander Jean
2 Wilson, and the National Department and District
3 officers, Past Commanders, chairmen and guests, good
4 morning to you all.

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

6 HISTORIAN BEYER: One of the most historical
7 highlights of 2022 is a visit with the National
8 Commander. I've got to say it's been the best one
9 I've ever attended.

10 Thanks to you, Steve.

11 Hearing the Commander's message of "No veteran
12 left behind" and the importance of membership as he
13 visits with Legion family members of Posts in the
14 12th District, the tour of the National Veterans
15 Museum, and having some quality time with our fellow
16 National and Department officers, especially
17 Alternate NEC Steve Masowick and 2nd Vice Commander
18 Charles Stennis was truly memorable. You'll have to
19 talk to them about it.

20 Representing our Department, I visited Posts
21 and attended Legion family events around the state
22 to gather the story as it happens, as well as
23 documenting the journey of our fearless leader, Jean
24 Wilson.

25 Many of you have invited me to be there for

1 your event and to share it with others on Facebook
2 and other media. And for that I am grateful, as I
3 attend and see the good works that our Legion
4 members are providing in our communities and the
5 difference that each of you are really making.

6 As all the historians should be doing to
7 memorialize their Post events and activities, and
8 their history book and narratives, it is up to them
9 to keep those memories preserved in order that their
10 members will have an everlasting archive of how it
11 happened, what we did, why it happened, and how it
12 made us feel. The photos will tell the story of how
13 our veterans walked through the mission of The
14 American Legion.

15 The Post History Book and the Department
16 History Contest deadline is June 25th, 2022. Each
17 Post History Book submitted for judging must follow
18 the instructions as outlined in the 2021 Officer's
19 Guide and Manual of Ceremonies, in the section "Post
20 Histories," pages 124 through 133.

21 (Cell phone ringing).

22 Excuse me.

23 It may be mailed or hand delivered to me at my
24 address for judging. It's in the Department
25 Directory if you need it.

1 The best Post History Book will be submitted to
2 National for judging.

3 I would also now like to thank Assistant
4 Historian Ralph Jackson and my wife Dayna, the
5 Auxiliary Department Historian, for their
6 assistance.

7 And thank you, Commander Jean, for this
8 appointment. It's been great.

9 And God bless all of you, for God and country,
10 and your service. Thank you.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

12 All right, since Bob Klostermeier is not here,
13 I'm going to call on Jim Koppin, as he told me he
14 has a honey-do thing to do today. And he's been
15 married, happily married, for a long time. So I
16 want to keep him that way.

17 Jim Koppin, our Boys State Director.

18 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Thank you, Commander.

19 Good morning, Buckeye Boy Staters.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

21 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Oh, there's a lot more
22 answered than what are on our staff. I'll get to
23 that later.

24 The 2022 American Legion Buckeye Boys State
25 Program is being planned as we speak. The dates for

1 this year's program are June the 12th through the
2 19th. And the program will be held at Miami
3 University in Oxford, Ohio. The delegate fee will
4 remain at \$300 per delegate, and all orientation
5 dates are now set. They are on the Buckeye Boys
6 State website.

7 The American Legion Buckeye Boys State staff
8 will conduct our spring planning meeting on
9 Saturday, April the 9th, here at Department
10 Headquarters, starting at 10:00 AM. So if you have
11 nothing else to do, come on back next week.

12 I would now like to ask for the help of all the
13 members of the DEC. If The American Legion Buckeye
14 Boys State staff is to continue to plan and execute
15 the best Buckeye Boys State Program in the nation,
16 then we need to recruit more Legionnaires to fill
17 out our staff. And with all the new members that
18 Brad and the membership team have recruited, that
19 will be a big help. So all of you who answered
20 about being Buckeye Boys Staters, I have some
21 applications here (indicating), and Christie has
22 more.

23 When you go back to your District, and your
24 County, and Post meetings, please spread the word of
25 what a great program this is and how those members

1 can help out.

2 That brings me to this point of talking
3 directly to Districts 7, 8, 11 and 13. Districts 7,
4 8, and 13, only have one staff member from their
5 Districts on our staff. And District 11 has no
6 members on our staff. I'm willing to come to your
7 meetings and talk about American Legion Buckeye Boys
8 State if you would extend me an invitation.

9 During the 2021 American Legion Buckeye Boys
10 State Program, Miami University officials invited
11 myself, as Director, then President William Pennel,
12 and Chief Counselor and Consultant Grant Grace, to
13 an informational meeting to discuss the future of
14 The American Legion Buckeye Boys State Program at
15 Miami University.

16 During that meeting, the university officials
17 expressed exactly how committed they were to keeping
18 American Legion Buckeye Boys State at Miami
19 University, and they were looking forward to a
20 long-term commitment. Many ideas were exchanged
21 back and forth. And I expressed that my main
22 concern was that we could no longer afford to be at
23 Miami University.

24 Of the \$300 fee paid per delegate by each Post
25 in 2017, Miami received \$258 of that \$300. In 2018,

1 Miami got \$262.29. In 2019, it went up to 267.33.
2 2020, no program. And in 2021, Miami University
3 received \$273.89 of our \$300.

4 I'm not one to sit back and wait for things to
5 happen. So before we left Miami University last
6 year, I asked Grant Grace to come up with a contract
7 proposal so that we can present our concerns first.

8 After consulting with Christie White about the
9 amount of money we would need to be able to continue
10 to put on a program each year, we thought that if we
11 could cap the amount that we pay Miami University at
12 \$270, we would not have to raise the amount that we
13 receive from each Post, i.e. the \$300 per delegate.

14 Grant sent a contract proposal to Miami
15 University with only two conditions. No. 1 was to
16 cap the fee we pay to Miami per delegate at \$270 for
17 the length of the contract. And No. 2 was that we
18 would like a ten-year contract.

19 Within less than a week, Miami University
20 contacted Grant and accepted our proposal, with one
21 addition.

22 And for some of our trustees who are here in
23 the room, and others, this next clause raised some
24 concerns. So I'm going to read the clause that was
25 kind of a sticking point.

1 It said, "Acknowledgment of costs. The parties
2 acknowledge the university's charge of \$270 per each
3 first night attending delegate each year" -- which
4 they call a "base sum -- "does not fully cover the
5 university's cost of hosting the conference, and
6 that the university is currently subsidizing the
7 cost of the conference. Each year the university
8 shall calculate its cost for hosting the conference
9 using its normal and customary seasonal conference
10 rate charges" -- that's what the university calls
11 its "hosting cost." And that goes for all programs,
12 not just Buckeye Boys State -- "The university
13 agrees to actively support The American Legion
14 Buckeye Boys State's effort to secure additional
15 sources of funding for the conference including
16 gifts, governmental support, sponsorships and other
17 additional sources of funding, hereafter known as
18 additional revenue. Any additional revenue received
19 shall first be used to reimburse the university the
20 difference between the base sum and the hosting cost
21 for the conference. Once the university's hosting
22 costs have been fully met, American Legion Buckeye
23 Boys State shall have the sole discretion to use any
24 additional revenue for the improvement/expansion of
25 the conference or to defray the \$270 base sum."

1 Sometime around the fourth week of November,
2 2021, we attempted to have a mail-in vote to either
3 accept or object to the new contract. After there
4 were several objections or concerns to this process,
5 President Chapman scheduled a trustees meeting here
6 at Department Headquarters, held on Saturday,
7 February 19, 2022 at 11:00 AM. All trustees were
8 first e-mailed an invitation to attend and were
9 later mailed a written invitation by standard mail.
10 And finally, all who did not respond were personally
11 contacted by myself, President Chapman or Secretary
12 Weldon.

13 At the meeting, 27 trustees were present and
14 two were present by phone. Also present was Grant
15 Grace, to explain the contract proposal, and Randy
16 Thomas and Nick Miller, representing Miami
17 University, to answer any questions from the
18 trustees.

19 The new proposal was explained to those in
20 attendance, and all questions were addressed until
21 everyone was satisfied that everything was
22 explained.

23 A motion was made by George Monroe, and the
24 second was by William Pennell, to proceed with the
25 vote on the new contract. The motion passed. A

1 roll call vote was taken by Secretary Weldon, with
2 27 yes votes to accept the contract proposal and
3 zero no votes against.

4 Are there any questions about anything in my
5 report?

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

7 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Madam commander, since I am
8 not a voting member of the DEC, I ask that you call
9 for a motion to accept my report and the approval of
10 The American Legion Buckeye Boys State and Miami
11 University contract.

12 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Commander, I so move.
13 Buxton.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Al Buxton, 4th District, so
15 moved.

16 Seconded?

17 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
18 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds the motion.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Is there any discussion?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Hearing no
22 discussion, all those in favor signify by saying
23 aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

3 Thank you, Jim.

4 (Applause).

5 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Now that that little bit of
6 business is out of the way, we will go ahead.
7 Christie will have the contract drawn up and legally
8 signed by the Adjutant, myself, probably the
9 Department Commander. And then it will be sent on
10 to Miami University for their signature.

11 Like I said, I am working on getting some new
12 members. I'm really interested in a gentleman from
13 Painesville right now. If the Commander and the 1st
14 Vice Commander would explain to him how easy it is
15 to come to Boys State and still perform your other
16 duties, I would appreciate that.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: It's pretty easy.

18 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: I'm not going to mention any
19 names.

20 Thank you.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Jim, we'd like to thank you
22 for all your hard work, and the committee's hard
23 work, in getting this contract nailed down. I know
24 it took a lot of time and effort. And, you know,
25 with you guys getting this nailed down for us, it

1 doesn't look like we're going to have to increase
2 our Buckeye Boys State fees anytime soon. And
3 that's really important for Posts that, you know,
4 are struggling to come up with \$300 to send a boy.
5 So we appreciate it very much.

6 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: That committee that's going
7 to explore outside funding is to be made up of three
8 people from Miami University, and the three people
9 from the trustees are going to be Chris Ballard,
10 from the 6th District; Roger Wiant, he's one of our
11 trustees from the 14th District; and also Jeff
12 Jordan, he is a consultant. They will be our
13 representatives for that board.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm sure they'll do an
15 excellent job.

16 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Thank you, Commander.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

18 And see, I kept you in check with your wife.

19 DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Yeah, she will be happy.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: So we now call on Alternate
21 NEC Steve.

22 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: It only took me four
23 years to get here.

24 Madam President, thank you. Vice Commander
25 Wilson.

1 The only thing we have to talk about here today
2 is Jill, who was with the Americanism Committee, has
3 retired. And in her place, Ron Neff is going to
4 move from Internal Affairs to Americanism. The only
5 problem with that is he's a Marine. We'll see how
6 that works.

7 Before I go, I'd like to say one thing. I got
8 to go on the A&G Test trip. I got to go with Jerry
9 White, who laid the foundation for it many years
10 ago, and Christie. And I always said I was going to
11 make a report card on how they did. Well, it's kind
12 of hard. They both did a great job. Jerry laid the
13 foundation.

14 Christie, you were thinking on your feet.
15 Excellent job.

16 Those kids were grateful. I'm grateful. I
17 have never been on a better trip than I had this
18 last one out.

19 Other than the circumstances they had, remember
20 the truck drivers were on strike in Canada? Well
21 they decided to move over to Christie's area and do
22 it in Washington D.C. So a lot of the places that
23 we wanted to go to were closed. But she did well.
24 We got to see a lot of things that we did get a
25 chance to see.

1 And I'd just like to thank you, Christie, for
2 the opportunity to go on that trip.

3 (Applause).

4 COMMANDER WILSON: And don't forget to thank
5 your wife.

6 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Oh, yeah. If she
7 didn't get to go as 1st Vice Commander or President,
8 I wouldn't have had the opportunity to go.

9 So, thank you, Cindy.

10 In closing, I'm going to be seeing Bob
11 Klostermeier on Tuesday. I'm going to run up. Does
12 the Department have a card we could sign today so I
13 could take it up with me? Is there one in the
14 building?

15 ADJUTANT HALL: I'm sure we can get one. We'll
16 get it taken care of.

17 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: All right. Maybe
18 after lunch we can send it around and have it signed
19 and I'll take it to him.

20 Thank you.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

22 We'll next call on our Department Judge
23 Advocate, Bob Ray.

24 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you, Commander.

25 At our August meeting, I mentioned the fact

1 that we've had changes to the National Constitution,
2 and also to our constitution. And therefore, all
3 constitutions at all levels needed to be updated.
4 And that's been a long and winding process.

5 It wasn't a month into the year I got a
6 constitution from a Post and I went through it. And
7 on the very first page they had the eligibility
8 dates wrong. So I called the gentleman and said
9 that. And he says, "That's what's in your
10 constitution." And sure enough, it is. The first
11 page of ours still has the old eligibility dates.

12 And several other instances like that have come
13 up. So I spoke to Commander Jean and I said I
14 believe that our constitution needs a full, front to
15 back, page revision done, revision and approval, for
16 this coming convention. And she authorized me to
17 form an ad hoc committee, and that's what I've done.

18 We will work on it. We will have a draft that
19 will be sent out to everybody to look at and see if
20 they agree or not. And then it will be presented to
21 the Constitution and Bylaws Committee at the
22 convention for approval.

23 This is something that, I went back, and it
24 hadn't been done for decades, a cover-to-cover
25 revision. So we felt this time it was necessary.

1 So that is going to be forthcoming down the
2 road. And we'll all get a, like I say, we'll get a
3 draft that you can look through.

4 And hopefully we'll get everything. Every now
5 and then somebody catches something. One guy said
6 you got "Chaplain" spelled wrong on one page and I
7 guess I never noticed that. We've got spellcheck
8 now on most of our computers, so that shouldn't be a
9 problem.

10 The other item on my talk there is the
11 resolution. It's passed out for information
12 purposes only. It's something that we need to do.
13 It's a conflict of interest resolution.

14 But again, speaking to the Commander, and also
15 getting some advice from the National Commander's
16 office, it is something where we need to develop a
17 policy, not just a resolution. So a policy will be
18 forthcoming, before our Department Convention, that
19 we can approve for a conflict of interest policy.

20 And the resolution just covers members of the
21 DEC. But actually, it needs to cover all the
22 officers, employees, volunteers, anybody that deals
23 with any part of our organization and could have a
24 possible conflict of interest.

25 National's actually got a form that you have to

1 fill out and sign. And we probably will come up
2 with something like that too.

3 But it's in the forming stages. So, therefore,
4 I just recommend that this be received for
5 information purposes only. And there will be more
6 time between now and the Department Convention.

7 Commander, that's my report, unless there's any
8 questions.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I thank you.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, thank you, Bob.

12 Mr. Hartman, do you have anything to say?

13 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: I just have a couple
14 of things to bring up that you can take back to your
15 Districts.

16 As Bob mentioned here, the constitution and
17 bylaws, I would ask to say, by hand vote, how many
18 of you have updated your constitution and bylaws
19 within the last five years?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

21 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: Not a whole lot. So
22 that's something that you really need to look into,
23 not only at the District level, but at the Post
24 level also.

25 Well, so it's that time of year again when the

1 Post Inspections should be turned in already. CPR
2 reports are due. And also your certification of the
3 new officers are going to be coming, and Post
4 elections. So make sure you take that back and get
5 your Posts to get that information put in.

6 With that, Ms. Commander, and members of the
7 DEC, that's all I have, unless anybody has any
8 questions.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: Thank you.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, thank you, Mr.
12 Hartman.

13 We'll turn to our Adjutant, Eric Hall.

14 ADJUTANT HALL: Thank you, Commander.

15 Mine is going to be short, because I'll be
16 talking with you a little bit later, after lunch.

17 Just remember that the mileage reimbursement
18 forms, make sure you guys get those filled out and
19 get those back to Becky. If you get them filled out
20 today, that would be great.

21 And then the other thing is, again, thank you
22 guys for coming out today for this meeting. Thank
23 you for your time on a Saturday to be out here as
24 well.

25 Just one other thing.

1 For our luncheon today, I just want to let you
2 guys know that our luncheon is sponsored by one of
3 our partners, NewCom Resources. They are an IT
4 communication group that we use. So they are the
5 ones who are providing our lunch for today.

6 But again, I'll be speaking a little bit later.
7 So that's all I have.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, now we're going
9 to move on to committee and commissions reports.
10 Americanism, Christie.

11 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
12 District. I was asked to give the Americanism
13 report, since I'm on the commission.

14 Just to run over it briefly, we went
15 over Educator of the Year. With the dates changing
16 everything to Mid-Winter, we were looking to have
17 the packets being submitted from the Districts by
18 the first weekend of October, the first or second
19 weekend of the fall meetings. And then we need to
20 have them submitted to Department by September 15th,
21 for the commission to vote on them.

22 The second subject that we discussed was Eagle
23 Scout of the Year. We only had one submitted. It
24 was an Eagle Scout who the project up front with the
25 retired flags, Tyler Pokorney. I'm sorry if I

1 butchered his name.

2 Those two motions did pass.

3 Other than that, that was about it for
4 discussion.

5 Do we need a motion for my report?

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Uh-huh.

7 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: All right. Since I'm
8 a standing member of the committee, I do make a
9 motion to accept the Americanism report.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion made.

11 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
12 District, seconds.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Richard Wright, 13th
14 District, seconds.

15 Is there any discussion?

16 Yes, Joyce.

17 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: You know there is.

18 Joyce Hannum, 1st Vice, 9th District.

19 On the members present, Charlie Stennis was the
20 alternate. He was representing Bill Dittebrand, who
21 couldn't be there. So this needs to be changed on
22 the front page.

23 And a question on the Eagle Scout of the Year.

24 Was that submitted by a Post? There was someone
25 saying that it has to be submitted by a Post.

1 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: That I'm not 100
2 percent sure of. Unfortunately, I was running late
3 that morning because I was just getting off my
4 24-hour shift.

5 Do we know who submitted that?

6 COMMANDER WILSON: There's Miss Christie.

7 COORDINATOR WHITE: Christie White, Americanism
8 and Children and Youth Coordinator.

9 That Eagle Scout of the Year was not actually
10 submitted to National. He did not get his paperwork
11 to us in time. So that was not submitted. The
12 commission voted to have the Department sent that in
13 to National as a Department Eagle Scout of the Year.
14 However, he did get us his paperwork in time.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Any other questions?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, okay, John,
18 thank you.

19 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: We have to vote.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, he didn't qualify.

21 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: Well, we still have a
22 motion in the minutes to accept because we did
23 change the Educator of the Year timeframe.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. All those in favor
25 signify by saying aye.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

5 Okay, we now have Marv on Baseball.

6 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Good morning, Commander.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Morning.

8 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: How are you?

9 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm great.

10 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: All you folks up there at
11 the big table, DEC guys, and ladies, and
12 distinguished guests, this is my short report.

13 You have my minutes of our February 20 meeting.
14 So you can follow along, or I'll just give you some
15 highlights of it.

16 As of this time, of the 16 total members of our
17 Baseball Commission, 12 were there, attended. Two
18 were excused.

19 Okay, right now we have 34 teams registered, as
20 of 4/1/22, for baseball. And I'm looking to get,
21 hopefully, 50. My goal was 60.

22 We have 50, or I have 50, background and adult
23 training things that I have approved. And we are
24 using the PYS, Protect Youth Sports. The same one
25 people go in to get their background check for our

1 baseball program.

2 All I have to do is, when I check and see when
3 their name comes up, I go in and look at their
4 background check. And if it's good enough for me to
5 approve, I approve it. At that time, I click on a
6 link and PYS sends them a link to do the adult
7 training awareness program, a far better program
8 than the one we used before.

9 They must pass a test. It's a little tough.
10 It's a little bit different. You couldn't fail the
11 other one. Plus, this is far easier on me
12 administrative-wise. All they have to do is take
13 the test and click submit. They don't have to do
14 anything else. They'll send them their score. They
15 send me their score.

16 And they have a site on our particular baseball
17 site for the PYS. And I can look at every one of
18 them and see if they're pending, if they're
19 completed.

20 So, at the time, we have about 30, I think,
21 approved with all trainings.

22 I'm having a little difficulty with some teams
23 because they didn't attend our meeting. And
24 therefore, they didn't look or they weren't informed
25 by the commission or a District Chairman. So these

1 teams and the team managers weren't informed that
2 this is the only adult training awareness program
3 that we're going to accept. So if you have any
4 connection to baseball, tell them, inform them. If
5 they don't understand how to get to it, they can
6 call me. I'll help them out.

7 Okay, the first day of the Department
8 tournament lineup is in your minutes. So I don't
9 need to go over that.

10 The dates of the junior and senior Department
11 tournaments on Beavers Field in Lancaster, Ohio is
12 in your minutes.

13 And we did not increase team fees this year.
14 But we're going to take a hard look at it throughout
15 the season and try to come up with some kind of a
16 fundraiser, in addition to the license plate thing.
17 Because that probably won't generate any funds until
18 probably next year.

19 Correct?

20 FROM THE FLOOR: Correct.

21 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Okay. All right, so
22 we'll get with Christie and we'll work on that.

23 And I wanted to, there's a -- you can get this
24 sheet (indicating). You go on the National Baseball
25 site and click on "resources." It is an age

1 eligibility chart that pinpoints it down to the day.
2 Our ages for baseball in The American Legion is
3 January 1 through December 31. And it tells you
4 what classes and what levels they can play under.
5 So there's no gray area here. I like this.

6 And there's one little thing here I wanted to
7 tell you, a new change this year from the National.
8 The number of the students that the schools, the
9 teams can get from schools, or a school or a number
10 of schools, has increased to 7500. That's boys in
11 the 10th, 11th and 12th grade. So that's increased
12 considerable.

13 It helps out teams recruiting. But sometimes
14 they get some of these smaller schools and pretty
15 soon it looks like, wow, we're right up against it.
16 We can't go over the number. Well this way it will
17 help, in my opinion, more of the smaller schools
18 than it will the larger ones. The teams that have,
19 the Cincinnati's, that's a sure thing. You know,
20 they take one school and probably fill it up. So
21 that's just an example. And I think it will work
22 very well and maybe help us increase our program.

23 So, like I said, I'm looking to get 60 teams.
24 It would be nice, but it's tough. Posts don't have
25 a lot of money. So they're having to go outside to

1 get fundraising.

2 So if you have any questions from your Posts
3 that you can't answer, just tell them to give me a
4 call. That's what I'm getting paid for.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: You didn't get your check?

6 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: No, I didn't get my
7 check.

8 That's it. Any questions, gentlemen?

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Anybody got any questions?

10 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I do.

11 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Yes.

12 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
13 District.

14 What is the cost to sponsor a team?

15 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: I'm glad you asked that.

16 It's \$500 for a junior team, 600 for a senior
17 team. That includes your liability and medical
18 insurance, your registration fee here, your
19 registration fee at National, and your insurance.
20 So, a pretty good deal.

21 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay, 500 for
22 juniors, 600 for seniors.

23 Okay, and then my other question is: What does
24 the youth, do they contribute to this as well, our
25 team members?

1 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: That's entirely up to the
2 Post.

3 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

4 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Some Posts do, some
5 don't. Some can handle the cost, some can't.
6 That's the way it's been handled since I've been in
7 baseball.

8 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Does anyone else have any
10 questions? Now is a good time to ask, since he's
11 standing here.

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

13 CMTE CHRMN SHAMHART: Thank you gentlemen,
14 ladies.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, thank you, Marv.

16 Okay, we now have Jason Rue on Bowling. I
17 don't think John Looker is here.

18 Christie, did you have anything for Oratorical?

19 COORDINATOR WHITE: I just have an update on
20 the winners.

21 Christie White, Americanism and Youth
22 Coordinator. I just have an update on the winners.

23 The Oratorical Commission met at Mid-Winter.
24 The only purpose for the meeting is to plan the
25 Department Oratorical Contest.

1 The contest was held on Sunday, March 6th.

2 The first place winner was Mercy Persing, from
3 District 4. Second place was Mary Betterson from
4 District 6. Third place was Emily Schutte, from
5 District 3. Fourth, Ben Saunders, from District
6 one. Fifth was Tyler Rowan, from District 2. Sixth
7 place was Georgetta Wright, from District 12.

8 And as National Vice Wilson has stated, the
9 National finals will be in Indianapolis, April 22nd
10 through the 24th.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, thank you, Miss
12 Christie.

13 Okay, Jason Rue, now you're up.

14 CMSN CHRMN RUE: The Bowling Commission met
15 Wednesday, March 16th, hear at Department. The
16 meeting was called to order at 3:45. Roll call was
17 made. Three out of five members were present.

18 The chairman, Jason Rue, stated that the
19 bowling tournament went well. There were no major
20 issues. And we are still waiting on results from
21 the bowling alley.

22 Well, they came in. Peggy has the winners
23 calculated and we're putting them in a spreadsheet.
24 We did that.

25 New business.

1 Peggy made a motion to purchase a Compute
2 Bowling program to help track our bowlers from year
3 to year. The motion passed.

4 Ron made a motion to pay out the top ten
5 places. The motion passed.

6 The top ten places were for team, doubles,
7 individual, and then the overall through all nine
8 games.

9 A motion was made to take Terry Kaufman off the
10 Bowling Commission because he was hard to get ahold
11 of and he does not have access to a computer. That
12 motion was passed.

13 Ron made a motion to make Peggy the Chairperson
14 for 2023 Bowling Tournament. That motion passed.

15 A motion was made for a 300-game plaque to be
16 made and held here at Department. The motion
17 passed.

18 Under good of The Legion, there was nothing to
19 report.

20 I dismissed the meeting at 5:15, I think it
21 was.

22 That's my report, Commander.

23 Because of the money in here, I would entertain
24 a motion to accept this report.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion to accept

1 the bowling report. Is there a second?

2 CMSN CHRMN RUE: No, I can't make the motion.

3 1VC TEIS: He can't make the motion.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm sorry. You're not on
5 the DEC.

6 Go ahead, Richard.

7 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
8 District, motions that we accept the report as read.

9 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
10 District Commander, seconds.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Now we have a proper first
12 and second.

13 Is there any discussion or does anyone have any
14 questions?

15 1VC TEIS: Commander, 1st Vice Brad Teis.

16 I believe, I don't think you can vote in your
17 commissioner, because I believe that's my
18 appointment for next year. It's the Commander's
19 appointment.

20 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: There wasn't anybody
21 voted in, it was just out.

22 1VC TEIS: He just said Peggy.

23 CMSN CHRMN RUE: No, I did say Peggy was voted
24 in for chairperson. Strike that from the minutes
25 then?

1 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, so we will have a
2 motion and a second to accept the report minus the
3 chairperson.

4 Is there any other discussion?

5 JD?

6 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick,
7 Alternate NEC, part of the Bowling Commission.

8 Isn't she going to be the chairperson because
9 she's going to be from that area? That's how we
10 normally do it.

11 1VC TEIS: That's not her District.

12 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Oh, okay.

13 1VC TEIS: Zanesville is not her District.

14 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay. Normally we
15 just take the closest person to that bowling alley.

16 1VC TEIS: Correct.

17 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: So, yeah, very good.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Jerry Perry.

19 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 1st Vice,
20 4th District.

21 When is that spreadsheet going to come out so
22 we know how many teams at Post 72 won the bowling
23 tournament?

24 1VC TEIS: Whatever.

25 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: It's on the website.

1 1VC TEIS: It's already on the website.

2 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I don't think there's
3 anyone from 72, Jerry. But it is on the website.

4 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: You're killing me.

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: It's already on the
6 website.

7 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yeah, it's on the
8 website. Jon put it on the website.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Well it might be on the
10 website, but I thought we would have a report here.

11 ASST ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I could print it out.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Well that would be nice.
13 Now everybody knows that it's on the website.

14 CMSN CHR MN RUE: Commander, I will say that
15 last year we made out the top six. This year we
16 made out the top ten, to increase the money payouts.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. I just think if we
18 could have one printed and then we could just read
19 it. There are people who continually ask me if they
20 won any money or not. And I did not know it was
21 posted on the website.

22 Okay, we'll move on. Andy Atkins --

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: The vote.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Sorry about that. We've
25 still got to vote.

1 All those in favor.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

6 CMSN CHRMN RUE: Do you want me to give the
7 Scholarship Committee report while I'm up here,
8 Commander?

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

10 CMTE CHRMN RUE: So, currently we have 14
11 scholarship applications turned in to Department for
12 our scholarship program.

13 We have not had a meeting yet to finalize that
14 because they still have up until the 15th, on some
15 of them, to get in. So after that day, well
16 probably around the beginning of May, we will have a
17 meeting to go over and award the scholarships.

18 1VC TEIS: Does Christie have that date?
19 Usually we have a date.

20 CMTE CHRMN RUE: For the meeting itself?

21 1VC TEIS: Yeah.

22 CMTE CHRMN RUE: I don't think we've set a date
23 yet for it.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: I don't think it's been set
25 yet.

1 Christie, has that date been set yet for the
2 Scholarship meeting?

3 COORDINATOR WHITE: No, ma'am, not yet.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. We'll be doing it
5 shortly.

6 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes, ma'am.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

8 CMTE CHRMN RUE: That's my report, Commander.
9 Thank you.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, thank you.
11 Andy Atkins.

12 CMSN CHRMN ATKINS: Commander, distinguished
13 members of the Executive Committee.

14 We had a meeting on March 13th, and opened the
15 meeting properly. Everything was done according to
16 the way we open meetings.

17 And there was ten members present. Three
18 members were excused because there was conferences
19 and stuff going on.

20 So then, of course, Christie White was there.
21 She's always there.

22 And we had the reading of the previous minutes,
23 which were approved.

24 Under unfinished business, Robin Johnson, she's
25 the 8th District Chairman, brought up that she could

1 get some quotes for T-shirts in her area.

2 The committee still wants to get T-shirts. But
3 we had a real downfall for two years there.
4 Everything was really way above what we could
5 afford. So we're still going to try to get those.
6 Everybody is supposed to be going back to get some
7 quotes.

8 And what they will look like, they've made up a
9 picture of a pin that we sold in the past, you know.
10 So we'll put that on the back. And everybody's on
11 for Children and Youth, so the Sons, The Legion, the
12 Auxiliary, and the Riders. So all of them will be
13 on the front. So we'll see how it goes.

14 And we had a motion by one guy that if we don't
15 get any quotes then we are going to table this, or
16 not table it again, we're going to drop it and go to
17 something else. So we need to make some, maybe get
18 some quotes and make some decisions at the standing
19 committee meeting.

20 Also, they brought up other ways of making some
21 money for the Children and Youth. One suggested
22 maybe having a silent auction at the Department
23 Convention and the other one was a gun raffle.

24 We kicked that around a little bit because of
25 our Children and Youth. But gun raffles really go

1 well. And so we are going to get some folks out
2 there to see if we can do a gun raffle and raise
3 money.

4 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
5 Vice, 9th District.

6 I don't want to rain on your parade, but a gun
7 raffle for Children and Youth just doesn't sound
8 good. You know, children can't be involved with it.
9 If it's something like a barbecue grill or lawn
10 furniture or something that might be a little bit
11 better than a gun raffle for Children and Youth.

12 CMSN CHRMN ATKINS: Well, that's kind of what
13 was brought up.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: John Life.

15 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
16 District 1st Vice Commander, also a member of that
17 committee.

18 The reason why it was brought up, the raffle, I
19 understand your concerns, but at the same time, the
20 youth are actually into hunting. There are hunting
21 courses strictly dedicated to youth. You can be up
22 to a certain age. After that, you cannot be a part
23 of it.

24 There are shooting competitions that The Legion
25 itself sponsors across the nation. And this, I

1 think we're only talking about a .22, which most of
2 the .22s are used for shooting competitions only.

3 CMSN CHRMN ATKINS: Thank you.

4 So that was about the gun raffle. And I still
5 think that, you know, we're going to do that, unless
6 this body says they don't want us to. We would like
7 to have a gun to raffle off the Department
8 Convention. So we'll see how that goes.

9 Child Welfare Worker of the Year, that needs to
10 be in by, the deadline is August 1st for them to get
11 that turned in. There's nomination packets out
12 there. If you don't have one, we can get you one.
13 Christie put them back there.

14 You know, there's social workers and other
15 people who do an awful lot for this Legion. And
16 we're lucky if we get one, one person to, you know,
17 to judge. So we should have, you know, we should
18 have 14, at least, one from each District. I mean
19 there's just an awful lot of good for this.

20 Okay, the last statement that, well, I guess it
21 isn't the last, but one thing that was brought up,
22 and it's been brought up the last couple of
23 meetings, is about children's suicide.

24 We've tried to find some brochures on that.
25 It's hard to find. There's not much out there on

1 Children and Youth. National doesn't have any. And
2 they gave us some sites to go to, but I don't think
3 that's good enough. So we're talking about getting
4 some facts and figures together, and suggestions for
5 us to have our own, create our own brochure.

6 It's a touchy subject, there's no doubt. And
7 I'm talking with a couple of social workers and they
8 said there needs to be something out there because
9 children need to know about it. It isn't like
10 you're sheltering them by telling them, you know,
11 information. You're just telling them the right
12 places to go if they have these feelings.

13 So that was about it for that committee.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, you've heard the
15 Children and Youth report. Do we have a motion to
16 accept?

17 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
18 District, motions that we accept the report as read.

19 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
20 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds the motion.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: You heard the motion. Is
22 there any discussion?

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
25 favor signify by saying aye.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

5 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Commander, may I have a
6 moment?

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Uh-huh.

8 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: I didn't mean to walk away
9 too quick.

10 My Post and that, when my wife passed away,
11 Children and Youth was her heart. So I've got a \$50
12 donation Thursday night at our bingo. And the lady
13 said, "Do with it what you want." So here's an
14 extra \$50 to add on to that, I think it was \$745
15 that we got.

16 (Applause).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, thank you, Al.

18 All right, is Harold here, Harold Savage?

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Eric will give the
21 report.

22 ADJUTANT HALL: Okay. The Department Finance
23 Committee meeting was held on March 23rd of this
24 year. And we had Harold Savage do the call to
25 order, the chairperson, and led the Pledge of

1 Allegiance. And Charles Stennis did the invocation.

2 Commander Wilson, Treasurer Robert Wilson,
3 Finance Chairman Harold Savage, Jose Rivera, and
4 Holly Lewis were the present members.

5 The guests, we had Nancy Saum, from Rea &
6 Associates; Blake Farmer, from our Advisory
7 Partners; Charles Stennis, 2nd Vice Commander;
8 myself; and Becky Corbin, our Fiscal Secretary.

9 Jose Rivera also made a motion to accept the
10 previous minutes as printed. And it was seconded by
11 Holly Lewis.

12 We had an update from Nancy, from Rea &
13 Associates, about Moloney & Novotny.

14 I stated that the goal for the 2020-2021 audit
15 is to be completed by Department Convention in July,
16 for the DEC, for the outgoing. And then the
17 committee agreed to review the audit over the next
18 few days and have an e-mail vote for March 28th.

19 And then Nancy explained that the letters from
20 the IRS stating that there was a late fee for the
21 990s is something that she will work out with
22 Moloney & Novotny.

23 The reason that we got a bill from the IRS in
24 reference to that is because we had to mail all the
25 documents in because we changed our year end. So

1 there is documentation that supports it, that shows
2 that that fee will be waived, that we will not be
3 having to pay that amount for the 990s being filed
4 late because we did file it on time.

5 One of the things discussed was Quickbooks.
6 Harold Savage had concerns regarding the P&L and how
7 items and monies were recorded. Nancy explained to
8 the committee how items are categorized, that the
9 Ohio Life monies are taken from the endowment and
10 not listed as an expense. Nancy and Ben Antonelli,
11 Rea & Associates, will continue to work on the
12 breakout of information for the areas.

13 Blake Farmer, from our TSG Advice Partners, on
14 the portfolio, discussed the current economic
15 environment, and what is creating the volatility
16 that we are currently seeing in the markets.
17 Corporate earnings have been good and the economy is
18 growing. However, there is high inflation due to
19 the choppy recovery of the global economy from
20 COVID. The Federal Reserve has started raising
21 interest rates to combat inflation, which has caused
22 the markets to be choppy. They are a bit concerned
23 by the Fed tightening policies too aggressively.
24 Russia has attacked the Ukraine as well, which is
25 adding to the uncertainty. He is continuing to

1 monitor the situation and make the adjustments as
2 needed.

3 We have not lost any monies in reference to our
4 investments. It does go up and down in the daily
5 market, but it has increased at the year end each
6 year.

7 We had some unfurnished business.

8 Currently, we are standing at 59 percent of the
9 Posts for ACH, to receive their Post monies due to
10 the Post regarding membership credits. When post
11 Credit checks are sent out, a new forms are included
12 to encourage them to sign up.

13 One of the things that we are asking is that,
14 that you can take back to the Posts, is that each
15 Post does sign up for ACH, because then the Post
16 credits are automatically deposited to the account.
17 And then we do not have the amount of outstanding
18 checks that have not been cashed when they get sent
19 out to the Posts.

20 License plates to raise money for the Baseball
21 program is still being addressed. Holly reported
22 that enough signatures were collected to get to work
23 on the next step of the process.

24 Going on the new business, Harold Savage
25 provided a copy of the new budget for '22-'23.

1 In a decision on the new budget, the line item
2 for staff pay increased 6.5 percent for a pay
3 increase and a cost of living increase.

4 The Department Service Officer staffs will have
5 their income taken out of the monies from the State
6 of Ohio appropriations.

7 And the Finance Committee and myself had a
8 lengthy discussion. The following motions were
9 made:

10 Holly Lewis motioned to give the Department
11 Service Officers' staff a 6.5 percent pay increase,
12 retroactive to January 1st. It was seconded by Jose
13 Rivera.

14 Holly Lewis made a motion to give a 3 percent
15 cost of living raise for the Department Staff,
16 retroactive to January 1st. Seconded by Jose
17 Rivera.

18 Holly Lewis then made the motion for the
19 bonuses from the fiscal year '21-'22 surplus to the
20 Department staff based on their performance. And
21 seconded by Jose Rivera.

22 Member Jose Rivera motioned that the '22-'23
23 budget be for the DEC approval. And seconded by
24 Holly Lewis.

25 Harold Savage also asked if a finance officer

1 would be hired in the future. Commander Wilson
2 stated that it is better to have an outside person
3 to keep the books. Commander Wilson also asked that
4 we table this to another time.

5 Myself proposed an increase in the mileage
6 reimbursement to go from 35 cents to 45 cents, due
7 to the cost of gas and expenses.

8 Treasurer Robert Wilson made a motion to
9 increase the mileage reimbursement to 45 cents per
10 mile, and to make the effective start date the
11 '22-'23 fiscal year. And it was seconded by Jose
12 Rivera.

13 The Finance Committee was asked by the
14 Americanism Committee to cover the costs, upfront,
15 for the Americanism Pins, with the monies being
16 recouped by the selling of the pins. Jose Rivera
17 made the motion to have the Department cover the
18 cost of the Americanism pins at the
19 one-and-one-quarter-inch size at \$4,960, with
20 shipping. Treasurer Robert Wilson seconded it.

21 The good of The Legion, we have that the next
22 conference call will be held Wednesday, May 11th,
23 2022, at 6:00 PM.

24 I gave the benediction and we saluted the
25 colors.

1 I am not a voting member of this committee.

2 So --

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Richard Wright.

4 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
5 District, motions to accept the report as read.

6 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
7 District Commander, seconds.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Questions?

9 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
10 District 1st Vice Commander, out of curiosity, the
11 report stated the Department staff was looking to
12 get a 6.5 increase, yet, for some reason, only the
13 DSOs got it. And the Department Headquarters' staff
14 only gets a 3 percent increase. Is there a reason
15 why there's a difference?

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

17 2VC STENNIS: Year before last, the Ohio
18 Department of Veterans Affairs increased the grant
19 from 320,000 to 400,000, to the Department of Ohio.
20 That's how that 6.5 would be covered.

21 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: One more thing to add
22 to that, because, if I remember right, when I've
23 seen the budget before, it was already approved for
24 a 5 percent increase for the Department staff.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, there was. There was

1 that in there.

2 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: So if there was
3 already a 5 percent increase, why do they only get
4 3?

5 1VC TEIS: Brad Teis, 1st Vice.

6 If you listen to the way that was reported,
7 they're going to get a 3 percent cost of living
8 raise. The other increase will be decided by him
9 (indicating), everything, after they go through
10 their --

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Review.

12 1VC TEIS: -- a review.

13 And that doesn't mean they're going to get the
14 whole other 3-and-a-half percent.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Joyce.

16 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
17 Vice, 9th District.

18 A silly question here. On your last page we
19 had the motion to cover the cost of the Americanism
20 pins. It didn't say whether you actually voted on
21 it or not. That just needs to be added to the
22 minutes. Did you drop it or did you vote on it?

23 ADJUTANT HALL: It was voted and passed. Sorry
24 about that.

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: You just need to add

1 "Motion passed."

2 ADJUTANT HALL: Correct. Thank you.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: Jermaine.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Thank you,
5 Commander.

6 Jermaine Ferguson, 1st Vice, District 6.

7 It says that the motion passed, motion to pass
8 the '22-'23 budget for DEC approval. Knowing that
9 the end of the fiscal year is June 30th, when does
10 this body approve the budget?

11 1VC TEIS: The next DEC meeting.

12 ADJUTANT HALL: The next DEC. It will be done
13 at the next DEC, which will be done for the DEC that
14 is outgoing. That will have to be voted on. So it
15 would be the one on that Friday (sic).

16 FROM THE FLOOR: Thursday.

17 ADJUTANT HALL: Or Thursday, I'm sorry.

18 FROM THE FLOOR: June 30th.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Any other questions,
20 concerns? Speak up now.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
23 favor signify by saying aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Nay.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

3 Okay, I believe Ken is here but Scott is going
4 to give his report. Ken is coming back from Africa.

5 FROM THE FLOOR: Tomorrow.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Tomorrow.

7 COORDINATOR PALIDER: I will read the
8 Legislative minutes today.

9 Our Legislative Commission happened on
10 March 13th, at 9:00 AM. It was called to order at
11 9:12. We had seven out of 13 members present.

12 Our guests included the Commander, Brad and
13 Adjutant, for their opening remarks.

14 Old business.

15 The American Legion License Plate update.
16 There are two state representatives working together
17 to introduce a bill that would create The American
18 Legion License Plate. Those two representatives are
19 Representative Lanese, out of District 23, and
20 Representative Richardson, out of District 86.

21 A legislative update.

22 A motion was made to support Senate Bill 250,
23 which is to designate US-20, in Ohio, as "Ohio Medal
24 of Honor Highway," and House Bill 415, which is
25 shortening the amount of time for active duty

1 military to receive in-state tuition. Jermaine
2 Ferguson of the 6th District made the motion to
3 accept. Holly Lewis seconded. The motion was
4 carried.

5 A motion was made to send a letter of support
6 to Senator Portman and Senator Brown, to support the
7 Honoring Our Pact Act of 2021 bill. This bill is
8 burn pit recognition. It gets the ball rolling on
9 that. And that was a motion made by Jermaine
10 Ferguson. It was seconded by Jason Rue.

11 Next is the Legislator of the Year Award.

12 A motion made by Jermaine Ferguson to nominate
13 State Rep. Adam Miller as State Legislator of the
14 Year. And I will submit a resolution to the DEC if
15 approved. This was seconded by Tim Shaw of the 2ns
16 District.

17 Next we discussed having former Congressman
18 Steve Stivers as the Legislator of the Year for the
19 congressional delegation, as he left Congress in the
20 middle of his term to go on the Ohio Chamber of
21 Commerce. The reason for this nomination was
22 because of his work on the Legion-supported Paws
23 Act, which he helped to pass in Congress. That
24 discussion was tabled.

25 We discussed three resolutions which we will be

1 discussing today.

2 There's 22-03, which is the original civics
3 resolution from the Americanism Commission that the
4 DEC sent to IA, or sent to the Legislative
5 Commission and then was sent to IA. That was
6 amended and approved.

7 There's the state buddy check resolution, which
8 we had kind of a little hiccup on that process, but
9 that was approved and sent to this body.

10 And then the resolution to the National
11 Americanism Commission, which is 22-06. The motion
12 was made by Dennis Teynor out of the 5th, and
13 supported by Holly Lewis out of the 10th.

14 Now, under the good of The Legion, we discussed
15 the current redistricting issue in the state. It's
16 still going on. It's six months overdue. The
17 primary may get moved. Some of us don't even know
18 who we're going to be voting for because we don't
19 know who will be included in our elections, myself
20 included. I don't know what congressional district
21 I'm currently in.

22 And then we discussed the Legislator of the
23 Year guidelines being changed to include a Civil
24 Servant of the Year Award. The commission is
25 looking to change the state legislator award to only

1 being a state level legislator award.

2 The current, the way the current guidelines are
3 set up is the state-level award can go to a county
4 commissioner, any county position, because it is
5 technically for the state.

6 What we're looking at is to only use the state
7 reps in the general assembly, state senators and
8 state reps. And then the civil servant award is to
9 recognize those not in state government, and that
10 includes legislative aides, mayors, and
11 county-elected positions.

12 Jermaine Ferguson of the 6th District made a
13 motion to create the Civil Servant of the Year Award
14 through a resolution, and to amend the program
15 guidelines, which was seconded by Holly Lewis.

16 Holly Lewis led us in the closing prayer,
17 Chairman LaVoy gave his closing statement, and we
18 adjourned at 10:35.

19 Any questions?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, you heard Scott's
22 report. Do we have a motion to accept?

23 1VC TEIS: Teis, 1st Vice, so moves.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Teis, 1st Vice, so moves.

25 We got a second?

1 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
2 District, seconds.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Is there any
4 discussion?

5 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: You know there is.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, Miss Joyce.

7 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
8 Vice, 9th District.

9 On your first page, under "New Business," the
10 "Legislative Update," the word "amount" has an extra
11 "M" in it. You need to correct that.

12 I mean these are permanent records. We don't
13 want to look like idiots in the future.

14 And on the Legislator of the Year, is that
15 simply a committee-only nomination involved, or can
16 Districts nominate people? How does that process
17 go?

18 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Your Districts are
19 allowed to nominate people and bring them to the
20 commission. We didn't have any nominations sent to
21 us. But we had a discussion on current state
22 representatives that are doing the most
23 veteran-friendly legislation and Adam Miller was the
24 one we came upon.

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Is there any formal

1 form you sent in?

2 COORDINATOR PALIDER: There's just guidelines.
3 The Department never created a packet. This was
4 before Jermaine and I.

5 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Are the guidelines on
6 the website?

7 COORDINATOR PALIDER: I believe so, yes.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Cool. Thanks.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, any other questions?
10 Any other discussion?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those --
13 Oh, Kevin.

14 1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Kevin Motter, 1st
15 District 1st Vice.

16 Just curiosity. Why are we not recognizing
17 federal representatives?

18 COORDINATOR PALIDER: We had the discussion.
19 No one had a recommendation for who they wanted,
20 except previous congress member Steve Stivers. And
21 only the current body was thought to be recognized.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Anyone?

23 Jermaine.

24 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Yes, Commander.
25 Jermaine, District 6 1st Vice Commander.

1 Just a point of clarification for the
2 Legislator of the Year.

3 If we move forward with the civil servant and
4 the state, this body will still approve any
5 resolution.

6 So if you want to submit, your District wants
7 to submit such nomination, then please put it in a
8 resolution format, and maybe include any supporting
9 documentation. That's the best practice. Because
10 this body will then see a resolution for an award
11 this body needs to vote on, not just through
12 committee minutes but through a resolution process.

13 Thank you.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

15 Alrighty, anyone else?

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing no one else has any
18 questions, all those in favor say aye.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same answer.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

23 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Commander, seeing as
24 Chuck Craynon, VA&R Chair, is not here, may I
25 proceed to read his report?

1 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, go ahead.

2 COORDINATOR PALIDER: All right.

3 The Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation
4 Standing Commission met here at Department
5 Headquarters on March 13th. Our meeting was started
6 at 11:06 AM. We had eight members present.

7 The first part of our minutes was the District
8 reports.

9 And so District 1 stated that the Toledo VA is
10 allowing volunteers back into the facility for the
11 first time in almost two years, due to COVID.
12 Toledo is also considering extending the VA Physical
13 Therapy Department.

14 District No. 3: Dayton is still not letting
15 volunteers in.

16 District No. 5: The CBOCs are letting
17 volunteers back in and the clinic is currently open.

18 District No. 6 is trying to get into the Marion
19 CBOC to see how it is functioning. They have been
20 unsuccessful so far.

21 District No. 12, this is the big one. The
22 Chillicothe VA is recommended for closure. But the
23 plan is that if it is to close, again, it is a
24 recommendation currently, that the rest home will
25 stay open. The ER is closed and it's currently on

1 restricted hours. There's no medical facility for a
2 while, according to District 12. They've been
3 shipping out major treatments to Cincinnati and
4 Columbus already.

5 A subsection of this is the VA cannot find
6 personnel to staff the facility adequately. It is
7 outdated and has hazardous materials in the
8 building's infrastructure.

9 Current plans to build, if the Chillicothe VA,
10 and this is hearsay, but I am confirming it by
11 talking to certain members of Congress, the current
12 plan is to build a CBOC in Circleville, if the
13 Chillicothe VA is to close.

14 District 13: Wade Park is still not fully
15 open, but the VAVS Rep, Leroy Brinkhoff, is going to
16 drop off more donations to help the facility. He's
17 doing a great job up there.

18 District 14: The CBOCs have been open to
19 volunteers and they are allowing more into the
20 facility as they open the facilities more as we move
21 away from COVID.

22 There was no old business.

23 New Business.

24 We discussed the of-the-year awards with our
25 commission.

1 And Darell Bishop made a motion to accept
2 August 1st and September 15th deadlines for
3 Department VA&R award nominations. This was
4 seconded by Dave Cook. This motion was carried.

5 There was a discussion held on the Department
6 sending out nomination packets through the mail due
7 to certain areas of the state not having reliable
8 Internet service to access the digital packet.

9 A Gifts for Yanks update was given by
10 Department Coordinator Andrew Klingler.

11 On the gift card idea, the \$25 amount would be
12 good for one year, if we did the gift card route.

13 There's currently \$110,000 in the budget, and
14 more donations have come in already.

15 The deadline is May 31st, because the Gifts for
16 Yanks Awards are done in June.

17 Some VAVS need clinic representatives for the
18 CBOCs across Ohio. There's a number of facilities
19 that need VAVS reps that we don't have. I have to
20 check with Andrew about who those are though.

21 The Gifts for Yanks Committee has not set a
22 budget as of yet.

23 Moving on to the Commander's visit and
24 voluntary service/veterans homes update, at the time
25 of this meeting, I had contacted Dayton and

1 Cincinnati for visits. Those are not confirmed to
2 be occurring. April 11th will be the Dayton VA
3 visit. April 21st will be the Cincinnati VA visit.

4 Pat Grzybowski, out of the 1st District, stated
5 that the Toledo VA would like to have the Commander
6 for a visit. He's currently working on that
7 information.

8 And then the big one was the potential closure
9 of the Chillicothe VA. And we can go into more
10 discussion on this, as the Commander and Eric
11 attended a meeting on this closure.

12 Would you like me to do so?

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

14 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Okay.

15 So, again, this came out of the AIR Commission
16 through the VA. The Chillicothe VA and a number of,
17 I think there's ten other facilities across the
18 country, are recommended for closure.

19 This is a recommendation. And a lot of people
20 see "recommendation" and already assumed it was
21 closing. So there's been a lot of pushback on this.

22 Now this closure is occurring, or this
23 recommended closure is occurring due to it being
24 data driven. It is projected that by 2029, so seven
25 years from now, the population around the

1 Chillicothe VA is going to shrink by almost ten
2 percent.

3 There are people fighting to keep this facility
4 open. Senator Brown's office is fighting for this,
5 because Senator Brown's office is very caring about
6 the VA. There's also, I know we've sent up a thank
7 you to Tim Ryan, who's in the House and is fighting
8 for this. And Senator Portman is concerned, but he
9 is also on his way out. He is not seeking
10 re-election. So I don't know what he will do.

11 Now what we've decided to do about this event
12 is we are going to work on a statewide petition
13 campaign to get signatures and send it to members of
14 Congress. I am going to do this virtually, through
15 a link format, as well as doing paper copies for the
16 areas that cannot access Internet access.

17 And we are looking to partner with all the
18 members of the Ohio Veterans Services. And we're
19 talking 26 organizations. They seemed on board with
20 it. I am coordinating that with some of the ones
21 that are interested. The DAV, VFW, and Paralyzed
22 Veterans of America are the ones who have been
23 asking me. They are interested, as well as some
24 other veterans service commissions.

25 This recommendation is, it's alarming, to say

1 the least.

2 And National gave a statement on the
3 recommended closures on their website. Though they
4 aren't fully against it, or though they aren't fully
5 for it, they are not entirely against it. Because
6 they understand the challenge for veterans and their
7 care in this country, and the future of the VA. So
8 they're open to a hearing, a transparent hearing
9 process, on why they would close this and what is
10 the backup plan if this facility is to close.

11 Because we're talking two-hour drives to
12 Columbus, Dayton and Cincinnati for care. And a
13 large portion of Chillicothe VA members are mental
14 health patients. I don't think you want to drive
15 four hours round trip to wait and talk about your
16 mental health. I think we're going to have an
17 issue. And that was discussed in that meeting.

18 Now that's all I have on Chillicothe. You are
19 free to e-mail me or call me. And I can put
20 together a large information packet of what I know
21 so far. And you can disperse it to your Districts
22 if you'd like.

23 Where was I?

24 There was a discussion that the VE&Es be folded
25 back into the VA&R Committee, the Sons of The

1 American Legion VE&Es be folded back into our VA&R
2 Committee. Because, according to -- I forget the
3 name -- they haven't had a whole lot of
4 participation.

5 Oh, Bob Carson. That's right, Bob.

6 There has not been participation in almost six
7 years, active participation.

8 Moving on to some of the good of The Legion
9 information, we had our virtual Washington
10 Conference. The National NEC approved resolutions
11 regarding immigrants who honorably served in the
12 military, and who are currently serving, to gain
13 citizenship, and therefore receive VA care and other
14 benefits that they are entitled to.

15 There's also another resolution that came out
16 of the Department of Delaware that is being amended.
17 And if adopted, it would not matter what the age is
18 of a developmentally disabled dependent and they
19 would still be eligible for care. I know that if
20 you adopt someone after 18 years old, they aren't
21 entitled to care. But that would be changed.
22 They're currently working on sending that back to
23 the National Convention floor.

24 There was no further business. Pat Grzybowski
25 gave a prayer, we saluted the flag, and the meeting

1 adjourned at 11:55 AM.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, you heard Scott's
3 report. Do we have a motion to accept?

4 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th
5 District 1st Vice, makes a motion to accept the
6 report as read.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: And do we have a second?

8 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
9 District, seconds.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, is there any
11 discussion?

12 Jermaine.

13 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Thanks, Commander.
14 Ferguson, 1st Vice, District 6.

15 I think it's appropriate for our Department to
16 pass a resolution in support of the Chillicothe VA
17 Medical Center and I would like to see that.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: I would like to say that
19 Scott, myself and Eric, a couple of weeks ago, went
20 over to Waverly, over to a town hall meeting, and
21 listened to what people had to say about the
22 possibility of Chillicothe closing.

23 And of course it's going to disrupt many, many
24 lives. And they would either have to go to Dayton,
25 or Cincinnati, or Columbus.

1 And they were very upset. I don't blame them.
2 If they drive from there to Cincinnati, it's a
3 two-hour drive. A two-hour drive, wait on your
4 appointment, and then a two-hour drive back. That's
5 just not right.

6 So we're doing as much as we can to try to get
7 our name out there, working on some petition to turn
8 in.

9 And there's no reason for this facility to
10 close. They did over \$3 million in updates. Is it
11 a perfect place? No. But I can guarantee the
12 Cincinnati VA is not a perfect place either.

13 So we've got to try to do what we can to fight
14 to keep Chillicothe open.

15 Okay, so all those in favor for accepting the
16 report say aye.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

21 And we're going to have one last report before
22 we break for lunch. And we'll hear from SAL Adviser
23 Skip Craun.

24 CMTE CHRMN CRAUN: The Detachment Executive
25 Committee met at the Crowne Plaza Hotel in Columbus,

1 Ohio, on Friday, January 21st, 2022.

2 The following resolutions were approved:

3 To put Squadron 31, in District 10, on notice
4 of cancellation of charter.

5 To make the following National appointment
6 recommendations: Jeff Vrabel, Sr., District 9,
7 Americanism Commission; Jon Coakley, II, District
8 12, Child Welfare Foundation Committee; Bill
9 Sutterlin, District 5, VA&R Commission; Bernie
10 Kessler, District 5, Legislative Commission; Jeff
11 Vrabel, Jr., District 9, Century Committee; Dennis
12 Albright, District 7, Children and Youth Committee;
13 and John Robinson, Veterans Education and Employment
14 Commission.

15 The last one was to make the following Future
16 Projects Fund donations: Veterans and Children's
17 Fund, \$1,000; Save A Warrior, \$1,000; National
18 Emergency Fund, \$1,000; Children's Miracle Network,
19 \$1,500; Fisher House, \$500 each to the Cincinnati,
20 Cleveland and Dayton houses; Gifts for Yanks,
21 \$1,000; H.O.O.V.E.S., \$1,000; and Child Welfare
22 Foundation, \$400; for a total of \$8400.

23 This report requires the approval of the
24 Department Executive Committee.

25 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th

1 District, motions that the report be accepted as
2 read.

3 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
4 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds the motion.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: We have a motion and a
6 second to accept the report.

7 Is there any discussion?

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in
10 favor signify by saying aye.

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

15 Okay, we'll have Al Buxton, our Chaplain, come
16 up and give us a prayer for lunch.

17 If we can all be back by 1:00 o'clock, we'll
18 move on with the meeting.

19 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Let us pray.

20 Lord, we ask You that You bless the food that
21 we're about to partake in, and those that prepared
22 it for us, and keep all of our families in your
23 keep. Amen.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, let's pay

1 respects to the colors. One, two.

2 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

3 We now stand in adjournment until 1:00 o'clock.

4 (THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS).

5 . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

6 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll rise and pay respects
7 to the colors. One, two.

8 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

9 I'd like to say that I'm not feeling well today
10 at all. I have a severe migraine headache. And I'm
11 going to turn the meeting over to 1st Vice Brad.

12 And I appreciate everyone being here today, but
13 it's kind of silly for me to be here with such a
14 headache when we have the capable hands of Brad and
15 Charles. So thank you, everyone, for being here.

16 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Well I hope you feel
17 better tomorrow.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, really.

19 But anyway, thanks for everyone being here.
20 And I hope you enjoyed your lunch.

21 I'd like to thank Eric for getting the lunch
22 sponsored. So it didn't cost us the Department any
23 money. I thought it was a very nice lunch.

24 Thank you for the birthday take. Thanks
25 everybody for the birthday wishes. And I'm going to

1 go.

2 But before we go, I think our National Vice
3 Commander, Jerry Wilson, will give us a report on
4 Charities. But I'll be headed towards the car.

5 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: God bless you,
6 Commander.

7 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I want to give a report
8 on Charities.

9 There's some people who have been sending in
10 things for Charities.

11 For example, the 3rd District sent in a request
12 for a cart, a golf cart, to transport patients from
13 the parking lot to the hospital. That should have
14 gone, or should go through the Gifts for the Yanks.

15 And it did go through the Gifts for the Yanks
16 for the 4th District.

17 And I was told that the Gifts for the Yanks
18 Chairman told them that there was no money
19 available. And I called Darell Bishop, who's
20 probably more familiar with the money and the Gifts
21 for Yanks than probably anybody in this room, and he
22 said they have \$430,000 in their investment account
23 and 200-and-some thousand in their working account.
24 So they do have enough money to be able to do that.
25 So we referred that back to them.

1 We also got a request for the Charities, Inc.,
2 to buy pins, loan money for pins. Charities, Inc.,
3 can't do that. It's not a catch-all.

4 Charities, Inc., gives the Department of Ohio,
5 I believe, around 40,000 a year for expenses.

6 And you can all go to the Finance Committee and
7 request money, if you need pins and stuff like that,
8 from the Finance Committee. And if it's a loan,
9 they loan it to you. When you sell the pins you can
10 pay the money back.

11 But Charities is just not a catch-all. You've
12 got to be careful what you do.

13 You all know that Arrow International donated
14 \$100,000 to Charities. And what we were planning on
15 doing -- we was going to do it in our last meeting
16 but I drove up here for the meeting and there was
17 only two people here, me and Glen Hickman. So two
18 does not make a quorum out of five. So we couldn't
19 vote on anything.

20 We did have one request for \$500.

21 Because what we were planning on doing with
22 Charities, with the money Arrow gave us, is to give
23 it out to the Posts who are involved in bingo or
24 gaming and with Charities. Because we want to try
25 to build the charity program up.

1 Because we want to do a lot more for the Posts
2 but we're kind of restricted. We can't repair roofs
3 or we can't put in new carpet. We can do things
4 with children and youth, first responders,
5 charitable things, but not to repair your post. All
6 right?

7 So we're planning on giving a grant to each
8 Post that is involved with Charities, whether it be
9 bingo, whether it be gaming. And I don't care which
10 company you work with on gaming, any of the three.
11 We're planning on giving a \$500 credit, or grant, to
12 each Post. Okay?

13 Now does anybody have any questions on
14 Charities? Don't be bashful.

15 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
16 District.

17 And the grants that you give out to Districts'
18 Posts, can it be considered within your organization
19 that we can donate monies to nonprofits?

20 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: The \$500 we're planning
21 on giving to each of the Posts, you can do whatever
22 you want with it.

23 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay. But I'm
24 asking can we donate monies to -- we have a lady in
25 our District.

1 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Yeah.

2 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: But she's a
3 non-401(c) (3). She does good things for veterans.
4 She's a veteran herself. But are we allowed to use
5 those funds to donate to her?

6 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Your Post decides what
7 charities you want to give to.

8 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

9 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: All right? Not
10 Charities, Inc. You do.

11 When you get your money back, you can put it in
12 your charitable account. And whatever your Post
13 decides they want to do with that charity account,
14 it's your business.

15 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Okay.

16 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: All right?

17 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Thank you.

18 Joyce, do you have something?

19 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Just to ask if 50/50
20 drawings count as gambling.

21 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Yeah, you're right about
22 that.

23 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: I was just being a
24 smartass.

25 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: No? I would have never

1 picked up on that.

2 Does anyone else have any questions though?

3 Right here (indicating).

4 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Do you have a
5 timeline established of when this is all going to
6 start and take place?

7 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: It's going to start as
8 soon as we have our meeting with a quorum. The next
9 meeting we have.

10 Sir, do you have something?

11 LEGIONNAIRE CROTHERS: Wes Crothers, District
12 10, 2nd Vice Commander, Post 131.

13 Yesterday, I received a postcard from Arrow.
14 They put an injunction against one of the other
15 suppliers.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: And the reason for that was
17 the other company was sending out information about
18 how well they outperformed Arrow in the State of
19 Michigan (sic) and everything in it was false. Or
20 I'm sorry, North Dakota. And everything in it was
21 false. So they filed a judgment against them to
22 make them stop that.

23 They're going out and saying anything they
24 want. And you'll find out that Arrow doesn't do
25 that. We're not going to badmouth other companies.

1 They can do what they want to do. But we're not
2 going to sit back and let them badmouth them. And
3 that's the reason you got that.

4 Anything else?

5 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

6 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Chappy is the only one
7 that sent in the request for the \$500 so far.

8 So get online. I know it's a simple little
9 thing, but it's got the letterhead for Charities and
10 that, and the Department. Fill out that little
11 form, request the \$500, and as soon as we have a
12 quorum in a meeting, we'll get that out to you.

13 PDC CHAPMAN: Commander, through you to Jerry,
14 I got a reply back from Shirley because it was a
15 little early. I didn't know, but she said after
16 April 1st is when we would be eligible.

17 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: We were going to vote on
18 it at the last meeting. But like I said, there was
19 only two there. And we can't vote when you don't
20 have a quorum.

21 PDC CHAPMAN: If you did go with Arrow, they're
22 delivering machines today. I just got a call awhile
23 ago and they'll be at my Post in about an hour.

24 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Yeah, they've had over a
25 thousand they've put out already.

1 Okay?

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Mr. 1st Vice.

4 1VC TEIS: Thank you, sir.

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Thank you very much
6 guys. I'll get the girl home.

7 1VC TEIS: All right, back to the agenda.

8 Let's see, Holly is not here.

9 Jon Vulgamore, will you give the report on the
10 Media, Marketing and Communications Commission.

11 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: Thank you, Commander.

12 Jon Vulgamore, Media, Marketing and
13 Communications Coordinator for the staff. I'm going
14 to substitute for Chairman Lewis' minutes.

15 The latest meeting for the Media, Marketing and
16 Communications Commission was held on Sunday,
17 March 13th, 2022, at 3:00 PM, at the Department
18 Headquarters Library. Call to order was 3:05.

19 Chairman Lewis opened up the meeting in regular
20 form at 3:05. The invocation was given by Al Beyer,
21 District 5. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by
22 Chairman Lewis for all that was present. The
23 meeting secretary appointment was substituted by all
24 agreeing to be video recorded so there's a
25 transcribed copy of the meeting that we could

1 produce minutes from.

2 There was also a virtual option to join this
3 commission meeting through Microsoft Teams.

4 Roll call of the members and subcommission
5 members was next on the agenda.

6 Guests present were Department 1st Vice
7 Commander Brad Teis; Department 2nd Vice Commander
8 Charles Stennis; 12th District 2nd Vice Commander
9 Suzette Heller; Department Adjutant Eric Hall; and
10 myself.

11 The motion for the previous minutes was
12 approved by Martin Moore and seconded by Chris
13 Emmons.

14 There was no unfinished business.

15 New business.

16 Discussion the motions was quite lengthy, so
17 I'll summarize in the interest of saving time here.

18 The OLN cost analysis was given by myself, and
19 also the digital only, savings and ad savings for
20 the Ohio Legion News.

21 A motion was made to change the verbiage in our
22 constitution and bylaws, the end of mail when it
23 came to publication distribution, in order to, in
24 the future, to make an effort to stop the mail copy.
25 There's been a lot of feedback both ways, but this

1 was motioned by Chris Emmons and seconded by Steve
2 Ebersole of the 12th District. In an effort to
3 start gaining that budget back, get it under
4 control, because it's been, for the last two to
5 three years, it's been way, way over what we
6 allocate in the constitution bylaws for sending the
7 Ohio Legion News.

8 The next item on the agenda was a new
9 contractor for the OLN.

10 The previous contractor, Vision Printing and
11 Graphics, has been with us for around 15 years. But
12 the performance is late, with late deadlines. I'm
13 sure you've probably realized last fall's edition
14 got to you very late. So that was a huge factor,
15 plus rising costs with the printing industry.

16 So now we're going with Times Leader Media
17 Group as our new Ohio Legion News contractor. And
18 the only major difference you'll see, probably,
19 going forward, starting with the spring edition,
20 will be the pages sized down. Instead of an 11 by
21 15 piece of paper, it's going to be a ten by ten.
22 So there's going to be a little less content, a
23 little more content on the digital side on the
24 website.

25 So please bear in mind that it's going to be a

1 transition working with the new contractor, to get
2 them familiar with our infrastructure and our
3 verbiage and our functions.

4 So that motion was carried, again by Steve
5 Ebersole, and seconded by Martin Moore, District 5.

6 A motion was also made to make the taps section
7 in the Ohio Legion News strictly on the digital or
8 the electronic version. That motion was carried by,
9 again, Chris Emmons, District 3, and seconded by
10 Joyce Hannum, District 9.

11 The next discussion was on some test marketing,
12 increasing the OLN ad pages, website, mobile app,
13 experience, to improve our website to make it more
14 user friendly on your phones.

15 And we pretty much concluded the meeting with
16 some of the good of the commission discussion.

17 Dayna Beyer is going to be a National
18 Oratorical Contest escort.

19 James Lockyer requested to be signed up for the
20 digital-only OLN, or re-signed up, I should say.

21 Joyce Hannum of the 9th District suggested more
22 live streaming of District and Post-level events.

23 And Chris Emmons, 3rd District, asked if the
24 Commission would meet at the next Department
25 Convention, and Chair Lewis answered yes.

1 Chair Lewis directed the salute to colors, and
2 the meeting adjourned at 4:13.

3 If someone would make the --

4 1VC TEIS: But before we go to that, Jon, was
5 there anything in there, I didn't hear, stating what
6 the cost savings is going to be from OLN to the new
7 company?

8 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: The postage, of course,
9 is a static price. But the sizing and the design
10 have gone down \$4,000, from about 8,000, down to
11 about 4,000, for the current bid and quote. So that
12 should put us at budget.

13 1VC TEIS: Yep.

14 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: We'll do another cost
15 analysis after spring.

16 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick,
17 Alternate NEC.

18 How many people are joining online monthly? Is
19 the list growing or has it stopped?

20 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: Yes, it's about a
21 two-year process, signing up for receiving the
22 electronic copy only. We've gone from about 500
23 members to about 3500 members now.

24 I run campaigns in April and in November. And
25 I would say an average of two to 400 sign up each

1 campaign.

2 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Good. So it is
3 catching on.

4 1VC TEIS: And we plan on putting that in each
5 OLN, so they can keep seeing it over and over. And
6 it's on the website.

7 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: And how many members do we
8 have? 78,000?

9 COORDINATOR VULGAMORE: Well, 90-plus, yes,
10 sir.

11 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: It doesn't sound like a
12 whole lot then.

13 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: It's growing, though.
14 That's all. As long as it's growing, we're doing
15 okay.

16 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th
17 District, motions to accept the meeting report as
18 read.

19 5TH DISTRICT CMDR DULL: Ron Dull, 5th District
20 Commander, seconds that motion.

21 1VC TEIS: All right, I have a first and second
22 to accept the MMC report.

23 Is there any discussion?

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

25 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

2 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

3 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

4 1VC TEIS: Motion carried. Thank you.

5 Scott, Gifts for the Yanks, since Holly's not
6 here.

7 COORDINATOR PALIDER: All right, the Gifts for
8 Yanks meeting happened on February 20th, at 12:30
9 PM, in the Department Library. There were nine
10 members present and two guests, Department
11 Coordinator Andrew Klingler and myself.

12 The previous minutes were read and approved.

13 Under subcommittee meeting discussion, ken
14 Ellis of the 4th District discussed that all of the
15 gifts from this year had been distributed out
16 successfully.

17 Under unfinished business, distribution of old
18 gifts, Stanley Popek, from the 13th District,
19 inquired about acquiring some of the extra gifts.
20 And it was noted that there was an opportunity for
21 all members to retrieve extra gifts from the back.
22 We currently have them in the back room.

23 It was also pointed out by Holly Lewis of the
24 10th District that not all of the committee members
25 had received their personal gifts from this year's

1 operation.

2 The committee also brought up the question on
3 why there was an excess of gifts remaining from this
4 year. The excess is attributed to COVID
5 restrictions in some facilities.

6 John Tepper inquired about the monies remaining
7 for the Chillicothe VA. It was determined that the
8 VAVS Coordinator had passed away and the District
9 did not request funds.

10 Holly Lewis of the 10th District presented to
11 the committee a need for a manual that thoroughly
12 explains the special request process.

13 Under new business, the gift card proposal was
14 discussed.

15 Darell Bishop proposed that this year the
16 committee consider that the gifts for this upcoming
17 Christmas be gift cards.

18 Department Coordinator Andrew Klingler
19 presented the proposition given by the gift card
20 company Signature.

21 Robert Schmoll of the 8th District voiced his
22 concerns over gifts in the past that had been
23 manufactured in China. He agreed that the gift
24 cards were a great way to help veterans, and that
25 the funds would not be used for Chinese-made

1 products.

2 Stanley Popek of the 13th District motioned for
3 the 12-month expiration day gift card option, which
4 would cost \$3.06 per card. This motion was seconded
5 by Robert Schmoll.

6 The committee then requested that the usage of
7 the gift cards would need to be tracked if possible.

8 This motion was passed.

9 The budget review was next. Darell Bishop of
10 the 5th District presented to the committee that in
11 the past few years, the committee has given the
12 American Legion Auxiliary \$11,000 every year for
13 them to purchase gifts and other items for the
14 Cleveland, Dayton, Cincinnati, and Chillicothe VA
15 facilities. This allotment had not been approved in
16 the past and it was determined by the committee that
17 this would need to be changed.

18 Holly Lewis of the 10th District motioned that
19 \$8,000 be designated towards The American Legion
20 Auxiliary, to be used in Dayton, Cincinnati,
21 Cleveland and Chillicothe, with 2,000 going to each
22 facility.

23 Holly stated that the committee is given a
24 report on how the donated funds were used. The
25 American Legion Auxiliary has somewhere stated that

1 the Gift for Yanks had donated funds when
2 distributing the materials.

3 Stanley Popek of the 13th District seconded the
4 motion. This motion was carried.

5 It was brought up by Department Coordinator
6 Andrew Klingler to send in a request to American
7 Legion Charities for \$50,000. This amount will help
8 the Gift for Yanks Committee reach its fundraising
9 goal.

10 Stanley Popek of the 13th District motioned
11 that the committee will wait until the May meeting
12 to determine the budget, after a finance report is
13 mailed to the committee. Holly Lewis seconded this
14 motion.

15 Holly Lewis then presented the recommendation
16 to the committee that they change the Gifts for
17 Yanks name.

18 Darell Bishop of the 5th District communicated
19 that they must first separate themselves from the
20 VA&R Commission before the committee changes their
21 name.

22 It was determined that the committee had
23 reported directly to the DEC in the past.

24 Mike Homan of the 2nd District moved that we
25 create a resolution that the committee will report

1 directly to the DEC. This motion was passed. And
2 we will review that resolution later.

3 Then the last item was the committee requested
4 Andrew Klingler send a monthly breakdown of all the
5 Districts' donations, along with the total donation
6 amount. Andrew would also need to send out letters
7 notifying VAVS representatives on the upcoming April
8 15th deadline.

9 The meeting was adjourned at 2:01 PM.

10 That's all I got.

11 1VC TEIS: I would entertain a motion to accept
12 the minutes.

13 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: I'll make that
14 motion. I'd also like to give you \$100.

15 Thank you.

16 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: I'll second that
17 motion. And I'd also like to give you a check for
18 \$1,000 to the Gifts for Yanks from Post 484.

19 1VC TEIS: Did you make the motion?

20 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Yes, I did.

21 1VC TEIS: Okay.

22 All right, we have a first and second to accept
23 the Gifts for Yanks --

24 Yes.

25 And you guys got to start saying your names.

1 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, first.

2 1VC TEIS: Bob Carson made the motion and Steve
3 Ervin made the second.

4 I have a motion and a second.

5 Any discussion?

6 Yes, dear.

7 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
8 Vice, 9th District.

9 The only question I have is they need to change
10 the spelling. They have Stanley Popek's name
11 correct on the first page. The next five times it's
12 "Stanely" instead of Stanley. So they need to make
13 those corrections before they file it.

14 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

15 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

16 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

18 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

21 All right, next up, Post Charter revocations,
22 suspensions, Eric Hall, Department Adjutant.

23 ADJUTANT HALL: Thank you, guys, and ladies.

24 Just a couple of things here.

25 All the paperwork is in for Post 182, 433 and

1 590. So those are going to be directed up to
2 National for the final completion of those.

3 And then the part for 807 merging with 352, 807
4 is closing, but only because it's merging with 352.

5 So I don't have anything else in reference to
6 them.

7 Does anybody else have any other questions?

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 1VC TEIS: All right, thank you.

10 All right, next up, resolutions, constitutional
11 amendments, Mr. Bob Ray.

12 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: All right, resolutions.

13 The very first one is Resolution 22-10.

14 "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of
15 Ohio Department Executive Committee, assembled in
16 regular session in Delaware, Ohio, on April 2, 2022,
17 amends the rules and procedures of The American
18 Legion Department Executive Committee to add Article
19 17, Conflict of Interest."

20 That's the one I've already talked about in my
21 report. This is under advisement because we have to
22 come up with a conflict of interest policy before we
23 should really put it into our constitution. So that
24 one we can set aside for now.

25 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: 1st Vice Commander,

1 Jermaine Ferguson, the District 6 1st Vice
2 Commander.

3 This resolution is to amend the rules of
4 procedure for this body. It's a conflict of
5 interest clause. Meaning that, for instance, if I
6 sell pins and this body votes in the minutes for a
7 budget to purchase pins from my company, I have to
8 say "I recuse myself," and I leave the room for that
9 conversation. It is a good policy for any
10 organization.

11 It does also have a financial relationship.
12 For instance, since I serve on my planning
13 commission, which approves zoning, and we have a
14 nonprofit that just moved forward to create
15 emergency housing, I had to recuse myself and remove
16 myself from the room.

17 I motion that we adopt, or that we amend the
18 rules of the DEC. We can continue the process of
19 creating policy, but the rules that we vote by, I
20 believe we should amend them to include that
21 conflict of interest clause. That way we are all in
22 good standing with the organization.

23 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: As I stated earlier, under
24 my report, this should be passed to the Judge
25 Advocate and the Commander, and taken under

1 advisement, before we pass something like this.

2 I talked to somebody at the National
3 organization, the Judge Advocate, and he agreed that
4 this thing should have a policy spelled out as to
5 how it's done. And it should not only include
6 somebody that wants to sell pins, it includes
7 officers, employees, volunteers, and anybody else
8 that handles Legion funds.

9 So I believe that a complete policy that could
10 be understood by everybody should be put together
11 first, before we vote on anything. That's my
12 recommendation.

13 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: I made a motion.

14 1VC TEIS: Well, he made a motion.

15 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Was there a second?

16 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I thought that was
17 a set-aside.

18 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: It dies for lack of a
19 second.

20 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Per the rules of
21 the Department of Ohio DEC, "The rules of the
22 committee may be amended as follows: At any regular
23 or special meeting of the committee by unanimous
24 vote," or, "At any regular or special meeting of the
25 committee provided a written notice thereof is

1 mailed, e-mailed, faxed, texted, or provided" --
2 which we have a written copy right here (indicating)
3 that's been provided to this body.

4 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I provided it.

5 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: -- "three days in
6 advance to all committee members, setting forth the
7 proposed amendment."

8 There is a recommendation to set this aside.
9 But as a member of the DEC, I ask that we vote and
10 entertain a second.

11 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: You're out of order. It
12 already died for lack of a second. So you can't
13 bring it up again. Sorry.

14 21-02.

15 "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of
16 Ohio Internal Affairs Committee in regular meeting
17 at the 2022 Mid-Winter Conference, that Article XI,
18 Section 1, of The American Legion Department
19 Constitution be amended to change the minimum
20 membership that a Post shall have from 25 to 15
21 members.

22 "Be it finally resolved that Article XI,
23 Section 1, shall read: "The local unit shall be the
24 Post, which shall have a minimum membership of 15."

25 My comments on this is: How many of you -- has

1 everybody seen the officer's guide that we put out?
2 Every officer is supposed to have one. It's online.
3 It's got 186 pages in it. And the officer's guide
4 for a Post says that you should have a minimum of
5 eight officers plus an executive committee, and you
6 should have a minimum of six committees. So how can
7 you do that with only 15 people?

8 Identify yourself, sir.

9 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton,
10 Commander, 12th District.

11 We have a number of Posts in my District that
12 don't have an officer in every position. They're
13 lucky to have five people show up at a meeting. And
14 they're still functioning. Most of the officers are
15 holding three jobs. And they're still functioning.
16 They're still doing committee work. So I don't know
17 that arbitrary numbers of how many you have
18 identified in the officer's guide really makes any
19 sense in the real world.

20 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: It makes as much sense as
21 reducing the number of people you have to have. How
22 far down do you go? Do you go down to ten? Five?
23 One?

24 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander, may I
25 respond?

1 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Yes. Go ahead.

2 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton,
3 Commander, 12th District.

4 I've done research on this, sir. And I started
5 two years ago. And we had 25 Posts in the
6 Department that were failing to meet the 25 minimum
7 requirement. Some of these Posts have gone by the
8 wayside. They failed. And frankly, Posts do fail.
9 But I don't know that identifying the minimum
10 required 15, or whatever, 25, or whatever the number
11 is, has any real bearing on whether a Post is going
12 to fail or not.

13 Usually they fail because people refuse to do
14 the jobs, people don't attend the meetings, people
15 don't participate in the programs. That's how the
16 Posts fail. Identifying the minimum required
17 membership of 15 isn't going to change that.

18 In reality, we're really not being fair to the
19 small community Posts throughout Ohio. We had 25
20 Posts around Ohio that fall into this category. Two
21 years ago we had 25 Posts. And some of those have
22 gone by the wayside. Eighteen of those Posts are
23 still on this list and they're still working.
24 They're still doing the function of a Post serving
25 veterans.

1 An analysis of the membership around Ohio
2 identifies that 25 of these Posts are in this
3 category. District 5 has three Posts. District 11
4 has six Posts. Districts 4, 13 and 14, who don't
5 have any small, rural Posts in their District, don't
6 have this problem because they live in big
7 metropolitan urban areas with lots of veterans and
8 lots of 888s.

9 Yes, sir, they do.

10 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: You're wrong, sir.

11 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: The majority of
12 the Posts --

13 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: The 4th District has
14 several rural Posts. And they all manage to make
15 their membership.

16 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: The majority of
17 Posts with less than 25 members are located in towns
18 and villages with an average of 1,000 residents or
19 less.

20 The majority of those Posts under the 25
21 membership requirement are actually maintaining
22 membership of 16 to 18 members without problems. It
23 happens every year for the last two years I've
24 checked.

25 Further research shows that the zip code search

1 tool recommended by Department, and National, to
2 locate available 888 members for these Posts
3 indicates an average of only two to three available
4 888 members in these areas. The demographics don't
5 support it in the rural areas, the rural
6 communities.

7 The question remains. Why 25? There's no
8 documentation qualifying why 25 is the minimum
9 requirement. National does not mandate this.

10 Further analysis shows that Ohio is the only
11 Department requiring 25 members as a minimum.
12 Thirty-two other Departments, including California,
13 Florida, Indiana, Michigan, Pennsylvania, and Texas,
14 large states, large memberships, have this rule of
15 15. Five Departments require ten as the minimum.
16 The Department of North Dakota only requires five.
17 The eleven other departments around the country
18 leave this management up to the DEC. And frankly, I
19 think the DEC is busy enough that it doesn't have to
20 do this micromanagement of membership.

21 The bottom line: A minimum Post requirement of
22 25 is an arbitrary number. It unfairly handicaps
23 the smaller populated rural communities with smaller
24 veteran populations in numerous Districts around the
25 state. This resolution recommending defining the

1 minimum Post should be approved to a minimum 15
2 members, which is a more fair, realistic,
3 justifiable, and attainable minimum Post membership
4 requirement.

5 This has also been previously reviewed and
6 recommended by the Parliamentarian, the Judge
7 Advocate a couple years ago, membership committee,
8 and Internal Affairs Committee.

9 The bottom line with the current requirement is
10 we're just not being fair to the small, rural,
11 community Posts.

12 The other sister resolution we haven't talked
13 about reduces the minimum delegate requirement to
14 15. Right now these Posts are reading 16, 17, 14,
15 15, 18, 20 members, and they have no say on the
16 convention floor because the rule right now says
17 you're required to have 25. If you don't, you don't
18 count.

19 Thank you, sir.

20 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you. They're very
21 interesting numbers.

22 I'll read you some interesting numbers also.

23 The State of Ohio has 770,000 veterans over the
24 age of 18, all of which are eligible for The
25 American Legion.

1 Each District we have has thousands. But the
2 largest, the 4th District, has 97,000 veterans. The
3 smallest is the 11th District. They only have
4 23,000 eligible veterans. All the other Districts
5 are in between.

6 And we say we can't get anymore members? What
7 are we going to do about these 770,000 we got that
8 are eligible?

9 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander, Jermaine
10 Ferguson, 6th, Vice.

11 Procedurally, it is the role of the Department
12 Judge Advocate, in this setting, to introduce the
13 resolutions. Then a motion must be made from the
14 floor, and seconded, before discussions can take
15 place. We cannot debate this resolution until a
16 motion and a second.

17 Secondly, the Department Judge Advocate cannot
18 call someone out of order when there's a motion on
19 the floor. Only the Chair of this committee can.

20 Thank you.

21 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Poulton, Commander
22 of the 12th District, I make a motion to approve
23 this resolution.

24 2ND DISTRICT 1VC SHAW: Tim Shaw, 2nd District
25 1st Vice, I second the motion.

1 1VC TEIS: All right, we have a first and a
2 second to accept the resolution.

3 Is there any discussion?

4 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Steve Ervin, 4th
5 District Commander.

6 You know, what really upset me about this thing
7 is everybody is saying we can't get membership. You
8 always hear about 888s. I always hear about what
9 we're doing. What are we actually doing as
10 membership to actually go out and try to get new
11 members?

12 I hear he's living in small communities. How
13 far do they reach out of their community? If you've
14 got a town with only 400 people, you've got to have
15 people outside that community.

16 My mother lives in a small burg down here in
17 Leesburg, Ohio. And they've got a small Post. And
18 they go outside their community. They go outside
19 their five-mile range or ten-mile range.

20 All we do every year is basically reduce our
21 membership quota. How long are we going to take
22 this down? We should be going up.

23 When I joined The Legion back 16 years ago, we
24 were above 100,000 members. Now we're down to
25 80,000. So how long are we going to do this?

1 That's all I have to say.

2 11TH DISTRICT 1VC WAINWRIGHT: Steve
3 Wainwright, 1st Vice Commander, 11th District, the
4 smallest District.

5 And I'm telling you you can keep cutting this
6 membership all you want. What are we trying to do?
7 You're going to say we can't have 15 members.
8 You've got to have 25. What are you going to do
9 with those Posts? We're biting our nose to spite
10 our face.

11 For God sakes, man, let's take everybody that
12 we can get. I don't care if there's only 15 in or
13 not. Let's keep them as veterans. Because if you
14 don't keep them as veterans, I mean, I can go up and
15 down that Route 7, where I live, and there's little
16 Posts everywhere, if you don't keep those Posts
17 alive, you're going to still lose veterans. That's
18 all you're going to do. You're going to lose
19 members.

20 I'm on the membership. I call them. There's
21 four or five good members that are functioning. I
22 see in the paper where they perform military
23 funerals. I see where they put out flags.

24 There may be just a few of them, but I urge
25 that you pass this resolution.

1 10TH DISTRICT CMDR RHODE: Bob Rhode, 10th
2 District Commander.

3 I also would urge you to go ahead and vote for
4 this change from 25 to 15. I have a small burg
5 outside of New Philadelphia called Sherrodsville.
6 They have 412 people in there. That's men, women
7 and children. And that's it for 15 miles around.
8 What are they going to do? They don't get a voice?
9 They went and fought for our country like every one
10 of you. They have a voice.

11 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
12 District Commander.

13 I'm from Marion County. Our oldest Post in
14 Marion County is La Rue. It's one on the list I
15 have for membership that's in red. They've got 14,
16 maybe 17 members, out of 25. Marion may be 15
17 minutes, 20 minutes down the road, 584, 162. They
18 don't want to go. They want to keep that Post
19 going. They do have a few members that are able to
20 keep it going. If you blink you're through it.
21 It's small.

22 A lot of my Posts that I have are small. I
23 would ask that it gets reduced down 15. Because if
24 not, some of that legacy that we've had since 1919
25 is going to go away. And I don't want to see that

1 happen. I don't want it on my watch. I don't want
2 to see it the next 20 or 30 years, when I'm still
3 standing here. I don't want to see where some of
4 you guys go. There should be a direct number. But
5 if we are going to set it, we should set it at a
6 reasonable number. If 15 is it, then 15 is it. If
7 five is it, then five is it. It only takes a
8 couple.

9 And that's all I've got to say about that. But
10 I just want to keep that legacy going.

11 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander, Jermaine
12 Ferguson, 6th District.

13 I'm not going to speak against my District
14 Commander here, but my question and my concern is
15 that when we lower the bar to 15 members, I don't
16 want that to be a signal to the rest of the Posts
17 who are at the 25. Because we have a lot that are
18 at 25, and we're getting very close above 15 at 25.

19 Is there a way that we can create a policy, and
20 maybe I need an advisory opinion on this, can we
21 create an opinion, or a policy that this body
22 approves Post minimums, on a specific case-by-case
23 basis, to be at 15?

24 The reason why is, if we set the floor at 15
25 without having proof there's been a revitalization

1 done or attempted, without proof that there are no
2 expired members, let's prove that this Post cannot,
3 cannot, it is impossible for them to be at 25. Is
4 there away to address this issue from that approach?

5 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Well, no matter what you
6 do today, you can approve it if you want or not, it
7 still has to go to the Department Convention and be
8 voted on by the delegates to the Department
9 Convention. So anymore talk is redundant.

10 1VC TEIS: One more.

11 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 1st Vice,
12 4th District.

13 We are a large District. But, we also have
14 small Posts. We have other members that want to
15 start a new Post. But, if we keep this goal at 25,
16 a lot of them are not going to do that.

17 We had Posts that did that last year. They did
18 their 25. They had five members pass away. Now
19 they went out and recruited. They got to 32.

20 But what we need to do is we need to get out
21 there and work our membership. We've got membership
22 chairmen in our Posts and in our District that don't
23 want to do the job. They have to step up or step
24 out.

25 But I still do recommend we pass this

1 amendment.

2 Thank you.

3 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Anyone No response).

5 1VC TEIS: Anyone want my opinion?

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Yeah. No.

7 1VC TEIS: This is something we have to look
8 at. Because I'll tell you, and I looked at a lot of
9 research like Tom did.

10 We have 65 Posts in my District. And we have
11 them below that. Sherrodsville is one of them.
12 We've got a bunch of them that are hanging between
13 15 and 25.

14 We have Amish communities in our District. And
15 we have one county that only has two Posts. Another
16 county only has one Post. It's all Amish all the
17 way around there. They're not allowed to join.
18 They not even allowed to bear arms. So they can't
19 be members. So take that whole county with one
20 Post, now I've got to go to clear to the next county
21 to get somebody for my Post. Okay?

22 But getting down to what I'm saying here now
23 is: If you go in National's guidelines, if you go
24 to their Post awards, their District awards, the
25 Race to the Top, their number is 15 and above. As

1 he stated, there's a lot. You're talking
2 Pennsylvania. All the big ones are at 15. Okay?

3 The problem is, when we talked to some of these
4 other ones a few years back, when they sent out the
5 letter saying if you couldn't keep 25 members you
6 had to shut your Post or merge. We went to those
7 Posts. We visited those Posts. You know what they
8 told us? Screw you. You shut us down, we're going
9 to leave The American Legion and we're not going to
10 go over and merge with another Post, because it's
11 too far away. It's too far away.

12 But we need to make a decision today. And I'm
13 just saying this is National. You've got all these
14 other big Departments that do this. And I would say
15 at that point, if it goes below 15, then yeah, we
16 need to talk to them about merging or doing
17 something. But National if you look at their
18 awards, it's 15 and above.

19 That's all I've got to say.

20 Any other discussion?

21 FROM THE FLOOR: Question on the motion.

22 1VC TEIS: Okay, all in favor of passing this
23 resolution to 15 say aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

3 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: It will go to the
4 convention floor.

5 The next resolution is tied to that, reducing
6 the number for delegates from 25 to 15. So that
7 also should go along with it.

8 The next one.

9 "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of
10 Ohio Department Executive Committee ... April 2,
11 2022, that we call upon the Ohio General Assembly
12 and/or the Ohio State Board of Education --

13 1VC TEIS: Point of order. Point of order.

14 That doesn't go with the other one. It's a
15 separate resolution. So we need to call for a vote
16 on this one.

17 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Right.

18 21-09, reducing the number from 25 to 15. Need
19 a motion.

20 2ND DISTRICT 1VC SHAW: Tim Shaw, 2nd District
21 1st Vice, I motion, or move.

22 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, 6th District
23 Commander, seconds.

24 1VC TEIS: All right, a motion and a second on
25 the floor to lower the delegation strength to start

1 at 15. All in favor signify by saying aye.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

3 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

6 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Once again, "Resolved --

7 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: What number are we on?

8 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 21-08 (sic).

9 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: 21-08 (sic), thank
10 you.

11 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: "Resolved, by The American
12 Legion Department of Ohio Department Executive
13 Committee, assembled in regular session, April 2,
14 that we call upon the Ohio General Assembly and/or
15 the Ohio Board of Education, to expand high-quality,
16 age-appropriate, evidence-based civic education to
17 all K through 12 students by revising Ohio's
18 learning standards for social studies; and be it
19 further

20 "Resolved, that the Ohio learning standards for
21 social studies shall include a new, required course
22 on U.S. Government for seventh and eighth graders; a
23 new required Ohio State Government course as a
24 requirement for high school graduation, and be it
25 further

1 "Resolved, to promote hands-on civic learning
2 through visits to local and state public hearings,
3 courtroom visits, local boards of elections,
4 simulated learning opportunities; and be it further.

5 "Resolved, that hard copies of the U.S.
6 Constitution; the Declaration of Independence, the
7 U.S. Flag Code; and the Ohio State Constitution
8 shall be issued to every eighth grader and every
9 senior in high school; and it is added to required
10 reading."

11 1VC TEIS: Okay, I believe that was 21-03
12 (sic), Bob.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Twenty-two. 22-03.

14 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 22-03.

15 1VC TEIS: Okay.

16 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 22-03, that's correct.

17 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
18 District 1st Vice Commander, makes a motion to
19 accept this resolution.

20 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine Ferguson,
21 District 6 1st Vice Commander, seconds.

22 1VC TEIS: I have a motion and a second to
23 accept Resolution 22-03A.

24 Any discussion?

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

3 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

6 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 22-05.

7 "Whereas, The American Legion seeks to
8 strengthen America and the State of Ohio by
9 improving the lives of our veterans, the military,
10 and their families.

11 "Be it resolved, by the American Legion
12 Department of Ohio Department Executive Committee,
13 assembled in regular session in Delaware, Ohio, on
14 April 2, 2022, that we call upon the Ohio General
15 Assembly to designate the week of March 15th as the
16 'Buddy Check Week' for the State of Ohio, to
17 organize outreach events and educate veterans on how
18 to conduct peer wellness checks; and be it finally

19 "Resolved, that the Director of Ohio Veterans
20 Services shall collaborate with veteran service
21 organizations, county Veteran Service Commissions,
22 nonprofits that serve veterans, mental health
23 experts, members of the Armed Forces, the Secretary
24 of State, county commissioners, mayors, and members
25 of the Ohio General Assembly, in the planning and

1 execution of Ohio's Buddy Check Week."

2 I'll have a motion.

3 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District,
4 Department Chaplain, I make a motion that we accept
5 this resolution.

6 10TH DISTRICT CMDR RHODE: Bob Rhode, 10th
7 District Commander, I second this motion.

8 1VC TEIS: All right, a motion and a second to
9 accept Resolution 22-05, Ohio Buddy Check.

10 Any discussion?

11 4TH DISTRICT 1VC PERRY: Jerry Perry, 4th
12 District 1st Vice.

13 Although I do agree with the buddy check
14 system, why do we have to have the state mandate
15 that we're doing our job? That's what we're
16 supposed to be doing. We're supposed to be doing
17 our buddy checks. It's an American Legion program.
18 Why are we demanding the state tell all the other
19 organizations to do our job? We're supposed to be
20 calling our members. We're supposed to be checking
21 on them.

22 So, that's all I have. Thank you.

23 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

24 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander, Jermaine
25 Ferguson, District 6 1st Vice Commander.

1 By a show of hands, who's aware of the National
2 Legislative Agenda? Who's aware of the National
3 Legislative Agenda?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

5 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: All right.

6 So I recommend that we read our National
7 Legislative Agenda.

8 If you read it, you will find that we are
9 urging Congress to pass a national buddy check week.

10 So, we are The American Legion, but we do not
11 represent or have every single veteran in Ohio;
12 correct?

13 That doesn't mean that we cannot call on the
14 state legislature to do the buddy check for all
15 veterans.

16 We have a rising mental health crisis in
17 America.

18 The reason why March 15th seems to be a perfect
19 time is not because it's our birthday, happy
20 birthday, but because it is after the post holiday,
21 the post Veterans Day, and it's not long between
22 when there's no recognition for any kind of
23 veterans.

24 It makes sense to try and reach out, in a
25 statewide effort, to reach out to all veterans, make

1 sure they know their benefits, their voting rights,
2 everything, and for the State of Ohio to lead and
3 enact state legislation. Because we know Congress
4 may not ever do it, because it's Congress, and they
5 have a hard time getting things done.

6 I urge your vote of yes.

7 1VC TEIS: Any other discussion?

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 1VC TEIS: I have a first and a second. All in
10 favor signify by saying aye.

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

12 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: No.

14 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

15 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Resolution 22-06.

16 "Whereas, the National Executive Committee of
17 The American Legion, in regular meeting October
18 14-15, 2015, adopted Resolution 22, The American
19 Legion 21st Century Policy on Education ...

20 "Resolved, by The American Legion Department of
21 Ohio Department Executive Committee, assembled in
22 regular session, Delaware, Ohio, April 2, 2022, that
23 we shall call upon the National American Legion
24 Americanism Commission to revise the organization's
25 21st Century Policy on Education to define and list

1 'civic education' as a Federal educational activity
2 of national interest."

3 It needs a motion.

4 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Buxton, 4th District, so
5 moves.

6 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright seconds.

7 1VC TEIS: Motion and a second to accept
8 Resolution 22-06.

9 Any discussion?

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

13 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

16 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 22-07.

17 "Whereas, when the federal government calls up
18 the respective National Guard of any state for any
19 service in any region of the United States ...

20 "Be it resolved, by The American Legion
21 Department of Ohio Department Executive Committee,
22 assembled at Department Headquarters, April 2, 2022,
23 that the Department of Ohio urges that each
24 respective governor of each state ensure that their
25 respective National Guard be reimbursed, and be it

1 finally

2 "Resolved, whether the call-up is within the
3 said state or another emergency, or another state
4 requests the assistance of a governor of a state,
5 the requesting state ensure that the National Guard
6 be reimbursed for expenses to ensure that their
7 operating funds have been replenished for use in
8 their day-to-day operations."

9 It needs a motion.

10 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Mr. Commander, Buxton, 4th
11 District, National Security Chairman, I move that
12 this be adopted.

13 2VC STENNIS: 2nd Vice Stennis seconds that
14 motion.

15 1VC TEIS: All right, we have a first and
16 second to accept resolution 22-07.

17 Any discussion?

18 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

19 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

21 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

24 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: 22-09.

25 "Whereas, the Department of Ohio Gifts for

1 Yanks Program has been in existence since 1952; and

2 "Whereas, the Department of Ohio Legion
3 recently moved the Department Gifts for Yanks
4 Committee under the purview of the Veterans Affairs
5 and Rehabilitation Commission; and

6 "Whereas, The American Legion VA&R is a
7 National program and the Gifts For Yanks is a
8 Department of Ohio program; and

9 "Whereas, the Department of Ohio American
10 Legion treats American Legion Baseball and American
11 Legion Boys State as programs approved by the DEC;
12 be it

13 "Resolved, by the Department Executive
14 Committee of The American Legion Department of Ohio,
15 in regular session assembled at Department
16 Headquarters on April 2, 2022, does hereby deem that
17 all minutes and decisions of the Gifts for Yanks
18 Committee will be approved by the Department
19 Executive Committee, rather than the Veterans
20 Affairs and Rehabilitation Commission."

21 It requires a vote.

22 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st
23 Vice, 9th District, I so move.

24 5TH DISTRICT 1VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop from
25 the 5th District seconds the motion.

1 1VC TEIS: All right, I have a motion and a
2 second to accept Resolution 22-09, Gifts for Yanks.

3 Any discussion?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

7 1VC TEIS: Opposed, same sign.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

10 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Commander, that's the end
11 of the resolutions.

12 1VC TEIS: All right. Thank you, sir.

13 We're getting down to the end.

14 Yes, Tom.

15 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Thank you,
16 Commander.

17 A question. Under Post Charter revocations and
18 suspensions, we talked about closing four Posts.
19 Doesn't the DEC have to approve this before it gets
20 forwarded to National?

21 ADJUTANT HALL: They were already approved.

22 1VC TEIS: They were approved prior to. They
23 were just bringing them back up to --

24 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: 182 was never
25 approved before this body.

1 I submitted a letter to Department on
2 January 19th, respectfully requesting that we cancel
3 the charter of this Post and merge its few remaining
4 assets, which are minor in nature, a couple flags,
5 they have no property, they have no members, merge
6 their assets with Post 1.

7 We really, really need to get this. This has
8 been on our books for three years. They've had no
9 members for three years. And it's been killing our
10 membership for three years.

11 1VC TEIS: All right, sir. We did not know
12 that.

13 Do you want to make the motion, sir?

14 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: I make a motion
15 that we close and cancel Charter 182, and transfer
16 its assets to Post 1.

17 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
18 District 1st Vice Commander, seconds said motion.

19 1VC TEIS: All right, we have a motion and a
20 second to send this paperwork on to National for
21 closing Post 182.

22 Any discussion?

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

24 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

1 1VC TEIS: Opposed, the same.

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander.

5 1VC TEIS: Yes.

6 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Back to the
7 Resolution 22-10, the conflict of interest. There
8 was not a ruling from the Chair. There was one by
9 the presenter, saying that the motion was invalid.
10 Can the Chair please rule?

11 I made a motion to amend the Rules and
12 Procedures of The American Legion Department
13 Executive Committee, Article 17, Conflict of
14 Interest. The Judge Advocate recommended to refer
15 it for study, but a motion was made by the floor, by
16 a member of the committee.

17 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Nobody seconded and it
18 died for lack of a second. Nobody seconded your
19 motion, until after we started the discussion. It
20 was never seconded.

21 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 14th
22 District 1st Vice Commander.

23 It died because there was no second because
24 they didn't get an opportunity to get a second. You
25 two started getting into an argument back and forth,

1 which kind of drew away from the motion.

2 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: I'd like to
3 introduce a motion to amend the rules and procedures
4 of this Executive Committee to add Article 17,
5 Conflict of Interest.

6 6TH DISTRICT CMDR COX: Gary Cox, Jr., 6th
7 District Commander, I second that.

8 1VC TEIS: Go ahead.

9 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: If you remember, when I
10 gave my report and I mentioned this, I said it was
11 tabled and you all passed that. So that makes it
12 tabled.

13 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander, when the
14 resolution was then read, the resolve clause was
15 read by the Judge Advocate, under resolutions, it
16 becomes active again.

17 Either or. Any member of this DEC can make a
18 motion to amend the rules of the DEC. This is where
19 I ask for a ruling of the Chair on the first or
20 second.

21 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: It needs unanimous
22 consent.

23 1VC TEIS: There is a motion on the floor.

24 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Go ahead.

25 1VC TEIS: We have a first and a second.

1 Any discussion?

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 1VC TEIS: All in favor signify by saying aye.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

5 1VC TEIS: Opposed.

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

7 1VC TEIS: Motion carried.

8 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: That's wonderful.

9 1VC TEIS: All right, let's continue on.

10 Is there any unfinished business?

11 Yes, Mr. Poulton.

12 PDC CHAPMAN: Commander, Past Commander

13 Chapman, who has no vote.

14 A point of order here. The Chair is the only
15 one that can rule somebody out of order. The Judge
16 Advocate is not a voting member of the committee.
17 He's there to whisper to you, he's there to pass
18 advice to you in a situation like that. You, as the
19 Chair, are the only one that can rule somebody out
20 of order.

21 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander,

22 Poulton, 12th District Commander.

23 I've been asked the same question for Items B,
24 C and D under closings. Don't they also have to
25 have a ruling by the DEC before it passes to

1 National for official cancellation of their
2 charters?

3 ADJUTANT HALL: Post 433 and 590 was prior to
4 me becoming Adjutant. And that has already been
5 voted on. So those have already been voted on.
6 Because those Posts all have to go up to National
7 for the final portion of this. But that's already
8 been voted on.

9 1VC TEIS: Any unfinished business?

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 1VC TEIS: New business.

12 Go ahead.

13 ADJUTANT HALL: Pretty quick, the District
14 forms which are going to be due, there is a packet
15 outside for all the Districts to pick up and get
16 your District forms. Please get those filled out so
17 that we can get those back so we can have those
18 immediately after the District conventions.

19 Also, the other thing is, we know that Arrow is
20 our preferred vendor through our Charities. They
21 also got awarded, through the state, an endorsement
22 for their electronic bingo. So we are -- I just
23 wanted to take time to do that so you know that it's
24 there.

25 The next DEC meeting is going to be held --

1 sorry, I got it out of order.

2 That's all I have for new business.

3 1VC TEIS: All right, anything for the good of
4 The Legion?

5 Christie, convention.

6 COORDINATOR WHITE: All right. I've discussed
7 the Department Convention multiple times. There is
8 a flyer out in the hallway. So I don't want to get
9 into it too, too much.

10 Again, the dates for the Department Convention
11 are July 1st through the 3rd. It is at the Hilton
12 Cincinnati Netherland. The deadline for
13 registration is May 29th. Please make your hotel
14 reservation by May 29th. If not, I'm going to get a
15 bunch of calls.

16 Hospitality rooms. There will be one group
17 hospitality room. It will be in the basement of the
18 hotel. The candidates and Districts will be in one
19 section of the room. There is a side room attached
20 to the hospitality that will be the officer's
21 hospitality. So you cannot have your own
22 hospitality. There will be one joint hospitality
23 room.

24 Does anyone have any questions on convention?

25 1VC TEIS: And the reason for the hospitality

1 rooms is, if you guys haven't been to this hotel,
2 they remodeled this hotel. This hotel goes way,
3 way, way back. But they didn't add any rooms. And
4 the rooms that we actually thought we could use for
5 hospitality rooms the Auxiliary is in. And we don't
6 want to have to have them take their stuff up to put
7 it in. We don't want to keep going back and forth.

8 But it's a huge room downstairs. It's like a
9 Jack and Jill, two bedrooms like, whatever you want
10 to call it. There's a bathroom in between.

11 And then Jean, the Commander, will have hers
12 over here (indicating). But then we'll all be in
13 the one.

14 So we'll have something going out soon.

15 COORDINATOR WHITE: The other thing I want to
16 mention about convention as well, there is a sheet
17 out in the hallway for vendors. We're trying to do
18 vendors a little different this year than we've done
19 in the past. They have their own room, their own
20 space. And we also have different packages for
21 vendors to purchase vendor space. So if you would
22 like to take a flyer or two back to your communities
23 or Districts and see if anybody would be interested
24 in becoming a vendor or sponsoring, that would be an
25 awesome thing.

1 Any other questions on Department Convention?

2 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

3 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Thank you.

4 1VC TEIS: Thank you, dear.

5 Better do the National right now, while you're
6 there.

7 COORDINATOR WHITE: Okay. National Convention.

8 So there's also information in the hallway
9 about National Convention. That was completed
10 yesterday. The registration form and the hotel
11 registration form is out there.

12 National Convention will be in Milwaukee,
13 Wisconsin, August 26th through September 1st. The
14 Department of Ohio will be housed at the Doubletree
15 Hilton Milwaukee downtown. Again, the address is on
16 the form out there. If not, see me after and I can
17 give you the address to the hotel.

18 The Wisconsin Center District is a two-mile
19 (sic) walk from the hotel -- or not two miles, two
20 minutes. Sorry.

21 I just wanted to see if you were paying
22 attention.

23 The housing cost, including tax, is \$164 a
24 night. Parking is \$123 (sic), and it's valet
25 parking only.

1 FROM THE FLOOR: 123 for the whole trip?

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: 123 (sic) per day, valet
3 parking.

4 You guys can call Bridget at National.
5 National chose the hotel. The hotel chooses the
6 parking amount. Do not shoot the messenger.

7 1VC TEIS: Whether you want to believe it or
8 not, the price last year was the same. That's
9 National. That's not us. That's National.

10 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Christie, there will
11 probably be American Legion Posts that will shuttle
12 you back and forth to your car, like they did in
13 Indianapolis; right?

14 COORDINATOR WHITE: I would assume so. There's
15 still some details that are not worked out yet
16 through Department and National, as far as meeting
17 places. There's still information that's being sent
18 out.

19 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th
20 District Commander.

21 On the flyer you've got, it just says \$23. It
22 doesn't say 123.

23 COORDINATOR WHITE: I'm sorry.

24 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: It says \$23, plus
25 tax, for valet parking.

1 COORDINATOR WHITE: Correct.

2 14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: You said 123.

3 COORDINATOR WHITE: Oh, 23. That's why
4 everyone was freaking out. It's 23 bucks, yes.
5 \$23.

6 (Applause).

7 Any other questions on National Convention or
8 Department Convention?

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 COORDINATOR WHITE: No? Okay.

11 ADJUTANT HALL: All right, just a couple of
12 things that I have.

13 1VC TEIS: Come on.

14 ADJUTANT HALL: So the DEC, the first DEC, for
15 outgoing, is going to be on June 30th. We do not
16 have a time set for that yet, but that will be in
17 the mail when it goes out for that DEC.

18 And then the DEC is going to be on July 3rd for
19 the new incoming officers that are coming in.

20 And again, those times are all to be determined
21 as we get closer to the timeline. When we send out
22 the mailing, we'll have the times added to the dates
23 for that.

24 Also, the National Membership Workshop is on
