3 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll salute the colors.  
4 One, two.

5 . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

6 Invocation by Department Chaplain Al Buxton.

7 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Good morning.

8 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

9 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: I'd like to remember a few  
10 people in our prayers that's been ill, and the  
11 passing of Bob Klostermeier's brother, Steve.  
12 Please remember him in our prayer.

13 Dear Lord, as we gather for this meeting,  
14 give us the use of Your gift of peace and  
15 understanding, that we may approach the matters  
16 that we must handle with sincere and just hearts.  
17 And may You watch over and guide our tongues, that  
18 we may not hurt our friends with whom we work for  
19 the betterment of our communities and our country.  
20 Keep us always true to the principles on which The  
21 American Legion was founded.

22 We ask this in Your Holy name, amen.

23 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Remain uncovered.

25 1st Vice Brad will lead us in the pledge.

1 . . . PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

2 COMMANDER WILSON: 2nd Vice Charles will lead  
3 us in the preamble.

4 . . . PREAMBLE BY ASSEMBLY . . .

5 A POW/MIA empty chair is placed at all  
6 official meetings of The American Legion as a  
7 physical symbol of the thousands of American  
8 POW/MIAs still unaccounted for from all wars and  
9 conflicts involving the United States of America.  
10 This is a reminder to all of us to spare no effort  
11 to secure the release of any American prisoners  
12 from captivity, the repatriation of the remains of  
13 those who died bravely in the defense of liberty,  
14 and a full accounting for all those missing.

15 Let us rededicate ourselves for this vital  
16 endeavor.

17 We'll now have roll call by Adjutant Eric  
18 Hall.

19 ADJUTANT HALL: Good morning, everybody.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

21 ADJUTANT HALL: All right, let's continue  
22 with the roll call.

23 . . . ROLL CALL CONDUCTED . . .

24 COMMANDER WILSON: We do have a quorum.

25 Now we'll have introduction of guests by

2 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: Commander, we have  
3 with us Jerry Wilson, our National Vice Commander;  
4 Al Beyer, Department Historian; Frank Adley,  
5 Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms; Walter  
6 Meharg, Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms;  
7 Jason Rue, Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms;  
8 Ken LaVoy, 2nd Vice Commander, Legislative  
9 Chairman; Robin Johnson, 2nd Vice Commander of the  
10 8th District; John Looker, Department Oratorical  
11 Chairman; Wesley, 2nd Vice Commander, I can't read  
12 the last name.

13 FROM THE FLOOR: Carothers.

14 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: Okay, Crothers.

15 Ron Distel, Assistant Chaplin; Dayna Beyer,  
16 Department Historian, Auxiliary; Robert Schmitt,  
17 Past Department Commander; Ron Chapman, President  
18 of Buckeye Boys State; George Monroe, Past  
19 Department Sergeant-at-Arms and Past 4th District  
20 Commander; James Koppin, Director of Buckeye Boys  
21 State; Shane Eaton, 6th District 2nd Vice; Steve  
22 Foster, Department Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms;  
23 Chuck Craynon, Past Department Treasurer; Holly  
24 Lewis, Media, Marketing and Communications;  
25 Richard Houp, Americanism Chair; Suzette Heller,

1 2nd Vice of the 12th District; Andy Atkins, Child

3 Who did I miss?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: Thank you.

6 That's it, Commander.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Craig.

8 We'll have the previous minutes by Eric Hall.

9 PDC FRIEND: Commander?

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, Roger Friend. Roger  
11 Friend.

12 PDC FRIEND: Roger Friend, PDC. Sorry.

13 I move that we suspend the reading of the  
14 minutes due to the fact that the minutes are  
15 provided prior to.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, we have a motion.

17 Do we have a second?

18 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Steve Ervin, 4th  
19 District, I second that motion.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: The motion is seconded.

21 Since everyone was provided with the minutes  
22 prior to the meeting and the minutes are printed,  
23 we will dispense with the reading of the minutes.

24 Is there any discussion?

25 Yes.

1           9TH DISTRICT1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st  
2 Vice, 9th District. On page 137, line No. 9, it  
3 says, "They classified their officers." It should  
4 be they "certified" their officers.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: Certified, thank you.  
6 We'll note that correction. Thank you.

7           Any other corrections or additions?

8           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

9           COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
10 favor signify by saying aye.

11          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

12          COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

13          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

14          COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

15          All right. I'd like to welcome everyone to  
16 the DEC meeting. Thank you for being here. We  
17 have a lot of business to go through today.

18          Please make sure that if you have a cell  
19 phone that it's turned off or on vibrate. We  
20 would hate to fine you, but we will.

21          So when you want to speak, please raise your  
22 hand and address the chair. Give your name so the  
23 Dragons over here (indicating) can record it  
24 properly. So we need your name and your District,  
25 or your title, for the information for the



1 Dragons. And that's very helpful.

2 If you're giving a report, please be prepared  
3 to give your report. We don't want to waste time  
4 watching you walk up here to the microphone. So  
5 when you know you're going to be giving a report,  
6 kind of line up here (indicating) so we can move  
7 the meeting on quickly.

8 Just a couple of things from the Department  
9 that we're doing.

10 We're currently working on policies for the  
11 Department. We're currently working on a  
12 Department credit card policy, a Department cell  
13 phone use policy, e-mail and internet policies,  
14 the code of ethics. We hope to have these all  
15 completed and out to you guys for your review by  
16 the first of the year.

17 Kevin Motter, from the 1st District, a recent  
18 graduate of the National American Legion College,  
19 I asked him if he would just say a few things  
20 about what happened at the college and what he  
21 took from it and how much he enjoyed it.

22 You did enjoy it?

23 1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Yes, ma'am.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

25 If you would just come to the microphone.

1           1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: First of all, you  
2 know, you buy them books, you send them to school,  
3 and they still dress in the wrong darn dress.

4           COMMANDER WILSON: You have your Legion cap  
5 on and you're dressed appropriately.

6           1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: I stand out.

7           It was a --

8           FROM THE FLOOR: We can't hear you.

9           1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Can you hear me  
10 now?

11          FROM THE FLOOR: Turn the volume up.

12          Yeah, you might have to turn the volume up or  
13 something.

14          1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Hello?

15          I'll use my command voice. How's that?

16          COMMANDER WILSON: There you go.

17          1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: All right.

18          Once again, I apologize for being in the  
19 wrong dress. Yes, I know I'm in the Legion cap.  
20 But, you know, send me to school, you know, I skip  
21 over some stuff.

22          The National Legion College was fantastic.

23          You know, the first thing they tell you is  
24 there's no hospitality room, and that's absolutely  
25 true. You don't have time for a hospitality room.

1 You know, they pack a lot of stuff in in those  
2 five, six days that you're there. As soon as you  
3 get there, you start learning.

4 I would encourage you to search your  
5 Districts for younger members, to start pushing  
6 them through National Legion College.

7 In 2020, I was the only applicant in the  
8 Department to go. So I was chosen to go. It was  
9 a great honor.

10 I mean just to go to the National  
11 Headquarters and to see the history behind the  
12 Legion and what we're all about, and the people  
13 who helped to construct this organization, and to  
14 see the building and all the mementoes and the  
15 history and the artifacts that go along with that,  
16 from 1919 to the present, was just tremendous.  
17 That was probably -- if I wasn't studying, that's  
18 what I was doing is I was searching that building  
19 high and low for different things.

20 Once again, I think the main thing that I  
21 took away from it was the awareness of the  
22 generational changes, you know, the generational  
23 changes between the World War II generation and my  
24 generation.

25 The World War II generation was the

1 generation that pretty much groomed me and the  
2 Vietnam era for where we're at today. And they  
3 have a different perspective on things because of  
4 their life, the things that they went through  
5 during their lives, the Great Depression and such.

6 The Vietnam generation had a different  
7 perspective on things than the World War II  
8 generation.

9 My generation, and the generations forward  
10 from me, have a different perspective.

11 What we have to do is we have to be mindful  
12 of those differences.

13 One of the things that we were made aware of  
14 was today's veterans don't like to talk on the  
15 telephone, the younger guys. They would rather  
16 have a text message or an e-mail. They are very  
17 mindful of time. They don't like their time  
18 wasted. And they look at wanting to move up into  
19 leadership positions faster than what we are used  
20 to, prior generations.

21 So what we're looking at doing is finding the  
22 right individuals with the right attitude, the  
23 right desire, to do the things that this  
24 organization is all about, and look at them, groom  
25 them, point them in the right direction, and start

1 getting them trained up. And that's what National  
2 Legion College is for.

3 It's a stepping stone. First we've got basic  
4 training, you know, through National. And then  
5 you've got Buckeye Legion College, that's the next  
6 stepping stone. Then National Legion College is  
7 the next thing above that.

8 But I highly encourage you to look out for or  
9 look for those younger members and encourage them  
10 to apply and get them through that course.  
11 Because that's where we're headed for.

12 We've got another generational change coming  
13 up.

14 We went through -- you know, I remember World  
15 War I veterans. I had a great uncle who I  
16 remember fondly who was a World War I veteran.  
17 That generation went to post everlasting.

18 World War II is rapidly, rapidly going. I  
19 know I've got one member in my Post, in my home  
20 Post, that's a World War II veteran. But he's  
21 unable to do anything.

22 Along with Korea and Vietnam, you guys are  
23 the backbone right now. But you're going to be  
24 moving on also. So we need to look at those  
25 younger members and groom them.

1           And I'm looking at some already here that  
2           need to apply for Buckeye Boys State, or not  
3           Buckeye Boys State, but National Legion College.  
4           And I already told Jason he needs to get his  
5           application in and get that done.

6           I think I've used up my time, ma'am.

7           COMMANDER WILSON: You're good.

8           1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Thank you very  
9           much.

10          (Applause).

11          COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Kevin.

12          And as Kevin says, you know, we need more  
13          graduates.

14          If you have any questions about what you need  
15          to do to go to Legion College, see Ken LaVoy or  
16          Mike Blackwell or Holly, so they can answer any  
17          question that you have.

18          I will ask that -- and I know that when we're  
19          all sitting next to each other it's easy to start  
20          chatting with one another, but if you could, try  
21          to keep it down a little bit. When I hear someone  
22          else talking when someone else is talking, I get a  
23          little distracted. So just please try to be  
24          mindful of that.

25          Also, recently, I think most of you got this

1 on your table, but long-time Legionnaire, a great  
2 man, who was Department Historian many years, him  
3 and his wife worked together, but he's turning 90.  
4 And they're going to be having a celebration for  
5 him on January the 23rd. So if anybody is  
6 interested in that, hopefully you have that  
7 information.

8 Okay, so now we're going to be moving on.  
9 And we'll have Mr. Brad give us a membership  
10 report.

11 1VC TEIS: Commander.

12 Morning.

13 FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: Morning.

14 1VC TEIS: Well, we got good news, we got bad  
15 news. That's every membership year.

16 We're getting into that time of the year  
17 where everything starts slowing down. And we  
18 can't slow down. We have to keep going. We've  
19 hit every lap so far.

20 Right now we're sitting at roughly around  
21 71 percent. But we need to be 75 percent by  
22 Wednesday. So hopefully we get a lot of cards  
23 turned in today and we get some coming in.

24 But please get out to your Posts. We've got  
25 to get them. You've got to round them up, bring

1 them in down here, and let John know so we can get  
2 them in the system.

3 Let's see, we like to start with  
4 congratulations to the 2nd District.

5 1st Vice, stand up.

6 And also the 4th District stand up.

7 They both won the brown jug this year.

8 They'll be receiving their awards at Mid-Winter.

9 And that's \$1,000 to both of your Districts.

10 So thank you very much.

11 (Applause).

12 All right, you can sit down, gentlemen.

13 Thank you.

14 New member recruiting cards. Anybody gets a  
15 new member, you guys got a shot at 100 bucks. We  
16 pull 15 tickets at Mid-Winter and we pull 15 at  
17 the Department Convention. If you don't put them  
18 in, you don't have a chance.

19 And right now, what have we got, John?

20 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Probably about 100  
21 or so.

22 1VC TEIS: So 100, that's it. And I know  
23 that people have recruited more than that.

24 Please get them in. Get them to John. Get  
25 them turned in by Mid-Winter. We'll get them in



1 the thing and we can get them drawn out. It's 100  
2 bucks for anybody who gets it.

3 If not, then there's a lot of people like  
4 Jerry and a lot of other people who have gotten  
5 double winners. And you can't say, "Well why did  
6 they win twice?" Well, if you don't turn them in,  
7 that's what happens.

8 New members. We like to get new members.  
9 But the problem is, right now, we need to work on  
10 retention. If this department could get to  
11 90 percent retention, we'll be quota by probably  
12 March or April.

13 We need to start getting out to our Posts.  
14 When you're going around doing your Post  
15 inspections, please get with them. Show them how  
16 to go over their sheets and look at their  
17 retention.

18 We have to retain the members we have. We're  
19 averaging seven to 8,000 a year that we don't  
20 retain. If we would have retained half of those  
21 in the last five years, this Department would have  
22 been quota five years in the row. We've got to  
23 get those done.

24 Everybody is worried about 888s. Those are  
25 great. Those are extra.

1           John knows and I know, and we've been  
2 fighting with National about getting the 888s in  
3 the system. He has the report. They're in the  
4 system, but they're not showing on our reports  
5 because they can't do that yet.

6           The thing about that is is we have a funny  
7 feeling, because of the new system and the way the  
8 membership year starts, actually January 1st, I  
9 think, after January 1st, we're going to start  
10 seeing them on our report.

11           Correct, John?

12           ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: That's what it  
13 looks like.

14           1VC TEIS: That's what I think. That's what  
15 we're seeing.

16           But those are extra and above. We need to  
17 keep up with retention. We need to keep that  
18 going. We can't depend on the 888s.

19           And this is a great time right now. You're  
20 sending out Christmas cards. If you send  
21 Christmas cards out to your Post, put a little  
22 note in there. Put a little note in there and  
23 tell them to please contact you and see if they  
24 need any help trying to get their membership in.

25           And also start a mailing right now. Put a

1 mailing out to your Posts and have them send  
2 mailings out to their members.

3 I know Jean and I, our Posts, we always start  
4 real early. We start before the year even starts.  
5 We start in June, sending out. So we start  
6 getting stuff in before National.

7 Do not wait for National to send out their  
8 dues notices. Because pretty soon I don't think  
9 you're going to see them. I think they're going  
10 to leave them up to the Departments.

11 But we can't depend on them. We have to  
12 depend on ourselves.

13 When we had our meeting, we were talking  
14 about the team concept. A lot of you are doing  
15 it. And it shows in our District reports, and in  
16 the Department reports also.

17 But for those not using it, it shows. It  
18 shows. There's no "I" in team. You're not going  
19 to get it done by yourself. Split up your  
20 reports. Split up your Posts.

21 Like District 10 has got 65 Posts. I'd have  
22 seven people split that up. That's less than ten.  
23 And let those people take care of those ten Posts.  
24 That way you can go to one person to get a report  
25 for all ten Posts.

1 Split them up, north, south, east, west, or  
2 whatever you have to do. Split them up that way.  
3 It works.

4 We did it for years. District 4 is doing it,  
5 2 is doing it, 3 is doing it. And we're doing a  
6 great job if we keep doing it that way.

7 If you want to keep doing it on your own,  
8 you're still going to be sitting where you're at.

9 Let's see, the other thing was Post  
10 Inspection Forms. I sent out an e-mail to all 1st  
11 Vice, 2nd Vice, and Commanders of the Districts.  
12 So if anybody has any Post Inspection Forms -- did  
13 you bring them in today?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (Indicating).

15 1VC TEIS: One, two, I got three back here.  
16 Okay.

17 Because we had that meeting, that GoToMeeting  
18 the other night. And I sent an e-mail out saying  
19 I wanted them. And on the GoTo Meeting there was  
20 a lot of you guys who said you almost had them  
21 done. So if you almost had them done, then I  
22 should have all of your reports.

23 We've got to have them in. And I'm going to  
24 keep bugging you until we have them all, 100  
25 percent.

1           When it comes down to membership cards also,  
2 we are sitting at over 90 Posts, or 90 Squadrons  
3 in the Department that have not turned in one  
4 Squadron membership card.

5           When you guys go out and talk to your Posts,  
6 please let the Commander of that Post know that is  
7 his responsibility to follow up with that Squadron  
8 to make sure those cards are getting turned in.

9           But we've got over 90 Squadrons that haven't  
10 turned one card in. And we're at the end of the  
11 year.

12           How many do we have not mailed out yet?

13           FROM THE FLOOR: 38.

14           1VC TEIS: So 38 Squadrons have not turned in  
15 their paperwork to get their cards. It's  
16 terrible. So I'd like to have each one of you  
17 District Commanders, at the end, see John  
18 afterwards. We need to find out what Squadrons in  
19 your Districts have cards that are still sitting  
20 back there so you guys can get out there and get  
21 this done.

22           At this time, who's got the green lantern?

23           FROM THE FLOOR: (Indicating).

24           1VC TEIS: Would you like to stand up,  
25 please, and give it to your counterpart next to

1 you.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Congratulations.

3 1VC TEIS: Congratulations to the 2nd  
4 District.

5 Mr. Tim, you're doing a great job.

6 (Applause).

7 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Don't get too  
8 comfortable.

9 On behalf of the 4th District, we're very  
10 happy, really, to pass this on. Not that we  
11 wanted to pass it on, but Tim and his group did a  
12 very outstanding job this year. He's been in  
13 contact with the 4th District this whole year,  
14 asking us how he can do things, working his team.

15 Jerry has indicated, I wish he was here today  
16 to speak also, but he said Tim has been really on  
17 top of it, trying to get things done.

18 So we're very, very happy to have some  
19 competition this year. That's the main thing. So  
20 congratulations and don't let anybody take that.

21 1VC TEIS: All right.

22 And the little note that Mr. Perry sent me,  
23 it says, "A great honor to carry this lantern. I  
24 want each District in the state to see how hard it  
25 is to work to get this done. And I want to thank

1 1st Vice Commander Tim Shaw, from the 2nd-to-None  
2 District for keeping the pressure on and to be  
3 awarded the green lantern for his District."

4 (Applause).

5 All right, the red lantern. 12th District.  
6 12th District.

7 FROM THE FLOOR: Who do you want, the  
8 Commander or the 1st Vice?

9 1VC TEIS: 1st Vice.

10 (Applause).

11 Now you've got to work to give that back to  
12 somebody.

13 All right. And both of you gentlemen  
14 remember one thing: You've got to carry that with  
15 you. If you don't have it at the DEC meetings, or  
16 anyplace else, and somebody questions and asks for  
17 it, you can be fined \$20.

18 All right, at this time, let's see, John, you  
19 want to come up?

20 We'll just do this over there.

21 All right, at this time we know that at every  
22 District, or at the Department DEC meetings, the  
23 leaders from the Districts that are ahead in the  
24 large, medium and small categories get a small No.  
25 1 pin.

1           So right now, from the 4th District, would  
2 Mr. Steve Ervin come up in place of Mr. Perry.

3           Congratulations.

4           (Applause).

5           All right, the medium category, Mr. Tim Shaw.  
6           Congratulations.

7           (Applause).

8           All right. And then the small category,  
9 Mr. Schmoll.

10          Congratulations.

11          8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: Thank you, sir.

12          (Applause).

13          1VC TEIS: All right. Now, at this time,  
14 does anybody have any cards to turn in?

15          Bring them up and see Mr. John and say in the  
16 mic how many you've got.

17          . . . MEMBERSHIP CARDS TURNED IN . . .

18          All right, I know there's quite a bit of  
19 cards here.

20          I know Post 374 had 67 or 68 and had another  
21 30-something come in.

22          ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: So that's 100 for  
23 that Post.

24          1VC TEIS: That almost puts them at quota.

25          All right, don't forget, 1st Vices,



1 Commanders, 2nd Vices if you'd like to, there's a  
2 membership meeting December 21st, 6:00 o'clock,  
3 GoTo Meeting. And please, please, please, send  
4 your inspection reports in. We're going to start  
5 putting them on --

6 Yes, sir?

7 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Have them send them  
8 to Sherry, at her e-mail address.

9 1VC TEIS: Okay.

10 You got that? Send them to Sherry, Sherry  
11 Yockey, at her e-mail address, if you're going to  
12 do it by e-mail.

13 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Executive admin.

14 1VC TEIS: ExecutiveAdmin@OhioLegion.

15 Because we've got to get these in. The last  
16 few years we got them in but we got them in late.  
17 We're going to have it done. It will be done by  
18 March 1st, folks. I will have you on speed dial.

19 At this time, thanks everybody, for  
20 attending.

21 2nd Vices, I appreciate you coming today.  
22 Please stop in for every meeting we have, because  
23 next year you'll be coming through.

24 And then all the 1st Vices, which will be  
25 Commanders next year, and the 2nd Vices coming up,

1 remember that our February meeting will be here at  
2 the Department for our membership meeting.

3 And we'll be working on the new membership  
4 manual for next year. So look at your membership  
5 manuals now and see if there's any changes you  
6 think you might want to see done, or that we need  
7 to do to help your Posts and the Districts win  
8 their monies, and so we can start handing out more  
9 money too.

10 But we have quite a few monetary amounts  
11 we're going to be handing out at the Mid-Winter.  
12 And the awards will be on Sunday this year, not at  
13 the Saturday night dinner.

14 So thank you very much.

15 Commander, that's my report.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Brad.

17 Now we'll have a report from our 2nd Vice,  
18 Charles Stennis.

19 2VC STENNIS: Good morning, ladies and  
20 gentlemen.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

22 2VC STENNIS: You guys can do better than  
23 that.

24 Good morning, ladies and gentlemen.

25 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

1           2VC STENNIS: Outstanding.

2           If I wanted to go to a funeral, I'd head down  
3 the road a little bit.

4           First, I will talk about Post activities.

5           The Department Bowling Tournament will be  
6 held the weekends of February 11th through 13th,  
7 the 18th through 20th, the 25th through 27th. And  
8 snow date is March 4th through the 6th. It will  
9 be held at Cedar Lanes, in Sandusky, Ohio. And it  
10 will be hosted by Post 83. The deadline for the  
11 bowling tournament is December 20th. And the  
12 registration information is on the Department  
13 website. And the cost is \$61 per person.

14           Next, the euchre tournament is March 19th.  
15 And that's going to be hosted by Post 262. That's  
16 out in Hamman, Ohio. That's a little south of  
17 Toledo. And that will be \$20 per team.

18           You know, I tried to learn euchre off  
19 YouTube. That's a difficult game. That game is  
20 not easy.

21           But I'll be there. And I expect to win.

22           It's like backwards Spades a little bit.  
23 It's a difficult game. It's not easy. Not easy.  
24 Not easy.

25           Project 1500 Thanks. Now I have gotten a few

1 things from some Districts, but not all. But not  
2 all.

3 The goal, or what Project 1500 Thanks is, is  
4 that I want 100 thank yous from each District,  
5 whether you send a card, whether you send an  
6 e-mail, or whether you made a phone call. E-mail  
7 me, text me, or even call me, I'm not going to  
8 answer but you can call me, and say what you have  
9 done. And I'm going to put that together.

10 Because what's going to happen at convention,  
11 I'm going to put together a dashboard of who we've  
12 reached out and contacted, who we've started to  
13 develop relationships.

14 No one man is an island. And whether you're  
15 the Commander, whether you're the 1st Vice, 2nd  
16 Vice, you are not. We need to develop  
17 relationships.

18 One of the biggest problems within our  
19 organization is that we have a hard time relating  
20 from one generation to another.

21 So, here's a great example. I sent a thank  
22 you card to a young lady who is doing a  
23 fundraiser, and told her she did a great job, she  
24 did wonderful. And you know what she did to me?  
25 She sent me a letter back saying would you

1 recommend me for a doctorate degree at Antioch  
2 College. And of course I did that.

3 But that's forming a relationship by just  
4 sending a card and saying thank you.

5 Internal affairs. We met for the very first  
6 time at the fall conference. We had a lengthy  
7 discussion about Post 888s. But one of the  
8 gentlemen graciously told us that although need to  
9 focus on 888s, we also need to focus on renewing  
10 the members that we already have. We really do.

11 And with that being said, over the  
12 Thanksgiving holiday, I sat down with my 1st Vice  
13 in my Post and we found out we had four dead  
14 members still on the roster. And we also found  
15 out that we had members that the Post normally  
16 paid for that we should have three or four months  
17 ago. So those sort of things --

18 And Mr. Foster (sic), I think it was you.  
19 You were right.

20 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Ervin.

21 2VC STENNIS: Ervin, I'm sorry.

22 You were right.

23 But anyway, we are planning to have a  
24 meeting, everyone who was on that committee, we  
25 are planning on having another meeting at

1 Mid-Winter, in the afternoon on Saturday. I will  
2 be forwarding information prior to that.

3 And we may have a GoTo Meeting before we have  
4 that meeting. Because we spent a lot of time on a  
5 couple of subjects and we need to get away from  
6 doing that.

7 And the problem is, we talk too much. We  
8 talk too much. And what we need to do is get down  
9 to the business at hand and what needs to be done.

10 And that will be at Mid-Winter. And I do  
11 know we have some information that we have to go  
12 over, some resolutions that we have to go over, so  
13 we can make our recommendations to the DEC.

14 And then lastly, before I get out of here, I  
15 made a mistake by buying Survey Monkey. Does  
16 anybody know what that is?

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Yeah. Yeah.

18 2VC STENNIS: So I bought it by mistake. It  
19 cost me a grand.

20 But anyway, I bought it and I used it for  
21 another organization. But when my Post started  
22 doing a little infighting, I used it for my Post.

23 And what I did, I created a survey. And I  
24 sent that survey out to leadership within the  
25 Post, where they were able to put comments to it.

1 And what I decided to do was sit everybody down  
2 and do a, I don't know if everyone has worked in  
3 manufacturing, but do a 5S sort of thing. And  
4 actually that's worked out kind of well. Because  
5 things we should have done three or four years  
6 ago, we've done in less than 30 days. We've  
7 updated websites. We brought in Constant Contact.  
8 Hell, we even brought in a bowling machine, in  
9 less than 30 days. Because one group thought that  
10 the other group didn't understand each other.

11 So anyone who wants to borrow it, or see it,  
12 or even just review it, please let me know. I'll  
13 forward it to you. Like I said, I already paid  
14 for the software. So if you're able to use that,  
15 that would be great.

16 Actually, I brought a copy of what we did  
17 with me. And if you want to take a look at it,  
18 I'm always willing to share.

19 And Commander, that's all I have.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, thank you.

21 And we'll now call on our Department  
22 Treasurer, Robert Wilson.

23 TREASURER WILSON: Good morning.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

25 TREASURER WILSON: Since this is my first

1 report as Treasurer, I asked some senior people in  
2 our Department for some advice. And I was told  
3 three words, "short and sweet."

4 Okay, No. 1, we have nine investment accounts  
5 with the Fidelity Investment firm. As of  
6 October 31st, we have \$7,619,993.43. The 990 Form  
7 is complete and filed for 2020.

8 The audit. Well, there's some balance sheet  
9 issues that we have to get resolved. Once those  
10 are resolved, hopefully very soon --

11 How much is that, 20?

12 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Twenty bucks? I don't  
13 care. I got the money.

14 TREASURER WILSON: I didn't recommend that,  
15 Brother Jerry.

16 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: That's okay.

17 TREASURER WILSON: Okay.

18 Once those issues have been resolved, we hope  
19 to have the audit finished by late December,  
20 mid-January. So that's what we're pushing for  
21 now.

22 That's all I have. Thank you.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Just to clarify one thing  
24 for Robert, it's not a balance issue. It's  
25 documentation that they need. Okay?



1           One is they need a copy of a couple of checks  
2 that were given to the Department of Ohio. One  
3 was for an inheritance that we received. One was  
4 for a donation.

5           They pick a couple of things that they want  
6 to see the actual documentation for.

7           There is really nothing major. It's just a  
8 few simple things that they asked us for that we  
9 have to give them.

10          And we hope to have it cleared up and  
11 everything given to them by the end of next week.  
12 And then it's back in their ballpark.

13          So did anybody have any questions for Robert?

14          Yes, Mr. Bishop.

15          5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 5th  
16 District 1st Vice Commander.

17          I was going over the profit and loss sheets.

18          COMMANDER WILSON: Sorry, we're having  
19 trouble hearing you.

20          5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: I'm sorry.

21          I was going over the profit and loss sheets  
22 that you sent out on the e-mail. And it seemed  
23 like just about everybody has a negative balance.  
24 And I'd like to know why the investments for the  
25 Gifts to the Yanks is not on the profit and loss

1 sheets. They've got about \$400,000 in  
2 investments. And I want to know why it's not put  
3 on the sheet. According to the sheet here, we're  
4 \$16,000 in the red, which we're not in the red.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Do you have an answer for  
6 that, Charles?

7 2VC STENNIS: Yes.

8 PDC Bishop, what we did was we pulled Gifts  
9 for the Yanks out of the -- that actually should  
10 not be there. And in our last Finance meeting,  
11 they are going to update the P&L. So those items  
12 will be removed and they will not be seen. There  
13 were several items that we noted to Rea and  
14 Associates that need to be removed. And once  
15 those are removed, the next P&L you see will be  
16 cleaned up.

17 5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Thank you.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, Joyce.

19 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st  
20 Vice, 9th District.

21 Is it possible that we can get that, the  
22 financial information, sent to us a little bit  
23 sooner than a week before the DEC? That's a lot  
24 to go over, especially if some of us have jobs  
25 still. I mean it's a lot to read. And some of us

1 actually read things like minutes and finance  
2 reports. Just a, you know, a week or two earlier,  
3 would really help out a lot to give us time to go  
4 over that.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, that can be done.  
6 We're trying to get the reports out quicker and  
7 clearer to everyone, as soon as possible, and we  
8 will work on that.

9 9TH DISTRICT1VC HANNUM: Thanks.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: You're welcome.

11 Anyone else?

12 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

13 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Thank you,  
14 Robert.

15 We'll move on to Al Buxton.

16 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Good morning again.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

18 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Everybody hear me?

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Yeah.

20 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Well, in my Chaplain's  
21 report, I've sent out quite a few cards to those  
22 that have been sick and those who have lost family  
23 members.

24 We'd also like to continue and remember the  
25 family of Bob Klostermeier, Past Department

1 Commander from 1984 to '85.

2 And Paul Drake's family. Paul passed away  
3 last week, I believe it was.

4 And Bob Mendoza, I understand he's in  
5 hospice. He was a Past Department Assistant  
6 Sergeant-at-Arms.

7 And anybody else that you know of that's been  
8 sick, or anybody who is sick or anybody who has  
9 lost somebody in their family, let us know and I  
10 will get a card out to everybody.

11 Darell.

12 5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 1st  
13 Vice Commander of the 5th District.

14 Our Commander, Ron Dull, has COVID. He found  
15 out about it yesterday. That's why he's not here.

16 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Okay. I'll get a card out  
17 to him. Let's remember that family also.

18 Also, coming up at Mid-Winter, I've been  
19 working on the, I've been asked to work on a Four  
20 Chaplains service. We will be having it at  
21 Mid-Winter. I have a copy of a program up here.  
22 Department Officer Jean and Brad and Charlie is  
23 going to be part of this, and one of the Chaplains  
24 from the 4th District. Ron is the Assistant  
25 Chaplain, and Melissa. We've got some good people

1 that's going to help to get this program kicking  
2 off.

3 I sent an e-mail to J.D. with a proposed  
4 poster that they're going to get and put up. And  
5 so take this back to your Districts and get as  
6 many people to come to this service as possible.  
7 I'd appreciate it very much.

8 That's the end of my Chaplain's report.

9 Now I'll go into National Security.

10 CMSN CHRMN BUXTON: National Security met  
11 Sunday, October the 10th, 10:00 AM, at Cherry  
12 Valley Lodge. All Districts were there except for  
13 three of them.

14 Introduction of guests: Robert Wilson,  
15 Department Treasurer; Jerry Perry, 4th District  
16 1st Vice and Law and Order Chairman.

17 Previous minutes were accepted by Jose Rivera  
18 and seconded by Mike Kennedy. Motion passed.

19 Opening remarks was given. District reports  
20 was given.

21 Old business: Law and Order Committee  
22 of-the-year awards. Law and Order Chair Jerry  
23 Perry spoke on moving the date up for Law and  
24 Order to Mid-Winter. The commission discussed the  
25 Law and Order Awards. The commission decided that

1 the awards should still be in place for summer  
2 convention this year, 2022, but moving forward  
3 towards Mid-Winter of 2023. Mike Kennedy made a  
4 motion to keep the awards of the year at the 2022  
5 Department Convention, but, moving forward,  
6 Department awards should be given out at  
7 Mid-Winter 2023. Doug Russell of the 10th  
8 seconded. The motion carried.

9 Jose Rivera made a motion to absorb the Law  
10 and Order Subcommittee into the National  
11 Commission, the National Security Commission, and  
12 five members of the National Security Commission  
13 will vote on the of-the-year awards. Richard  
14 Wright, 13th, seconded the motion.

15 A stipulation on the voting members is that  
16 voting members cannot vote on their own District's  
17 packet. Even and odd years have alternating  
18 voting years. The commission chair will always be  
19 one of the five voting members. The voting  
20 members for this year's awards are Districts 2, 6,  
21 12 and 14. Districts 4, 8 and 10 being alternates  
22 if anyone from 2, 6, 12 or 14 is unable to attend.

23 Motion carried.

24 The Wright-Patterson Blood Donor Program. A  
25 Department update was given on the

1 Wright-Patterson blood drive dates for October.  
2 They're not coming out and doing them. I think  
3 you have to go there and they will take care of  
4 it.

5 The amateur radio club was brought up. The  
6 commission is interested in having a ham radio  
7 operator come to Mid-Winter to discuss these  
8 programs potential in depth with the commission  
9 members.

10 New business.

11 National Guard is not getting paid when  
12 calling up for wildfire service and other things  
13 that the states call them up for. Chairman Buxton  
14 is interested in drafting a resolution to address  
15 this issue. Jose Rivera volunteered to draft the  
16 resolution.

17 Environmental and Conservation Committee:

18 Past Department Commander Bob Schmidt is going to  
19 be asked by Mike Kennedy about this committee at  
20 their District meeting. Mike Kennedy will remind  
21 Past Department Commander Schmidt that there needs  
22 to be a meeting held before Mid-Winter.

23 Resolutions: Asked about the M-16 resolution  
24 passed at National. Department Coordinator Scott  
25 Palider researched and informed the commission

1 members that this resolution did not pass  
2 National.

3 Good of The Legion, there was several things:  
4 Governor DeWine visited the National Guard  
5 stationed on the southern border.

6 Afghan refugees will be welcomed in Ohio  
7 according to Governor DeWine.

8 House Bill 5297, regarding establishing a  
9 National POW/MIA Memorial Museum in Jacksonville,  
10 Florida. Scott researched this piece of  
11 legislation for the commission members since it is  
12 regarding POW/MIAs.

13 No further business, the meeting was  
14 adjourned at 11:07 AM.

15 Commander, I move that these minutes be  
16 accepted as written.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Al Buxton moved that the  
18 minutes of these meetings be accepted as read.

19 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,  
20 Wright, 13th District, seconds.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Richard Wright from the  
22 13th District seconds.

23 Is there any discussion?

24 Yes, Joyce.

25 9TH DISTRICT1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th



1 District 1st Vice.

2 Can I turn in a couple of law and order  
3 applications for awards to you?

4 CMSN CHRMN BUXTON: Is that for this coming  
5 year, 2022?

6 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well they're due  
7 December 6th.

8 CMSN CHRMN BUXTON: If they are for 2022, I  
9 will take them, yes.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Anything else?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all in favor  
13 signify by saying aye.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: Aye.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

18 And thank you for submitting those  
19 applications from the 9th District.

20 CMSN CHRMN BUXTON: Yes, thank you, Joyce.

21 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Okay, let's go on with the  
22 Religious Emphasis Committee.

23 On September 11th, at 11:00 AM, the meeting  
24 was called to order. Department Chaplain Buxton  
25 opened the meeting of the Department Religious

1 Emphasis Committee at 11:00 AM. Salute the  
2 colors. Invocation by Chaplain Distel and  
3 Chaplain Schiffer. Pledge of Allegiance, and  
4 Chaplain Buxton led in reciting the Pledge.

5 Roll call --

6 COMMANDER WILSON: You can just give us the  
7 meat of the meeting.

8 CHAPLAIN BUXTON: All right, I will.

9 There was not enough to have a quorum. So we  
10 just had discussions only.

11 Guest was Christie White, American Legion  
12 Americanism and Children Youth Coordinator.

13 I gave greetings to the committee on behalf  
14 of Commander Jean Wilson and thanked them for  
15 serving on the committee.

16 Reading of previous minutes. There was not a  
17 quorum to approve the minutes from the previous  
18 meeting. Same goes with the committee rules.

19 Welcome and opening remarks: I asked the  
20 committee to promote the Father John Duffy Award  
21 and Post Chaplain Award in their Posts and  
22 Districts. Chaplain Schiffer mentioned that since  
23 the Commander's project is suicide awareness, he  
24 would like more information to be handed out on  
25 resources for the District Chaplains to utilize to

1 help their members. Chairman Distel mentioned, or  
2 Chaplain Distel mentioned that the Save a Warrior  
3 is a great resource to help veterans in need.

4 Charles Stennis wants to make sure we continue to  
5 have services at all Department meetings,  
6 Mid-Winter, Fall Conference, Department  
7 Convention. Chaplain Distel mentions that Monday  
8 is the 50th year of him returning from the war.

9 Old business: Father John Duffy criteria,  
10 Chaplain Stennis let the new committee know that  
11 the application criteria was reduced last year by  
12 Chaplain Fowle to make it easier for nominations.  
13 Chaplain Buxton asked if Department can mail the  
14 Father John Duffy application and Chaplain  
15 application to all Post Chaplains. Christie asked  
16 all District Chaplains to send her a list of all  
17 their Chaplains in the District to make sure  
18 Department has updated information and can mail  
19 out applications to them.

20 Post Chaplain Awards: Promote this in your  
21 Posts. Department Chaplain asked each member to  
22 push the award and have 14 applications on  
23 Department Convention to pick one.

24 New business.

25 Sunday services for fall meeting. Chaplain

1 Distel will take care of the Catholic services.  
2 Chaplain Buxton and Chairman Bradley will take  
3 care of the Protestant services. If there are not  
4 enough people, they will be combined and do a  
5 nondenominational service.

6 Prayer request/sick call. Chaplain Buxton is  
7 sending out cards to those members that have  
8 reached out and asked for prayer. Charles  
9 Sollberger's wife is not doing well. Lou  
10 Dimmerman was just released again from the  
11 hospital. And Steve Ebersole's wife Carol is in  
12 hospice.

13 Good of The Legion. Chaplain Bradley has  
14 instituted that his Post Chaplains attend the Post  
15 Service Officer Training because, as Chaplains,  
16 they are asked to help in that area from their  
17 members. He is also setting up a meeting with the  
18 Franklin County VSO to make sure they are all on  
19 the same page on the proper way to assist  
20 veterans. Chaplains discussed them conducting  
21 their Post Everlasting services at the Posts and  
22 having Post Everlasting Wall at Mid-Winter and  
23 convention. All the names from the Taps section  
24 on the Ohio Legion News will be printed out and  
25 hung up on this wall the entire weekend, to pay

1 respects to our fallen comrades.

2       Benediction. We moved to the memorial  
3 outside of Department to pay their respects. And  
4 we walked out and paid our respects to the  
5 memorial our there in front of the Department.

6       The meeting was a adjourned at 11:55.

7       That concludes my reports, Commander.

8       COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

9       Yes.

10       12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Tom Poulton,  
11 Commander of the 12th District.

12       Just to update your report, Steve Ebersole's  
13 wife Carol has since passed away, since your  
14 meeting.

15       CHAPLAIN BUXTON: Okay. We'll remember that  
16 family also in our prayers. Thank you.

17       COMMANDER WILSON: All right, Al Beyer.

18       HISTORIAN BEYER: Good morning.

19       FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

20       HISTORIAN BEYER: Good morning, Commander  
21 Wilson, and Department Officers, and Past  
22 Department Commanders.

23       It's been a long time since we last met.

24       After the National Convention at the end of  
25 August or the beginning of September there, my

1 wife and I were hit with COVID. And I had it  
2 pretty bad. I thought I was dead that night, I  
3 don't know. But they threw me in Mid-Central, up  
4 in Mansfield, or Mid-Ohio, up in Mansfield, Ohio,  
5 up here. And ten days later, they didn't want me  
6 to leave. Everyplace that I could go, the nursing  
7 staff and the doctors on board at that time, they  
8 didn't want me to leave.

9 So I owe a special thanks to our 2nd Vice  
10 Commander's wife, Tammy, Tammy Stennis, who was  
11 really great in facilitating my release.

12 I don't know, maybe they didn't want to turn  
13 a Marine out to the public. I do cause a little  
14 trouble once in a while.

15 Anyway, our National Historian for 2021-2022,  
16 his name is Robert Gilmore. They call him  
17 "Bubble."

18 And there have been no changes of the rules  
19 for the end of the year Post History Contest,  
20 which instructions can be found in your Post  
21 Officer's Handbook on pages 140 through 149.

22 Ralph Jackson, my Assistant Historian, and I  
23 have attended a few events across the state. And  
24 we attended the summer Department Golf Outing,  
25 hosted by Kettering Post 598, in District 3. And

1 later that day there was a car show held at their  
2 Post.

3 I'll tell you, if you've never been to it,  
4 that was the first time I was in their Post, man,  
5 that's an awesome Post. It's huge.

6 I was not able to attend, unfortunately,  
7 Jean's, our Commander's homecoming at the  
8 Department training in Newark. However, Ralph, my  
9 assistant, did send me, my wife and I, some  
10 photographs, fortunately, so we can get it in her  
11 scrapbook.

12 I visited other Posts around the state, to  
13 attend their events, including Veterans Day events  
14 at Englewood Post, District 3, and Woodcliff Post,  
15 in District 9; and then dinners at Lodi and  
16 Wadsworth, in District 5. It was also great to  
17 visit District 13's Parma Post, where we enjoyed a  
18 pancake breakfast and the chili cookoff at Post  
19 703.

20 These visits provide an opportunity to  
21 support various Posts and let them know how  
22 important they are, so we can share what they're  
23 doing for our fellow veterans. Like Post 523's  
24 Legion Family Picnic in District 12; and Post  
25 755's, in Sardinia, breakfast and car show in

1 District 4. Without these veterans doing what  
2 they're doing, there would be no history to  
3 report.

4 And we met a 75-year Legion member, his name  
5 was Dean Goodwin, who celebrated his 103rd  
6 birthday, which Commander Jean Wilson was there to  
7 present him with a Certificate of Achievement, and  
8 the City of Miamisburg made it Dean Goodwin's Day  
9 in his honor.

10 The guy also told me, he was telling me  
11 stories of what it was 100 years ago, he used to  
12 hook up his car battery, or his old truck battery,  
13 so he could listen to Amos and Andy. You know, I  
14 just thought that was awesome. I mean, anyway,  
15 Amos and Andy were great.

16 Anyway, Post 165, District 3, Commander Wayne  
17 shared his funny stories from the years Dean was  
18 in the military funeral detail.

19 And it is our pleasure to attend these Posts.

20 I say "our" pleasure. My best assistant I've  
21 ever had in the world is my wife. And most of you  
22 already know her. Some of you don't know her by  
23 her real name, Dayna, but on Facebook she's called  
24 "Tsi Sim."

25 Anyway, it's a real pleasure for us to visit



1 these District Posts. Sometimes, when we are  
2 already in the neighborhood, like Solon -- did I  
3 say that right? Solon?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Solon.

5 HISTORIAN BEYER: -- Post 309. I learned a  
6 lot of their rich Legion history, which we would  
7 not have learned had we not made the visit.

8 We do this so that we can recognize these  
9 members and archive all the wonderful, memorable  
10 events that our Ohio Legion Posts and Districts  
11 continue to do, supporting our programs, carrying  
12 on the mission for the good of The American  
13 Legion.

14 I want to thank you all for your invitations  
15 to your events, which are photographed and posted  
16 on Facebook locally and nationally, and in The  
17 Legion News and other publications.

18 Now be aware. We don't get all pictures in  
19 these different publications or different  
20 organizations. But, you know, cut us a break. We  
21 do get some of them in there.

22 If you have an upcoming event, or have had an  
23 event, contact me with your event information.

24 If you have any questions about the year, end  
25 of the year history contest, please call or write

1 me. My name is in the Department --

2 FROM THE FLOOR: Directory.

3 HISTORIAN BEYER: -- directory.

4 If we haven't visited your Post, please let  
5 me know today, if you can. You know, get ahold of  
6 me. Just give me the Post number. That's all I  
7 need. And I can call and find out what events  
8 they have got coming up, and we can get them in  
9 the news. There's a lot of these Posts that  
10 nobody even knows about them. I can't believe it.

11 Anyway, Merry Christmas to you and yours.

12 God is still our overall protector.

13 And as we continue our mission to serve, I  
14 would like to thank Assistant, Ralph, Historian,  
15 and my beautiful wife, Dayna Beyer, also known as  
16 Tsi Sim Mar, who is the Auxiliary Department  
17 Historian, for their assistance with our history  
18 program.

19 Thank you, Commander, for this appointment.

20 And God bless all of you. Be safe. And for  
21 God and country, God speed in all you do.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

23 Now we'll hear from National Executive  
24 Committeeman Bob Klostermeier.

25 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander.

1 First of all, I'd like to thank everybody for  
2 their condolences this morning. I just lost my  
3 brother on Tuesday. He put up a valiant battle.  
4 Last Thursday, they put him on a vent. And the  
5 doctor told us he had a 10 percent chance of  
6 coming off the vent.

7 He was taking medicine for years for  
8 osteoporosis. And that affects your lungs. So  
9 his lungs were so stiff they weren't working. And  
10 then it affected his heart and it took him.

11 So, anyway, his birthday would have been  
12 December 19th. He would have been 68.

13 But as far as the NEC goes, one thing about  
14 The American Legion, the National Commander  
15 brought it up to congress, keep the government  
16 open. Well they did finally pass a temporary bill  
17 to keep the government open. He said, "Our troops  
18 are doing their jobs. Lawmakers need to do  
19 theirs," American Legion National Commander Paul  
20 E. Dillard said today about another potential  
21 government shutdown that could occur if congress  
22 doesn't reach a budget agreement by December the  
23 3rd.

24 Well they did come up with a temporary  
25 agreement.

1           "The American Legion is no fan of continuing  
2 resolutions, but keeping the government open must  
3 be a priority," Dillard said. "We recall the  
4 shutdown of 2019, in which the Coast Guard  
5 continued to defend our shores while their pay was  
6 delayed. The American Legion stepped up and  
7 provided more than \$1 million in grants to the  
8 Coast Guard families in need. Two years later,  
9 Congress has still not passed legislation to  
10 guarantee that this essential branch be funded.  
11 Moreover, the Department of Defense and our  
12 national security are also endangered by prolonged  
13 shutdowns. Millions of Americans rely on Social  
14 Security to survive. I could go on and on about  
15 other essential government programs. The bottom  
16 line is that Congress needs to put the American  
17 people ahead of partisan politics." And that's  
18 from the National Commander.

19           Also, American Legion National Commander, "VA  
20 Maternity Bill a good step in an ongoing journey."

21           Indianapolis, December 1st, American Legion  
22 National Commander Paul Dillard applauded  
23 Tuesday's signing of the Protecting Moms Who  
24 Served Act, which requires \$15 million in  
25 Department of Veterans Affairs investment to

1 upgrade maternity care for women who served in the  
2 United States Armed Forces.

3 "The need to raise the standard of care for  
4 women in the VA healthcare facilities has been a  
5 high legislative priority for The American Legion  
6 for well over a decade, and this requirement is a  
7 step in the right direction."

8 There's more here, but it's just going on and  
9 on.

10 But I'll give these copies to our  
11 stenographers over there (indicating), and that  
12 way they don't have to try and get every word I  
13 say.

14 You might want to ask Charles what happens  
15 when he goes to a District and speaks. And trust  
16 me, Charles is an excellent speaker. And we all  
17 enjoy listening to him. The only problem was  
18 there was three Past Department Commanders there.  
19 And we noticed one thing, Charles forgot to  
20 mention the Commander's project. So I got tasked  
21 with fining him for not mentioning the Commander's  
22 project.

23 Once again, thank you. Merry Christmas,  
24 everyone. Enjoy your holiday season.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Did you have that money to

1 turn in?

2 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: We gave it to the 1st  
3 District to turn in to the Gifts for Yanks.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

5 Just for clarification, if you fine them for  
6 not mentioning my project and then you gave it to  
7 the Gifts for the Yanks, I'm a little confused.

8 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: It will still be coming  
9 through the District first, not just the Gifts for  
10 Yanks, but your project also.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. That sound better.  
12 Thank you. I just wanted to know.

13 Okay, Alternate NEC Steve, do you have  
14 anything you'd like to add?

15 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Commander Wilson, I  
16 called Bob on the phone and he said he was going  
17 to make the meeting and I said great.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, Judge Advocate  
19 Bob Ray.

20 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you, Commander.  
21 Good morning.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

23 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: You received two e-mails  
24 from Sherry earlier this week, or maybe last week,  
25 about the uniform code.

1           It was adopted. The resolution, 20-18, was  
2 adopted at the Department Convention, to allow us  
3 to form a committee and also to present a uniform  
4 code of conduct for all disciplinary proceedings.  
5 This is like a handbook of telling you how to hold  
6 trials. It's good from anywhere from the  
7 Department level down to the Post level. And each  
8 of you should have a copy of that.

9           The authority for providing this comes from  
10 our Constitution Section 3, Article 5, of the  
11 Bylaws of the Department Constitution, which was  
12 approved at the Department Convention.

13           So the uniform code, you all should have a  
14 copy of that. I believe it's pretty much  
15 self-explanatory. And like I say, it can be used  
16 not only for your Districts, but it can be used in  
17 any other proceeding, Post, county, whatever.

18           But I believe that this is something that we  
19 need. Because we have it in the constitution but  
20 it doesn't say exactly how we do it. Approving  
21 this, I recommend it be approved as an amendment,  
22 or an Attachment A to the Rules and Order of the  
23 Executive Committee. And I believe this will be a  
24 useful tool for us to use if and when we have  
25 disciplinary proceedings that have to come before

1 the Department Executive Committee.

2 Commander, I would need a motion for approval  
3 of this code.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, there's a  
5 motion by Robert Ray to --

6 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: No, I can't.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry.

8 Anyone want to make a motion?

9 TREASURER WILSON: Yes. Robert Wilson,  
10 Treasurer. I move that we accept this.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: A motion by Robert Wilson  
12 to accept the uniform code for conduct of  
13 disciplinary proceedings. It's under the  
14 miscellaneous section of your book.

15 Yes.

16 5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop  
17 seconds the motion.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Darell Bishop seconds the  
19 motion.

20 Any discussion?

21 Yes.

22 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Good morning.  
23 Jermaine Ferguson, 6th District.

24 Has legal counsel reviewed this?

25 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Yes.



1           6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: And has there  
2 been a recommendation to --

3           JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Yes.

4           6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Okay.

5           There are some spelling errors in this  
6 document. So if the Adjutant could just review  
7 this before it's officially adopted to remove the  
8 errors.

9           COMMANDER WILSON: We'll correct the spelling  
10 errors.

11           Any other discussion?

12           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

13           COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
14 favor signify by saying aye.

15           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

16           COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

17           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

18           COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

19           JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you, Commander.

20           One other thing. At our August meeting, I  
21 mentioned to all of you District Commanders, that  
22 because of the changes in the National and  
23 Department Constitutions, that the District  
24 Constitutions and/or your Posts need to be  
25 updated.

1           So far I have only received two District  
2       Constitutions, that's the 4th and the 11th, which  
3       are approved. At least 12 more are still  
4       outstanding.

5           I've had e-mail conversations and phone  
6       conversations with several members of several  
7       Districts, asking questions and whatever, and I've  
8       tried to help them out.

9           But these are the only two that have been  
10      submitted, so far, for approval, other than I  
11      think I have one more that's under review. I'm  
12      still working on it to get it back to the  
13      District. And we have only two. That's two out  
14      of 14. But we have only two Posts out of 500 that  
15      have sent in constitutions that have been  
16      approved.

17          So we still have some work to do on that  
18      area. Please go back to your Districts and your  
19      Posts and try and come up with some better  
20      constitutions that's up to date with what needs to  
21      be followed with National and Department mandates.

22          Thank you.

23          COMMANDER WILSON: We have a question.

24          Joyce.

25          9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th

1 District 1st Vice.

2 At that same meeting in August, it was  
3 mentioned that maybe you could send out something  
4 to tell us specifically what sections were  
5 changed.

6 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I did, to the District  
7 Commanders.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: I did not receive  
9 anything.

10 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: You're not the District  
11 Commander.

12 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: I did not  
13 receive it.

14 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I sent you an e-mail.

15 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Bill  
16 Dittebrand, 9th District Commander.

17 I did not receive anything.

18 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Well, I sent it out.

19 All the rest of them --

20 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: I didn't  
21 receive it.

22 JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I'll send it out to you  
23 again, sir.

24 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Okay, thank  
25 you.

1           COMMANDER WILSON: Tom Poulton.

2           12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander,  
3 Poulton, 12th District Commander.

4           Because these resolutions, specifically,  
5 we're talking about discipline and this other  
6 information, are Word documents, is there a chance  
7 that we could get a Word-framed document from  
8 Department that we can use at the Districts and  
9 share with all of our Posts, so we all say the  
10 same thing, instead of having to reinvent the  
11 wheel?

12          JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: I have no idea what you  
13 mean.

14          COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, we can do that.

15          12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Thank you.

16          JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Anything else?

17          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

18          JUDGE ADVOCATE RAY: Thank you. Merry  
19 Christmas and Happy New Year.

20          Thank you, Commander.

21          COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you. Thank you, Mr.  
22 Ray.

23          Ron Hartman, do you have anything to report?

24          PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: Well, Bob stole  
25 some of my thunder there, in reference to make

1 sure you get your constitution and bylaws updated.  
2 And we just heard from Eric what can be done,  
3 sending that out.

4 So I just want to mention the fact that Post  
5 inspections are due. I heard earlier that they'll  
6 accept them today if you got them with you. I see  
7 him shaking his head over there (indicating).  
8 There's still a lot of them out. So get your Post  
9 inspections turned in.

10 And also, I have a resolution that was  
11 submitted by the Department Convention, or the  
12 Department Executive Committee meeting August the  
13 7th. The origin was from Lucas County Council.  
14 Subject: Awarding of the Frederick Galbraith  
15 Distinguished Medal.

16 This resolution, I don't believe, was ever  
17 submitted to the Finance Committee. There's no  
18 wording or anything here. So, basically, I think  
19 the 1st District has to assign this back to the  
20 Finance Committee for approval.

21 So I move it goes back to the 1st District  
22 for financial analysis.

23 That's all I have.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, Eric Hall.

25 PDC SCHMITT: Commander. Bob Schmitt, Past

1 Department Commander.

2 In reference to that Frederick Galbraith  
3 Distinguished Service Medal, that was supposed to  
4 go through IA first. IA has to create the medal.  
5 Finance is supposed to then appropriate the money.  
6 And I checked in the IA report and there was  
7 nothing there on the floor from what I've seen on  
8 the report. But it should have gone to IA to  
9 create the award before you appropriate the money  
10 for it.

11 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: It should have gone  
12 to IA then.

13 PDC SCHMITT: Yeah. I don't know what  
14 happened to it.

15 2VC STENNIS: Commander, that is one of two  
16 resolutions that we're going to recommend at  
17 Mid-Winter, which is the next meeting.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. We're all in  
19 agreement?

20 PARLIAMENTARIAN HARTMAN: Yeah.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Great.

22 Eric Hall.

23 ADJUTANT HALL: Okay, good morning,  
24 everybody. Thank you so much for coming out today  
25 and making the drive. I know a lot of people came

1 from a long way.

2 Some of the things I'm going to touch on,  
3 basically, is for Mid-Winter, if you are planning  
4 on attending the banquet, if you do it on-line,  
5 please make sure that you get a confirmation that  
6 you did pay for that portion for the ticket for  
7 the banquet. Due to the fact of what we had  
8 happen at convention, we just want to make sure  
9 that people who do it on-line, that they are  
10 getting their tickets confirmed that they have  
11 that. And there will be a follow-up from  
12 Department to make sure you guys are still going  
13 to the banquet.

14 Also, in reference to what Joyce was saying,  
15 in reference to the minutes and the committees, we  
16 are going to make sure that we do -- that the  
17 committees are meeting sooner, so that those  
18 minutes can be brought out to everybody, so that  
19 we can get them out in a timely manner, so that  
20 you are able to review the minutes, so that when  
21 we come to the next meeting, then you guys are  
22 fully prepared for what we are doing from  
23 Department.

24 But at this time, I know that we're going to  
25 do something this afternoon. But Jerry, Vice

1 National Commander, if you would like to speak in  
2 reference to what you wanted to speak to this  
3 afternoon. Do you want to take the podium to  
4 speak on that?

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Now?

6 ADJUTANT HALL: Yes, sir.

7 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Yeah, I can do that.

8 ADJUTANT HALL: Okay.

9 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Jerry Wilson, National  
10 Vice Commander.

11 First of all, I want to thank everybody for  
12 Ohio being where it's at. If Ohio wasn't where  
13 it's at, Jerry Wilson wouldn't be where he's at.  
14 Because when they start selecting people, they  
15 don't look at the Departments that are in last  
16 place, they look at the ones that lead. And I  
17 want to thank you all for everything you've done.

18 But the National Commander wants everyone to  
19 try to get to 90 percent. I know that our  
20 Department Membership Chairman spoke about it, but  
21 he seems to think our National Vice Commanders  
22 aren't speaking about it enough. So we need to  
23 get the 90 percent retention.

24 We need to do buddy checks. It's fine when I  
25 go to other Departments now. When I went to



1 Wisconsin, I thought I was an operator, because we  
2 made 600 buddy checks while I was there. And we  
3 need to do that here also.

4 Yes, it's nice to get new members. But if we  
5 retain the members we've got, that's a big plus.

6 The other thing the Commander wants us to  
7 talk about is the child welfare program he's got.  
8 We want to see as many Posts as possible have some  
9 kind of fundraiser, split the pot, a raffle, a  
10 weapon, something. Do something to raise money  
11 for his child welfare program. That would be  
12 super nice if we could.

13 The other thing I want to speak about, I know  
14 that people have brought up before that they don't  
15 ever hear anything from Charities. And I agree.  
16 I think it's been one of those secret societies in  
17 our Department of Ohio. So I'm here today to give  
18 you a report on Charities.

19 We met with all three gaming companies a few  
20 weeks ago. We interviewed them and we asked them  
21 what they could do for the Department of Ohio  
22 American Legion Posts.

23 Two of them -- now you've got to keep in  
24 mind, up until that time, it was illegal to  
25 discuss percentages, to sign contracts. You

1       couldn't do any of that.

2               And when we interviewed them, the first one  
3       that came in was Arrow International. They flat  
4       out told us we can't discuss pricing with you  
5       because the attorney general tells us not to. So  
6       we're not going to. Which I appreciated that.

7               And then they brought in the owners of the  
8       company and some the people that are under them  
9       that are going to be working the system. And they  
10      gave us a complete program. They told us about  
11      everything, which was nice.

12              By the way, they own Manacolo. They own  
13      Lancaster Bingo. So they own a lot of the stuff  
14      they have.

15              There's been rumors that they sold out on the  
16      company. They didn't. They brought investors in  
17      for the gaming side, and that's what they're  
18      doing.

19              We then talked to Powerhouse. When they sat  
20      down with us, the first thing they said to us,  
21      which I thought was ironic, is they said, "We're  
22      not going to give more than 50 percent."

23              And I looked at them and I said, "I don't  
24      think we're supposed to be discussing that."

25              "Well, we're just telling you. Don't ask for

1 more than 50 percent, because we're not going to  
2 be doing it."

3 Then Grover came in. And they said basically  
4 the same thing. They weren't going to be doing  
5 more than 50 percent.

6 Well, it's now, they're allowed now to  
7 disclose it. Because of the other discussions  
8 with the attorney general, now they're allowed to  
9 disclose it.

10 And Arrow had us out to dinner the other  
11 night. They brought the entire Charities Board  
12 out. They wanted to tell us what they were going  
13 to be doing.

14 They're going to be giving us 65 percent of  
15 whatever the gaming revenue comes in to the Post.

16 I had talked with them before and they asked  
17 me what I thought about gaming companies. And I  
18 told him -- I called him "G3". I told him, I  
19 said, "You're not going to like my answer."

20 He said, "Well what's your answer?"

21 I said, "I think they suck."

22 He shook his head. "What do you mean?"

23 I said, "They're not interested in helping  
24 our Legion Posts. They're only interested in how  
25 much money they can take back to their company."

1 I said, "I want to talk to a company that's  
2 seriously interested in helping our American  
3 Legion Posts grow." And I said, "The reason for  
4 that is if the American Legion Posts grow, then  
5 the revenue to that gaming company is going to  
6 grow also."

7 And he said, "I like your answer."

8 So they're going to be giving 65 percent to  
9 the Posts.

10 Now, in addition to that, they donated  
11 \$10,000 to the Single Warrior Project our  
12 Commander has, which I thought was pretty nice.

13 While we were at the dinner, they produced  
14 and gave to Charities, Inc., \$100,000 for  
15 Charities, Inc. And they told us when they gave  
16 it to us there is no stipulation. You can do with  
17 that whatever you want to do with that.

18 And the Charities Board is deciding that we  
19 want to give money to the Posts. And we're coming  
20 up and we're talking to the IRS to make sure it's  
21 legal, but we want to be able to offer a grant to  
22 any Post that has gaming in our Department. You'd  
23 have to apply, just like you apply to National for  
24 \$1,000 and then you apply for another thousand.  
25 With this you can apply for 500 bucks. All you

1 have to do is send in your CPR in with it and a  
2 request. That's it. You don't have to tell us  
3 what you're doing with the money. That's your  
4 business. But you can get up to 500 bucks. So I  
5 think that's pretty nice.

6 The other thing, and this is the thing that  
7 really swayed the entire Charities Board, is  
8 they're going to offer, if you've got -- I'm going  
9 to try to make this quick -- if you've got, let's  
10 say five machines in your club room, they're going  
11 to give you a \$5,000 credit per machine.

12 Now what I mean by that is, let's say, for  
13 example, you've got these machines operating and  
14 you're bringing in 10,000 a month profit. Well  
15 you're getting 65 percent. That's your money,  
16 6,500. They're going to give you, for five  
17 machines, a \$25,000 credit, and the other 3,500  
18 you keep until that \$25,000 credit is zero.

19 So, in other words, you will keep 100 percent  
20 of your profit until that \$25,000 credit is zero.  
21 And then, after that, if you get 10,000, you keep  
22 6,500, and 3,500 goes to Arrow International.

23 I don't know that any other company has ever  
24 even considered doing those type of things for our  
25 American Legion Posts.

1           Now they're also going to probably do that  
2 with the AMVETS, with the Moose, with Elks, with  
3 all the other organizations, the VFW, with all the  
4 other organizations, if they want to participate.

5           And I would like to think that this  
6 Department of Ohio Executive Board thinks that's a  
7 pretty good deal. I think it is.

8           Any questions by anybody?

9           1VC TEIS: Jerry, just to let them know that  
10 that's to help offset that 90 days.

11          NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: That's correct.

12          1VC TEIS: Yeah.

13          NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Any other questions?

14          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15          NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Speak now, please.

16          That's why I'm here.

17          Back in the back.

18          CMTE CHRMN LOOKER: When will it be legal?

19          John Looker.

20          NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: It starts the first of  
21 the year. You can apply for your license. I  
22 think you can apply now. Because when I renewed  
23 our gaming license, it had a little spot on here  
24 that said, "Are you renewing gaming?" Well, we  
25 didn't have a gaming license then, so I put "No."

1 But I understand now that you can apply now and  
2 you should get your license before April 1st. And  
3 obviously the earlier you apply, the quicker  
4 you'll get the license.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: But it won't be before  
6 April 1st.

7 CMTE CHRMN LOOKER: Okay.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Anything else?

9 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine  
10 Ferguson, 1st Vice, 6th District.

11 Is there a reason why Charities' Board is  
12 stipulating the \$500 incentive for Posts who offer  
13 gaming and not just all Posts who will meet those  
14 obligations?

15 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Well, we just think  
16 that's what it should be. I mean, if you don't  
17 have gaming, are you going to get into it?

18 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Well, the  
19 question here is, it seems like it's an incentive  
20 only for, or rewarded only for gaming Posts, not  
21 for all Posts. It's through Charities, Inc.  
22 Charities, Inc., is not a gaming --

23 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I understand.

24 The thing is, Charities, Inc., is trying to  
25 make money, so that Charities, Inc., can give to

1 other Posts everything they want.

2 Right now we're set up, and Art Lustig is  
3 trying see if he can get this changed, where we  
4 can only give to a 501(c)(3). And we're trying to  
5 see if we can get that changed where we can do a  
6 roof, a parking lot, stuff like that. We haven't  
7 got that approved yet through the IRS. But once  
8 that's approved, we want to try to get as much  
9 money coming in to Charities.

10 Because it used to be where they had the --  
11 what was it? -- the OVCC, or whatever that title  
12 is, and part of your money had to go to Charities.

13 Well now it doesn't have to. So we're trying  
14 to get as many Posts to participate in the gaming  
15 so that Charities can get more money, so that  
16 Charities can then say, "We want to give this Post  
17 money to help repair their roof." You know what  
18 I'm saying? That's the reason for the incentive.

19 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Thank you.

20 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Any other questions,  
21 please?

22 Joyce.

23 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st  
24 Vice, 9th District.

25 At our last DEC meeting, we brought up, and



1 they were supposed to bring it to you guys at  
2 Charities, Inc., about making a form application  
3 for monies requested versus just writing a letter.  
4 Has that been discussed with Charities?

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Joyce, we're thinking  
6 about that. We just thought it was just as simple  
7 just to send the letter in. If we have a form,  
8 can we cover everything on the form? You know  
9 what I mean?

10 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: The problem is,  
11 letters get lost all the time.

12 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Okay.

13 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: You tell us you did  
14 not get the letter, or we don't --

15 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Would you do me a  
16 favor? Would you make up a typed form that you  
17 think would be great and send it to us and let us  
18 look at it?

19 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well, one, I'm not  
20 an expert.

21 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I'm not either.

22 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well we need some  
23 expert help like Suzette. I think she could  
24 probably help.

25 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: All right. If you've

1 got someone that can put a form together, send it  
2 to us. Let us look at it. And I'm sure we'll go  
3 with it. I don't think that's a problem, Joyce,  
4 at all.

5 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: I think it would be  
6 easier.

7 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: I think it would be  
8 easier. I think you're right. I think it would  
9 make it easier for us.

10 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Thank you.

11 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Anybody else?

12 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: NEC Klostermeier to Jerry.  
13 Are we going to have anything at Mid-Winter  
14 Conference, a class of any kind?

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Bingo class will be at  
16 Mid-Winter.

17 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Okay.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Bingo license, which  
19 they'll probably cover that at Mid-Winter.

20 Are you talking about your licensing for the  
21 gaming?

22 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Right.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, they'll have that.

24 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: All we have are tickets.  
25 And we're discussing whether or not we want to get

1 machines.

2           COMMANDER WILSON: Right. That will be  
3 covered in the bingo class, or should be.

4           NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Okay. Thank you.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: You're welcome.

6           NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Anything else?

7           I hope this makes it clear on Charities, Inc.  
8 And it's been brought up before that we were not  
9 really open and everything. And I agree. And I  
10 think it should be open.

11           And I would like to thank this Commander and  
12 hope the following Commanders would allow us time  
13 at the podium each year to explain what Charities  
14 is doing. Thank you very much, Commander.

15           COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

16           And Eric has one more thing, so he says.

17           ADJUTANT HALL: So anybody who does have the  
18 gaming systems in their Post, please make sure  
19 that they reach out to who their distributors are,  
20 so that they know that they make sure that, by the  
21 end of the month, that everything is closed out  
22 and everything is off. And then just coordinate  
23 with them as far as what else they need to do. So  
24 just make sure you reach out to the Posts and let  
25 them know that they need to get that stuff

1 removed.

2 That's all I've got.

3 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Yes.

4 And the reason for that is, if you get caught  
5 with gaming in your Post before the license is  
6 approved, you will be banned from having it by the  
7 attorney general. So don't get caught doing that.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we're going to  
9 move on.

10 Americanism Commission Chairman.

11 CMSN CHRMN HOUP: The Americanism Commission  
12 meeting was held October 8th, at 3:00 PM, at  
13 Cherry Valley Lodge.

14 The call to order was by myself. We saluted  
15 the colors. An invocation by Kent Long. We  
16 recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

17 All Districts were represented, with guests  
18 Christie White, Paul Sands and Harold Landis.

19 The previous minutes were approved as read.

20 Christie White, Americanism and Children and  
21 Youth Coordinator, notified the commission of when  
22 the testing dates should be at schools and asked  
23 that each chairman notify the Posts in their  
24 Districts what the dates should be. If they must  
25 work with schools and do the testing earlier, we

1 are flexible.

2 Posts need to have winning tests to the  
3 County Commanders by November 26th. County  
4 Commanders need to have them to the District  
5 Chairs by December 10th. District Americanism  
6 Chairs need to have them, the winning tests, to  
7 Department Headquarters by January 7th.

8 Trip dates for the trip will be February 28th  
9 through March 4th.

10 Unfinished business:

11 On the Americanism pins that we've talked  
12 about getting for the youth that help us and their  
13 Posts in various areas, Thom Stan, 11th District  
14 Chairman, motioned that Americanism pin A, which  
15 we had four drawings, to be the pin which the  
16 commission chooses. And then upon discussion,  
17 that motion was carried. The initial cost we  
18 thought was going to be \$3,240.

19 A resolution. Kent Long, 2nd District  
20 Chairman, moved to approve Resolution 22-03, to  
21 bring civics back to the classroom at schools.  
22 The commission will share that resolution with  
23 Children and Youth, to see if they would like to  
24 support it as well.

25 New business:

1           The A&G Tests were printed, or are going to  
2 be printed in-house. We will mail them to all  
3 Posts that have ordered them.

4           The A&G judging selections for Mid-Winter,  
5 January 21, 2022. Since it's an even year, the  
6 judges will be from the Districts of 8, 10, 14,  
7 and 4. Alternates will be 6, 12, and 2.

8           John Life, 14th District Chairman, motions  
9 that the judges of the A&G Tests will be District  
10 8, 10, 14, and 4, and the SAL Americanism Chairman  
11 and Auxiliary Americanism Chairperson. The  
12 alternate judges will be District 6, 12, and 2.  
13 That motion was passed.

14           Then it gets a little difficult after we  
15 adjourned.

16           We submitted our approved pin design to  
17 National.

18           And Christie, I'll need some help with this.

19           But anyway, they disallowed it because of the  
20 design of the American flag.

21           So, within the last week, we got the  
22 redesigns of this one (indicating). And this is  
23 the only copy I have.

24           But at any rate, that has been approved by  
25 National.

1           COMMANDER WILSON:  Very nice.

2           CMSN CHRNM HOUP:  So at any rate, if you want  
3 to, I can pass it around.  It's the only copy.  We  
4 run it off this morning.

5           I guess what I'm asking is that the DEC  
6 approve that pin.

7           We do have prices.  These are made, and the  
8 prices are made, by American-made pins, since it's  
9 Americanism.  When we get the financing, that's  
10 what we'll have to decide.

11          The inch and a quarter is 3.40 apiece, and  
12 inch and three-eighths is 3.50.  The total would  
13 be, for inch and a quarter, is 4960, plus  
14 shipping, and the other is 52.

15          So I need the DEC to approve that pin, if you  
16 so like it.  And you can discuss whether it should  
17 be made in America or if we buy a foreign product.

18          Okay, so that's what this is.

19          I can't make the motion, Commander.

20          COMMANDER WILSON:  Does anyone want to make  
21 the motion about the Americanism pin?

22          9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND:  Bill  
23 Dittebrand, 9th District Commander.  I make a  
24 motion that we approve that pin.

25          COMMANDER WILSON:  All right, we have a

1 motion to approve the pin.

2 Second?

3 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd  
4 District, seconds that motion.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. We have a  
6 motion and it's properly seconded.

7 Do we have any discussion?

8 Yes.

9 8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: Bob Schmoll, 1st  
10 Vice, 8th District.

11 That pin will be made in the USA, not China  
12 or Outer Swabovia or something like that?

13 COMMANDER WILSON: That is correct.

14 8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: All right. Thank  
15 you.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Mr. Ferguson.

17 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine  
18 Ferguson, 6th District.

19 What is the cost of the pin? Are we  
20 approving the cost of the pin or just the --

21 CMSN CHRNM HOUP: I think it will have to go  
22 to Finance to get the money. So we will have to  
23 apply to get it.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: So we have a motion on the  
25 floor, properly seconded, to approve the design of



1 the pin that's going to be made in the United  
2 States of America, hopefully. Well, sometimes  
3 they say it and it doesn't always mean that it's  
4 true.

5 So, all those in favor of the motion, signify  
6 by saying aye.

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

11 Are you done, Mr. Dick?

12 CMSN CHRNM HOUP: I just want to thank  
13 Christie for jumping through hoops this last week  
14 to get this thing designed and back through these  
15 people and back and forth. We thought we was done  
16 but we weren't. So thank you.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, Christie always does  
18 an excellent job.

19 In fact, she does such an excellent job,  
20 she's going to give Marv's report for Baseball.

21 I'd just like to say Marv is fighting cancer  
22 again. And he's taking chemo treatments again.  
23 So let's keep Marv in our daily thoughts and  
24 prayers. And hopefully he beats cancer again this  
25 time.

1 All right, Ms. Christie, you're up.

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: Thank you, Commander.

3 Good morning.

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

5 COORDINATOR WHITE: Pretend that I'm Marv  
6 Shamhart. He sent me his report. So for the time  
7 being, I am Marv.

8 So the American Legion Baseball Commission  
9 and District Chairmen met on October 24th, at  
10 10:00 AM, here at Department Headquarters.  
11 Everybody but one person was present.

12 The commission welcomed a new Commissioner,  
13 Chris Emmons, pending the DEC's approval.

14 They also welcomed two new District Chairmen  
15 from District 2 and District 3, William Lonsbury  
16 and Elijah Sims.

17 Elijah, I know, is young and the commission  
18 is really excited to kind of get him working on  
19 baseball. We told him, since you're young, you're  
20 going to be in it for the next 30, 40 years.

21 So --

22 The junior state baseball tournament, the  
23 date was set for July 14th through 17th. The  
24 senior state tournament is July 25th through the  
25 29th. The National Regional Tournament is August

1 3rd through 7th. And the World Series is the 11th  
2 through 16th.

3 Nobody has to write these dates down.  
4 They're all on the website. If you need  
5 clarification on those later, just let me know and  
6 I'll get them to you.

7 We had one long-time Commissioner resign,  
8 Richard Beeker. He was on the Baseball Commission  
9 for a good 30-plus years. He's over 90 years old.  
10 He resigned because of his age.

11 So we decided to create a Commissioner  
12 Emeritus status. That's to honor those  
13 Commissioners that gave so many years of their  
14 life to the Baseball program. It just kind of  
15 seemed wrong that as soon as they resign then  
16 that's it. So we still wanted to honor them by  
17 creating a Commissioner Emeritas status. Boys  
18 State has something similar to that.

19 So the Commission decided to induct Richard  
20 Beeker as the very first Commissioner Emeritus.  
21 They also voted to have Howard Frase and Chuck  
22 Morris. Both of those were Commissioners and  
23 resigned last year, to have the three of them be  
24 the first three Commissioner Emeritus.

25 If this body approves that change, they will

1 receive a certificate, some type of presentation,  
2 maybe at Mid-Winter Conference or something like  
3 that.

4 So, Commander, that is the baseball report.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. So we need a  
6 motion to accept this report.

7 1VC TEIS: Brad Teis, 2nd Vice (sic), on the  
8 Baseball Commission, I hereby adopt the motion.

9 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: NEC Klostermeier seconds  
10 the motion.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. We have a  
12 motion, duly seconded, to accept the report.

13 And is there any discussion?

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
16 favor signify by saying aye.

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

19 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

21 Thank you, Ms. Christie.

22 We'll next have our Boys State Director, Jim  
23 Koppin, otherwise known as "Donald Duck."

24 BBS DIRECTOR KOPPIN: That was a long time  
25 ago.

1           COMMANDER WILSON: I know. I've got a great  
2 memory. Some days.

3           BBS DIRECTOR KOPPIN: Good morning.

4           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good morning.

5           BBS DIRECTOR KOPPIN: The American Legion  
6 National Americanism Conference was held on  
7 September 24th, 25th and 26th, in Indianapolis,  
8 Indiana. Attending the conference from the  
9 Buckeye Boys State staff were myself, as director;  
10 Americanism and Children and Youth Coordinator  
11 Christie White; President Ron Chapman; 1st Vice  
12 President Dave Ridenour; and 2nd Vice President  
13 Melissa Fowle.

14           Ideas brought back included electronic  
15 baking, some changes to the Samsung Scholarship,  
16 virtual orientation, reducing or eliminating  
17 paperwork, delegate communication, privacy of  
18 information, and the willingness of all states to  
19 help each other.

20           The fall meeting of the trustees,  
21 commissioners, consultants and counselors was held  
22 at Department Headquarters on Saturday,  
23 October the 16th, 2021. President Ron Chapman  
24 called the meeting to order at 10:00 AM.

25           Melissa Fowle announced the names of the new

1 applicants who attended the 2021 program. And  
2 after evaluations by each section head, they were  
3 all voted on through the staff by the trustees.  
4 They are: Robert Clark, who is assigned to state  
5 government; William Dittebrand, assigned to state  
6 government; Steve Ervin, school board; Brian  
7 Fowle, city government; John Life, recreation;  
8 Dennis Morrison, city government; Joe Navarre, to  
9 the bank; Stan Oren, state government.

10 There were also two new consultants admitted  
11 to the staff. That was Thayne Gray, assigned to  
12 the county government; and Richard Ching to city  
13 government.

14 The spring meeting dates were announced.  
15 They will be April 8th and 9th.

16 The dates for the 2022 American Legion  
17 Buckeye Boys State Program will be June the 12th  
18 through the 19th.

19 After consultation with Christie about our  
20 financial status, we agreed that we could keep the  
21 fee for each delegate that the Post has to pay at  
22 \$300. We're working very diligently to keep that  
23 cost down to the Post. President Chapman called  
24 for a vote and the trustees agreed to keep the  
25 rate for the 2022 program.

1           While we were at the 2021 program, Miami  
2 University invited myself, then-President Bill  
3 Pennell, and Chief Counselor Grant Grace to an  
4 informal meeting to discuss the possibility of  
5 keeping The American Legion Buckeye Boys State at  
6 Miami University.

7           Later that week, I consulted with Brad about  
8 us making the opening contract offer in order for  
9 our intentions to be heard first. And he agreed  
10 that that would be in our best interest.

11           Sometime mid-summer, we sent a contract offer  
12 to Miami University with two changes. We asked  
13 for a ten-year contract and a fixed rate of \$275  
14 per delegate. That's for all ten years.

15           A few days later, they replied back. They  
16 accepted our offer. We agreed to set up a  
17 committee of three people from Miami University  
18 and three from The American Legion Buckeye Boys  
19 State to find outside sources to offset the cost  
20 of running the program.

21           Miami University's actual per-delegate cost  
22 is \$400 per delegate. Of that, we pay 270.

23           President Chapman and I have asked Trustees  
24 Chris Ballard and Roger Wiant, and Consultant Jeff  
25 Jordan, to be our representatives to that

1 committee.

2 After all the dates were changed and some  
3 minor language agreed to by Miami University and  
4 the Department legal counsel, Luther Liggett, Jr.,  
5 we believe that the contract is ready to be sent  
6 to The American Legion Buckeye Boys State Trustees  
7 for approval.

8 Since I wrote that report, that contract was  
9 sent to all the trustees. They could have a  
10 mail-in vote to either reject or accept the  
11 contract.

12 After some concerns were raised by a few of  
13 the trustees about how the money is raised by  
14 Miami University and our committee members were to  
15 be used, the contract has been put on hold. The  
16 vote count was 19 to 7 in favor, with two  
17 abstaining. We have a total of 50 trustees. That  
18 meant that 32 did not participate in the vote  
19 count.

20 I have consulted with President Chapman. We  
21 are going to have another trustees-only meeting in  
22 January, when time allows. We will ask that  
23 people from Miami University be here to represent  
24 their concerns or how the monies will be collected  
25 and spent. And at that time, then we will have a



1 contract vote, whether to accept or reject. So  
2 that's where we stand.

3 Are there any questions on my report?

4 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Anyone have any questions  
6 they'd like to ask?

7 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

8 BBS DIRECTOR KOPPIN: If not, Commander, I  
9 wish that you would ask for the approval of my  
10 report.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

12 We need a motion to accept Mr. Koppin's  
13 report.

14 5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Darell Bishop from the 5th  
16 District so moves.

17 Second?

18 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd  
19 District, seconds the motion.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Is there any discussion?

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, all those in favor  
23 signify by saying aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

3 And Jim, we would like to thank you for all  
4 your hard work, being the Director of Buckeye Boys  
5 State.

6 I know you get paid well. Yeah, right, I  
7 know.

8 But we do appreciate it. We know it's a  
9 very, very demanding job and we appreciate all  
10 your hard work.

11 BBS DIRECTOR KOPPIN: I get one more zero  
12 than I got last time.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: That's right, one more  
14 zero.

15 And we're going to move on to Mr. Looker, who  
16 will give the Oratorical Committee Report. He's  
17 the chairman.

18 CMTE CHRMN LOOKER: Thank you, Commander.

19 The Oratorical Committee met on October 2nd,  
20 at 10:00 AM, in the Department library.

21 Call to order was 10:00 AM, saluted the  
22 colors, invocation, Pledge of Allegiance, and the  
23 roll call.

24 There were eight of 14 Districts present at  
25 the meeting.

1           And the minutes from the previous meeting  
2 were approved. Also approved was the committee  
3 rules. And we approved the contest review.

4           There was a discussion about the money that  
5 we give out to the contestants. And there was a  
6 motion made to keep it the same, the scholarship  
7 money, \$2,500 for first place, \$1,500 for second  
8 place, and then the remaining \$2,500 to be  
9 distributed between the Districts that are  
10 present.

11           We had originally scheduled our Department  
12 contest for April the 10th, but both Christie and  
13 I got a nasty letter from National that said if it  
14 wasn't received by, if they didn't receive our  
15 contest winner by February 15th, that they would  
16 not be able to participate in the National  
17 contest.

18           So, we have talked about it this morning and  
19 our Department contest will be held on  
20 February 6th. And that's when our National  
21 Commander will be here. So we're hoping that we  
22 can --

23           COMMANDER WILSON: No, he won't be here until  
24 March. Sorry.

25           CMTE CHRNM LOOKER: Well, I'm hoping our

1 Department Commander will be there.

2 COMMANDER WILSON: I'll be there.

3 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: You said the  
4 Department's is going to be February?

5 CMTE CHRNM LOOKER: February 6th.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: February 6th. So make  
7 that notation, people, and take it back to your  
8 Districts.

9 CMTE CHRNM LOOKER: Under new business, we  
10 decided to have our next meeting on January 22nd,  
11 in conjunction with the Mid-Winter Conference.

12 And there was a booklet brought in by the 3rd  
13 District, William Carpenter. It's called, "The  
14 Key to the Constitution." And it has all the  
15 information in there for the students. So we are  
16 going to purchase 25 of those at \$5 apiece.

17 William Carpenter also mentioned to the  
18 committee that this will be his last year as  
19 committee chairman due to health issues. So he's  
20 looking for a replacement to represent the 3rd  
21 District.

22 Under the good of The Legion, we took a vote  
23 of those committee members that were present.

24 Benediction was given by the 12th District,  
25 Malcolm Glasgow. And William Carpenter, 3rd

1 District, motioned to adjourn the meeting at  
2 11:05.

3 Commander, if I could, I'd like to add  
4 something to my report. I'll be brief with it.

5 At our Veterans Service Commissioners'  
6 meeting two weekends ago, there was a group there  
7 that was called 9/17. And the 9/17 represents the  
8 actual date of the signing of the Constitution,  
9 September 17th.

10 There was a group from Nashville there. And  
11 what they do is they pass out a pamphlet that  
12 contains the Constitution, Amendments to the  
13 Constitution, and the Bill of Rights, to eighth  
14 grade students. Last year they passed out  
15 1.5 million booklets to the schools around the  
16 country.

17 This year, in 2022, they're concentrating all  
18 of their efforts in Ohio. So they will be giving  
19 out probably approximately 1 million to the eighth  
20 grade students in Ohio.

21 This is great. I've been get trying to get  
22 into the eighth graders, because they can't  
23 actually compete until the ninth grade. But this  
24 would be a great opportunity, so I volunteered to  
25 take care of Warren County.

1           So something I'd like to do is offer that to  
2 anybody else that would like to do that for their  
3 county or their District. And I have the  
4 information for the contact there that I will get  
5 to you.

6           All right.

7           COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

8           CMTE CHRNM LOOKER: Thank you, Commander.

9           COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

10          Do we have a motion to accept Mr. Looker's  
11 report?

12          PDC FRIEND: PDC Friend, I move to accept the  
13 report.

14          COMMANDER WILSON: Is there a second?

15          13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Wright, 13th  
16 District, seconds.

17          COMMANDER WILSON: Richard Wright from the  
18 13th seconds.

19          Is there any discussion?

20          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21          COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
22 favor of accepting his report say aye.

23          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

24          COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

25          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1           COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

2           Thank you, Mr. Looker.

3           Next up, Jason Rue on the Bowling and  
4           Scholarship committee.

5           CMTE CHRMN RUE: I do not have the minutes  
6           with me from the last meeting, but the last  
7           meeting we had was by phone. Three of us were  
8           present from the commission.

9           And we set the price for this year. And  
10          hopefully that will be something that can carry  
11          over, we were hoping, throughout.

12          And the dates were already given. All the  
13          information is on-line and has been sent out.

14          Sandusky is hosting. I've tried to get ahold  
15          of Terry, but he hasn't gotten back with me yet  
16          about the menus yet for those weekends. But they  
17          will be having a meal, he told us, on Saturday  
18          night.

19          And as far as Scholarships goes, all the  
20          information for scholarships is on-line.

21          If you guys have anybody who is interested in  
22          applying for them, please do have them go on-line,  
23          fill those out, and get them in to us, so we can  
24          get the money out to those that do deserve it.

25          COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, thank you, Mr.

1 Jason. I appreciate it.

2 CMTE CHR MN RUE: Thank you.

3 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Jason, what's the  
4 deadline on the memberships (sic)?

5 CMTE CHR MN RUE: Scholarships?

6 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Scholarships.

7 CMTE CHR MN RUE: Each one has a different  
8 date.

9 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Okay.

10 CMTE CHR MN RUE: They don't all have the same  
11 date.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Christie's got her hand up  
13 there in the back.

14 COORDINATOR WHITE: Scholarships, as a whole,  
15 is June 15th.

16 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: June 15th.

17 CMTE CHR MN RUE: There you go.

18 COMMANDER WILSON: If you've got any  
19 questions, go on-line, download the applications,  
20 and you'll see the information you need and what  
21 the deadlines and that are.

22 All right, is Harold here? Harold Savage?

23 FROM THE FLOOR: What about Andy?

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry, I missed  
25 Andy. Andy. Sorry.



1           Hey, get up here, because you'll be next.

2           CMTE CHR MN SAVAGE:   Okay.

3           COMMANDER WILSON:   We want to keep this  
4 moving on.   We've got lunch.   Come on, guys, move  
5 on.

6           Sorry, Andy.   You're so little.

7           CMSN CHR MN ATKINS:   Yeah.

8           Good morning, still, I guess.

9           COMMANDER WILSON:   Yes, it is.

10          CMSN CHR MN ATKINS:   I'm going to give this  
11 report as best I can.   Myself, like a lot of other  
12 people who went to the National Convention, I came  
13 home with COVID.   And I have a little long-term  
14 stuff going on.   So I'm hoping that's going to  
15 leave me soon.   But I got a report to go.

16          We had our meeting at the Cherry Valley Lodge  
17 on the 8th.   And it was opened in a regular  
18 fashion.

19          First up was the mention of the Sojourners  
20 Care Network.   They are our group that we  
21 sponsored as a state this year.

22          And Donovan's Kids, from last year, we don't  
23 see any movement there.   We tried to get ahold of  
24 them.   I think that COVID kind of knocked them  
25 out.   So we're hoping maybe they can get back into

1 it here. But for now they're not one of our  
2 groups.

3 A discussion was held about the Children and  
4 Youth pins and the Child Welfare pins. And \$105  
5 was turned from pin sales.

6 We still have some pins. And they were  
7 turned over to the state office. And they're  
8 going to have them at their table that they sell  
9 their shirts and stuff at. So if anybody has any  
10 that they want sold, turn them over to them and  
11 they'll work on that.

12 Okay, Ken Schutz mentioned not to purchase  
13 stickers to cover up by the previous year posted  
14 on the Donovan's cans. Each District can modify  
15 these themselves. These are the cans that are put  
16 out for donations at the Post where the money will  
17 go to the state. So that was passed.

18 Christie White notified the committee that  
19 there is a fact sheet inside our packets about  
20 Sojourners Care Network. A representative wasn't  
21 at the meeting, but the information will be in  
22 your packets.

23 Christie reminded the commission that checks  
24 should be made out to Child Welfare, that program.  
25 And then if you want the money to go straight to

1 the state Children and Youth, it has to be made  
2 out that way, made out to Children and Youth, and  
3 that money will be designated for them.

4 We talked about the T-shirts. There were  
5 several contacts made and explored, and the price  
6 was over \$20 per shirt, due to the range of sizes  
7 needed and other things. We decided to put that  
8 on hold for now, because it would make the price  
9 of the T-shirt too much for us to be selling and  
10 make any money on. So we decided to table that,  
11 the T-shirts.

12 Under new business, the suicide prevention  
13 was brought up. We're focused on children who  
14 commit suicide. It's been kind of an overlooked  
15 project. And some of the guys that have been on  
16 the committee for a long time said it's been  
17 brought up but never carried through. So we had a  
18 very long discussion on this.

19 William Fast, who is a reverend, and he goes  
20 to these different meetings, he said the church  
21 meeting, the seminar that they went to, they  
22 didn't have -- they said the child suicide  
23 preventing, once they found out about it, was  
24 very, very poor.

25 Christie White reported that she has been on

1 the Legion.org site and researched suicide  
2 awareness and prevention. There were only two  
3 links on the site regarding suicide, and all the  
4 information was focused on adults, veterans.

5 Handouts from the site were made available.

6 A robust discussion followed, actually for  
7 about 45 minutes. The committee is very, very  
8 concerned about this project and we think that it  
9 needs more attention, to think that you can go on  
10 the National website to try to get brochures and  
11 there's nothing there for children suicide. And  
12 we're worried about making it too public, and that  
13 the kids might get an idea from that.

14 I talked to a social worker who teaches  
15 social work. It happened to be my daughter. But  
16 she told me that you're not going to -- when you  
17 bring up the suicide and you discuss the suicide  
18 amongst children, you're not putting any thoughts  
19 in their head that they don't already have. They  
20 hear about it from the time they start school.  
21 And so if they're really serious about it, you  
22 know, they already have the information.

23 So we need to get a brochure out there  
24 talking about what can be done, helping. I mean  
25 it wouldn't just be for them. It would be for

1 their parents, anybody who would have contact,  
2 things to watch for. So that's going to be our  
3 next focus on this, is to try to get a brochure  
4 together.

5 For the good of The Legion, the 11th District  
6 Chairman read the resolution for the Americanism  
7 Committee. And we agreed that it's a good one.  
8 That was about teaching civics in schools. And  
9 the motion was made and we're going to co-sponsor  
10 that bill -- or not bill, but resolution. So,  
11 under good of The Legion, it was approved.

12 Ken Schutz mentioned that Ohio scholarships  
13 cannot be given to Legionnaire grandchildren who  
14 reside out of state. After a discussion, it was  
15 suggested that a resolution come out of a Post to  
16 attempt to change the eligibility so that the Ohio  
17 veterans' grandchildren can be eligible for these  
18 scholarships.

19 So, William Fast did a benediction and  
20 adjournment followed.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Does that conclude your  
22 report, Andy?

23 CMSN CHRMN ATKINS: That concludes my report.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. All right, thank  
25 you.

1 Do we have a motion to accept Andy's report?

2 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Paul Sands, 7th  
3 District, moves to accept.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

5 Steve Ervin?

6 4TH DISTRICT CMDR ERVIN: Steve Ervin, 4th  
7 District, seconds.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: A second.

9 Is there any discussion?

10 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
12 favor of accepting the Child Welfare report  
13 signify by saying aye.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

18 All right, now we're to you, sir. Sorry,  
19 Harold.

20 CMTE CHRNM SAVAGE: Okay.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Good to see you.

22 CMTE CHRNM SAVAGE: I was not ready for a  
23 report. I did not know I was supposed to give  
24 one.

25 But anyway, there was a couple of things.

1           We did have a meeting of the Finance  
2 Committee, probably about a week and a half ago.  
3 I don't have the exact dates here.

4           And one of the things that did come up was  
5 that our accountants found some money that was  
6 donated to Honor Flights. And so we approved to  
7 distribute that at the Commander's discretion.  
8 Because I think there's four in Ohio. And so she  
9 came up with that and that was approved, to get  
10 that money out to them.

11           COMMANDER WILSON: Actually, we had  
12 \$17,899.83 to split up between the four Honor  
13 Flights.

14           CMTE CHRNM SAVAGE: One of the other things  
15 that I'd like to touch on, I'm going to be working  
16 with the committee this year, or the commission,  
17 rather, it's something Charles Stennis talked  
18 about earlier, where we took, last year we took  
19 out three, I think Gifts for the Yanks, or not --  
20 Special Olympics and --

21           2VC STENNIS: Special Olympics, Gifts for the  
22 Yanks, and the Sons.

23           CMTE CHRNM SAVAGE: Yeah. Well, the Sons  
24 too.

25           2VC STENNIS: Right.

1 Well, there's a lot of stuff, like Joyce  
2 asked, that doesn't belong in there, in our P&L.  
3 A lot of it is past-year stuff and nonoperational  
4 stuff that does not contribute any profit or loss  
5 to the State of Ohio and the operation of its  
6 business. Once we get those out and we can get  
7 those accounts possibly under a different report,  
8 and then we can clean up the P&L to where it will  
9 be easier to read. So we can get it out, and  
10 maybe we can get it out to you a little faster.  
11 I've talked with Becky, and so we're going to be  
12 working on that.

13 And I guess that's all I have to report.

14 Are there any questions about the Finance  
15 Committee?

16 COMMANDER WILSON: I'd just like to add here  
17 that I contacted all the Honor Flights in Ohio,  
18 which we have one that comes out of Columbus,  
19 Cleveland, Cincinnati, and Dayton. And I spoke to  
20 them all and found out what size they were, how  
21 many flights they had, how many veterans they  
22 serve.

23 And so with the approval of the Finance  
24 Committee, we broke it down to where Columbus is  
25 the largest. They're going to get \$7,000.



1 Cleveland and Cincinnati are about the same size.  
2 They're each going to get \$4,000. Dayton is the  
3 smallest. They're going to get \$2,899.83. So we  
4 felt that was fair and the Finance Committee  
5 approved it.

6 So with that, we need to entertain a motion  
7 to accept the Finance Committee's report.

8 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,  
9 Wright, 13th District. I make a motion to approve  
10 the report as said by the chairman.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. We have a motion by  
12 Richard Wright.

13 Do we have a second?

14 TREASURER WILSON: Second, Robert Wilson,  
15 Treasurer.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Seconded by Robert Wilson.  
17 Is there any discussion?

18 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Commander.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

20 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: NEC Klostermeier.  
21 There is an Honor Flight that flies out of  
22 Findlay also.

23 COMMANDER WILSON: We took the biggest ones.

24 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Okay.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Just to be fair, we took

1 the biggest ones, the biggest four in Ohio.

2 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: They have two or three  
3 flights a year. So --

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Yeah, exactly.

5 So, any other discussion?

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

7 COMMANDER WILSON: So all those in favor  
8 signify by saying aye.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WILSON: And we're going to make  
13 arrangements with each Honor Flight to go present  
14 them the check so we can get them some recognition  
15 about their Honor Flight and also give the  
16 Department of Ohio recognition for donating the  
17 funds. So that will be happening in the next few  
18 weeks.

19 Thank you.

20 Ken LaVoy. And he is Chairman of the  
21 Legislative Commission.

22 CMSN CHRMN LAVOY: Thank you, Commander.

23 I've been sitting here about two hours. I  
24 noticed a lot of you squirming in your seats. So  
25 in keeping with the Commander's recommendation

1 that I keep my minutes very short and to the  
2 point, I'm going to take about 15 seconds of my  
3 report and say everybody stand up and stretch in  
4 place.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: We're going to be breaking  
6 here shortly, people, for lunch. So just bear  
7 with us a few more minutes.

8           CMSN CHRMN LAVOY: Okay, so as the Commander  
9 mentioned, we're going to be breaking for lunch  
10 shortly.

11           Our Legislative Commission met at the fall  
12 conference on Friday. We had nine out of 14  
13 Districts represented. We still had two Districts  
14 that had vacancies. That was District 9 and 14.  
15 But we did reach a quorum.

16           With that, we covered old business, new  
17 business, the District reports. Everything was  
18 given.

19           We did have some special guests that were  
20 present. We had Jerry Perry, Al Buxton, Ron  
21 Distel, Ron Chapman, and Suzette Heller, that came  
22 to our Commission Meeting, as well as Commander  
23 Wilson and Brad Teis stopped by, as I'm sure they  
24 did all the Commission meetings, to introduce the  
25 new Department Adjutant.

1           So with that, the main point that came out of  
2 our Legislative Commission was the discussion  
3 under new business that regarded House Bill 407,  
4 the Safe Shelter Initiative Program. There was a  
5 lot of questions with that.

6           And then also, in mirroring the success of  
7 the Sons of The American Legion and their license  
8 plate, we thought it was appropriate to put forth  
9 a resolution for an American Legion license plate.  
10 So I took that upon myself, as the chairman, to  
11 draft that. And that will be presented to you  
12 later this afternoon from Scott Palider, when he  
13 covers the resolutions.

14           Along with that, Jermaine Ferguson made a  
15 recommendation for drafting a resolution for a  
16 Buddy Check Day, and to put that as a piece of  
17 legislation, a state bill, to call for buddy  
18 checks to be conducted. So we haven't moved  
19 forward on anything with that, but everybody was  
20 in agreement that that was a good effort. And  
21 also, Holly Lewis recommended Senator Hoagland to  
22 sponsor the bill.

23           Let's see. We have, as I said, we talked  
24 about the Good of the Legion. We had a closing  
25 prayer by the great Chaplain Al Buxton, and we

1 adjourned about an hour and six minutes into the  
2 commission meeting.

3 Thank you, Commander, for the appointment.

4 I also want to move that these minutes are  
5 accepted as written and presented.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Do we have a  
7 motion to accept his report?

8 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander,  
9 Jermaine Ferguson, 6th District, moves to accept  
10 the minutes.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

12 Do we have a second? Don't be shy.

13 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,  
14 Wright, 13th District seconds.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Is there any discussion on  
16 the report?

17 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

18 COMMANDER WILSON: If not, all those in favor  
19 of accepting the report say aye.

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

21 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

22 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

23 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

24 Thank you.

25 CMSN CHRNM LAVOY: Thank you, Commander.

1           And I would not be doing my job as 2nd Vice  
2 for the 3rd District if I didn't say I have gun  
3 raffle tickets with me.

4           FROM THE FLOOR: Out of order.

5           CMSN CHRMN LAVOY: So see me.

6           COMMANDER WILSON: See him at lunch.

7           CMSN CHRMN LAVOY: Thank you. Merry  
8 Christmas everyone.

9           COMMANDER WILSON: Merry Christmas. Thank  
10 you.

11           The next report will be by Holly Lewis,  
12 Media, Marketing and Communications Commission  
13 Chairwoman.

14           CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Hello everybody.

15           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Hello.

16           CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: How are you?

17           COMMANDER WILSON: Wonderful.

18           CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Great.

19           So the Media, Marketing and Communications  
20 Commission met at Cherry Valley Hotel on  
21 October 10th, at 10:00 AM.

22           We did not have a quorum. So we only had  
23 seven of 14 Districts present. So this report is  
24 just for informational purposes.

25           The big thing is, we're very focused, as a

1 commission, on the cost of the Ohio Legion News.  
2 So we had an update from Jon Vulgamore about the  
3 summer edition.

4 The total cost of the Ohio Legion News,  
5 because of increasing postage and all kinds of  
6 other things, is now at \$31,993.20 per edition.  
7 Okay? So we are currently 6.2 cents per member  
8 over budget. It works out to about 20-K a year  
9 that we're over budget, because in the  
10 constitution and bylaws we have \$1.20 of  
11 membership dues that is allocated to this purpose.

12 So, we are very heavily focused on  
13 encouraging people to sign up for the electronic  
14 version of the Ohio Legion News. So there is a  
15 campaign that has been going out. If we have your  
16 e-mail, there's also a place on the website,  
17 OhioLegion.com, for you to sign up for the  
18 electronic version.

19 As an incentive, we have very limited space  
20 in the printed Ohio Legion News, so we have  
21 created an annex that is being sent out  
22 electronically. So everything that we get that we  
23 have to chop out of the printed version is in the  
24 electronic version. So if you have Posts that are  
25 wondering why their pictures and articles and all

1 the things aren't in the printed version, they  
2 should sign up for the electronic one, they'll get  
3 it. All right?

4 The other thing that was suggested by Joyce  
5 Hannum from District 9 was to have a section, a  
6 letters to the editor, like letters to the  
7 Commander, Adjutant. So that's something that  
8 we'll be discussing with the leadership team.

9 We did talk about getting rid of the OLM  
10 mailing all together, but that's not a feasible  
11 option at this point.

12 We also talked about maybe making it, instead  
13 of quarterly, making it three times. The  
14 committee didn't feel that that was a viable  
15 option either.

16 So, to that point, we sent out another  
17 October 1st campaign for the electronic version of  
18 the Ohio Legion News. And we now have 2,472  
19 people that have signed up for that. So it's  
20 saving us about \$1,000 an edition. Okay?

21 The other thing that we have done is we now  
22 are accepting advertising for the Ohio Legion  
23 News. And Arrow International did buy an ad for  
24 \$2,000. And Charities, Inc., was considering, I  
25 don't know if it happened, buying an ad as well.



1           So we did discuss having different  
2 advertising options versus, you know, printed,  
3 because there's limited space in the print versus  
4 electronic-only advertising. So we're playing  
5 with that as well.

6           The other thing that happened was the  
7 OhioLegion.com, we had some upgrades to that. So  
8 we had them back up our website on a local server.  
9 We have a clone of it, just in case it goes down.  
10 And we integrated updated site themes on WordPress  
11 and those kinds of things. So all of that is  
12 taken care of. So there is now a contingency  
13 plan. It's backed up. It wasn't backed up  
14 before, which was a little bit of an issue.

15           And then Frank Morrow is going to be on the  
16 subcommission. So he's got a couple people that  
17 are going through the website to make sure that  
18 all the links work, and identifying what needs to  
19 be updated. So you may be asked for information  
20 for the website.

21           And if you see things that aren't up to date  
22 on Ohio Legion News, either let myself or Jon  
23 Vulgamore know and we'll get that updated.

24           The last thing was the, just the  
25 Department -- we did talk about the Department

1 Commander's program, and the communications that  
2 we're going to do for that for Save A Warrior.

3 And the meeting ended and everybody was  
4 happy. And that's that. And that concludes my  
5 report.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you, Ms. Holly.

7 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Any questions?

8 COMMANDER WILSON: Any questions? Any  
9 questions of Ms. Holly?

10 Yes, Jermaine.

11 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Jermaine Ferguson, 6th  
12 District.

13 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: How many  
14 e-subscribers do we need to have a balanced  
15 budget?

16 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: I don't know the answer  
17 to that, Jermaine. But I know we're about \$5,000  
18 per edition over budget.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: So we're encouraging you  
20 to try to get your members, yourself, and  
21 everyone, to receive your Legion News on-line.  
22 You'll get it quicker, there's more information in  
23 there, and it saves us money.

24 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: So right now the cost is  
25 36.2 cents per member, per paper.

1 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Hey, Holly.

2 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Yes.

3 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Steve Masowick,  
4 Alternate NEC.

5 What's the link on that? Do you have that?

6 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: It's on OhioLegion.com,  
7 right on the very front of the page. It's in the  
8 bar to the right.

9 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay.

10 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: And there's a little  
11 thing that says "Newsletter," right, sign up for  
12 electronic, or something like that.

13 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay.

14 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Okay?

15 And then what happens is, once you sign up  
16 for it, in the background we know to take you off  
17 the print list.

18 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Okay.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Anything else?

20 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

21 CMSN CHRWMN LEWIS: Awesome, thank you.

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Charles?

23 CMSN CHRWMN CRAYNON: Yes, ma'am.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: We're going to get  
25 Charles' report and then we're going to break for

1 lunch, Charles' and Holly's. We'll save JD for  
2 after lunch.

3 CMSN CHRMN CRAYNON: You know when you're on  
4 a committee that starts with a "V", you know  
5 you're at the end of it.

6 The VA&R Commission was called to order at  
7 the Cherry Valley Lodge, in Newark, on  
8 October 8th, at 5:00 PM. We had nine Districts  
9 that were represented. We had four Districts that  
10 were absent. And we still have District 11 that's  
11 vacant.

12 Guests: Richard Wright, Al Buxton, Jerry  
13 Perry, Joe Navarre, Robert Wilson, and Kelly  
14 Pulczynski.

15 The previous committee minutes were approved  
16 by the DEC and they were reviewed by the  
17 committee.

18 District reports:

19 District 1, Toledo VA, they're doing  
20 drive-through COVID testing and they're giving flu  
21 and COVID shots.

22 District 4 gave an update on the stand down  
23 for the homeless veterans in Cincinnati. They  
24 gave out 500 backpacks to homeless veterans. It  
25 sounds like it was a very good stand down.

1           District 13, the Commander visited the  
2 Cleveland VA at the Fisher House. And also, you  
3 can now get your booster shots at the Cleveland  
4 VA.

5           Under old business, our website, which was  
6 outdated, was updated and it has all the correct  
7 VA&R contact information for the Department on  
8 that.

9           Commander Wilson, and 1st Vice Brad Teis, and  
10 the Adjutant, Eric Hall, visited, along with the  
11 membership coordinator, and the Assistant  
12 Adjutant, JD Robinson. They all addressed the  
13 commission on their plans for suicide awareness.  
14 The Commander's program will be in place for next  
15 year, as well as for the incoming Commander.

16           New business:

17           Department Service Officer William Genochio  
18 and Coordinator Scott Palider updated us on  
19 various items.

20           The Department VBA Coordinator, William  
21 Genochio, spoke on a VSO training event which was  
22 held at Department Headquarters. There were over  
23 45 participants in that event.

24           He also spoke on the VA update in Cleveland  
25 and the appeals hearing now being held in person

1 if the veteran would like an in-person hearing.

2 Gifts for Yanks update. We were updated on  
3 the Gifts for Yanks September report, and project  
4 requests for the Sandusky Veterans Home, Cleveland  
5 Fisher House and Cleveland VA were discussed.

6 Commander visits. A summary of Commander  
7 Wilson's visits to the Sandusky Veterans' Home,  
8 Cleveland VA Medical Center, and the Cleveland  
9 Federal Building, September 28th through the 30th,  
10 was given.

11 The first annual Veterans Expo was held in  
12 September of 2021, in Pickerington. And  
13 Department Coordinator Scott Palider has certain  
14 financial groups which are interested in teaching  
15 financial literacy courses to our Legionnaires.  
16 So if you have anyone interested in that, see  
17 Scott.

18 Commander Wilson's program is getting  
19 traction, and roughly 15,000 has been raised as of  
20 this report.

21 Suzette Heller recommended that we have a  
22 representative for the Commander's program be  
23 invited to speak at the Mid-Winter Conference, and  
24 possibly at the Department Convention.

25 There were no resolutions. There were no

1 comments for the good of The Legion. And there  
2 being no further business, the meeting was closed  
3 at 5:52 PM, with a salute to the colors.

4 Thank you, Commander.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

6 Do we have a motion to accept his report?

7 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Klostermeier, NEC, moves  
8 to accept.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: Klostermeier.

10 2ND DISTRICT CMDR HOMAN: Mike Homan, 2nd  
11 District, seconds the motion.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Seconded.

13 Is there any discussion?

14 Yes.

15 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th  
16 District. I just have a quick question, not a  
17 complaint.

18 How do you submit for the VA Healthcare  
19 Worker of the Year?

20 CMSN CHRMN CRAYNON: That is on-line, or it  
21 was on-line. Is it on there now? I haven't  
22 checked recently, but it was on-line. And I  
23 couldn't answer for sure right now, but there  
24 is --

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: There is a form?

1 CMSN CHR MN CRAYNON: Like all the other  
2 forms, it was on-line. And I'll double check on  
3 it.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Check with Scott. He  
5 should be able to give you the form.

6 CMSN CHR MN CRAYNON: I'll get back to you on  
7 that.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Okay, thanks.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, any other  
10 discussion?

11 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
13 favor signify by saying aye.

14 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

16 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

18 Holly on Gifts for Yanks.

19 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: This is a subcommittee  
20 report. So it's just for information only. And I  
21 do realize I'm standing between you and food, so  
22 I'll make it quick.

23 We had our subcommittee meeting on  
24 November 11th, at Department headquarters, with  
25 Robert Steggemann, Ken Ellis, Darell Bishop and



1 myself present, with Andrew Klingler and Scott  
2 Palider.

3 So just a quick update on the distribution of  
4 gifts. So Cincinnati will be getting 300 gifts;  
5 Cleveland will be getting 300 gifts; Dayton, 250  
6 gifts; Sandusky, 325; Georgetown, 100; and  
7 Chillicothe, 236.

8 None of the facilities are letting us in to  
9 distribute the gifts again this year. But they  
10 will allow us to drop off the gifts with the  
11 staff, and the staff will distribute the gifts.  
12 Same as last year. Okay?

13 All of the gifts are being packed by  
14 Department staff. Thank you so much for doing  
15 that. They're making good progress. Everything  
16 should be ready, probably Monday. And the  
17 District chairs will get a phone call to come get  
18 the stuff. Okay?

19 We did have some stuff. We have stuff left  
20 over, right, from previous years. So we  
21 determined that we were going to just give the DEC  
22 the cushions, right, that were part of the gifts  
23 last year, and then the rest of the leftover gifts  
24 will be equally distributed out to the 14  
25 Districts. So out in the lobby, please, before

1 you leave, take your distribution.

2 And we would like to encourage you to make  
3 sure that those gifts go to shut-in veterans.  
4 Okay? It's not, you know, raffle stuff. It's for  
5 veterans who are sick, shut-in, you know, please.  
6 Okay?

7 If you need help taking them to your cars,  
8 let us know and we'll gather a gang to help you.

9 All right, on the new business, Andrew is  
10 going to notify the Districts once the gifts are  
11 packed and ready. So just alert your chair that  
12 that's coming.

13 We did decide that we're not going to have a  
14 vendor table at Mid-Winter. But we will be  
15 selling our fundraising items at the emblem tables  
16 table. So we have the gold rifle pens, Gifts for  
17 Yanks pens, and then other available items from  
18 previous years.

19 Darell brought up the topic of changing the  
20 Gifts for Yanks name. And along with changing the  
21 program's name, he discussed that the Gifts for  
22 Yanks should become its own commission. Because  
23 the Gifts for Yanks is not a National Program, but  
24 instead falls under the Department of Ohio. So we  
25 don't agree the Gifts for Yanks should fall under

1 the VA&R Commission, but we're going to bring it  
2 up at the next Gifts for Yanks full committee  
3 meeting.

4 The other thing we talked about, and I just  
5 want to make sure to answer any questions about  
6 this, you know, we have all these guidelines about  
7 these gifts have to be made in the U.S.A., all the  
8 things. And it's getting really, really  
9 challenging for us to meet a budget that we have  
10 with U.S. made products that are appropriate for  
11 all of the demographics. It's getting very  
12 challenging.

13 So we discussed changing the gifts out to  
14 gift cards. And we're getting feedback from the  
15 VA facilities that that would be more appropriate  
16 as well, because they don't want to have to deal  
17 with, you know, these gifts. Sometimes they're  
18 bulky, blah, blah, blah, blah, blah. So we are  
19 looking at potential partners of either Walmart,  
20 Amazon, or working directly with Visa to get Visa  
21 gift cards because those could be used anywhere.  
22 All right?

23 So we are investigating that. I just wanted  
24 you to be aware that we are investigating that.  
25 It does save us a ton of money on shipping,

1 logistics. So the gift would actually be more.

2 Right? We would be able to do --

3 Right now we're averaging around 23 to \$25  
4 per gift. We could potentially get it up to 30 or  
5 35, right, just because we're saving money on all  
6 of that. All right?

7 So just more to come on that, but I wanted to  
8 kind of presell you on it, because it's a great  
9 idea. Right?

10 So we did also review the amount that has  
11 been fundraised so far. We're going to run,  
12 probably run a fundraising ad in the Ohio Legion  
13 News. Because right now, our donations are only  
14 at \$52,583. It's really low. Our donations are  
15 way down.

16 So please, if you could, on your Post visits,  
17 whatever, remind people about the Gifts for Yanks  
18 program. And if they need more information, they  
19 should contact Department. We can get them  
20 flyers, all kinds of things.

21 The other thing that we're going to do is --  
22 you know how we had those honor roll posters? So  
23 we're going to -- Andrew is working on making a  
24 new version of that that we can print here so we  
25 can save money. So we'll have that to send out to

1 all the Posts as well.

2 So our meeting adjourned at 11:20 AM, and I  
3 am done.

4 Any questions, comments?

5 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Holly.

6 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Yes.

7 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Through the Chair,  
8 Commander, to Holly.

9 Did you say Sandusky is not going to allow us  
10 to be there?

11 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Uh-huh.

12 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: At the September meeting,  
13 the chairman there told us we would be allowed to  
14 come in. Now I've 25 guys I've got to contact at  
15 my Post that go every year. And we already had it  
16 planned to go.

17 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Yeah. Andrew called all  
18 of the VA facilities and they all said no.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

20 Yes, Darell.

21 5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: Darell Bishop, 5th  
22 District.

23 Holly, you forgot to add in there that we  
24 will have tickets for the coin raffle.

25 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Oh, yeah, yeah.

1           So we will have tickets for the coin raffle  
2 as well at Mid-Winter. So we have that centennial  
3 coin set still.

4           COMMANDER WILSON: Yes. You had your hand up  
5 first.

6           14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th  
7 District Commander.

8           We received a stack of these things  
9 (indicating), a stack of these things (indicating)  
10 back. Just about everybody's got them. Is there  
11 a list of Posts that we're supposed to give them  
12 to or --

13           CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Your Gifts for Yanks  
14 Chairman should be telling you that.

15           COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

16           5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: They'll be getting  
17 a list, Commander. They'll be getting a --

18           COMMANDER WILSON: They'll be getting a list.

19           5TH DISTRICT 2VC BISHOP: In June, with all  
20 the donations form the Posts. And then it's up to  
21 your Gifts for the Yanks Chairman on how they want  
22 to pass out the plaques, if they want to go three  
23 different categories or whatever. But it's up to  
24 the Gifts for Yanks Chairman what to do with the  
25 plaques.

1 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Yeah. We leave that up  
2 to the chair and how they want to run that in  
3 their own District.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Any other  
5 questions?

6 Mr. Schmoll.

7 8TH DISTRICT 1VC SCHMOLL: Yeah, that was my  
8 question. If we so desire to wait until June,  
9 that the year is over, then we can, like our  
10 District can decide how we're going to do this?

11 COMMANDER WILSON: You can give it out when  
12 you want to. Okay? It's your show.

13 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: You're show.

14 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, any other  
15 questions?

16 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine  
17 Ferguson, 6th District.

18 Was there a serious discussion about changing  
19 the program name of Gifts for Yanks to something  
20 else, or was it just deliberations, seeing what  
21 the feeling of the committee is?

22 CMTE CHRWMN LEWIS: Yeah, we're -- this was  
23 just a subcommittee meeting. So there was really  
24 only the four of us discussing it. So we want to  
25 bring it up at the full-blown committee meeting.

1           COMMANDER WILSON:  Yeah, I think that was  
2           stated.

3           Okay, any other questions?

4           FROM THE ASSEMBLY:  (No response).

5           COMMANDER WILSON:  If not, we're going to  
6           break for lunch.  We're going to salute the colors  
7           and we're going to be back in our seats, ready to  
8           meet, by ten after 12:00 -- I mean ten after 1:00.

9           All right, so we'll salute the colors.  One,  
10          two.

11          . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

12          All right, we're in recess until ten after  
13          1:00.

14          (THEREUPON, THE PROCEEDINGS STOOD IN RECESS).

15          . . . CALL TO ORDER . . .

16          COMMANDER WILSON:  Salute to the colors.

17          One, two.

18          . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

19          Okay, we're going to reconvene our meeting.

20          And the first report is J.D.

21          ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON:  Good afternoon,  
22          everybody.

23          FROM THE ASSEMBLY:  Good afternoon.

24          ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON:  We went to the -- I  
25          went to the SAL DEC meeting held in Swanton before



1 the Commander's homecoming. We did not have a  
2 quorum. So we went over a few line items that  
3 needed to be dealt with, but did not vote  
4 anything.

5 The biggest thing that was taken away from  
6 the meeting was there was 90 Squadrons that had  
7 represented zero membership so far this year. And  
8 38 Squadrons that had not turned in their  
9 officers' certification, CSRs, Annual Squadron  
10 Reports.

11 National Vice Commander Jeff Vrabel asked  
12 that all District, Legion District officers and  
13 advisers need to work with the Posts to make sure  
14 all these forms can be turned in on time.

15 Their forms need to be turned in the same  
16 time our forms do. So please reach out to your  
17 District SAL officers, your Squadron officers at  
18 your local Posts, to make sure that the forms are  
19 getting turned in so that, one, they can get their  
20 membership cards out; and two, starting in  
21 January, National is going to be updating for the  
22 SAL to be able to pay on--line. When that is  
23 done, if your Squadron has not turned in what  
24 their dues are, they will not be getting the money  
25 for it when the members renew on-line. So, it's

1 in their best interests to be turning those forms  
2 in.

3 Commander, that's my report.

4 COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

5 Does anyone have any questions of John?

6 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

7 COMMANDER WILSON: John, I have a question.

8 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Yes, ma'am.

9 COMMANDER WILSON: What is the SAL doing,  
10 what is the leadership of the SAL doing about  
11 these Squadrons that have not filled out their  
12 paperwork and are at a zero?

13 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: So far, they are  
14 dividing between all the state officers and  
15 District officers and going out and contacting all  
16 the Posts. I know I had three of them contact me  
17 this week to start getting their forms turned in.  
18 But they are actually knocking on doors at the  
19 Squadron level.

20 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, all right.

21 Do we have a question back there?

22 HISTORIAN BEYER: Al Beyer, Department  
23 Historian.

24 John, I go to a lot of Posts throughout the  
25 state all the time. And I was pretty ignorant

1     beforehand, but I'll tell you, 80 percent of these  
2     Posts, the Squadron Commanders don't feel that  
3     they have an obligations to the Post Commanders.  
4     And they just, you know, they got their noses so  
5     high, stuck up in the air, they don't want to  
6     associate with the Commander on these issues, you  
7     know. I think that's a major problem somebody's  
8     got to deal with.

9             ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I can agree with  
10     that.

11            COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Well, that's  
12     something, definitely, that we need to be working  
13     on diligently. And whatever help that you or the  
14     SAL officers may need from Department, we're  
15     willing to do that.

16            Yes.

17            14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th  
18     District Commander.

19            Speaking of the SAL members, I'm a Past  
20     District Commander for the SAL in the 14th  
21     District. And from what we have seen, it's not  
22     the SAL members that are sticking their nose up.  
23     Okay? It's the Riders that are sticking their  
24     nose up at the SAL, telling us we have no business  
25     controlling anything at the Post. Okay?

1           If it's not the Sons signing up the Rider,  
2           it's a Legion member signing up the Rider. And  
3           we're arguing constantly, trying to get the Legion  
4           Riders to work with the Sons.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Well we're talking  
6           about the Sons right now.

7           14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Right, we are.  
8           We're trying to get their membership. The  
9           Legion Riders are holding their people back from  
10          signing their membership cards until right at the  
11          end of the year, just because the Sons have more  
12          authority in the Posts.

13          COMMANDER WILSON: All right. Well, that's  
14          something you have to work on at your District  
15          level. You're the District Commander. Maybe you  
16          can be talking to them about it at your  
17          conferences. If you need our help, let us know.

18          Anything else? Any questions, concerns?

19          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

20          COMMANDER WILSON: All right, thank you J.D.

21          ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Thanks, Commander.

22          COMMANDER WILSON: And if you don't mind, I'm  
23          going to move over here.

24          I've been told by a couple reliable sources  
25          that a couple of people have some donations for

1 Save A Warrior. So if you have that, you can  
2 bring that up at this time.

3 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: Commander, I'd  
4 like to present a few checks, for a total of  
5 \$1,180.

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Wow.

7 (Applause).

8 9TH DISTRICT CMDR DITTEBRAND: It's all from  
9 pins.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: So this is all from pin  
11 sales from the 9th District. So, all those others  
12 who just took the 50 pins and sold them, or asked  
13 for a donation, this is what can be done with some  
14 work and dedication. So we appreciate this very,  
15 very much.

16 Great job, great job. Great job to you and  
17 the 1st Vice. Thank you.

18 Mr. Homan.

19 So we have \$145 from the 2nd District in pin  
20 sales. And they gave me money earlier. And also  
21 there's a \$1,000 donation from District 2.

22 (Applause).

23 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: District 12 has  
24 an initial contribution of \$58.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: All right.

1           And District 12 has some of their pins sold,  
2 and so that's \$58.

3           12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: We still have a  
4 few more.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: A few more to sell. Okay,  
6 great.

7           (Applause).

8           Also, I'd like to mention that the Mission  
9 Blue Grant is still out there. And out of the  
10 500-and-some Posts that we have in the Department  
11 of Ohio, I'm sorry to say we only have 17 who have  
12 applied. I think it's been brought out a couple  
13 of times. This is the second time you can apply  
14 for the Mission Blue Grant.

15           If your Post didn't apply before, they can  
16 get \$2,000. If they applied before and got the  
17 1,000, they can get another \$1,000.

18           So you need to go to National, download the  
19 Mission Blue app, fill it out, attach your  
20 insurance declaration page showing that National  
21 and the Department of Ohio are additional  
22 insureds, and mail it in to the Department  
23 Adjutant. They sign the paperwork, verify that  
24 you got all your ducks in a row, and they move it  
25 on to National.

1 I know I did it for our Post and we had our  
2 check turned around to us in about ten days.

3 So you're missing the boat if you're not  
4 encouraging the Posts in your District to do this.  
5 It's free money. And I don't know any Post --

6 Now you have to own the Post home or you have  
7 to rent. It's has to be brick and mortar. You  
8 can't just meet somewhere.

9 So please do that for your Posts. Please get  
10 that information out to all of your Posts in your  
11 Districts.

12 And the last thing is, if you haven't filled  
13 out your expense report, please do so before you  
14 leave today, and turn it in to Becky so they can  
15 do a quick turnaround on your checks. Okay?  
16 That's important.

17 All right, now we're going to go to Mr. Eric.

18 ADJUTANT HALL: Thank you, Commander.

19 Okay, well thank you, everybody. We're going  
20 to be talking about the Post Charters and  
21 suspensions.

22 And there is an error in the agenda in  
23 reference to that. In reference to the George  
24 Carver Post, from my understanding, that Post is  
25 closed, or should be closed. Is that correct?

1           Joyce, can you speak on behalf of that,  
2 please?

3           9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Yes. Joyce Hannum,  
4 9th District 1st Vice.

5           According to the minutes of the last DEC  
6 meeting, it was voted on and approved to cancel  
7 the charter of that Post, not suspend it. And  
8 it's listed here as suspended in the agenda. So  
9 that should have been taken care of by this time,  
10 rather than waiting to talk about it some more.

11          ADJUTANT HALL: I know that it still hasn't  
12 been done. Is that correct?

13          COMMANDER WILSON: We'll take care of it.

14          ADJUTANT HALL: The Walter Weller Post, most  
15 of the members will probably transfer to 587. I  
16 have not received anything in reference to the  
17 update that that has been confirmed and that it's  
18 been completed. So I will be following up on that  
19 in reference to find out to insure that all that  
20 with the property and with the members, that they  
21 are all transferred.

22          PDC SCHMITT: Commander.

23          COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

24          PDC SCHMITT: Through the chairs to Eric, on  
25 the 135 Walter Weller Post, we've been holding off



1 on the final transfer of at least one person  
2 because of the fact we've been waiting for a  
3 letter --

4 ADJUTANT HALL: Yes.

5 PDC SCHMITT: -- to officially transfer the  
6 building over to another Post. And we can't  
7 complete that until we have that letter.

8 ADJUTANT HALL: I'll get that for you, yes.

9 PDC SCHMITT: Okay?

10 ADJUTANT HALL: Yes.

11 PDC SCHMITT: So that's where it's at.

12 That's why we're holding up on the final  
13 distribution of the membership there.

14 ADJUTANT HALL: Got you. Thank you.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: That will be taken care  
16 of. Thank you.

17 ADJUTANT HALL: Okay. Yes.

18 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Klostermeier, NEC. I have  
19 a question.

20 Some of those members transferred into Adams  
21 Township, not all to 587.

22 ADJUTANT HALL: Right.

23 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Now my 1st Vice Commander  
24 at our Post meeting last night asked me to check  
25 and see if we are going to get the cards for 135,

1 or if anybody is going to get them, or do we have  
2 to get ahold of these guys to finish up the  
3 transfers to get them into our Post. They've  
4 already said they want to, but how do we handle  
5 the membership cards? Do we just make them a new  
6 one?

7 ADJUTANT HALL: J.D. will answer that for  
8 you.

9 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: If you e-mail me  
10 the members cards you need, I will pull them out  
11 of 135 and mail those cards to you.

12 NEC KLOSTERMEIER: Okay. I'll check with my  
13 1st Vice. Thank you, J.D.

14 ADJUTANT HALL: The Ironton Post 433, Paul  
15 Sands did come by to the office to drop off some  
16 miscellaneous items in reference to the  
17 membership. In that, also, there was no minutes  
18 that were dropped off. They refused to turn over  
19 the financials. They did turn in the rifles that  
20 they were holding, that they did have.

21 Paul, do you have anything else in reference  
22 to that that was going on since we last talked?

23 7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Paul Sands, 7th  
24 District Commander.

25 As far as the rifles, if they had other

1 rifles, nobody knows whatever happened to them.

2 The Post financials, we will never get them  
3 by calling to request, calling them.

4 I also talked to them about some checks that  
5 members had already paid for this year that have  
6 never been cashed, and a couple from late last  
7 year. They said that, his wife said, "Well, I  
8 have a stack of them here, but I haven't listed  
9 them and deposited them yet."

10 So I requested, instead of her doing that,  
11 send them to me, then I'm going to transfer them  
12 up here to Department.

13 Well, the next day, I called him again and  
14 the phone number has been disconnected, or I've  
15 been blocked, one or the other.

16 But he has no intentions of turning over any  
17 financial records.

18 The minutes. He said, "What minutes?"

19 And I said, "You don't take minutes of your  
20 meetings?"

21 And he said, "Well, we have a file cabinet  
22 and there was some folders in there with a bunch  
23 of papers in them. We just threw them in a paper  
24 bag and threw them away."

25 This man has been, he's been Commander for

1 better than ten years down there. He's done  
2 everything his own way. Every year, the members  
3 have to fight to get their membership cards, get  
4 their checks cashed. This man does what he wants  
5 to. And as far as I know, he has just decided to  
6 close up shop. And I don't know what he's going  
7 to do.

8           COMMANDER WILSON: Well, Paul, we're going to  
9 get in contact with that Commander.

10           7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Good luck.

11           COMMANDER WILSON: We will.

12           7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Because, I'll tell  
13 you, you can e-mail him, you can call him. You  
14 might have to go down and see him. But he won't  
15 answer the phone or e-mails.

16           COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, he'll answer his door.  
17 So --

18           7TH DISTRICT CMDR SANDS: Yeah.

19           So anyway, that's where we stand with him.  
20 He just don't care.

21           COMMANDER WILSON: Well, we'll have to get to  
22 the bottom of that. Thank you.

23           PDC SCHMITT: Commander, in reference to the  
24 ceremonial rifles, those are all controlled by  
25 TACOM, up in Detroit. They control every

1 ceremonial rifle and standing display in the world  
2 out of Detroit.

3 And we give them the Post number, she'll send  
4 down every firearm that they're supposed to have  
5 by serial number.

6 Mansfield Post is supposed to have ten. They  
7 sent three rifles back. Those have been sent  
8 back. They don't know where the other ones are  
9 at.

10 I sent the list over to the police department  
11 there to be on the lookout of those rifles,  
12 because they're considered stolen.

13 So everything comes out of Detroit. But you  
14 get with me and I can help you with it.

15 ADJUTANT HALL: I'll get you that  
16 information. Thank you.

17 Ironton Post 590. Now that Post is the one  
18 where there's back taxes owed. We don't know in  
19 reference to what direction we need to do because  
20 we need to know what we need to do with the  
21 property. I know the Post has been closed, but we  
22 need to resolve as far as what we're going to do  
23 with the property.

24 COMMANDER WILSON: 590 was supposed to  
25 transfer into this Post. And they were going to

1 take over that Post property.

2 ADJUTANT HALL: That never happened.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: That never happened.

4 So we've to figure out what we're going to do  
5 with that. There's like \$9,000 in back property  
6 taxes that's owed.

7 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Wilson, National Vice.

8 Has anybody talked to the auditor down there  
9 to find out if they've foreclosed on it or if  
10 they've auctioned it off? Because that's normally  
11 what happens, the auditor will auction the  
12 property off for the taxes.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: Well, we'll find that out.

14 ADJUTANT HALL: Okay, and then the Post 350,  
15 J.D., was there anything in reference to the  
16 temporary charter to get their permanent charter?

17 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They have not  
18 submitted their annual dues record yet. That is  
19 the only thing holding up their temporary charter.

20 ADJUTANT HALL: They have not submitted --  
21 Say that again, J.D. I'm sorry.

22 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: They have not  
23 submitted their annual dues form. So National has  
24 not finished processing their charter.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we need to get

1     ahold of them and tell them that's what they need  
2     to do.

3             ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: I tried to get  
4     ahold of them and they're very hard to communicate  
5     with.

6             COMMANDER WILSON: Well, we've got to try  
7     harder.

8             13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: We are going to  
9     try harder, Commander. It's bizarre, what this  
10    has turned in to. I've never seen such a  
11    situation as Post 350.

12            The previous Commander that ran that Post,  
13    that closed the Post, wants to come back in. And  
14    he has the people rather miffed. They don't like  
15    him.

16            And I don't -- after my last conversation  
17    with Michael, the Commander there, they're not  
18    meeting due to COVID. So they don't have a Post  
19    home. So we're in limbo right now.

20            I do have a division Commander assigned to  
21    them. And once he gets well, he's going to --  
22    Remember Stan Popek? Stanley is their division  
23    Commander.

24            COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

25            ADJUTANT HALL: All right.

1           The last thing I have here is going to  
2     require a vote, in reference to Post -- I'm sorry,  
3     just give me one second here -- it is going to be  
4     Post 465, and merger to Post 1.

5           I do have the, I do have all the  
6     documentation that is needed to send up to  
7     National in reference to the request for a charter  
8     and change, and for the revitalization team  
9     charter and Department development.

10          So we do need a motion and a second and a  
11     voting for this.

12          COMMANDER WILSON: So we need a motion to  
13     approve this merger.

14          12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander,  
15     Poulton, District 12 Commander, I'd like to make  
16     the motion that we approve the merger of Post 465  
17     with Post 1.

18          COMMANDER WILSON: All right, we have a  
19     motion.

20          Do we have a second?

21          14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 1st Vice  
22     Commander, 14th District, seconds that motion.

23          COMMANDER WILSON: All right. So we have a  
24     motion and properly seconded.

25          Do we have any discussion?



1           12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander, can I  
2 make a brief statement about what happened here?

3           COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

4           12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Post 465 is one  
5 of those Posts that had one person doing  
6 everything. And that's one of my tasks in my  
7 District, is to try to work with the Posts. We  
8 have a minimum number of officers doing all the  
9 work. And we actually had three Posts in the last  
10 16 months that had one person in charge, and every  
11 one of those three persons, for whatever reason,  
12 passed away. One was locked up in probate, one  
13 was locked up in all kinds of a mess.

14           So this specific case is to merge a Post  
15 where the Commander passed away. Nobody is  
16 willing to step up and take charge of anything.  
17 All the members already approved to merge with  
18 Post 1, from Post 465.

19           But it's a bigger problem that I think we  
20 need to work on. And for District 12, that's one  
21 of my tasks.

22           Thank you.

23           COMMANDER WILSON: Thank you.

24           Okay, any other discussion?

25           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

1           COMMANDER WILSON: Hearing none, all those in  
2 favor signify by saying aye.

3           FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: Aye.

4           COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

5           FROM THE ASSEMBLEY: (No response).

6           COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

7           That's all the Adjutant has for right now.  
8 Who knows, he'll probably be back.

9           All right, so now we have resolutions and  
10 constitutional amendments by Scott.

11          2VC STENNIS: Commander, before we get  
12 started, I believe the first two resolutions that  
13 you're going to read will be taken care of by the  
14 Internal Affairs Commission at Mid-Winter.

15          COMMANDER WILSON: So we just need to do the  
16 last two.

17          2VC STENNIS: Yeah.

18          COORDINATOR PALIDER: I'm just going to  
19 discuss 22-03 and 22-04, as we already discussed  
20 with the Parliamentarian and 2nd Vice.

21          Okay, so I'm just going to read the resolve  
22 clauses.

23          So, 22-03, this is from the Americanism  
24 Committee and it's, "Bring Civics Back into the  
25 Classrooms of Ohio Schools."

1           "Resolved, that The American Legion of  
2 Ohio -- the Department of Ohio American Legion  
3 urges that the Ohio Department of Education  
4 investigates and comes up with a program requiring  
5 all school systems to create a class teaching  
6 civics to their students, first through 12th  
7 grade; and be it further

8           "Resolved, that the Department of Ohio  
9 American Legion urges the Ohio Department of  
10 education consider making said class at the high  
11 school level be a requirement as one of the three  
12 credits required to have a social studies to  
13 graduate."

14           COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, any discussion on  
15 that?

16           6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander.

17           COMMANDER WILSON: Uh-huh.

18           6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Jermaine from the  
19 6th District.

20           I move that this resolution be forwarded to  
21 the Department Legislative Committee for further  
22 review. There are some -- I can go into reasons  
23 why, but that's the motion.

24           COMMANDER WILSON: All right, Jermaine  
25 Ferguson moves that this resolution be adopted

1 (sic).

2 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: No, no.

3 COMMANDER WILSON: I'm sorry.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: It be referred  
5 to --

6 COMMANDER WILSON: Referred. I'm sorry. I  
7 didn't hear you.

8 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Be referred to  
9 the Department Legislative Committee to do some  
10 refinement on it.

11 COMMANDER WILSON: All right. We have a  
12 motion to refer it back to committee.

13 Is there a second?

14 8TH DISTRICT CMDR SMATHERS: Harold Smathers,  
15 Commander, 8th District, I second.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. All right, is there  
17 any discussion?

18 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: Yeah, Commander.  
19 Steve Masowick, Alternate NEC.

20 If they're going to send this back to  
21 wherever it came from for reasons that he can't  
22 tell us or doesn't know why, why are you doing  
23 this?

24 COMMANDER WILSON: No, he didn't say he  
25 didn't know. He said he would discuss them if

1 anyone wanted to hear it.

2 MASOWICK ALT NECMAN: Yeah, I'd like to know  
3 why he doesn't approve it.

4 6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Yes.

5 So, one, the Legislative liaison will be  
6 required to allocate. Therefore, this resolution  
7 should go to the Legislative Committee for review.

8 There are some -- okay, so I agree with this  
9 resolution. It needs to be strengthened, in my  
10 opinion. And I think the Department Legislative  
11 Committee is best suited to look at this to make  
12 sure that what is in this resolution can go to a  
13 legislator, and that it reflect our organization  
14 in the best light.

15 For instance, it says, "Investigates and  
16 comes up with a program required in all school  
17 systems." There could be some verbiage that we  
18 could use with some studies that are already  
19 published, to kind of clean that up a little bit.

20 It also says, "Consider making said class at  
21 the high school level be a requirement as one of  
22 the three."

23 Ohio has a requirement for a government or  
24 civics class. It is already a high school  
25 graduation requirement. So that's factually

1 wrong.

2 So we need to strengthen and make sure Ohio  
3 offers a high-quality civic education. And there  
4 are strong facts that we can argue that there are  
5 poor quality civic education requirements in our  
6 public education system. That's why I'm asking  
7 for this resolution to be forwarded to the  
8 Department Legislation Committee, so we can look  
9 at this and fine tune it, to make sure that this  
10 is something we can hand to legislators, and our  
11 recommendation makes sense and --

12 COMMANDER WILSON: Got you. Got you.

13 MASOWICK ALT NECMAN: I agree then. I  
14 understand.

15 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. All right, well,  
16 that's why we clarify things. I like when people  
17 ask questions and then we're all on the same page.

18 So all those in favor signify --

19 Well is there any other discussion? I'm  
20 sorry.

21 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

22 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, all those in  
23 favor signify by saying aye.

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

3 All right, Mr. Scott.

4 COORDINATOR PALIDER: Okay, Resolution 22-04.

5 This is from the Legislative Commission, and it's  
6 for The American Legion Department of Ohio to  
7 encourage the Ohio General Assembly to establish  
8 an American Legion license plate in the State of  
9 Ohio.

10 The resolve clause reads: "Resolved, that  
11 the Executive Committee of The American Legion  
12 Department of Ohio, assembled in Delaware, Ohio,  
13 on December 4th, 2021, that The American Legion  
14 shall apply to the State of Ohio legislature for  
15 the approval of an American Legion specialty  
16 license plate to be made available to all American  
17 Legion members in good standing; and be it

18 "Resolved, that the Executive Committee of  
19 The American Legion Department of Ohio, assembled  
20 in Delaware, Ohio, on December 4th, 2021, put  
21 forth to the State of Ohio legislature the  
22 appropriate, nationally-approved, original, time  
23 honored, well recognized and respected logo of The  
24 American Legion to be placed on a specialty  
25 license plate."

1           COMMANDER WILSON: All right. You've heard  
2 the resolution. Do we have a motion to accept?

3           1ST DISTRICT 1VC MOTTER: Kevin Motter, 1st  
4 District 1st Vice, so moves.

5           COMMANDER WILSON: Kevin Motter.

6           14TH DISTRICT CMDR CARSON: Bob Carson, 14th  
7 District, seconds.

8           COMMANDER WILSON: Seconds it.

9 All right, do we have any discussion?

10 Yes, Bob.

11           10TH DISTRICT CMDR RHODE: Bob Rhode, 10th  
12 District Commander.

13           There is a problem with verbiage in this. If  
14 you concentrate, it says, you know, a member in  
15 good standing. Anybody who is a member with a  
16 card may not be in good standing. If they have a  
17 card, how do they know, unless they're going to  
18 present the card whenever they get their plate.  
19 They don't. That's why I say the verbiage needs  
20 to be changed.

21           COMMANDER WILSON: Yes, Joyce.

22           9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 1st  
23 Vice, 9th District.

24           My question on this is anybody that signs up  
25 on National on-line, whether they're a veteran or



1 not, they can go ahead and tell them they're a  
2 member and they can turn around and get a license  
3 plate from Ohio. And some of them may be  
4 criminals, because they're not checking their  
5 backgrounds, they're not checking to verify them.  
6 That could reflect badly on us if we have Legion  
7 license plates running around doing criminal  
8 activities. And I don't know how you get around  
9 it.

10           COMMANDER WILSON: Well, I guess that we have  
11 to take the people -- hope people have a little  
12 bit of integrity. It's like the Sons' American  
13 Legion plate, you know, you have to hope that  
14 people have a little bit of integrity, and they're  
15 not going to say they belong to The American  
16 Legion if they don't, or they're not going to say  
17 they served if they didn't.

18           So, you know, it is an integrity factor with  
19 some people. I don't really know how we could  
20 resolve that where everyone would have to prove  
21 it. I'm not sure.

22           9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Perhaps if we could  
23 add verbiage that would make them show an Ohio  
24 membership card, not a National membership card.  
25 That might --

1           COMMANDER WILSON: I think we can change that  
2 verbiage pretty easily, with that correction.

3           6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: Commander,  
4 Jermaine Ferguson, 6th District.

5           So I stand for this resolution. But from an  
6 implementation standpoint, there is no statutory  
7 requirement for specialty license plates to show  
8 proof of belonging to said membership.

9           So, for instance, my wife could purchase an  
10 American Legion and she may not be an American  
11 Legion member.

12          COMMANDER WILSON: Right.

13          6TH DISTRICT 1VC FERGUSON: And I think that  
14 this is a good resolution to move forward. One,  
15 because it puts The American Legion on plates and  
16 cars. Hopefully we all purchase one.

17          And this just gets us out to -- there's  
18 another step in the process. We have to get a  
19 petition of 125 signatures, roughly, and then a  
20 legislator has to introduce legislation for it to  
21 be officially approved by the Ohio General  
22 Assembly. So this is just the first step to move  
23 forward.

24          My only question is: This is a revenue  
25 generator. What are those funds going to be

1 dedicated to, and should this speak to that?

2           COMMANDER WILSON: Well, our recommendation  
3 to the Finance Committee was to give it to  
4 American Legion Baseball. American Legion  
5 Baseball has no funding of its own. So every year  
6 they come in to the Department of Ohio and every  
7 year they're a cost to us. So we were hoping to  
8 generate some funds for American Legion Baseball  
9 through the sale of this license plate, and then  
10 that would help fund their budget. It wouldn't  
11 probably pay all of it, but it would help fund it.

12           Yes, Scott.

13           COORDINATOR PALIDER: Yes.

14           I mean, in order to lay out all the funding  
15 and everything, we have to write another  
16 resolution anyway for that. This is just the  
17 first step to get the ball rolling. So that's how  
18 I read this.

19           COMMANDER WILSON: Right. We've got to get  
20 the ball rolling to get it going.

21           And I think it's -- don't anyone take  
22 offense, but I think it's a shame that the Sons  
23 has a license plate and we don't. So this was  
24 trying to get something rolling for The American  
25 Legion.

1           So do we have a motion to move on with this  
2 resolution?

3           FROM THE FLOOR: We already did.

4           COMMANDER WILSON: Oh, I'm sorry. I forgot  
5 what we did. We were just discussing, I'm sorry.  
6 I lost track there for a second.

7           So all those in favor signify by saying aye.

8           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Aye.

9           COMMANDER WILSON: Those opposed, same sign.

10          FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

11          COMMANDER WILSON: Motion carried.

12          COORDINATOR PALIDER: That's all I've got.

13          COMMANDER WILSON: Scott, thank you.

14          All right, we're moving on through the  
15 agenda. We have unfinished business. Unfinished  
16 business.

17          Yes.

18          13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Commander,  
19 Wright, 13th District.

20          The last time we met, the last DEC meeting, I  
21 brought forth that we had a Squadron in the 13th  
22 District that applied for membership. I sent down  
23 a check but nothing has happened. I'd like to  
24 readdress that. The check was cashed. I believe  
25 we sent down a check for \$70 to start this

1 Squadron. So I'm quite sure you can't answer it  
2 right now, but would you relook into it, please?

3 ADJUTANT HALL: Which Squadron?

4 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Squadron No. 2.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, we'll check into  
6 that.

7 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: Thank you, ma'am.

8 COMMANDER WILSON: You're welcome.

9 Any other unfinished business?

10 14TH DISTRICT 1VC LIFE: John Life, 1st Vice  
11 Commander, 14th District.

12 The last time we had a video conference was  
13 about Past Department Commander Dennis Clausing.  
14 We said we would hold any conversation with that  
15 to this meeting, to discuss what we should do.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, I'll address that.  
17 Thank you.

18 At this time, their Post, the Post that he  
19 belonged to, is dealing with that. They have sent  
20 a letter to Dennis, through his attorney. So  
21 we're letting the Post get that resolution  
22 together first, before we discuss it any further.

23 Okay, any new business?

24 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Any new business?

1 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: (No response).

2 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay, if not, we're moving  
3 on.

4 Okay, Ms. Christie.

5 She will report on Mid-Winter, the Department  
6 Convention.

7 COORDINATOR WHITE: All right. Good  
8 afternoon.

9 FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Good afternoon.

10 COORDINATOR WHITE: Sitting in everybody's  
11 chairs when you got in today, you guys should have  
12 received a couple pieces of paper.

13 The ones in the back, if you do not have one,  
14 there are some on the table.

15 The very first one is the Mid-Winter  
16 reservations and the tentative schedule. It is  
17 tentative. If something changes, it is tentative.

18 So, to touch on Mid-Winter real quick, to  
19 make hotel reservations, call the number on the  
20 hotel, or for the hotel, press No. 2, and  
21 reference code "AAL". You need to have your  
22 reservations for the hotel by January 13th.

23 We're also asking you again to register for  
24 the conference. You can do that on our website.  
25 And it's on the front page.

1           Once you register, it just makes registration  
2 go by so much faster the day of the conference.  
3 Once you register, you will receive an e-mail  
4 notification saying we've got your registration,  
5 we'll see you there.

6           So if you do not get an e-mail from us,  
7 either myself or John, possibly,  
8 TheLegion@OhioLegion e-mail, then contact us and  
9 let us know.

10           We are having a blood drive again on Friday,  
11 from 2:30 to 7:30. If you would like to donate,  
12 you can go to RedCrossBlood.org and use donor code  
13 "Legion", or contact me and let me know and I'll  
14 get you signed up.

15           BALC, Buckeye American Legion College, will  
16 be having classes. They are doing classes on Post  
17 compliance, finance, programs, and leadership.  
18 Our lovely table officers will also be doing a  
19 Commander, 1st Vice, 2nd Vice and Adjunct  
20 training. So check out on the schedule when those  
21 are. Be sure to catch a couple of those.

22           Saturday, at noon, we have a slight change.  
23 Instead of having a Past Department Commanders  
24 Spouses Brunch, we are doing a DEC spouses brunch.  
25 So it will be for the officers, the Commander and

1 the 1st Vice, District Commanders, their spouses,  
2 as a thank you to your spouses for supporting you  
3 all year. If you have any follow-up or any other  
4 questions about that, let us know. You should  
5 have received an invitation in the mail from  
6 Sherry. If you have not, contact either --

7 COMMANDER WILSON: Shortly.

8 COORDINATOR WHITE: Yes. It's in the mail.

9 On Saturday night, we are doing an awards  
10 banquet. And it's just specifically of-the-year  
11 awards. Membership awards will be given on  
12 Sunday, at the general session. So at the awards  
13 banquet, we will be honoring the Law Officer of  
14 the Year, Firefighter of the Year, Child Welfare  
15 Worker of the Year, Educator of the Year. We also  
16 have a special Department Commander's Appreciation  
17 Award that we will just be doing this year, unless  
18 it's awesome and then we will continue on for  
19 years to come.

20 The deadline to make your dinner reservations  
21 is January 12th, and it's \$40 a person.

22 There should have been, on your seat also, a

24 Yes.

25 8TH DISTRICT CMDR SMATHERS: Harold Smathers,



1 8th District Commander.

2 Last year at this thing, we all, we had  
3 several members from the Post go up. Well, one  
4 ended up sitting clear over here (indicating), one  
5 ended up sitting clear over here (indicating).  
6 Should we order all of our tickets for the dinner  
7 at one time?

8 COORDINATOR WHITE: No need. There will be  
9 no assigned seating. There will be tables set  
10 specifically for VIPs, the ones that are being  
11 honored. And besides that, you guys can sit  
12 wherever you want to.

13 8TH DISTRICT CMDR SMATHERS: Okay.

14 COORDINATOR WHITE: It's so much easier.

15 Also, you can register with us on line or you  
16 will get this hard copy, like I said. Once we  
17 receive it, you will get an e-mail saying we have  
18 received your banquet reservation, we will see you  
19 there.

20 If for some reason you send this in, either  
21 via e-mail or hard copy, and you do not get an  
22 e-mail from us saying that we received it, call  
23 me. We don't want any issues from last year.  
24 We're trying to fix it a little bit.

25 And as I mentioned before, at the general

1 session there will be the membership awards,  
2 recruiter cards, and Charities drawing. We will  
3 do that on Sunday. Sunday will be the membership  
4 day.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: And our guest speaker.

6 COORDINATOR WHITE: And our guest speaker,  
7 yes. We have Jake from Save A Warrior.

8 Save A Warrior is the Commander's project.  
9 So he will be the keynote speaker on Sunday.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Anything else?

11 COORDINATOR WHITE: Oh, and the Four  
12 Chaplains Service. We will have a Four Chaplains  
13 service on Sunday. The Department Chaplain has  
14 been working really hard to make this a different  
15 kind of Four Chaplains service.

16 COMMANDER WILSON: We're hoping, for Sunday,  
17 that we have a larger turnout for the Four  
18 Chaplains. Last year we had approximately 20  
19 people in the Four Chaplains service. So we're  
20 hoping that you will consider attending and  
21 bringing the people that are with you to the  
22 service.

23 13TH DISTRICT CMDR WRIGHT: I have a  
24 question. What awards are being given out?

25 COMMANDER WILSON: Of the year, Educator of

1 the Year --

2 COORDINATOR WHITE: Educator of the Year,  
3 Child Welfare Worker of the Year, Law Officer of  
4 the Year, Firefighter of the Year.

5 And then we're doing a special Department  
6 Commander's Appreciation Award. That one will  
7 be -- we all kind of had a discussion here at  
8 Department.

9 Our Fire Inspector for Berlin Township, he's  
10 the one who actually was one of the first  
11 responders here after the building caught on fire  
12 a couple years ago. He's actually getting ready

14 So we had a conversation about it. And we  
15 never actually recognized him after that. He was  
16 a big reason why the fire stayed in the back and

22 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay. Anything else of  
23 Christie?

24 Yes, Joyce.

25 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Joyce Hannum, 9th

1 District.

2 Just a quick question: So are the  
3 of-the-year awards always going to be at  
4 Mid-Winter from now on, or is this just a special,  
5 one-time thing?

6 COORDINATOR WHITE: To be determined. We  
7 haven't discussed that.

8 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Well, when it's  
9 determined, can you let us all know?

10 COMMANDER WILSON: Yes.

11 9TH DISTRICT 1VC HANNUM: Because if you look  
12 at these award forms, it says the deadline is  
13 April 1st. Then we get the form from Department  
14 that says the deadline is December 6th, to have  
15 them turned in. Well I turn them in on the 4th  
16 and they're not any good until next year now.

17 So the information is not getting out there.  
18 And I'm sure there's other people who would like  
19 to do the awards and you keep changing the  
20 deadlines. And if you keep this up, and if you  
21 keep changing them --

22 I mean, I prefer to have these done at  
23 convention, like we've always done, rather than  
24 have these at Mid-Winter and throw everybody off  
25 their game.

1           COMMANDER WILSON:  Okay, thank you.

2           Anything else?  Anyone else have anything for  
3  Christie?

4           ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK:  Yeah.  Steve  
5  Masowick, Alternate NEC.

6           That hat is very stylish.

7           COMMANDER WILSON:  Okay.

8           All right, National Commander's visit, Eric  
9  Hall.

10          ADJUTANT HALL:  Okay, this is going to be the  
11  last time that I'll be speaking here for today.  
12  So thank you, guys.

13          So the National Commander visit is going to  
14  be on April (sic) 4th through the 6th.  Commander  
15  Wilson, 1st Vice Brad Teis and myself went over  
16  pretty much a tentative agenda.  We are still  
17  waiting from National on their portion.

18          Yes.

19          12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON:  Poulton,  
20  Commander, 12th District.

21          Is that April or March?

22          ADJUTANT HALL:  March.

23          FROM THE FLOOR:  You said April.

24          ADJUTANT HALL:  All right, we stand  
25  corrected.  Sorry about that.  It is March.  Thank

1 you for that correction.

2 So once we find out, the NECmen will know as  
3 well, as far as the agenda, once we know more  
4 information in reference to that. Other than  
5 that -- that's for the National Commander's visit.

6 Our next DEC is going to be on April 2nd. It  
7 will be here at Department Headquarters.

8 The National Membership Workshop is going to  
9 be on July 28th through the 30th. And that will  
10 be on-line. Again, that's going to be July 28th  
11 through the 30th.

12 And then our National Convention is going to  
13 be on August 26th through September 1st. And  
14 that's going to be in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

15 So, in reference to DEC, the Membership  
16 Workshop and the National Convention, all that  
17 stuff is going to be available on-line, once we  
18 get information more closer to that as well. And  
19 when we have our own convention as well, all that  
20 stuff will be on-line.

21 Anybody have questions for me?

22 LEGIONNAIRE HELLER: What's your favorite  
23 color?

24 ADJUTANT HALL: That is not a fair question.  
25 I'm not going to say it.

1 FROM THE FLOOR: It's pink.

2 ADJUTANT HALL: No, it's blue. That's why  
3 she wanted me to say that, for "Go Blue." No.

4 That's only once in every 11 years, so --

5 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Wilson, National Vice.  
6 Who is going to be picking the Commander up?

7 COMMANDER WILSON: We are. He's coming into  
8 Cincinnati.

9 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: Okay.

10 COMMANDER WILSON: We'll get with you. We'll  
11 get with you, sir.

12 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: All right.

13 COMMANDER WILSON: One more question?

14 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Commander,  
15 Poulton, 12th District. My last comment of the  
16 day.

17 COMMANDER WILSON: Can we hold you to that?

18 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: Yes, ma'am.

19 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

20 12TH DISTRICT CMDR POULTON: For the good of  
21 The Legion, one of our Posts, Post 800, is having  
22 a fundraiser at the Winking Lizard on Polaris  
23 Boulevard, on a great day coming up a week from  
24 now, December 11th, and it's the "Go Army, Beat  
25 Navy Day." So it's a fundraiser for them at the

1 Winking Lizard. It's \$20 a person. They're  
2 providing food and lots of opportunity to beat  
3 Navy.

4 Thanks.

5 COMMANDER WILSON: Okay.

6 FROM THE FLOOR: Go Navy.

7 COMMANDER WILSON: All right, let's see some  
8 control back here.

9 Yes, Sergeant-at-Arms Craig.

10 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS WHITHAM: I have a donation  
11 here from Suzette, her phone went off.

12 COMMANDER WILSON: And you might want to get  
13 Mr. Wilson's too, while you're up.

14 NTL VICE CMDR WILSON: You got change for a  
15 100?

16 COMMANDER WILSON: I'll just take the 100.

17 Come on, let's not take all day.

18 There we go. That's what we're talking  
19 about.

20 Yes, J.D., in the back.

21 ASST. ADJUTANT ROBINSON: Commander,  
22 Robinson, staff.

23 I received an e-mail from National this week  
24 regarding they are setting up a database, and  
25 making it available to all Legionnaires, of



1 institutions within each state that handle PTS.  
2 So if you have something in your area that deals  
3 with PTSD, please forward it to me so I can give  
4 it to National and get it put in our database.

5 Another thing is, we'll be conducting  
6 MyLegion training at Post 598 in Kettering next  
7 Saturday night at 6:00 PM.

8 ALTERNATE NEC MASOWICK: So 6:00 PM at  
9 Kettering?

10 COMMANDER WILSON: It's 6:00 PM at Kettering,  
11 yeah.

12 And we got a \$20 donation here from the  
13 Chaplin because he said his phone went off. So,  
14 God love you.

15 Also, I'd like to say that let's keep his  
16 wife, Becky, in our good thoughts and good  
17 prayers, as she is recovering. But she's in rehab  
18 right now. So they need all the prayers they can  
19 get.

20 In closing, first of all, seriously, I want  
21 to thank everyone for being here today. I would  
22 like to thank everyone for being cooperative in  
23 getting this meeting moving forward in a good way,  
24 getting to all the business that we needed to be  
25 taken care of.

1           But please remember to do your buddy checks.  
2           This is a hard time of the year for a lot of  
3           people. They don't have any other family, maybe  
4           just their Legion family. So please check in on  
5           them and see that they're doing good.

6           Please reach out to those non-renewed members  
7           and let's get them back into our American Legion  
8           Family. It's very, very important.

9           Don't be counting on 888s, because it's  
10          just -- that's ridiculous.

11          You know, we've already got these people in  
12          our membership rolls. We just need to reach out  
13          to them and get them to renew, or see what's going  
14          on with them.

15          If anybody needs anymore pins to sell, we  
16          have more pins here. So you can see Becky and she  
17          can give you some.

18          You saw what the 9th District did. They did  
19          a tremendous job selling the pins. And I think  
20          that they had a great tool. They took them out to  
21          their Post meetings, told people what they were  
22          for, and you can see how many pins they sold. So  
23          they did a great job.

24          From my family to yours, I wish everyone a  
25          very blessed holiday, a Merry Christmas, a Happy

1 Hanukkah, however you celebrate your time is  
2 great.

3 And if there's no other business to come  
4 before the meeting, then I will ask the Assistant  
5 Chaplin, Ron Distel, to lead us in prayer.

6 And have a safe trip home.

7 ASST CHAPLAIN DISTEL: I only wrote 37 pages  
8 of the prayer, so we'll be out of here real quick.

9 We all know that this is the season of  
10 giving. And God is always giving. He gives us  
11 direction, He gives us the cause, and He gives us  
12 a purpose, just like all of you here. You've  
13 shared the directions of our programs, you've  
14 shared a cause to go by, and a purpose to do so.  
15 If you're religious or not, God has taught you  
16 well.

17 Let us pray.

18 As we depart, Lord, we are reminded that  
19 there are differences between us. However, Lord,  
20 we remain faithful comrades.

21 We all, Lord, served our country proudly, and  
22 for many different reasons to do so. There was  
23 one reason that we all served this great land, and  
24 that was so that our families and friends could  
25 live without fear and in peace.

1           We pray to you, Lord, that, in the future,  
2 many will feel as we did, so our country can  
3 continue to be the land of the free.

4           It's to You we pray, Lord. Amen.

5           FROM THE ASSEMBLY: Amen.

6           COMMANDER WILSON: Recover.

7           We'll pay respects to the flag. One, two.

8           . . . SALUTE TO COLORS BY ASSEMBLY . . .

9           I now declare this DEC meeting adjourned.
