The members of the 136th General Assembly returned to work after a lengthy holiday break. January marks the beginning of the second half of the term. Any legislation they plan to pass into law must be passed by both chambers this year or they are dead.

There are no hearings we can report on because there were no hearings held. The House did not have any hearings scheduled and the Senate did not have any hearings scheduled until the last week of the month. Those were all cancelled due to the first big snowstorm that hit Columbus, and most of Ohio, this winter.

Meetings, discussions, and caucuses were held no doubt, to draw up the biennial capital appropriations bill. According to *A Guidebook for Ohio Legislators*, capital appropriations are slightly different from operating appropriations. Among the most obvious difference is that appropriations are made for the entire biennium, rather than each fiscal year of the biennium.

It also states the process of enacting a biennial capital appropriations bill is simpler and shorter than the one for enacting the operating appropriations bills. It also occurs within the context of another activity – the preparation of the state's six-year Capital Improvements Plan. This plan is updated biennially by OBM on the basis of recommendations it receives from affected state agencies. The process usually begins in the late summer of each odd-numbered year. At that time, OBM distributes guidelines to the agencies for the preparation of both the Capital Budget and the six-year Capital Improvements Plan. As with the operating appropriations bills, OBM reviews the agencies' submissions and sends its preliminary recommendations to the Governor. When final decisions have been made, the Governor's recommendations are drafted as a bill by LSC staff.

Our legislators will be busy with the Capital Appropriations bill – first by the House and then the Senate for a few months. But will at the same time be pushing to get new bills introduced and current bills passed. Expect to see more action during the second half than you did during the first half.

### Presidents' Day

President's Day, also known as Washington's Birthday, is on the third Monday of February each year and is a federal holiday in the United States. The day not only honors George Washington (born February 22), the first President of the United States, and Abraham Lincoln (born February 12) whose birthdays are both in February, but honors all the presidents who have served in the United States.

The majority of our nation's presidents hold the distinction of once being called a Veteran before they ever held the title of Commander-in-Chief. Thirty-one of the 45 U.S. presidents have served in the U.S. armed forces, and 12 of them were generals.

*A look at what the bills say... **In a Nut Shell***  
Summaries from the OFFICE OF RESEARCH AND DRAFTING

For the third time, Senator **Thomas F. Patton** (SD-24) introduced a bill that would authorize total property tax exemption for totally disabled veterans. He originally introduced this bill while serving in the House. House Bill 694 during the 134th General Assembly and House Bill 90 in the 135th.

He introduced Senate Bill 92 at the start of the 136th General Assembly and it was referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee where it had its first hearing. It was then put on a shelf where it has remained for nearly a year.

The bill will replace the partial homestead exemption for disabled veterans with an enhanced homestead exemption for all disabled veterans equal to all taxes imposed on the homestead. The state will reimburse local taxing units for the resulting reduction in taxes in the same manner as other homestead exemptions.

#### **Senate Bill 92-**

##### **The Detailed Analysis**

*As Introduced*

#### **Homestead exemption: disabled veterans**

Continuing law provides a property tax credit for the residence, or "homestead," of certain qualifying individuals. The standard "homestead exemption" equals the taxes that would be charged on up to \$28,000, for tax year 2025, of the true value of a home owned by a homeowner who is 65 years of age or older, permanently and totally disabled, or at least 59 years old and the surviving spouse of an individual who previously received the exemption. ("True value" is the appraised fair market value.) The credit essentially exempts \$28,000 of the value of a homestead from taxation. The amount of the tax savings for a qualifying homestead depends on the local tax rate: the higher the tax rate, the greater the tax reduction. This standard exemption is means-tested, so only homeowners with household income below a certain threshold (\$40,000 for tax year 2025) may qualify for the exemption.

Under current law, a special "enhanced" exemption of \$56,000, for tax year 2025, is available for homes of honorably discharged military veterans

with a total disability and surviving spouses of emergency responders who died in the line of duty. The bill expands the enhanced exemption for disabled veterans by increasing the exemption to equal the full value of the veteran's homestead. In essence, the enhanced exemption completely exempts a disabled veteran's home from taxes.

As under the current homestead exemption for disabled veterans, the bill's enhanced exemption extends to the surviving spouse of a disabled veteran, until the spouse dies or remarries. Also like the current disabled veteran exemption, the bill's enhanced exemption does not require the disabled veteran to make below a certain income.

Similar to other homestead exemptions, the bill's enhanced disabled veteran exemption applies to manufactured and mobile homes regardless of whether they are taxed as real property or subject to the manufactured home tax. Also similar to other homestead exemptions, the enhanced exemption does not exempt the disabled veteran's homestead from special assessments.

#### **Application requirements**

As with all current homestead exemptions, a disabled veteran must apply to the county auditor to qualify for the exemption. The veteran must include with this initial application a copy of the veteran's discharge record showing the veteran received a total disability rating. After this initial application, no further application is needed to maintain the exemption, but the auditor must be notified if the homestead no longer qualifies for the bill's enhanced veteran exemption. (This notification is required under continuing law to report ineligibility for all current homestead exemptions.)

# WHAT OTHER STATES ARE DOING

There are many bills that will help veterans, military, or families of veteran or service member in just about, if not all the fifty states. Some of them are similar to bills we have in the Ohio General Assembly and some of them are unique to the states they are in. There are the 'Hey, why didn't I think of that' variety and some that might make you shake your head in bewilderment.

OLR takes a look at some of the Vet/Military bills in other states. They are bills introduced within the past year or so. They may still be in committees, have passed out of committee, or have been signed into law. You can look at the progress of each by going to the websites of each of the state's legislature. Maybe some of them will spark some interest and begin to grow in Ohio.

In this issue of OL Report are a few such bills from California, Alabama, and our western neighbor, Indiana.



## IN THE INDIANA GENERAL ASSEMBLY

**SB 166:** This bill changes references relating to military discharges to require discharges under honorable conditions. (Current law provides that a veteran is eligible for benefits except under certain conditions designated by the Indiana Department of Veterans' Affairs (IDVA).) The bill excludes references used to determine eligibility for grants from the Military Family Relief Fund.

**HB 1109:** Establishes the Hoosier homeless veteran initiative for the purpose of providing a means for homeless veterans to have access to temporary shelter during the veteran's rehabilitation. Provides that the initiative shall be coordinated and administered by the Indiana department of veterans' affairs (department) in consultation with the Indiana department of health. Requires each homeless shelter with at least 25 beds to reserve at least one bed out of every 25 beds for a homeless veteran. Provides that a homeless shelter or other entity may apply to the department to become a participating shelter. Provides that a participating shelter shall receive.

**HB 1216:** Requires the Indiana department of veterans' affairs to establish and administer a hyperbaric oxygen treatment program (program) to make grants to certain providers to provide diagnostic testing and hyperbaric oxygen treatment to qualified service members. Establishes program requirements. Requires the Indiana department of health to: (1) issue a request for proposals to offer treatment under the program; and (2) adopt rules to implement these provisions, including rules concerning program eligibility, treatment plan requirements, criteria for approving payments for treatment, and confidentiality. Provides that funding for the program is paid from the military family relief fund. Makes conforming amendments related to the sunset of the hyperbaric oxygen treatment pilot program.



## IN THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE

**SB 56:** According to the author, this bill seeks to remove the counterproductive inclusion of disability compensation from the calculation of the Low Income Exclusion of the Disabled Veterans' Property Tax Exemption, as veterans must receive that compensation to qualify for the tax exemption in the first place. Families surviving on only social security and disability pay should qualify for the low income exclusion.

**AJR 15:** This resolution urges the United States Congress to pass the Major Richard Star Act to ensure veterans with disabilities receive their full United States Department of Defense retirement pay and United States Department of Veterans Affairs disability compensation without offset.

**SB 694:** This bill provides additional protections for veterans in California in connection with fees charged for assistance applying for veterans' benefits and the privacy of their information. This bill requires persons to be federally accredited before preparing, presenting, or prosecuting a veteran's claim for benefits under federal law.

**States**, from Page Three**IN THE ALABAMA STATE LEGISLATURE**

**HB 30:** Under existing law, households whose sole source of income is Social Security benefits are exempt from paying solid waste collection fees. This bill would exempt households whose sole source of income is veterans' benefits from paying these fees.

**HB 102:** Under existing law, certain distinctive license plates may be retained by the surviving spouse of the original plate recipient. This bill would authorize the surviving spouse of a disabled veteran who has been issued a disabled veteran license plate to retain the plate upon the veteran's death.

**HB 233:** Under existing law, certain members of the National Guard may receive tuition reimbursement through the National Guard Educational Assistance Program when seeking a college degree or certain other certifications. This bill would authorize tuition assistance for workforce development programs, in addition to tuition assistance, through the National Guard Educational Assistance Program. This bill would authorize the use of tuition assistance for additional educational expenses, such as on-campus living expenses and meal plans.

Under existing law, guard members who achieve a certain grade point average requirement are authorized to receive academic excellence benefits in addition to educational reimbursement through the program. This bill would remove any reference to academic excellence benefits and revises the requirements to qualify for tuition assistance. This bill would repeal a section that provides certain qualifications for the National Guard Educational Assistance Program.

**SB 191:** This bill would create the Home Schooling Opportunities for Military Education (HOME) Act. This bill would apply to parents who are active duty members of the Armed Forces of the United States or members of the National Guard or reserve components of the Armed Forces of the United States, and are on active duty orders that require a temporary or permanent change of station. This bill would require those military parents to inform their local superintendent of education of any intention to home school their dependent children and to comply with state law relating to home schooling. This bill would

allow dependents of those military parents who are receiving home school instruction to use public school facilities and equipment on the same basis as regularly enrolled students under certain circumstances. This bill would require local school systems to provide home school students with disabilities who are dependents of those military parents and are residing within the system access to special education services. This bill would also require local school systems to allow participation in interscholastic activities by home school students and other dependents of those military parents residing within the system.

**SB 216:** Under existing law, members of the National Guard may be presented awards for certain accomplishments and service by order of the Governor. This bill would revise the requirements for Alabama National Guard members to receive these awards. This bill would create new awards for Alabama National Guard Members for certain accomplishments and service. This bill would also prescribe that certain awards may be presented by the Governor and that certain awards may be presented by the Adjutant General.

As with all current homestead exemptions, local taxing units are reimbursed by the state for the reduction in property tax revenue that results from the bill's enhanced disabled veterans homestead exemption. The reimbursement is paid from the GRF semiannually or annually.

**Application date**

The enhanced homestead exemption for disabled veterans begins to apply for tax year 2025 or, in the case of homes that are subject to the manufactured home tax, tax year 2026. The difference in application is accounted for by the fact that manufactured home tax is payable on a current-year basis, whereas property tax is payable in arrears.
