It was spring break time for our legislators but not too many ventured down to sunny Florida like the college kids do. Or at least they aren't talking about it.

Most of Ohio's legislators spend many hours going door to door campaigning, or attending banquets, or fundraising. The primary election in May and the General election in November will keep them busy for a while.

The second week in May will see them all in the statehouse again working hard to get as much done as possible before the summer break begins. A short month and a half is all they have.

The House did not have any hearings, but the Veterans and Military Development Committee did travel to Allen County and met with the folks at several locations. On their afternoon agenda were TASK Force Lima, Regional Growth Partnership, Ohio National Guard, Lima Chamber of Commerce, Ohio Means Jobs, - Allen County, and a Federal Update.

The senators had four hearings in three committees. The senators also introduced four bills and three resolutions.

The representatives introduced two bills and two resolutions.

Hearings Held for Veteran/Military Legislation

April 13-17

On Tuesday morning the Senate Workforce Development Committee heard sponsor testimony from Representatives **Ty D. Mathews** (HD-83) and **Nick Santucci** (HD-64). Their bill was introduced in February last year to establish the Ohio Defense and Space Commission and list their responsibilities and duties. The new commission could make grants to support economic development related to the defense industry, The bill would establish the Ohio Defense Fund and specifies allocation requirements for money in the fund, and require that any revenue from interest earned on bonds of the State of Israel, in the state treasury, be deposited into the Ohio Defense Fund. The bill had five hearings in the House Veterans and Military Development Committee before being voted on by the House with a vote of 82 to 10.

The Senate Select Committee on Gaming held a meeting the same morning for sponsor testimony on House Bill 476.

Representatives **Meredith Craig** (HD-77) and **David Thomas** (HD-65) introduced the bill last September and it passed on the House Floor in November 85-0. The purpose of the bill is to authorize online raffles and make related changes to the Charitable Gaming Law.

The next day the Senate Armed Services, Veterans Affairs and Public Safety Committee met in the afternoon to hear testimony on two bills. They were HB 297 and SB 218. There were no witnesses for SB 218, there for its fifth hearing, After a motion to favorably pass it, a vote was taken and it passed 6 to 0. The bill was introduced in June by Senator **Kristina D. Roegner** (SD-27) to exempt family child care providers certified by the U.S. armed forces from the law governing the regulation of child care providers, including the requirement that certain family child care homes be licensed by the Department of Children and Youth.

Amended House Bill 297 was scheduled for its third hearing but there was no testimony to be heard or read by the members. The bill was introduced by Representatives **Kevin Ritter** (HD-94) and **Johnathan**

Newman (HD-80) one year ago and passed in the House in November 89-0. The bill would increase the amount a county may provide to military and veterans organizations and civic organizations for Memorial Day expenses.

In The Month of May

Members of the General Assembly will be back to work in their offices and in the statehouse on the second week of May. During the next weeks they will be working they will be pushing hard to introduce new bills, have their bills scheduled for hearings, and get their bills past and to the governor.

They have seven weeks to get as much as they can done before they begin their summer break on July One. They know that they don't return until after the November election and then they only have a few weeks until the end of the 136th General Assembly which means that all bills not passed will die. Bottom line –they have about two and a half months and then it's over.

May of course has the Ohio Primary Election, that will tell us who will be on the November ballot, It is also a big military month with lots of wonderful holidays before the end of the month and Memorial Day. They should all be more interesting and eventful because of the 250 Anniversary Celebration going on.

*A look at what the bills say... **In a Nutshell***

Summaries from the OFFICE OF RESEARCH AND DRAFTING

Two bills have been introduced in the House that would benefit the many Veteran Service Organizations in Ohio. One will help them with Memorial Day expenses and the other will allow them to help veterans with basic life needs.

House Bill 297 was introduced a year ago to double the expense money provided by County Commissions for VSOs. It has not been increased since the 124th General Assembly did so more than 24 years ago.

HB 297 was passed by the House in November with an 89 to 0 vote. Since then, it has had three hearings in the Senate Armed Services, Veterans Affairs and Public Safety Committee.

House Bill 721 was introduced in February and will establish a state grant program. The bill was referred to the House Veterans and Military Development Committee in March but has not had any hearings at this time.

House Bill 297-

The Detailed Analysis

As Passed by the House

Memorial Day expenses

Veterans' organizations

The bill increases, from \$500 to \$1,000 the amount that a county may provide to certain organizations to defray Memorial Day expenses. Under continuing law, the board of county commissioners must annually appropriate, and advance upon application made by certain organizations, a sum of money to defray the expenses of Memorial Day. Eligible organizations include each garrison or naval branch of the Army and Navy Union, U.S.A. and each chartered post, garrison, or naval branch of any organization of veterans recognized and chartered by the Congress, in the county.

The organization applying for an advance of funds must submit to the board of county commissioners, with its application, a statement of expenses incurred up to the time the application for an advance is submitted. The organization receiving money from this

appropriation must file a sworn statement accounting for the complete expenditure of the funds. Any unexpended funds must be returned to the county.

Civic organizations

The bill increases from \$100 to \$200 the amount a county may appropriate to a civic organization for Memorial Day expenses. Under continuing law, if any veterans' organization posts have become extinct or unable to attend to Memorial Day services, the county appropriation must be made to a post or unit of the sons of union veterans of the civil war, woman's relief corps, or daughters of veterans, or to any civic or patriotic organization willing and able to undertake and perform the work of commemoration and observance of Memorial Day. Under current law, if the appropriation by the county is made to a civic organization, it must not exceed \$100.

Veterans Organization Grant Program

The bill establishes the Veterans Organization Grant Program within the Department of Development. Under the program, the Director of Development, upon request from an organization eligible to receive money, may annually provide a \$1,000 grant to the organization for the purpose of financing celebrations honoring veterans or for providing

Key Military Holidays and Observances in May

- ⇒ Silver Star Service Banner Day (May 1): Honors wounded, ill, and injured veterans.
- ⇒ Loyalty Day (May 1): Recognizes loyalty to the U.S. and the heritage of American freedom.
- ⇒ VE Day (Victory in Europe) (May 8): Marks the end of WWII in Europe.
- ⇒ Military Spouse Appreciation Day (Friday before Mother's Day): Recognizes the sacrifices of military spouses.
- ⇒ Children of Fallen Patriots Day (May 13): Honors the children of military members who died in service.
- ⇒ Armed Forces Day (Third Saturday in May): Pays tribute to men and women currently serving in all branches of the U.S. Armed Forces.
- ⇒ Memorial Day (Last Monday in May): A federal holiday honoring those who died while serving in the military.
- ⇒ Month of the Military Caregiver: Observes the dedication of caregivers to service members.

SOUND OFF

There are 61 house bills and 26 senate bills that have been introduced through April 30 and more will be added before the end of the year. That is more than 100 bills that directly affect Ohio's veterans, military personnel, or their families.

These bills attempt to address a number of issues... naming streets after fallen veterans, reducing veteran's property tax, allowing surviving spouses to purchase Purple Heart license plates, giving business owners tax credits for hiring veterans, improving the Ohio National Guard Scholarship Program, creating a Veterans Organization Grant Program, and giving veterans a larger discount at Ohio State Parks, to name a few.

With the end of the 136th General Assembly just months away, what do you think are the issues that our elected officials should get passed into law before December 31 when they will die if not passed.

veterans with basic necessities, including food. Under the bill, an eligible organization is: ...each garrison or naval branch of the Army and Navy Union, U.S.A. and to each chartered post, garrison, or naval branch of any organization of veterans recognized and chartered by the congress.

The bill requires the Director of Development to establish the procedures by which eligible organizations may apply for a grant, and must adopt rules, under the Administrative Procedure Act, for the administration of the program. The rules must require that each organization that receives a grant annually file a sworn statement with the Director accounting for the complete expenditure of the funds. The annual sworn statement must be provided until the funds from the grant have been exhausted.

Appropriation

The bill appropriates, to the Department of Development, \$225,000 for FY 2026 and \$225,000 for FY 2027, to be used to issue grants to qualifying veterans organizations.

LEGISLATION INTRODUCED IN APRIL

SB 401 was introduced on April 1 by Senator **William P. DeMora** (SD-25).

The Bill would enact section 5.63 of the Revised Code to designate February 8th as "General William Tecumseh Sherman Day."

It was referred to the Senate Armed Services, Veterans Affairs and Public Safety.

SB 402 was introduced on April 1 by Senator **William P. DeMora** (SD-25).

The Bill would enact section 5.63 of the Revised Code to designate March 6 as "General Philip Sheridan Day."

It was referred to the Senate Armed Services, Veterans Affairs and Public Safety.

SB 416 was introduced on April 1 by Senator **Thomas F. Patton** (SD-24).

The bill would amend sections 3.17 and 3313.11 and to enact section 3313.111 of the Revised Code regarding school district board of education members deployed on active duty in the United States Armed Forces or Ohio National Guard.

It was referred to the Senate Armed Services, Veterans Affairs and Public Safety.

SB 417 was introduced on April 1 by Senator Theresa Gavarone (SD-2).

The Bill would amend sections 123.01, 123.17, and 5913.09 and to enact section 123.012 of the Revised Code to authorize the state to enter into an enhanced lease agreement, with a private entity, to utilize unproductive and unused state real property, to empower a board of trustees of a state university and the Adjutant General to lease land, and to name this act the Advancing Strategic State and Military Asset Efficiency and Transformation (ASSET) Act.

It was referred to the Senate Finance Committee.

HR 378 was introduced on April 7 by Representative **Kevin D. Miller** (HD-69).

The resolution was memory of Captain Seth R. Koval.

It was adopted by the House the same day.

SR 324 was introduced on April 9 by Senators **Casey Weinstein** (SD-28) and **Terry Johnson** (SD-14).

The resolution was to recognize April 2026 as the Month of the Military Child in Ohio.

It was adopted by the Senate the same day.

HR 390 was introduced on April 13 by Representative **Brian Lampton** (HD-70).

The resolution praised the Beavercreek High School Air Force Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps on its remarkable success and salute its members as exemplary citizens.

It was adopted by the House the same day.

SR 332 was introduced on April 14 by Senator **Kyle Koehler** (SD-10).

The resolution was honoring the Beavercreek High School Air Force JROTC on winning two 2026 U.S. Air Force Open Drill Nationals championships.

It was adopted by the Senate the same day.

HB 823 was introduced on April 15 by Representatives **David Thomas** (HD-65) and **Ty D. Mathews** (HD-83).

The bill would amend sections 3.07, 3.17, 305.03, 503.241, and 3313.11 and to enact section 3.171 of the Revised Code to allow an elected official who is deployed on active military duty to retain the official's position and to attend meetings virtually.

The bill has not been referred to a committee yet.

HB 824 was introduced on April 15 by Representative **Sean P. Brennan** (HD-14).

A bill is a document by which a member of the General Assembly proposes to enact a new law or amend or repeal an existing law. The term “bill” is used to refer to the document from the time it is drafted and delivered to the members until it is considered and approved by both the House and the Senate. After passing both houses, a bill becomes an “act” and must be presented to the Governor for acceptance or rejection. If accepted, or if the Governor does not take any action for ten days, it becomes a “law.”

The details of every bill can be found on the Ohio Legislature website. You can also check the status of bills as they travel through committees and sessions, find out how the voting went, and read the testimony of every witness.

To find a bill type the bill number (example: SB 712 or HB 943) into the search bar.
