

The Power of Membership

The American Legion is the largest veteran's service organization in the world. The American Legion has been responsible for, or been involved with a multitude of actions that have improved the lives of veterans, their families, children, and communities.

The American Legion exists through membership. Membership brings with it responsibilities. There is the responsibility to support the organization's beliefs. There is a responsibility to learn about the history of the organization. There is a responsibility to promote the organization.

Membership gives each of us a voice. We have the right to speak in meetings. We have the right to select our officers. We also have the right to hold positions in our posts.

In many posts however, members don't want to accept positions of leadership. Organizations cannot exist without leadership. In many cases, we have the same members holding office over and over again. We need members to accept the responsibilities of leadership. Without new leaders, the organization becomes stagnant. In many cases,

leaders start to take ownership, and lose objectivity.

I have seen many cases where members don't use the power of membership to ban together to make changes in their posts. They try to attack the problem individually. They are ineffective and get frustrated. Their frustration leads to lack of, or no, participation in post activities. This should not be happening. No member should allow anyone to keep them from being an active member in their post.

I have come to realize that many members do not understand, or utilize their power, and

Please look at your membership dues like a magazine subscription, when you buy a magazine subscription you pay up front, well the same is true with your dues in The American Legion they are due up front the same as a magazine subscription and any other organization.

Some of you have not paid your 2017 membership dues, we want you to know that we appreciate every member that we have and want to keep you in our ranks. Each of you served our Country when called upon and earned your right to be a member of the largest War Time Veterans Organization. Your members should be receiving their second Dues Notice in the mail now. If they paid their dues and they still get another notice, it will due to the card making National's cutoff date for whatever reason. This is another reason to take care of your Post membership directly with National on My Legion.org.

Part of our membership benefits is the various Discounts that we get at various places for various necessities. There is one benefit that goes with our membership that can be very beneficial to all of us or I should say to our beneficiaries and that is the Legionnaires Insurance Trust Legion Care insurance. Each of us are entitled to it through our membership and

it costs us nothing, that means FREE. However, we must sign up for it to have it if needed. The benefit is \$1000.00 for non-Legion business accidents resulting in death or \$5000.00 when traveling to and from Legion meetings or activities. We have some of the Insurance brochures with applications in the Department Supply Room or you can sign up online at https://www.thelit.com/no-cost-legioncare. LIT or Legionnaire Insurance Trust has other insurance products that are available at a cost such as Cancer Insurance, Long Term Care insurance, Emergency Assistance Insurance if needed. I am not suggesting that anyone purchase any additional products but you our membership needs to know what is available. Purchasing additional products from LIT is beneficial to the Department of Ohio, so that you should know that if you purchase additional products you are helping the Department of Ohio financially.

Did you know you can now membership online? process It's true! You can now process membership online through MyLegion.org. If you don't already have access, I would encourage you to submit your Authorization Form to National Headquarters today.

Mylegion.org is a great opportunity for every Post to work smarter not harder while leveraging technology in being more efficient. This will give you more time to support and focus on the programs most important to you within the communities you serve.

Here are just a few things you can do with membership at MyLegion. org:

- Renewals existing members
- Add new members and import transfer members from other Posts. NOTE: Posts can only import transfers whose dues have been paid
- Pay fees electronically and eliminate the need for Post Officers to send the National/

Department portion of the (3part) Membership Cards and paper checks to Department Headquarters

o Electronic check (E-Check) is the only payment method available when using this feature. The account must be a valid business checking or savings account E-Checks take up to 5 business days to be processed, and Posts will be charged a returned check fee for all declined E-Checks.

I know some Legionnaires have voiced concerns and given feedback to the Department concerning the security of their checking account information. While we certainly understand the concerns, the American Legion has taken all the necessary steps to safeguard and encrypt your account information. With you still may want to consider opening an account for the sole purpose of processing memberships. This will add an additional level of security, and make for easier bookkeeping.

Moving forward, the only cards

Department needs to receive are those that have monies with them. That means that if the Membership Chairman or Adjutant processes renewals, new memberships or transfers online, you do not have to send the cards to Department, if one of your members renews online, you do not have to send us their cards. However, you should keep these cards in a file for your own records. Our suggestion is to mark those cards as "Renewed

Online" and file them. You may also want to mark the cards that the Adjutant processes as EFT-Online (EFT - Electronic Fund Transfer) and file them by year.

If you are concerned about receiving your Post's portion of membership renewals done online, please know that Department Headquarters remits a payment to Posts at the end of every month.

We are hopeful that you will take advantage of the membership

resources available at MyLegion. org portal. We realize this may be a sizable adjustment of the process you are used to, so please know we are here to help you along the way. We are confident that you will quickly find the process to be user-friendly, time-saving and a great way to streamline your membership processes.

VETERANS AFFAIRS & REHABILITATION

VA&R Director Comments:

As the 2017-2018 programs year is upon us, let us be mindful of the Legionnaires around us who have contributed to our programs for maybe a century, a decade or two, or just a few years. It amazes me how fast the time goes by in The American Legion as we continue to place God and Country first in everything we do. Please keep in mind that the project of Commander Pleasant this year is VA&R.

We are approaching our 100th anniversary! Imagine what our predecessors would say, think, or do, if they were operating in our time and age. I am certain The American Legion looked much different in the early 20th Century compared to the early 21st Century. One constant comparison is our Preamble which encases our mission and principles along with our Four Pillars of Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation, Americanism, Children & Youth, and a strong National Security. In this issue, we will focus on Legislative, VA&R, VAVS, Gifts For Yanks, and Employment & Education, and National Security.

Please contact me personally if you have suggestions regarding anything communicated here. You may also find a copy of this newsletter on our Department website, www.ohiolegion.com. There are many changes still happening with technology at Department HQ and we look forward to sharing that with you as it unfolds. We thank you for your volunteer efforts and look forward to working with you more in the future!

VA&R/LEGISLATIVE:

This year has been active with policy relating to Veterans both in the 132nd Ohio General Assembly (OGA) and Congress. In the Spring, Governor Kasich and Ohio Department of Veteran Services sought to eliminate the

grant received by The American Legion Department of Ohio from the Ohio Operating Budget for 2018-2019 in the amount of \$349,189.00. Through the unity of all the VSO's we managed to get this back into the budget through the second half of this OGA. We will be challenged with this issue again in 2020-2021. During the next two years we will work together for a solution and present this to our legislators once elections for the office of Governor are complete in 2018.

The grant money is necessary for VA&R to support our (10) DSO's at each of our (7) locations throughout the state. We have received over 600 appeals within a calendar year and nearly 12,000 submissions from CVSO's. The mission of the DSO's is to assist veterans and support the 88 County Veteran Service Offices with filing claims and representing veterans to the Department of Veterans Affairs and Board of Veterans Appeals. How we do this may look different once the Appeals Modernization Act is implemented by VA Central Office.

The Appeals Modernization Act that was signed by President Trump in August at our National Convention has become a priority for the VA to roll out. You may hear of veterans receiving "notice to opt in" near February 2018. These notices will be sent to all veterans who currently have an appeal pending and are given an option to have claim reassessed at the VA Regional Office again, or continue to advance to the Board of Veterans Appeals. We urge you to CONTACT A DSO OR CVSO before making that choice! We are waiting for instructions on how to proceed and yet, there has been limited communication from the VA. Our VA&R Team at National in Wash D.C., will educate us more in February at DSO training during Washington Conference.

Issue 2: As you have seen, The American Legion Department of Ohio is opposed to Issue 2 because the passage of this harms thousands of veterans who receive care from the Department of Veterans Affairs. We ask you to VOTE NO ON ISSUE 2 but first educate yourself on the matter at www.noonissue2.org. There will be a Post mailing in October with facts and details that supports opposition of Issue 2.

If your post does not file the necessary documents on time, then your Non-Profit status may have expired. If so, please handle accordingly. While visiting the SOS website, be sure that the Post's name matches identically to the name listed in its constitution and by-laws. Also ensure that the "Registered Agent" for your post is current and correct so that you can receive all of your business information in a timely manner.

THE FALL OF ISSUE 2

On Tuesday November 7th, 2017, Ohio voters took a stand and rejected the Ohio Drug Price Relief Act known as Issue 2. Nearly 80% of Ohio voters opposed this issue, while only 20% of voters supported Issue 2. The overwhelming rejection rate makes Ohio's stand on the issue very clear-Issue 2 is not welcome in Ohio.

The creators of Issue 2 hope to pass a similar issue in South Dakota, following their failed campaign in Ohio.

"I would like to thank all of the legionnaires and voters that listened to our campaign and Voted "No" on Issue 2. As we all know, a win is a win."

Three Position Air Rifle Tournament

The American Legion Americanism Division annually presents its Junior Three Position Air Rifle Tournament. This world class competition provides American Legion Affiliated youth competitors an opportunity to test their marksmanship ability in competition with other junior competitors throughout the nation.

The competition began on November 1, 2017 with a Postal Match; a match in which competitor's fire on their home ranges using targets that have been marked for identification. The fired targets are then returned to the American Legion for scoring

and ranking for awards. Annually more than 1,300 individuals and 200 teams participate.

The tournament is divided into three rounds of exciting competition.

The First Round team tournament is a "paper" match and will be comprised of the top four athletes' individual tournament scores. A club with at least four individuals enters one team; at least eight individuals enters two teams; and so on.

The First Round and Second Round of the Individual Tournament are postal matches, whereas the Third Round is the Individual National Championship and a shoulder-to-shoulder competition.

The American Legion Individual Three Position Air Rifle National Championships is held in July at the USA Shooting range facility located at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

The winners in both the Precision and Sporter category will each receive a \$5,000.00 college scholarship provided in part by The American Legion and The Sons of the American Legion. The two winners are also honored as part of the Youth Champions Delegation during the American Legion National Convention.

Additionally, a \$1,000.00 college scholarship will be awarded to the second place finishers in both the Sporter and Precision categories. This scholarship is being generously provided by The American Legion Auxiliary.



Alva Forrest "Frosty" Hoffman was recently recognized and honored for 70 years of continuous service to American Legion Post 134. Frosty surrounded by daughter-In-law Donna Hoffman, wife Kathleen and son Mark is shown reading the certificate of Service and Loyalty to the merits of the American Legion. Frosty joined the Coast Guard in Columbus on Friday the 13th 1942. He went through six weeks of boot camp in New York and then shore patrol on Manhatten beach. Frosty remembers patrolling the beaches with nothing but a flashlight and a wooden stick. He was then transferred to Foley Beach, South Carolina where was assigned to a horse patrol unit patrolling the beaches looking for Germans that might be coming ashore from their submarines. A year later he volunteered to go to Fort Lauderdale and enter fire control schooling. He said most people thought that meant putting out fires but he was actually becoming proficient with twin 40 millimeter guns. Once he completed his schooling he was assigned to LST #887. They crossed the Big Water and participated in and supported the Battle of IWO JIMA. LST 887 was credited with the downing of a Japanese Val Bomber. Frosty's guns were the first to start firing at the incoming plane. Frosty attained the rank Fire Controlman 3rd Class Petty Officer before being discharged in 1946 at Detroit, Michigan.

News.






