Also Akron Mayor's office representative announced that November 1st is officially Arther Dinkins day per city/mayor's proclamation!



Each Post has many stories to be told, someone just has to take time to research and post it on the National website centennial.legion.org. This site has been revamped and is more user friendly. Each Post has unlimited space. let's make your Post part of The American Legion History of the First 100 Years and beyond.

Well it just so happened that we had another gem already working for us that has those very Jermaine Ferguson, interests. another Program Administrator is now stepping into that position with great enthusianism to learn what Suzette did for us. His responsiblities will be modified for awhile as he learns his new area of responsibility. Parris Hopson who also was a Program Administrator is now an Assistant to the Adjutant helping Becky with all of her responsiblities for Suzette

and myself. Parris can float and help where extra help is needed. Now with all of this said. I hope that you realize that Membership, Programs, Posts Activities, etc. is extremely short on help and you might not get an immediate answer to your question. We are looking for at least one more PA (Program Administrator). Be patient, treat them with respect and I assure you that they will treat you with equal respect.

1st Vice Roger Friend is the Department Membership Chairman this year and I am sure that Roger is going to have a lot to say in his article. However, Membership is everyone's responsibility and as Commander I have a few points that I want to make.

1. The 2019 Membership Awards Manual has up to \$40,000 in Awards monies to give away to Districts. Posts and MEMBERS. Take advantage of it and earn some money for your District, Post and Members, District Officers, you have a responsibility to make sure the Posts are aware of the potential this helps your District. The Membership needs to be aware of their potential to win some money by signing up new members or expired members. Each Post should have recruiter cards that must be filled out for each member that signs up a new member or expired member. These recuiter cards are to mailed into the Department for the drawing that will be held at the Mid-Winter Conference in Columbus in January. Each winner drawn will receive \$100 and there will be 15 winners. An Expired member is a member who has not paid their dues for 2018 or before.

2. The 2019 Membership Awards Manual should not be treated like an assembly manual that comes with something you need to put together (I don't need any manual I can figure it out) by the time that you figure out what's available in Awards Monies, it may be too late. Read it now and go for the money.

3. The Membership reports change daily, example: while at National for the Fall Meetings, the report came out that Ohio was one of 5 Departments that was ahead of a year ago, infact we were 611 cards ahead putting us in #2 in that ranking. I am not one for bragging, but when Ohio was in this position I had to "BRAG". Ohio is being noticed by National and other Departments, let's keep working Membership and keep Ohio moving.

Part of our membership benefits is the various discounts that we get at various places for various necessities. There is one benefit that goes with our membership that can be very beneficial to all of us or I should say to our beneficiaries, and that is the Legionnaires Insurance Trust Legion Care insurance. Each of us is entitled to it through our membership, and it costs us nothing, that means FREE. However, we must sign up for it to have it if needed. The benefit is \$1000 for non-Legion business accidents resulting in death or \$5000 when traveling to and from Legion meetings or activities. We have some of the Insurance brochures with applications in the Department Supply Room, or you can sign up online at https://www.thelit. com/no-cost-legioncare. Legionnaire Insurance Trust (LIT) has other insurance products that are available at a cost such as Cancer Insurance, Long Term Care insurance or Emergency Assistance Insurance if needed. I am not suggesting that anyone purchase any additional products but you,our members, need to know what is available. Purchasing additional products from LIT is beneficial to the Department of Ohio, so you should know that if you purchase additional products you are helping the Department of Ohio financially. I take this position very seriously and embrace each and every one of you as we share this journey together, as an AMERICAN LEGION FAM-ILY! Now, this means that we may not always agree, as a familv. However, as a family, we rise through our differences and come together for the common good of the family by doing what is good and right for The American Legion and what is good and right for the VETERAN! As a family, we put the needs of others first. If we can do just that, God will always find a way for our own needs to be met. This, I believe.

Every morning when I approach my office door there are 5 faces staring at me. First is Hugh K. Martin who served from 1919-1924, then John J. Saslavasky from 1925-1945, followed by Joseph S. Deutschle, Sr., 1946-1966, then John P. Hone from 1967-1990, and Roger Hight 1994-2015. I was very blessed to have been hired by Roger Hight and to be mentored by some of The American Legion's greatest. EVERYDAY is a mentoring experience in The American Legion. There isn't a day that goes by that I don't LEARN something from another Legionnaire! I hope that your experience is the same. One of my favorite passag-

es in the Bible is Proverbs 27:17 "You use steel to sharpen steel, and one friend sharpens another." My friends, we are at the pinnacle of sharpening our fellow veterans and Legionnaires with the rich history of this AMAZING organization.

HELLER'S HORIZONS

I encourage you to seek out your "WHY". Why do you do what you do in The American Legion? Why The American Legion? Let me tell vou my why. In the late 1990's after active duty, I was a former National Guard Soldier and we often frequented a local American Legion Post close to the Armory when serving drill weekends. I didn't know I could join The American Legion as a woman. I remember asking someone, "can I join The American Legion?" and they politely said yes but didn't offer me instructions on how to become a member. I thought to myself, well, I'll probably be back and will ask again another time. Fast forward to 2009. As a Chapter President of Student Veterans of America attending "TSUN", I found a passion for advocacy on behalf of veterans in higher education. Often, I would be at the Statehouse attending House Veterans Affairs Committee hearings and this one particular time, there they were... the MEN with the funny hats ...! One of them approached me and said "who are you?" and I po-litely said back "who are you?". From that day forward, it suddenly became one of the greatest love relationships I have yet to experience There were roughly 4 or 5 of them from AL, VFW, MOPH, MCL, and AMVETS. They began to tell me their stories, specifically their "WHY". Over the course of the next 18 months or so, I met those men in the basement of The American Legion Department of Michigan every month. We talked about student veterans, homeless veterans, women veterans, veteran treatment courts, and everything patriotic and veteran related inbetween.

Upon graduation, Pat Lafferty offered me a position as a Department Service Officer in the Detroit AL office Downtown. I had no idea what I was getting myself into but the first words out of my mouth was "YES" and the second was "well, how much does it pay?"! The money didn't matter. From that point forward, I continued to advocate for veterans from every era, generation, race, gender, and war. I began to notice the role of advocacy and that I could potentially be a part of Veterans lives literally being CHANGED by the simplest act of caring and listening. May I never forget those experiences. Leaving that position as the VA&R Director was a tough decision to make, at first. When I began to see the challenges and impact I could make on the lives of the people I see every day through mentoring, encouragement, and guidance, I knew it was the right thing to do. I MUST pass onto others what has been so freely given to me Otherwise, I squander the opportunity for all of us to grow. When the WHY is greater than the who, the what, and myself, the mission is far more meaningful and purposeful. With that being said, I challenge you: What is your "WHY"? who come after us even better! What we have received, what has been passed down ... poses the question ... What are we leaving for those who follow us? The American Legion's National Commander declared "Celebrating Our Legacy" as this year's slogan. It "spotlights" our precious inheritance and serves as a wakeup call for renewed focus on our precious beneficiaries. We should all want to leave a legacy; something that will enrich our families and contribute to the freedom that we all enjoy.

And so, it was for the American Legion eighty-two years ago, when their members sought the creation of "Buckeye Boys State" here in Ohio. They constructed a training/teaching program designed to prepare high school junior boys on how to become active participants in all facets of state, county, and city government. The military and civilian backgrounds of Legionnaires united their efforts to invigorate those who will take our place in the life and development of our nation.

Entering the seminary as a young man, little did I know that a legacy was left behind for me. It came in two waves

While teaching high school as a newly ordained priest, I sited a picture in the faculty room of a man in a WWII uniform. The photograph was Father Clem Falter, an Army Chaplain, and a member of my Order (C.PP.S.). On November 8th, 1942, Fr. Clem was killed in the first American landing on the African coast of Fedala. Offering his time to the troops, he was quoted as saying "I'm not here to look after my own safety, but to seek the welfare of my soldiers." His story was indelibly imprinted in my mind

A few years later, one of my students, while teaching at Carroll High School in Dayton, Ohio, was sent to Vietnam. While home on leave, he visited me. "Father we need priests' in Vietnam, I haven't had the opportunity to go to Mass for nearly a year! We need Chaplains to minister to the troops." We said our goodbyes and I blessed him, not knowing that it would be the last time I would ever see him. When he was sent back to Nam, he was killed in an ambush on a scouting mission. The memory of this "wonderful young man" deeply stirred me. His words would change my life and challenge me to the core. Celebrating their Legacies: In 1970, with the Lord's guidance, I took my oath and enlisted in the 107th Armored Cav - Ohio National Guard. Six years later, I entered active duty. Over a span of 30 years, I sought to honor the memories of my two fallen heroes. After retirement, I was asked to share my inheritance within the Boy's State Program. The legacy I once received is now for me to pass on - and God willing - these young boys will find a way in their own lives to honor the legacies of so many

forgotten soldiers who gave the ultimate sacrifice for all of us! John. 12: 24-25: "I tell you most solemnly; unless a grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it re-

of document to operate. The first is, of course, the charter granted by the National American Legion. Second is the Articles Incorporation filed with of the Ohio Secretary of State. This document states only the non-profit purpose of the organization, its name, location and the names of the original incorporators. Third and fourth are the Constitution and By-Laws, (which may be combined into a single document if the amendment procedures are identical). These documents provide for the officers and

standing committees and their duties, membership criteria, election. meetings. auorum requirements, discipline, etc. Finally, there are the detailed operating procedures which may be contained in several documents, such as meeting minutes, resolutions, Codes of Regulation, Standard Operating Procedures, house rules, and so forth

In order to use the trademarked name and emblems of the American Legion, each subsidiary organization to the Department, Districts or Posts. (sponsoring organization), such as Buckeye Boys State, SAL squadrons and ALR chapters, must abide by the following mandatory rules as set forth in the National American Legion Name and Emblem Use and Protection Guide:

1. All officers, directors,

trustees, etc. must be named by the sponsoring organization (usually nominated by the sponsoring organization commander and confirmed by the Executive Committee). An election by the members of the subsidiary organization could begin the selection process.

2. All vacancies in the subsidiary organization must be filled by the sponsoring organization.

3. The subsidiary organization must report to the sponsoring organization, no less frequently than monthly. These reports must include financial reports. 4. The sponsoring organization treasurer or finance officer must be a signatory on all accounts.

5. All articles of incorporation, Constitutions, or by-laws must be approved by the sponsoring organization.

VA&R Updates

This quarter the American Legion DSO's conducted (27) Decision Review Officer (DRO) hearings and (52) Board of Veterans Appeal (BVA) hearings.

DRO Hearings Scheduled: 23 BVA Hearings Scheduled: 50

It is paramount that you show

for your scheduled hearing or call the American Legion DSO's if you plan not to attend your hearing. This will ensure that the next veteran in line can get added to the docket to have their case heard. To request or cancel a hearing call 216-522-3504 a VA Form 21-4138 Statement in Support of Claim will need to be filled out and signed by the veteran to withdraw a hearing.

Blue Water Veterans and Agent Orange Exposure

Currently Blue Water veterans are not presumed to be exposed to Agent Orange while in the waters off the coast of Vietnam or it's inland waters. Unless the ship has been identified and listed by the VA can be located at the following: https://www.benefits.va.gov/ compensation/claims-postserviceagent_orange.asp. These Blue water veterans must prove on a factual basis that they were exposed to Agent Orange to receive benefits and each case is decided on a caseby-case basis. Veterans that went ashore into Vietnam or operated on its inland waterways between January 9, 1962 through May 7. 1975 are presumed exposed. A list of these ships can again be found through the link above.

H.R.299 Blue Water Navy Vietnam Veterans Act of 2017, has been recently been approved by the House of Representatives.

(a) Veteran who, during active military, naval, or air service, served in the territorial seas of the Republic of Vietnam during the period beginning on January 9, 1962, and ending on May 7, 1975, shall be considered to have been incurred in or aggravated by such service, notwithstanding that there is no record of evidence of such disease during the period of such service.

(b) Exposure. --A veteran who, during active military, naval, or air service, served in the territorial seas of the Republic of Vietnam during the period beginning on January 9, 1962, and ending on May 7, 1975, shall be presumed to have been exposed during such service to an herbicide agent containing dioxin or 2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid, and may be presumed to have been exposed during such service to any other chemical compound in an herbicide agent, unless there is affirmative evidence to establish that the veteran was not exposed to any such agent during that service H.R. 299 115th Cong. This school year, many local Post are reaching out to their local high schools to promote The American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program. The Oratorical Scholarship Program is a "Constitutional Speech Contest" aimed at developing a deeper knowledge and appreciation of the Constitution of the United States among our high school students. One-hundred percent Americanism is our goal.

Oratorical contest is a combination of the prepared oration and assigned topic discourse. The prepared oration must be on some aspect of the Constitution with emphasis on the duties and obligations of citizens to our government. The prepared oration must be the original effort of the contestant and must not take up less than eight minutes or more than 10 minutes for delivery. The contestant will randomly draw an assigned topic the day of the competition. The purpose of the assigned topic is to test the speaker's knowledge of the subject, the extent of his or her research, and the ability to discuss the topic as related to the basic principles of gov-

ernment under the Constitution. This year's assigned topics are as follows: Amendment 1, Amendment 4, Amendment 13, Amendment 21.

High School students will first compete at their Post and/or County, then they will advance to their District competition. Each District must submit their winner to Department of Ohio by February 25th, 2019. The Department of Ohio competition will take place on March 10, 2019. We welcome Legionnaires to sign up with Department of Ohio Staff to help conduct the Department Contest. The Department winner will go onto compete at the National level. National contest will take place on April 5th – 7th, 2019 in Indianapolis, Indiana.

The Department of Ohio presents \$1,000 scholarship to the secondplace awardee and \$2,000 scholarship to the first-place awardee. Each department winner who is certified into and participates in the first round of the national contest will receive a \$1,500 scholarship. National contest offers an additional \$1500 scholarship to everyone who advances to the next round. The three finalists in the final round will be awarded: 1st place: \$18,000; 2nd place: \$16,000; 3rd place: \$14,000.

We strongly encourage every Post, County, and District to be an active participant in this years' Oratorical program. Reach out to your children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews to offer them the opportunity to learn more about our Constitution, become an experienced public speaker, and a chance to earn a scholarship they can use to continue their education.

Legion Auxiliary Unit, or Sons of the American Legion Squadron - OR - be a registered, active member of a chartered Boy Scout Troop, Varsity Scout Team, or Venturing Crew, and the son or grandson of a Legionnaire, Sons of the American Legion or Auxiliary Member - AND - be an active member of his religious institution and must have received the appropriate Boy Scout religious emblem, have demonstrated practical citizenship in church, school, Scouting, and community, have reached his 15th birthday and be enrolled in high school at the time of selection Department of Ohio Eagle Scout of the Year Awardee will be submitted to compete on the national level. The American Legion annually honors the Eagle Scout of the Year at the national convention. The winner of the competition receives a \$10,000 scholarship, and the three runners-up are each awarded \$2,500 scholarships. Department Eagle Scout of the Year

will be honored at the Department

Convention.

Child Welfare Worker of the Year Award

The Department of Ohio Child Welfare Committee created the Child Welfare Worker of the Year Award to recognize those front line civilian warriors who work tirelessly on behalf of children every day. The successes of those who have received this award are the youth who emerge as productive tax paying citizens from all walks of life that may be underserved and at-risk of basic needs of shelter and food. These children may suffer from poverty and broken homes filled with abusive or dysfunctional families that rely upon care and resources distributed, or administered, by the selfless this award recognizes. The Department Child Welfare Worker of the Year Award will be presented at the Department Convention.

Educator of the Year Award

The Department Americanism committee will select an educator in any grade from K-12 in any public, private, or parochial school, or academy in the State of Ohio rec-

ognized by the Ohio Department of Education. Educators must be nominated by a local American Legion Post and be endorsed by the superintendent and principal through letters of recommendations. The Department Educator of the Year Award will be presented at the Department Convention.

Civilian Life Saver of the Year is awarded to any nonpaid or professional person who has saved a life.

The American Legion Department of Ohio Scholarship was established in 1971 to assist deserving high school students and veterans attending institutions of higher learning with the everincreasing costs of higher education. The Department of Ohio offers six different scholarships for Veterans and their children. To be eligible for a scholarship one must be:

- a. Legionnaire in good standing OR
- b. A direct descendant of a Legionnaire in good standing OR
- c. A direct descendant of a deceased Legionnaire in good standing at the time of passing.
- d. If not a Legionnaire, must be a military veteran eligible for Legion membership.
- PLUS
- Have a GPA of 3.5 or higher (Sealed Transcripts) AND a. Have an ACT of 25 or higher
- · Provide an accurately

completed application along with all required documentation

- If a high school senior, be attending college, university, or trade school in the fall semester immediately following high school graduation
- A College admission letter or a statement from University, College, or Trade School showing enrollment.

The Scholarship Screening Committee shall choose no award based on sex, age, race, creed, or national origin. The committee does not see the names or personal information of any applicant.

The Durward I. Bernhard Award is in honor of a lifelong resident of Belmont County who at the time of his passing, through his estate, provided funds to The American Legion Department of Ohio with the stipulation these funds be used to directly benefit the higher educational pursuits of Belmont County high school students, including home schooled or online students, or veterans residing in Belmont County.

The Donald L. Lanthorn Award is in honor of a lifelong resident of Licking County who served as the State Director of Veteran's Affairs and Rehabilitation for the Ohio American Legion State Headquarters for forty (40) years. This scholarship is awarded annually to one (1) selected high school student, including home schooled and online students, or veteran residing in and attending high school in Delaware, Knox, Licking, Madison, Marion. Morrow or Union counties

The American Legion/ Military Award is awarded annually to selected applicant who is a current American Legion member in good standing, or an Active Duty member, or a Veteran.

High School Award is awarded annually to selected to high school seniors, including home schooled and online students who reside and attend school within the state of Ohio.

The Surviving Spouse or Child Award is awarded to the surviving spouse or child of a deceased U.S. service member who died on active duty or from injuries received on active duty.

The College Student Award is awarded annually to a college

student (s).





OHIO'S PAST NATIONAL COMMANDERS

Frederic W. Galbraith Jr. Cincinnati, Ohio National Commander: 1920-1921 Died: June 9, 1921

Several notable "Firsts," some significant, one tragic, mark the life of Frederick W. Galbraith Jr., Department Commander of the Ohio American Legion in 1919-1920.

Born in 1874 in Watertown Arsenal, Massachusetts, Galbraith began his first career by going to sea as a member of the crew of the first steel schooner to clear an American sea port and sail around the Hom to Japan.

By age 24 Galbraith had made many such journeys and was a Ship's Master. In 1896, Galbraith left the sea to enter the business world, working in the tobacco industry. Galbraith was Treasurer of the Universal Tobacco Company in New York, and organized the Queen City Tobacco Company in Cincinnati, Ohio, his adopted home state.

Galbraith joined the Ohio Infantry in World War I, serving in Europe until the conclusion of the war, achieving the rank of Colonel.

Frederick Galbraith attended the first meetings held in Paris, France where veterans of World War I created the foundation and framework for the organization which would be called the American Legion.

Returning to the United States, Frederick Galbraith participated in the "first" stateside

can Legion where he achieved another notable "first" by being the first State Commander of the Ohio American Legion; 1919-1920.

Colonel Frederick Galbraith Jr.'s achievements in the creation of the American Legion were such that he was elected as the 2nd National Commander of the American Legion at the national convention held in Cleveland.

This accomplishment would lead to the "first" tragic event in the American Legion. As National Commander of the American Legion, while on Legion business in Indianapolis, Indiana, site of the American Legion National Headquarters, Frederick Galbraith Jr. was killed in an automobile accident June 9 1921 The death of Frederick Galbraith Ir marks the "first" and only time in the history of the American Legion that a National Commander has died while in office.

Milo Warner Toledo. Ohio National Commander: 1940-1941 Died: January 4, 1968

Milo J. Warner, Toledo, was one of the Founders of the Ohio Department of the American Legion in 1919. Milo Warner served as the 6th State Commander of the Ohio American Legion, serving in 1924-1925.

After leaving the office of State Commander, Milo Warner went on to hold a number of chairmanships and offices within the national ranks of the American Legion.

In 1940, Milo Warner was elected National Commander of the American Legion, one of only 5 Legionnaires from the Department of Ohio to hold this position in the history of the American Legion organization. Milo Warner served as National Commander of the American Legion in 1940-1941.

Warner was a graduate of Ohio State University where he obtained a B.A. in Law in 1916. A dedicated military man, Milo Warner served with the 1st Ohio Cavalry, Ohio Na-

tional Guard and later with the regular Army, where he saw

action in France

in World War I

with an artillery

battery



While fighting in World War I, Milo Warner was severely wounded, eventually receiving a Medical Discharge with Disability in 1919 for wounds received. Following his military service, Milo Warner returned to his home town of Toledo where he resumed a practice of law. For the remainder of his life, Milo Warner

remained active in many community, civic, and legal organizations within the Toledo area.

National Commander and Department Commander Milo J. Warner passed away in 1968.

Roger A. Munson Mentor, Ohio National Commander: 1992-1993 Died: April 19, 2000

Roger A. Munson, Mentor, served as Department Commander of the Ohio American Legion in 1968-1969.

A veteran of World War II, Roger Munson served with the United States Navy.

Roger Munson attended the Illinois Institute of Technology, Baldwin-Wallace college, and graduated with a Bachelors degree in Electrical Engineering from Case Institute of Technology. He is a member of Sigma Alpha Epsilon and Pi Delta Epsilon fraternities.

Following his service as State Commander of the Ohio American Legion, Roger Munson went on to hold a number of key positions and chairmanships within the national American Legion organization

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




HISTORY OF OHIO LEGION NEWS

THE HISTORY OF THE AMERICAN LEGION

The American Legion was born at a caucus of the American Expeditionary Force (A.E.F) in Paris, France. This caucus was the result of a proposal by Lt. Col. Theodore Roosevelt Jr. to a group of representatives of A.E.F. divisions and service units. Roosevelt's vision resulted in the founding Paris caucus of March 17-19, 1919, and subsequent organizational caucus held May 8-10, 1919, in St. Louis, MO. His unwavering service during these vital times won him the affectionate title, "Father of The American Legion."

As the weary, homesick delegates assembled for that first Paris caucus, they brought with them the raw materials with which to build an association of veterans whose primary devotion was to God and Country. In the minds of those veterans of the A.E.F. were a number of lofty ideals, uppermost among them:

1. Creation of a fraternity based upon the firm comradeship born of wartime service and dedicated to fair and equitable treatment for all veterans, particularly the disabled, and the widows and orphans whose loved ones paid the ultimate price for freedom;

2. Maintaining national security for America, including a universal military training program for the prevention of future world conflicts; and 3. Promotion of patriotism and the combating of materialistic and totalitarian ideologies that recognize neither the honor nor the integrity of the individual. It was at this Paris caucus that

The American Legion received its name. The honor of naming the new organization went to Maurice K. Gordon, then a Major in the 36th Division and later a Judge in Kentucky. A controversy had developed concerning the name, and it was Gordon who made the successful motion to label the fledgling group "The American Legion." Even though The American Legion was formed overseas, organizers realized members of the armed services had no choice whether they served in the United States or overseas. Accordingly, it was decided that membership in The American Legion should be open to all who served honorably in the armed forces in World War I. (Eligibility requirements for membership have since been


revised to open membership in the Legion to veterans who served honorably in the armed forces of the United States in WWII, The Korean War, the Vietnam War, Lebanon and Grenada, Panama, and the Persian Gulf.) Taken from "The American Legion Extension Institute: History & Organization" booklet.

Meaning of The American Legion emblem



In turn, each of the emblem's parts bears a meaning which no Legionnaire who wears the emblem should take lightly, and which he or she should know from the first moment it is put on. Why does the star signify constancy of purpose? Because the stars are fixed in the heavens. As the stars do not wander, so should The American Legion not wander from its fixed purposes. Further, the words "The American Legion" demand that the wearer "shall ever guard the sanctity of home and country and free institutions." There shines the emblem of The American Legion – your badge of pride, distinction, honor and service.






