I would like to take the time to go over what Posts must have on file to continue operating. Posts need to have a certificate of continued existence. All Posts need to be incorporated.

need to submit a new Constitution and Bylaws every five years to the Department. The Department needs an up-todate officers list. You must file the Post's Consolidated Post Report (CPR) every year - this is a federal requirement.

There are many other types of forms you must have on file. The forms depend on whether you have a brick-and-mortar Posts building or a canteen. If you have a SAL need to have the Post's 990s filed every or a Legion Riders, you are responsible

Please make sure you have adequate insurance for liability and theft. If you are a Post that doesn't have a building, but you do events, look at getting a policy to cover the event. If a Post is not incorporated and an accident happens, and there was no insurance purchased, it would then fall to the members of the tant Post to cover the cost of the accident. So please look into incorporating your Post

and protect your American Legion.

Decisions in Motion - RONR p. 32-57, OG p, 139-140

Official meetings are

held to provide information from committees, special guests, or by members for the good of the order (general announcements). This information does not need to be "decided" upon as it is simply received as informative. However, when decisions must be made that obligate the organization's time, talent or resources, a motion is made and then must be seconded to start the discussion. It is highly recommended that the motion be in written form so the chair can clearly state and the secre-

tary can accurately record the motion. If the motion is not seconded then it "falls to the floor" with no action taken. Once seconded, the chair must clearly restate the motion before opening discussion by offering the motion's creator the opportunity to speak first and last. Prior to the restating of the question (motion) by the chair the motion's creator owns the motion and may remove it for consideration without the assembly's permission. However, once the chair restates the motion it is considered owned by the assembly and can only be removed from consideration by a majority vote. The discussion ensues in the customary format of alternating the speakers between pro and con until all have had opportunity to speak and the chair calls for a vote, the time limit for debate has been reached, or the question is called for a vote thus ending debate.

Calling the Question RONR p. 197-209

WARNING Calling the Question, or "Previous Question" as stated in RONR, is a motion in itself to immediately close the debate and vote on the main motion. Calling the Question cannot be made while another has the floor, must be seconded, is not debatable, and must pass with 2/3 of those voting. All too often meetings at all levels have simply gone to the main motion vote after a Calling the Question thus wrongly denying the assembly its right to determine if it wants to close debate. Let us remember that our purpose in assembly is to conduct orderly business among comrades who respect the equal rights of all members to properly and thoroughly debate a motion for official action by the organization. Therefore, allowing for full, sufficient, and relevant store or on line)

debate is in good order. This is why the abrupt closure demands a 2/3 vote. When debate is officially stopped, all amendments are voted on from the most recent back to the main motion. Once the main motion is voted the Previous Question is considered exhausted and the next order of business is taken up by the assembly.

May your future meetings have a more fluid motion!

Flag Display and Respect

- (a) The Flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- (b) The Flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.
- (c) The Flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.
- (d) The Flag should never be used as

wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free.

Bunting of blue, white, and red is always arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle, and the red below should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform, and for decoration in general.

- (e) The Flag should never be fastened. displayed, used, or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any way.
- (f) The Flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling.
- (g) The Flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or drawing of any nature.

(h) The Flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.

- for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed on paper napkins or boxes or anything designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halvard from which the Flag is flown.
- (i) No part of the Flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform. However, a flag patch may be affixed to the uniform of military personnel, firemen, policemen, and members of patriotic organizations. The Flag represents a living country and is itself considered a living thing. Therefore, the lapel flag

(k) The Flag, when it is in such condi-(i) The Flag should never be used tion that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning. (Disposal of Unserviceable Flags Ceremony)

Flag Retirement

- In proper tribute and in memory and love, our Flag becomes faded and worn and must be honorably retired from life.
- The approved method of disposing of unserviceable Flags has been by burn-
- Such retirement of Flags that have become unserviceable may be done in public with respectful and honorable rites.
- The most appropriate day to perform this ceremony is National Flag Day, June 14th.

HISTORY

of Ohio Scholarship was established in 1971 to assist deserving high school students and veterans attending institutions of higher learning with the everincreasing costs of higher education.

ONE TIME SCHOLARSHIP AWARD

The scholarship offered by the American Legion Department of Ohio is a ONE TIME NON-RENEWABLE award.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION **DEADLINE**

All scholarship applications mailed to the American Legion Department of Ohio State Headquarters in Delaware, Ohio must be received by or postmarked by APRIL 15 annually.

SCHOLARSHIP SELECTION / NOTIFICATION

All scholarship applications received will be reviewed by the American Legion Department of Ohio Screening Committee in mid-May with scholarship recipients and non-recipients to be notified via surface mail or e-mail as soon as possible thereafter.

SCHOLARSHIP JUDGING **CRITERIA**

The judging criteria utilized by the Ohio American Legion Scholarship Screening Committee to choose the recipients for any scholarships awarded shall be based upon:

The applicant's academic achievement based on course grades; difficulty of the curriculum; ACT scores; participation in school activities and activities outside of the school and a general impression of each applicant's character obtained through a personal statement.

The American Legion Department of Ohio Scholarship consists of the following categories and the criteria required for each category are:

High School Award

High school awards, as chosen by the Scholarship Screening Committee of the Ohio American Legion, are awarded annually to selected high school seniors, including home schooled and online students, attending high school within the state of Ohio.

Requirements:

Open statewide.

The American Legion Department dant of a current paid member of the Ohio American Legion or a direct descendant of a deceased member of the Ohio American Legion who was in good standing at the time of death.

• Applicant must have a high school and college (if taking college courses) GPA of 3.5 or higher.

 Applicant must have an ACT score of 25 or higher.

The amount of each American Legion Department of Ohio high school award will be contingent upon the annual earnings of the Scholarship Fund.

College Student Award

An American Legion Department of Ohio scholarship may be awarded annually to a college student.

Requirements:

- Open statewide.
- Applicant must be a direct descendant of a current paid member of the Ohio American Legion or a direct descendant of a deceased member of the Ohio American Legion who was in good standing at the time of death.
- Applicant must have a high school and college GPA of 3.5 or higher.
- Applicant must have an ACT score of 25 or higher.

The amount of each American Legion Department of Ohio college award will be contingent upon the annual earnings of the Scholarship Fund.

Donald L. Lanthorn Award

Donald L. Lanthorn was a lifelong resident of Licking County who served as the State Director of Veteran's Affairs and Rehabilitation for the Ohio American Legion State Headquarters for forty (40) years.

The Donald L. Lanthorn award, as chosen by the Scholarship Screening Committee of the Ohio American Legion, is awarded annually to one (1) selected high school student, including home schooled and online students, or veteran residing in and attending high school in Delaware, Knox, Licking, Madison, Marion, Morrow or Union counties. Those applicants not selected for the Lanthorn scholarship may still be eligible for other Department of Ohio scholarships.

Requirements:

Restricted to high school, home

• Applicant must be a direct descension schooled, online or veterans residing residing in Belmont County. in Delaware, Knox, Licking, Madison, Marion, Morrow or Union County.

- Applicant must be a direct descendant of a current paid member of the Ohio American Legion or a direct descendant of a deceased member of the Ohio American Legion who was in good standing at the time of death.





Veterans "Right A Wrong" **At Hillside Cemetery**

Post 540 and Post 700 members "righted" a "wrong" done at Hillside Cemetery on July 17th, 2023. The "wrong" done was the unauthorized removal of some 400 American flags and marking stakes identifying veterans' graves. The flags are posted each May just prior to Memorial Day. The "right" done was the remarking of most of the graves with the recovered stakes by veterans on September 9th. Our focus in this first effort was to restake World War II graves to present graves easily identifiable by plaques affixed to headstones or plaques lying flat on the ground. Graves prior to World War II and dating back to the Revolutionary War lack plaques. The in-ground vear-round stakes were our means of identifying those graves deserving an American flag each year. The stakes are all gone. Working with Bazetta Township

(cemetery owner), the Cortland-Bazetta Historical Society, a lot of research and



After Europe and returning to Camp Myles Standish, Pilati was sent to Camp Bowie in Texas to train for deployment in the Pacific. Two weeks into the training, the bombs were dropped on Japan. After 27 months he was able to return home. Family and friends were there to support him including childhood friend, Ruth Bricker, whom he married. Pilati states you should always respect the US Flag, be thankful for your freedom, and Honor all Veterans.

This is a story about a 75 year old DAV who has never given up on life. He wont's to dedicate his story to the elderly and the handicap who has all but given up on life.



He has worked with and for needy children, homeless & needy veterans and the elderly through out his life, both as he served his country in the 60s and as a civilian. Because of the children he worked with in the military who were in need of help, when he was discharged in 70, he was always reaching out to the children in Scioto County.

He took over as a Scoutmaster for a dear friend who was forced to step down due to his health. He became Director of Big Brother and started Big Sister of Scioto County. He joined church in 1973, He repented, was baptized according to Acts chapter 2 in KJV) and received the Holy Goest. As he served the Lord, he became the Founder of Kids For Christ Foundation, and other programs for children, He was involved with the police department, Sheriff Department, Children Service and Juvenile Court with Judge Kirsch. At Girls State the young women (delegates) learn about city, county, and state government. Each delegate is assigned to one of two political parties in order to learn about party structure. Sadie's week at Girls State was a busy one. She enjoyed her week but was happy to return home.

He and his wife worked for the children for 25 years until he ended up in the hospital at the VA Hospital in Chillithee for a long stay. It didn't stop him from serving children in need. He continued his work after being released in 1992. His four children helped him until they went to collage and joined the Marines.

He and his Pastor, Mike Gifford at the New Life Family Worship Center knew each other since before he joined the military in 1967. As his pastor they worked side by side for the children, veterans and the elderly. He became a Deacon in the church as he and Pastor Gifford worked hand in hand in reaching out to others in need and the lost. They had yearly summer camps to get children off the streets and out of the allies for a week to rest their minds and have fun. Roy Rogers made a recording to get the word out about their work. People like Uncle Ebb and Andy Glockner gave their support by donating a car and finances to help the children. Bro. John took in foreign exchange students from Germany to help them further their education in America. One of the students joined church before going back home to Germany. The parents came for a visit and before going back to Germany they joined church with their son. (Acts chapter 2 KJV)

While fighting for children who were used in adult magazines he and his family were threatened by government officials who were involved. He was told to watch his children, he was told there were people berried in the hills that were never heard from again. He went through the fire several times in his life, but there was one that sticketh closer than a brother with him through the fire. (Jesus)

He wrote a book entitled, "SUFFER THE LITTLE CHILDREN" from his experience as a prison guard, his experience working in public schools, working with city officials, abused and neglected children in our area and areas outside the community. It was lent to the library where collage and high schools used it in making book reports. As a school employee he worked with handicap children with issues.

Bro. John had open heart surgery and the doctor had to go back in because he was filling up with blood. The doctors couldn't figure out where the blood was coming from or where it went after opening him up for the second time. He was transferred to a Nursing Home to be cared for and learn how to walk and get back on his feet. He was sent to the ER three times for treatment. The third time while on a venter later for the third time. He was asked if he wanted to be put on Life Support. Bro. John said no. He said as he lay there the Lord told him He wasn't finished with him yet. That has been several years ago.

He uses a cane, walker and scooter provided to him from the VA. He has a home health provider and can not drive due to his condition. He is picked up by his pastor each time for church, out reach and activities. He serves as the Deacon and is taken to a nursing home to meet with the residences for prayer, singing and in fellowship.

His message to the elderly and handicap is never give up. Don't feel as though you are alone in your battle. You were put here for some reason. God has a plan in mind for you. He isn't finished with you yet. No matter your condition, He has a job for you to do in life. Bro. John said it has been a great life in his 75 years and he wouldn't take anything for it. He said he brought his children up in church and they have turned out with jobs working with children. His grandchildren are working in doctors office and other occupations involving people.

At the end of his life he said he is looking forward to his retirement benefits in heaven with the Lord, his loved ones and his brothers and sisters in Christ. He recommends that if you are not already in church, get in and make Jesus your commander and chief. You will find that He is a wonderful boss with a lot of good things for you in life and a great retainment with lots of good benefits waiting for you.

BURNPITS DOCUMENTARY - TOXIC WOUNDS OF WAR

As you may know, for the past few years I have been working with Susan Zeier of Burnpits 360 to help pass meaningful legislation to help our vets who have been harmed by toxic fumes during their deployment. Last Aug the PACT Act was passed and so far, nearly 500K vets have applied for benefits with over \$215M being awarded. The COB initially thought 100K would apply. Susan had lost her son-in-law Heath Robinson after a two-year fight. Over 10 oncologists failed to identify the type of cancer he had after 2 years around the burn pits. She was relentless in pursuing legislation meeting with both Senators Brown and Portman.

The following excerpt from Susan is regarding the Burnpits documentary film they wish to finalize which Post 211's Executive Committee meeting voted to donate \$5K to this project. You can monitor the donation campaign results by clicking the link at the end of this article:

As you know America poisoned our soldiers who willingly went off to war and you also know that America refused to take care of our war heroes as they were battling the war that followed them home.

A group of persistent warriors known as Burnpits360 took that battle to Capitol Hill and triumphed after overcoming huge obstacles having doors slammed in our faces while fighting for health care and other benefits for sick and dying war heroes who were being ignored.

My daughter, Danielle, and I joined up with Burnpits360 and spent 5 years advocating and lobbying Congress asking that legislation be passed granting presumptive benefits and healthcare for our service members who are seriously and terminally ill with burn pit/toxic exposure illnesses. Our involvement resulted in having the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee name the bill in memory of my late son-in-law, an Ohio National Guardsman, who passed away on May 6, 2020, from burn pits caused lung cancer. Triumphant was the day the SFC Heath Robinson Honoring Our PACT Act was signed into law.

An incredible documentary team has been following our group for 5 years recording over 100 hours of video. It's time to tell the story of our journey and the obstacles we overcame to bring healthcare to Iraq and Afghanistan war veterans. We need your help to complete this project which you can find details of at the link attached. Please consider donating today. No amount is too small to get production of this incredible film over the finish line. We are getting a lot of \$5.00 and \$10.00 donations and it all adds up. The production team will be traveling to Sandusky, OH, and Columbus, OH to further interview my daughter, granddaughter, and me who all are an integral part of this film. We've been grateful for the outpouring of support our communities, friends, and family bestowed on us since 2017 when my sonin-law, Heath was first diagnosed with Stage 4 lung cancer caused by exposure to toxic burn pits while he served as a combat medic in Iraq. We are now asking for your support once again to have our stories told to the world. Asking for donations is not something I've done throughout these past 5 years. I gave up taking vacations, going to Ohio State football games....which I love to do, and treating myself to the little things that bring me joy in order to fund my advocacy. I didn't keep track but I easily spent \$25,000/\$30,000 driving back and forth to DC more times than I know, hotels, parking, printed materials like postcards and letters for others to sign and mail to their members of Congress and never once asked anyone for help. I'm asking now and will greatly appreciate any contribution you are willing to offer.
