Greetings, Legionnaires!

I hope you are enjoying the Fall weather. We are forming a committee to encourage participation for USA's 250th anniversary celebration. Aspects such as engaging veterans, local leaders, and volunteers in organizing state and community events, as well as honoring service, fostering unity, and commemorating history will be the focus. Brad Beatty has agreed to lead this effort.

We are also putting together a dedicated team for developing a strategic 5-year membership plan to lead us into the future, fostering growth, retaining members, and ensuring the

American Legion's vitality and impact within our communities. In addition, we are putting together a team focusing on Post revitalizations, 100% submittal of CPR's, and 888 memberships. CPR's can be based on calendar year activities instead of fiscal year. This information is used to show Congress the magnitude of activities Legionnaires are doing in our communities.

At the National Fall Meetings, I've committed our Ohio Legion to a goal of 92.3% membership retention rate this year. Ohio was recognized as number one in retention last year. Let's continue that success this year. Get out and do the Buddy Checks, stay in touch with your members, encourage and support them, get them involved.

I had the opportunity to visit our veterans in the Sandusky, Ohio VA facility. Due to additional funding increases, an additional 16 units were opened to house additional veterans.

We visited the Advanced Platform Technology (APT) located at Cleveland VA. It is dedicated to advancing medical technologies that improve the quality of life for veterans and individuals with disabilities. During the visit, we observed cutting-edge equipment and technology being developed to improve the lives of disabled veterans. One remarkable innovation is the use of electrodes that enable individuals to regain movement and participate in physical activities. Another technology observed is a form of "body armor"- robotic exoskeletons that can be fitted to the arms and legs. These devices use electrodes to monitor the user's effort: if the person is tiring, the robotics offer increased support; if they are slacking, the system reduces assistance, encouraging active engagement. This technology not only restores mobility but also provides significant psychological benefits by allowing individuals to stand, walk, and interact with others. We met a veteran who had lost his leg above the knee and now benefits from a sensor

pad placed in his artificial foot. Before the sensor technology, he had difficulty navigating surfaces like ice because he couldn't sense his foot's position, putting him at risk of falls. Now, he can feel where his foot is, and he even reported being able to run up and down stairs. Overall, these advancements at the VA lab are making a profound difference in the lives of disabled veterans, both physically and psychologically.

I want to encourage donations to my Commander's Project, Challenged Champions Equestrian Center, which provides therapeutic horseback riding and equine-assisted activities for veterans and individuals with physical, cognitive, and emotional challenges. Donations can be sent to Department marked for my project.

It is an honor to be your Commander. Thank you for your support.


Good day my fellow Legionnaires,



If you know of someone that is under the weather or has passed on PLEASE contact me - I will





Finding Veterans Programs and Sports Opportunities Across Ohio

Veterans across Ohio have access to a growing number of programs and recreational opportunities designed to help them connect, stay active, and thrive after military service. From support networks to adaptive sports, these initiatives are making a meaningful difference in the lives of those who served.

Connecting With Local Support

The Ohio Department of Veterans Services (ODVS) serves as the primary gateway for ben-

efits and community programs. Through 88 county veterans service offices, ODVS offers help with healthcare, housing, education, and financial assistance. Its comprehensive Veteran Resource Guide connects veterans directly to local agencies and services tailored to their needs.

"These programs ensure no veteran in Ohio feels left behind," an ODVS spokesperson said. "Whether you're looking for benefits, support groups, or new opportunities, your county office is the best place to start."

The ODVS also provides information on mental health services, homelessness prevention, and employment resources through its official website at https://dvs.ohio.gov.

Veterans Sports and Outdoor Recreation

Beyond benefits and assistance, many veterans are rediscovering a sense of purpose and community through sports and recreation programs. Adaptive

and inclusive athletic programs are helping veterans stay active while connecting with peers who share similar experiences.

A standout example is PGA HOPE (Helping Our Patriots Everywhere), a program from the PGA REACH Southern Ohio Foundation. This free six- to eight-week initiative introduces veterans with disabilities to golf, emphasizing wellness and camaraderie. "It's not just about golf—it's about confidence, connection, and healing," said one program organizer.

Other groups, such as Veteran Recreation Ohio, specialize in outdoor activities like hiking, camping, and fly-fishing, while building lasting friendships among veterans. Additionally, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs' Office of National Veterans Sports Programs sponsors nationwide adaptive sports events to aid physical and emotional recovery. Also, The Columbus area Sled Hockey team called Ohio Warriors compete

in tournaments and help build comradery in a growing sport.

All of these programs need our support as Legion Members. We need to remember the Four pillars and start working them. Veterans Affairs & Rehabilitation our first pillar.

Getting Involved

Veterans can start by visiting their county veterans service office or exploring statewide options online. Many programs are free, open to all ability levels, and designed to support both wellness and social engagement. See if your post can help in getting programs started in your area.

From golf greens to hiking trails, Ohio's veteran community continues to prove that service doesn't end with discharge—it simply takes on a new mission: connection, health, and hope.

At the time of writing this article the Government has been shut down for 31 days with the Senate failing to pass the Pay our Troops Act of 2026 multiple times. By utilizing the Grassroots action center on Legion. org you can make a difference by contacting Congress and urge them to pass this incredibly important piece of legislation that ensures our service members of the Armed Forces will be paid in the event of a government shut-

With Ohio Legislator returning for their first full month in October I feel it best to put out some helpful tips to the body for interactions that are helpful when contacting legislators and resources available to stay up to

date with happenings around the statehouse. See below for more information.

The mission of the Legislative Commission is to review all State, Federal, House, and Senate Bills pending to gauge the level of support from The American Legion Department of Ohio as well as lobbying tasks on behalf of the 75K+ Legionnaires within Ohio. The Legislative Commission members meet at least annually and are tasked with maintaining open lines of communication with local Legislators in their Districts to inform them of how The American Legion is at the forefront of helping veterans, their families, and our children & youth and to encourage participation in our programs. The Legislative Commission urges Legionnaires to create their own individual account on the Ohio General Assembly website and Congress website at: https:// www.legislature.ohio.gov/authentication/sign-in and https:// www.congress.gov/ - There, you will be able to view the current legislative activities as well as search current legislation. If you

are planning to interact with State Legislators or Members of Congress, please keep the following in mind:

NATIONAL SECURITY





The National Security Commission is responsible for reviewing items pertaining to various security issues that involve such items as cyber security, security of our boarders, our armed forces, their equipment and numbers so we don't get into a position where we can't maintain our presence in areas needed to insure our safety. The Commission is also involved in military benefits and quality of life items that face our armed forces as well as the veterans that have served. These issues are ad-

dressed by either creating Resolutions to address the items or approve submitted resolutions by other committees or individuals. These resolutions are presented at the department convention to be accepted and, once accepted, move on to the national convention. If the resolution is passed at the national level it will then be presented to congress for possible action.

Other programs that the National Security Commission is responsible for maintaining are:

Operation Comfort Warriors

Operation Comfort Warriors is a program dedicated to meeting the needs of wounded, injured or ill military personnel by providing them with comfort items not usually supplied by the government. OCW ensures that patients at U.S. military hospitals and warrior transition units are given items like sweat suits, DVDs, puzzles, electronic devices, books, calling cards and more. OCW also provides larger items such as ping pong tables, entertainment centers, computers, kayaks and other recreational goods for use by wounded warriors in common areas.

National Emergency Fund

National Emergency Fund, created in response to Hurricane Hugo in 1989, has provided more than \$8 million in direct financial assistance to American Legion Family members and posts. By providing this

emergency funding, NEF has prevented damaged posts from closing and enabled American Legion Family members to recover from tragedy.

POW/MIA Advocacy

The American Legion is committed to achieving a full accounting of all POW/MIAs from the Gulf Wars, Vietnam War, Cold War, Korean War and World War II.

The mission of The American Legion Buckeye Boys State is to provide an educational and leadership program that exposes young men to the rights and privileges, the duties and responsibilities, and the love for God and Country necessary to being self-governing citizens.

Through a practical, objective, nonpartisan approach, participants in The American Legion Buckeye Boys State program are exposed to fundamental democratic principles in local, county, and state elections and government functions which prepare them for leadership roles as patriotic American citizens.

Buckeye Boys State is a highly structured, intense, "hands on" workshop in Ohio Government.

Candidates selected to Buckeye Boys State must be willing to give The American Legion and Buckeye Boys State an eight-day commitment of their time and 100% willingness to learn and participate.

Candidates are required to attend a Boys State Orientation program in their area. Details on the orientation program are provided to all candidates by the sponsoring Post/Squadron.

THE FINAL SELECTION IS THE SOLE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE SPONSORING AMERICAN LEGION POST. A representative of the Post must meet with the candidate and certify him for acceptance.

American Legion Buckeye Boys State will be June 14th-June 21st, 2026 at Miami University. The Buckeye Boys State application process for delegates will be online again. Once you receive your enrollment form, please return it with the number of delegates your post plans on sending along with your payment by March 15th. You will receive back forms that have a specific code for each delegate to log onto the website and enter their information electronically. Each code is specific for each delegate, so the forms CANNOT BE COPIED. Enrollment Forms need to be turned in before Citizenship codes can be sent to the delegates.

American Legion Buckeye Boys State also created QR codes to educate students and schools that are unfamiliar with BBS. These codes are for educational and recruitment purposes only and are not delegate applications.

American Legion Buckeye Boys State, the premier Boys State program in the nation, is an eight (8) day "hands on" program which teaches the young men attending the organization, operation, and principles of State, County, and City Government in Ohio, as well as learning experiences about Ohio Courts, Ohio School Boards, Ohio Law Enforcement, Banking and Realty, Social Media operations, and much, much more.

Held on the campus of Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, American Legion Buckeye Boys State annually attracts over 700 of the top High School Junior young men in Ohio.

Individuals sought by Buckeye Boys State to join as staff mentors are not required to have a deep knowledge of government operations in Ohio, although such experience would be welcome and an asset.

The knowledge, expertise, and life experiences of just about any profession that interested parties may have had or may possess can be utilized within Boys State.

Although the majority of Buckeye Boys State staff serve for the full eight (8) days of Boys State, there are a number of positions available, notably in Elections and several Government sections of Boys State that would only require ones' participation for three (3) to four (4) days.

American Legion Buckeye Boys State provides all housing, meals, and supplies for Buckeye Boys State staff.

The greatest expense required of a prospective Buckeye Boys State staff member would be the expense of his or her time.



Oratorieal Program



- Quotations must always be indicated as such. Where quotations are more than 10 words in length, the author's name must be given in the manuscript and cited orally.
- It is acceptable to utilize or incorporate short phrases in a foreign language to develop the argument, establish a point, etc. It should be understood that the vast majority of the prepared oration and/or assigned topic must still be delivered in English. Singing is not permitted and will result in immediate disqualification. The contestant may, however, quote a verse(s) of a song(s) provided proper attribution is made.

The Assigned Topic (3-5 Minutes)

• The purpose of the assigned

topic discourse is to test the speaker's knowledge of the subject, the extent of his or her research, and the ability to discuss the topic as related to the basic principles of government under the Constitution

- The assigned topic shall be drawn by the contest official in full view of the audience immediately before the last speaker begins delivery of his or her prepared oration and will be made known to the audience and each contestant approximately five (5) minutes prior to the time of delivery
- The topic will be on some phase of the U.S. Constitution, selected from Articles and Sections as listed under assigned topics for the current year's contest
 - 2026 Assigned topics
 - » Amendment IV
 - » Article III
 - » Article IV
 - » Article VI

The American Legion Department awards the first-place

winner a \$4,000 Scholarship. The second-place winner receives \$2,000 and the remainder of the contestants equally divide \$3,000.

Flag Etiquette



Flag Display and Respect

- (a) The Flag should never be displayed with the union down, except as a signal of dire distress in instances of extreme danger to life or property.
- (b) The Flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, water, or merchandise.
- (c) The Flag should never be carried flat or horizontally, but always aloft and free.
- (d) The Flag should never be used as wearing apparel, bedding, or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, nor up, in folds, but always allowed to fall free.

Bunting of blue, white, and red is always arranged with the blue above, the white in the middle, and the red below should be used for covering a speaker's desk, draping the front of the platform,

and for decoration in general.

- (e) The Flag should never be fastened, displayed, used, or stored in such a manner as to permit it to be easily torn, soiled, or damaged in any way.
- (f) The Flag should never be used as a covering for a ceiling.
- (g) The Flag should never have placed upon it, nor on any part of it, nor attached to it any mark, insignia, letter, word, figure, design, picture, or drawing of any nature.
- (h) The Flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying, or delivering anything.
- (i) The Flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever. It should not be embroidered on such articles as cushions or handkerchiefs and the like, printed or otherwise impressed

on paper napkins or boxes or anything designed for temporary use and discard. Advertising signs should not be fastened to a staff or halyard from which the Flag is flown.

- (j) No part of the Flag should ever be used as a costume or athletic uniform. However, a flag patch may be affixed to the uniform of military personnel, firemen, policemen, and members of patriotic organizations. The Flag represents a living country and is itself considered a living thing. Therefore, the lapel flag pin being a replica, should be worn on the left lapel near the heart.
- (k) The Flag, when it is in such condition that it is no longer a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferably by burning. (Disposal of Unserviceable Flags Ceremony)

Flag Retirement

- a) In proper tribute and in memory and love, our Flag becomes faded and worn and must be honorably retired from life.
- b) The approved method of disposing of unserviceable Flags has been by burning.
- c) Such retirement of Flags that have become unserviceable may be done in public with respectful and honorable rites.
- d) The most appropriate day to perform this ceremony is National Flag Day, June 14th.

4th Grade Flag Education Program

The Department of Ohio is pleased to present the 4th Grade Flag Education Program again this year. This is a fairly new program to Ohio.

The 4th Grade Flag Education consists of the "Our Country's Flag" comic book from National Headquarters and a test with 20 questions – both multiple-choice and true/false – and a short essay, which is used as a tiebreaker.

The test is open to 4th Grade elementary students in all public, private, and home schools.

Each student participating in the Flag Education Test Program takes the same test. The answers on the test are scored against a standardized answer sheet. Students are given one hour to complete the test at school. No part of it is to be taken home. Also, students MAY NOT use their comic book, notes, or other materials to assist while taking the test.

Tests and comic books may be ordered by contacting your local American Legion Post. The sponsoring Post will provide the test to the applicable school officials. If desired, the Post may also participate in administering and grading the test.

There will be a male and female District winner. Each winner will be invited to attend the District Conference to be awarded.

Established in 1925, the purpose of Temporary Financial Assistance is to help families in need meet the cost of shelter, food, utilities and health expenses.

Through the American Veteran & Children Foundation, Veterans with minor children can apply for a one-time grant upwards of \$1500. This grant is designed to prevent children of veterans from experiencing homelessness and/or lack of utilities such as heat, water, and electric. Applicants must first exhaust all local and State resources.

"With great honor, we present this certificate of appreciation to you." The certificate was issued in "grateful appreciation and dedicated allegiance to the ideals of the American Legion." "And be it further known that such a record of consistent loyalty to The American Legion merits the honor of being cited as an outstanding contributor to the programs of The American Legion," reads the certificate.

American Legion Percy D. Hyatt Post 226 meets at the Andover Eagles Club at 410 E. Main St., Andover. It's named after the first Andover soldier killed in World War I. It is led by current Post Commander, Bob Hitchcock, who was among the members to receive certificates honoring their years of service. Hitchcock received his certificate at a Post meeting on Thursday, Aug. 14. "We're recognizing all members who have been in the Post for over 50 years," Hitchcock said. "It is our pleasure to honor them not only for their years of service in the military to protect their country, but also here supporting the American Legion." He expressed appreciation for the people who have donated their time to the organization. With some of the honorees living out of state, or because of health or other commitments, not all could be in attendance at the meeting. Hitchcock said the criteria for being a member of the American Legion is having served in the military. People can then apply for membership in their local American Legion. Post 226 has 46 members, with 8 regularly active.

As for the Post's projects, Hitchcock says they support veterans in the area. "We also help out with sending students from our school, Pymatuning Valley, to Boys State and Girls State," Hitchcock said. The organization also is involved with the Americanism and Government Test program, a joint initiative of the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary. It is open to students in 10th, 11th, and 12th grades, while 9th-grade students take a practice test. The exam consists of 50 questions in true-or-false, multiple-choice and fill-in-the-blank formats. The highest-scoring students have the opportunity to take a trip to Washing-ton, D.C., sponsored by the Legion.

As for his own involvement in the organization, Hitchcock said when he came back from service, he felt it was necessary to get involved and support veterans in the area. "One of the big events we do is on Memorial Day. We go to 11 cemeteries and not only provide a small speech, but we have some buglers we are very fortunate to have with us every year, and we have a gun salute," Hitchcock said. "And we have a small program that is put on at Andover Square." He's grateful for the community support of these ceremonies.

Hitchcock also thanked the Andover Village employees, Bill Webker and Joey Steen, who have dedicated time to hanging up banners in town honoring veterans from the Village. "We've been very happy with their help with that project," Hitchcock said. Member John Durda said another benefit they offer is an outreach program with the Ashtabula County Veterans Service Commission that meets from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. the last Thursday of every month at the town hall that helps veterans learn about and apply

for benefits. The Post is actively recruiting new members, and interested people may contact Hitchcock at 440-293-7166.








Post 710 - Flag Retirement Box

And that is in monies alone as the seeds that were planted with the hundreds there to support the cause are still yet to be measured.

Inside the Cleveland Gaming Classic: A Weekend of Play, Passion, and Community

the IX Center on the morning of September 20th, the first thing I noticed wasn't the glow of arcade screens or the thundering bass of game soundtracksit was the energy. Thousands of gamers, collectors, cosplayers, and families were already filling the massive hall, buzzing with excitement for what has become Ohio's largest and premier gaming weekend: the Cleveland Gaming Classic.



I approached a group of young gamers crowded around a vintage arcade cabinet. One boy, no older than nine, eagerly told me, "I've never played anything this old before!" His father laughed and added, "And I don't have to keep giving him quarters—everything is free. This is how every arcade should be." That theme came up over and over again: all games were free, and kids ten and under got in at no cost. It was clear that the Classic wasn't just a show-it was a family experience designed with accessibility in mind.



A Conversation With Chief Gamer Tom Jenkins

I sat down with Tom Jenkins, the

Gamer" and the driving force behind this event. "We wanted to build something that celebrates every era of gaming," Jenkins told me. "But more importantly, we wanted to give something back. Gaming has always brought people together—and now we're using it to support the community." That vision led to the creation of the Cleveland Gaming Foundation, a charitable expansion of the Classic's mission. Jenkins explained that the Foundation focuses heavily on supporting youth programs. educational initiatives, and community engagement. "This is where we connect passion with purpose," he said. "And every year, the impact grows."



A Perfect Fit for American Legion Children & Youth Programs

As I walked the venue, I couldn't help but think about how naturally this event aligns with the American Legion's Children & Youth initiatives. The Cleveland Gaming Classic is exactly the type of positive, family-centered community engagement that posts can highlight on their Consolidated **Post Report** (CPR). Several veterans and Legion family members I spoke with agreed. One Navy veteran attending with his teenage daughter told me, "Esports and gaming bring in kids who wouldn't normally walk through Legion doors. This is our bridge to the next generation."

Ohio Leading the Charge With Esports

Ohio isn't just keeping up with the movement; it's helping lead it.

If you couldn't attend this year, I highly recommend watching the highlight video to get a sense of the excitement and scope of the event. It's a glimpse into a world where nostalgia, technology, creativity, and community meet under one roof. But don't worryanother chance is coming soon. The 2026 Cleveland Gaming Classic will shift to the **Huntington Conven**tion Center in downtown Cleveland, running September 11-13, 2026. With a larger venue, expanding community programs, and growing national attention, next year's event promises to raise the bar even higher.

As I left the IX Center, I turned back to see a crowd cheering around a finals match on the main stage. A group of kids wearing oversized cosplay helmets rushed past me, laughing, while parents followed close behind. It struck me again that this wasn't simply a gaming convention-it was a community celebration. And for the American Legion, it's a new frontier waiting to be explored.
