ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP WORKSHOP

The annual Membership Workshop was held in Indianapolis on July 28-30. This 3 day workshop provides training for District 1st Vice Commanders, District Commanders, Department leadership, and Department staff in areas of membership recruitment and retention, fundraising, public relations, amongst others.

For the Department leadership and staff, the highlight of the weekend is the Commander's briefing with the Leading Candidate for National Commander. This year, that Leading Candidate is Charles Schmitt from Oregon. This briefing is where each Department explains their membership plans for the upcoming year and National then sets a quota they see as reasonable and achievable.

While there is an exact science to how the National quota is derived, each Department is afforded the ability to suggest either a higher or lower quota. Prior to this year's briefing, your Department leadership and staff met and agreed upon what we believed could be attainable. This number was 100,000, 5,000 members over National's proposed quota of 95,000.

You may or may not be asking, "Why would they ask for a higher quota than what was proposed?"

The reason is, we believe that together this is highly achievable. Your Department leadership and membership staff believes in each of you. We believe our Posts and Districts are doing the right things in forging an American Legion for the future, are creating programs and events that will appeal to the remaining 640,000 eligible veterans in Ohio who have yet to belong, and we believe that the work that needs to be done at EVERY level can, and will, be accomplished.

This past membership year was only the second year since 1946 that our membership has been under this 100,000 mark. Membership has been on a downward slide since reaching our all-time high in 1992-1993. In that year, the Department membership was over 167,000 members. Every veteran who has served during this downward slide is an eligible veteran which begs the question, "Why is membership not growing?" There are many different theories that many see as the answer. Each Post and District must evaluate themselves, and we must do the same here at Department Headquarters, to understand why this is. There is no one right answer, there are many, and each geographical region in this state has an answer that can and will work, we must simply act on the issues we find and correct them.

If you are an active Post that makes quota every year, and this year will be no different for you, there is no reason to stop when you hit that mark. Not only can you, and should you, continue to work on membership in your own Post, but why not help the Post in the next town over that is struggling? We are all in this together. We have Districts that hit quota, but not all Posts in that District is a quota Post. EVERY Post needs assistance. EVERY Post can be a quota Post with a little help from our friends. We are an American Legion family and every Post in every town need members just as much as every town NEEDS an American Legion.

The stakes are high, the standards and expectations are high, but our belief in each of you is higher.

IT'S AN INTERNAL AFFAIR

Have you ever looked at something, maybe a car or a house, and thought to yourself, "it sure would be nice to be able to have that?" In economic theory, this is what is known as a "positional good," or a product that gains its value based on desirability; a product that symbolizes a higher social status. Perceiving affluence is more important than actually being affluent. The perception of value in a product or service is what drives the desirability to possess the product or service.

Those of us who belong to The American Legion earned our membership, and not everyone can belong. We earned our membership through sacrifice, through dedication and devotion to our country, and by answering the call to duty. Not all of us served in theater, but we were ready and prepared when our nation needed us the most. There is a certain pride we should all take in that fact.

But are we losing the stature that comes with a membership in The American Legion? Are our communities still looking at The American Legion as a higher class? Unfortunately, those of us that hold a membership card will undoubtedly have a bias opinion so these questions are not for us to answer, but these are certainly questions we need to be asking our communities as our membership continues to

We need to ask ourselves what inspired each of us to belong. Was it out of philanthropy and the desire to better your community? Was it because you felt lost in a sea of civilians and needed to be around fellow brothers and sisters in arms? Was it out of a family legacy of membership? Did you join because you believed in the cause of a specific program run by The American Legion? Did you want to stand tall wearing a Fort Knox cap emblazoned with The American Legion logo? Whatever your reason for joining was, all of you hold a card that not everyone can.

Whatever value you take out of your membership into The American Legion must be shared throughout our communities and with our fellow veterans of ALL generations who do not currently belong. And if they do not perceive the same value then we must create value for them. We must find out what a nonmember would find worthy enough to pay Post dues to be involved with, and we must give that to them.

I would venture to say that there is not a single Post Constitution and By-Laws in the state that says the Post cannot do something new. There is also nothing on the books that says that by doing something new that you can't continue what is already being done. "Jason, it would be great to do the things you are suggesting, we just don't have anyone that can do it. Our membership is too old, no one is coming to the meetings, and most don't seem to care." It will be through our benefit of veterans that a fellow vet will look at what we are doing and think to themself, "I've been there and I'd like

We can turn membership around, and we can do it soon. We just have to accept that the prestige of membership, the desire to be a part of what we are doing has changed as society and the issues affecting our veterans have changed. We have to be willing to recognize that change, and we have to be willing to accept our responsibility as the world's largest war-time veteran's organization. We need to be at the forefront of every community with the same dedication and devotion we had when we joined the military in helping the veterans of THAT community. We have to be willing to adjust fire with the changing tides and be the cover fire our fellow veterans are needing.

Over this next membership year, I am asking every Post in the state, to hold a fundraiser. Renovate an amputee veteran's home, use the money to purchase groceries for a veteran struggling to pay their bills, start a program that pays for student veteran's to take internships so they don't have to work full-time for pay and miss out on valuable experience that will help them get a job. Veterans Affairs - Discharge Upgrade

Do you know a veteran, or are a veteran, who served their country and made a bad choice which resulted in an unfavorable discharge? Or, do you know a veteran, or are a veteran, who was discharged based on sexuality? If you are or know someone who experienced this, please keep reading. Are these discharges fair? That is not for us to decide. All veterans have earned the right to allow the Military Board of Corrections for each branch of service to review the evidence and argument presented to them.

Since September 2011, the 18 year ban on openly gay and lesbian service personnel was lifted through repealing the "Don't Ask - Don't Tell" policy which was passed by Congress and signed into law in 1993 under President Bill Clinton. This

means there are thousands of service-members who were discharged because of sexual orientation. This type of discharge is listed on their DD-214's and can be a humiliating experience when having to provide an organization, or other entity, a copy of their DD-214 for membership or services.

Another scenario is consequences that resulted due to symptoms of Post-Traumatic Stress and Traumatic Brain Injury (PTS/TBI) either due to combat, deployments, and military sexual trauma which may have contributed to an unfavorable discharge. These consequences tend to follow the veteran and they can sometimes be denied services or assistance within their Counties and the VA.

So, what can be done? The

American Legion is a strong advocate to help all veterans and especially those we are talking about here. Veterans Affairs and Rehabilitation is the forefront of our Four (4) Pillars of VA&R, Americanism, National Security, and Children & Youth. We can help you determine whether or not a discharge upgrade would be in your favor and expertly prepare a packet to the Military Board of Corrections who will review the evidence and make a determination. Wait! Can we reconsider that one? - RONR p. 310-315

Meeting over, a bunch of decisions made for the good of the order, a little bit of socializing and then on the way home. About half the way home you start thinking that one of the decisions just seems like it may have been wrong or you wish you had more information to discuss before the decision was made. You talk to a few other members and they also feel that the discussion seemed rushed and wished to get a do over. YOU CAN - by using one of the "Motions that bring a question again before the assembly", You have four op-

(RONR Chapter IX). tions; 1) Take from the Table, 2) Rescind or Amend Something Previously Adopted, 3) Discharge the Committee, and 4) Reconsider. Now I could use a newsletter for each of these actions, and may do this in the future, but for now let's understand the general use. motion was debat-Take from the

Table is used when a motion was voted to "lay on the table," think of a table over in the corner, which moves the motion to a future point in the same session to consider a more important item on the agenda. A motion to take from the table must be seconded, is not debatable and must pass with a majority vote for the discussion on the question to continue.

Reconsider is used to bring back a previous decision that was approved in the same meeting before adjournment. If you are in a multiple day meeting then the motion to reconsider must be brought before the next day's end after the decision. Key to this motion is that it must be brought by someone who voted for the original motion. Also, it must be seconded, is debat-

able if the original

able, and needs a majority to pass.

Rescind or Amend Something Previously Adopted is normally used to remove or change a previously approved action or policy. This motion is considered only after the meeting has adjourned or if while in the same multiple day meeting one full day has passed. In other words, an approved policy in day one can be rescinded or amended in day three or greater, otherwise in day two you would reconsider. This motion must be seconded, is debatable, and passes with 2/3 rising vote if no prior

jority otherwise. Discharge a Committee is used when a body or board has committed (referred) a question to a committee, wants to take the question back for further consideration, and the committee

Legion Members "Rock The Walk" For Ohio Veterans

SANDUSKY, OHIO -

A somewhat arduous but pleasant 71-mile, on-foot journey, impressive views along the southern edge of Lake Erie AND the joy of bettering the lives of veterans – it's safe to say those who participated in "Rock The Walk" May 19-22 had a full and rewarding weekend.

Members of the American Legion Post 214, American Legion Auxiliary Unit 214, and Sons of the American Legion, Squad 214 in Willoughby, Ohio, put themselves through the rigors of the four-day trek to raise money for the Ohio Veterans Home in Sandusky.

When they arrived, organizers Susan and Bob Fratino presented a large check for \$7,000. The aim: to equip the facility with several new mounted television screens.

"When we came up with the idea, my husband and I thought maybe we could hit \$3,000," said Susan Fratino, 1st Vice President of the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 214. "But we received so much support from family and friends and the community. We received corporate

sponsors, pledges.

"To actually finish that walk and enter the Veterans Home was pretty awesome."

The trip began in Willoughby Hills on Thurs., May 19, traversed scenic portions of State Rte. 6, and was completed on Sunday, May 22 with the purpose to support "those American heroes who proudly and selflessly served our great country to preserve all the freedoms that we enjoy today."

The group of 20 or so was joined on part of the walk by Lorain Mayor Chase Ritenauer and also received congratulations from Sandusky City manager Eric Wobser.

The Veterans Home in Sandusky, which includes a domiciliary, is a 720-bed nursing home and independent living facility. The Sandusky home opened in 1888 to service veterans of the Civil War and today continues to serve Ohio's wartime veterans.

At Buckeye Boys State, I was put into Schnug City of Wagonseller County. There were 42 other guys in my city and I became very close to all of them as the week progressed. We loved spending our free time together and relating to one another. Even during the busy work days, we would still check in on each other. There were truly strong bonds formed between us all. The counselors and Legionnaires were some of the most inspiring people I have ever met. For my career (at Boys State), I became the city safety/service director. I recorded many censuses, was in charge of checking everyone in, and helped out in other departments such as Engineer, Law Director, City Council. I also got to leave campus and actually see what an actual Safety/Service Director job entails, such as learning how a windmill and water treatment facility are maintained.

Out of all these great experiences, there is one that really stuck with me. At the first nightly assembly there was a WWII veteran. At the end of the assembly as everyone left the building, I stayed behind to shake his hand and thank him for his service. I've met many veterans before, but never a WWII veteran. That moment of talking to that elder will always stay with me as my grandfather served in WWII in the navy but died when I was only three years old preventing me from being able to grow up with him by my side. Simply seeing someone who went through the same things he did and seeing how he could've been was a gift that I will never forget, nor can I thank you all enough for. I have earned a newfound respect and all men and women who stood for it.

Once again, I cannot thank you all enough for giving me this opportunity. I will continue to speak proudly to others about the program and represent the American Legion with the utmost honor.



As The Public Sees the Legion By Georges D. Romeike

HOW widely are you known? If your name were mentioned before a gathering of Americans anywhere-a Legion post in Aroostook County, Maine, the Thursday Ladies' Bridge Club of Ingleside Avenue, Chicago, or Local No. 2 of the Gravel Roofers' Union, San Diego, Cal.-how many present could say, "Certainly, I've heard of him"? Not many. But don't be crestfallen or cast down. There are others in the same boat-many others. In point of fact, the average American stands about two chances in a million of achieving national fame or identity. Of the 110,000,000 people in the United States not more than 220 are at this moment nationally known, like, say, President Harding, Mary Pickford, General Pershing, Babe Ruth or Henry Ford. Who is Secretary of the Interior? Who is governor of Kentucky? The ranking officer of the Navy? President of Yale? Of Sears-Roebuck and Company? Of the Santa Fe, our longest railroad? Possibly you can answer these questions. If so, you can do more than most people can, yet each individual concerned is a very distinguished personage. Who is National Commander of The American Legion? But I forgot I was addressing a Legion audience. Of course you know. But how many others do? Well, a good many. The National Commander of The American Legion is better known than any of the people referred to in the questions asked in the preceding paragraph. He is one of the two-in-a-million, one of our figures really in the national public eye. He is probably known to more people than most of the women standing highest on the various lists of America's Twelve Most Famous Women which so many feminists have beer, compiling of late. He is better known than most of our high

officials of the Government. But he

is not so well known as a certain manufacturer of chewing gum, several baseball players, prize fighters, statesmen, financiers, actors and actresses (movie and otherwise), and at least one inventor. Fame is a versatile thing. I happen to know these things because it is my business to know them. The statements I have made are not guesses, but facts which can be proved by statistics-statistics based on newspaper clippings. Knowledge is spread, people and things become known, from what other people read, see and hear, but principally by what they read. And the most widelyread thing in the United States is the newspaper. There are more than 20,000 of them. Thus, when we find that by a month-to-month average a certain person is receiving so many columns of newspaper mention the country over, we know to what extent he is known to others. Why do people and organizations get mentioned in the newspapers, and thus become well known? Simply because what they say or do interests others or has some bearing on their lives. What you see in the papers is there because most of that paper's readers want it there. By no other policy can a newspaper be successful and continue to exist. The American Legion, although the youngest of our great national organizations, is one of the best known. The others who rank highest in point of newspaper mention are the Red Cross the Y. M. C. A., the Knights of Columbus, the Y. W. C. A. and the Salvation Army. The Legion was born with a great publicity heritage. When the war ended the two best-known organizations in the country were the Army and the Navy. As they disbanded, public interest followed the men who made them. What did these men do? They joined The American Legion, and while your membership figures are unfamiliar to me-enough of them joined

to make the word Legion synonymous with veteran, just as Volstead is synonymous with prohibition and Rockefeller with Standard Oil. But that isn't what has kept the Legion before the public. It has been kept there because its leaders have been outstanding personalities and its activities have been of public interest.

For a generation the most widely known conventions in America were the national conventions of the two principal political parties, held every four years. Organizations and movements came and went but their national gatherings never got an amount of newspaper space that would compare with that given the conventions which met to select men who successively became our "next presidents." The Legion has smashed this precedent. Your last convention at Kansas City received more newspaper space than any other similar gathering in America. It ran a close second to a national political convention. A high mark was set up. and you probably know better than I do the prospects of exceeding it in future conventions. I may say, however, that items bearing on your meeting in New Orleans next fall already are appearing in the papers. The distinguished foreign visitors who came to the United States last year as the guests of the Legion helped your convention publicity and helped impress the Legion on the public mind. Marshal Foch received more publicity than any foreign visitor who ever set foot on United States soil, and this goes back to the visit of the future King Edward VII in the 60's. Our clipping bureau collected one hundred and fifty pounds of clippings on the Legion's guests from only 2,000 principal newspapers. We just took the cream. Few Americans traveling abroad received the publicity that followed the Legion party headed by National Commander

Emery which went to France last summer. It ranked probably next to President Wilson's triumphal tour after the Armistice and Theodore Roosevelt's visit in 1909 when he returned from Africa. I eliminate Pershing and the A. E. F. as unfair competition. Great as is the interest which attached itself to a Legion convention however the amount of newspaper space one gets so far has fallen short of what was written about the Jeffries-Johnson fight in 1910 and the Dempsey-Carpentier match last year. World's baseball series also give you a run for your money. My office records show that the Legion's fight for the Adjusted Compensation Bill is establishing a publicity record. The contest has been long drawn out and has received as much publicity as the fight for woman suffrage did in its closing year. It probably has been the most written-about legislative contest since the battle over the League of Nations issue. The amount of space the newspapers devote to a man's death is always an indication of the public interest which attaches to the man and to the cause he represented. When Colonel Galbraith was killed the amount of publicity given that tragic event equaled that which would have been given the death of one of the country's twenty-five most prominent men. Mr. Galbraith had a personality which was particularly interesting to the public. In the minds of newspaper readers he will always be associated with the Legion's efforts in behalf of the disabled, and for what he said to the German propagandist, Von Mach. When Galbraith denounced Von Mach and ordered him from his room the story went around the world. Papers in Paris put it on the front page. The most striking bit of Legion publicity I have seen this year was when Mr. MacNider declined to resign the commandership to consider the United States senatorship from Iowa. It made people want to know more about a Legion whose commander preferred that job to a senator's seat.

Being in the clipping bureau business enables one to enjoy a peculiar insight into public affairs. We are able to see men and events as others see them. It is quite an asset. It is in fact the basis of our business. People want to see themselves as others see them. The easiest way this can be done is to peruse what the newspapers are saying about them. Nearly every man in public life, and every organization which has vital public relations, is a clipping-bureau subscriber. They want to know what the people are reading and saying about them. Praise, of course, is always most acceptable. I have had clients discontinue our service because the clippings we sent them were not sufficiently fulsome in praise. On the other hand we have clients who ask only for adverse criticism. Our clients range from kings and queens down. About a vear ago a European monarch requested clippings for one month which should contain any mention of his name. As far as we could learn not a single American newspaper mentioned that ruler's name during the month the order was in effect. It was not renewed. As I said, the clipping bureau business enables one to see others as they are seen through the eye of the American press, which is almost the eye of the American people. I am not a member of the Legion. My knowledge of its affairs has come to me entirely through the channels of my business. The picture I have given vou is most incomplete. It is not a picture, only a series of impressions and comparisons, which in a rough way approximate the conception the man in the street has of the Legion. It is distinctly a favorable impression, and I congratulate vou. Interesting times to be sure, much different from today. Or was it?

Veterans Administration Arithmetic

In olden times, when those dinosaurs of my generation trudged wearily to elementaryschool (yes, in them thar days warn't no yellow busses) we began the numbers racket by startingwith addition. Zero through nine were a must, as they were supposedly the bases for all that wasto follow. 1 + 1 is 2. 1 + 2 is 3. 2 + 2 is 4. etc., etc., etc.,or so I thought. We had our share ofkiddies who thought 2 + 2 = 22which reminds me of the New York TV Talking Head who whilereading the nightly news referred to WW II as World War Eleven. The station quickly sent out amemo that absolutely prohibited the future use of Roman Numerals.

What's all this got to do with the VA? Well, its like this... a Viet Nam Veteran friend ofmine who in retirement spends much of his time counseling veterans, questioned me regardingwhat he termed, VA

Math. "Never heard of it", was my reply. "Then take a look at 38 CFR*Book C." I did.

Welcome to the world of VA Multiple Disability Ratings.

First, some basics: When a veteran claims a disability the VA starts with the assumption of 100% efficiency in the performance of daily activities including work. After a claim isprocessed a percentage of disability may be determined, say 10%. The veteran's efficiency nowis 90%. So far, so good; but, what happens when there is more than one injury or illness? Therein lies the mystery of VA Math. For example, a veteran with two disabilities, 60% and 30%, add up to a disability rating of 72%. Don't believe it? Check the Combined Ratings Table 1 at Section 4.25. Here's how it works.

The disabilities are arranged as to their severity, greater disability

first. One finds themagic numbers from Table 1 and add them together. The total will then be converted to thenearest number divisible by 10 and combined numbers ending in 5 will be adjusted upward. Thus, with a disability of 40% and one of 20% the combined value is 52% but the 52% must beconverted to the closest number divisible by 10, which is 50%. Does this make any sense to you?

Returning to 38 CFR Book C, Sec. 4.25 (a) let's see what will be the answer when threedisabilities occur. 

DO NOT: scribble a write-up and

DO NOT: cut photos and articles out from other publications and submit. There are copyright and intellectual property laws that we must abide by. Submitting an article and picture from another publication can cause myself, and the Legion, to face plagiarism lawsuits that come with very hefty fines.

Rd, Delaware, OH, 43015 or email them to legion@ohiolegion.com with the subject line: Ohio Legion News submission. DO NOT: send in random photos

DO NOT: send in random photos or emails with no reason as to why I am receiving them and expect me to guess as to why. We also have photo contests for the new Legion Calendar and I don't want to mistake one for the other.

Our next OLN Deadline is October 28th, 2016. I look forward to receiving your photos and articles!
